

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Pa never had much compassion for the lazy or those who squandered their means and then never had enough for the necessities. Soon Pa came back in. It was a cold clear night out and there was ice in his beard. "Come on, Matt," he said. "Bundle up good, it's cold out tonight." I was really upset then. Not only wasn't I getting the rifle for Christmas, now Pa was dragging me out in the cold, and for no earthly reason that I could see. We'd already done all the chores, and I couldn't think of anything else that needed doing, especially not on a night like this. But I knew Pa was not very patient at one dragging one's feet when he'd told them to do something, so I got up and put my boots back on and got my cap, coat, and mittens. Ma gave me a mysterious smile as I opened the door to leave the house. Something was up, but I didn't know what.


Outside, I became even more dismayed. There in front of the house was the work team, already hitched to the big sled. Whatever it was we were going to do wasn't going to be a short, quick, little job. I could tell. We never hitched up this sled unless we were going to haul a big load.

Pa was already up on the seat, reins in hand. I reluctantly climbed up beside him. The cold was already biting at me. I wasn't happy. When I was on, Pa pulled the sled around the house and stopped in front of the woodshed. He got off and I followed. "I think we'll put on the high sideboards," he said. "Here, help me." The high sideboards! It had been a bigger job than I wanted to do with just the low sideboards on, but whatever it was we were going to do would be a lot bigger with the high sideboards on.

After we had exchanged the sideboards, Pa went into the woodshed and came out with an armload of wood---the wood I'd spent all summer hauling down from the mountain, and then all Fall sawing into blocks and splitting.

What was he doing? Finally I said something. "Pa," I asked, "what are you doing?" You been by the Widow Jensen's lately?" he asked. The Widow Jensen lived about two miles down the road. Her husband had died a year or so before and left her with three children, the oldest being eight. Sure, I'd been by, but so what? "Yeah," I said, "Why?" "I rode by just today," Pa said. "Little Jakey was out digging around in the wood pile trying to find a few chips. They're out of wood, Matt."

That was all he said and then he turned and went back into the woodshed for another armload of wood. I followed him. We loaded the sled so high that I began to wonder if the horses would be able to pull it. Finally, Pa called a halt to our loading, then we went to the smoke house and Pa took down a big ham and a side of bacon. He handed them to me



and told me to put them in the sled and wait.

When he returned he was carrying a sack of flour over his right shoulder and a smaller sack of something in his left hand. "What's in the little sack?" I asked. "Shoes. They're out of shoes. Little Jakey just had gunnysacks wrapped around his feet when he was out in the woodpile this morning. I got the children a little candy too. It just wouldn't be Christmas without a little candy."

We rode the two miles to Widow Jensen's pretty much in silence. I tried to think through what Pa was doing. We didn't have much by worldly standards. Of course, we did have a big woodpile, though most of what was left now was still in the form of logs that I would have to saw into blocks and split before we could use it. We also had meat and flour, so we could spare that, but I knew we didn't have any money, so why was Pa buying them shoes and candy?

Really, why was he doing any of this? Widow Jensen had closer neighbors than us; it shouldn't have been our concern. We came in from the blind side of the Jensen house and unloaded the wood as quietly as possible, and then we took the meat and flour and shoes to the door. We knocked. The door opened a crack and a timid voice said, "Who is it?"

"Lucas Miles, Ma'am, and my son, Matt. Could we come in for a bit?"

Widow Jensen opened the door and let us in. She had a blanket wrapped around her shoulders. The children were wrapped in another and were sitting in front of the fireplace by a very small fire that hardly gave off any heat at all. Widow Jensen fumbled with a match and finally lit the lamp. "We brought you a few things, Ma'am," Pa said and set down the sack of flour. I put the meat on the table. Then Pa handed her the sack that had the shoes in it.

She opened it hesitantly and took the shoes out one pair at a time. There was a pair for her and one for each of the children -- sturdy shoes, the best, shoes that would last. I watched her carefully. She bit her lower lip to keep it from trembling and then tears filled her eyes and started running down her cheeks. She looked up at Pa like she wanted to say something, but it wouldn't come out.

"We brought a load of wood too, Ma'am," Pa said. He turned to me and said, "Matt, go bring in enough to last awhile. Let's get that fire up to size and heat this place up." I wasn't the same person when I went back out to bring in the wood. I had a big lump in my throat and as much as I hate to admit it, there were tears in my eyes too. In my mind I kept seeing those three kids huddled around the fireplace and their mother standing there with tears running down

her cheeks with so much gratitude in her heart that she couldn't speak. My heart swelled within me and a joy that I'd never known before filled my soul. I had given at Christmas many times before, but never when it had made so much difference. I could see we were literally saving the lives of these people.

I soon had the fire blazing and everyone's spirits soared. The kids started giggling when Pa handed them each a piece of candy and Widow Jensen looked on with a smile that probably hadn't crossed her face for a long time. She finally turned to us. "God bless you," she said. "I know the Lord has sent you. The children and I have been praying that he would send one of his angels to spare us."

In spite of myself, the lump returned to my throat and the tears welled up in my eyes again. I'd never thought of Pa in those exact terms before, but after Widow Jensen mentioned it I could see that it was probably true. I was sure that a better man than Pa had never walked the earth. I started remembering all the times he had gone out of his way for Ma and me, and many others. The list seemed endless as I thought on it.

Pa insisted that everyone try on the shoes before we left. I was amazed when they all fit and I wondered how he had known what sizes to get. Then I guessed that if he was on an errand for the Lord that the Lord would make sure he got the right sizes.

Tears were running down Widow Jensen's face again when we stood up to leave. Pa took each of the kids in his big arms and gave them a hug. They clung to him and didn't want us to go. I could see that they missed their Pa, and I was glad that I still had mine.

At the door Pa turned to Widow Jensen and said, "The Mrs. wanted me to invite you and the children over for Christmas dinner tomorrow. The turkey will be more than the three of us can eat, and a man can get cantankerous if he has to eat turkey for too many meals. We'll be by to

get you about eleven. It'll be nice to have some little ones around again. Matt, here, hasn't been little for quite a spell." I was the youngest. My two brothers and two sisters had all married and had moved away. Widow Jensen nodded and said, "Thank you, Brother Miles. I don't have to say, "'May the Lord bless you,' I know for certain that He will."

Out on the sled I felt a warmth that came from deep within and I didn't even notice the cold. When we had gone a ways, Pa turned to me and said, "Matt, I want you to know something. Your ma and me have been tucking a little money away here and there all year so we could buy that rifle for you, but we didn't have quite enough.

Then yesterday a man who owed me a little money from years back came by to make things square. Your ma and me were real excited, thinking that now we could get you that rifle, and I started into town this morning to do just that. But on the way I saw little Jakey out scratching in the woodpile with his feet wrapped in those gunnysacks and I knew what I had to do. Son, I spent the money for shoes and a little candy for those children. I hope you understand."

I understood, and my eyes became wet with tears again. I understood very well, and I was so glad Pa had done it. Now the rifle seemed very low on my list of priorities. Pa had given me a lot more. He had given me the look on Widow Jensen's face and the radiant smiles of her three children.

For the rest of my life, whenever I saw any of the Jensens, or split a block of wood, I remembered, and remembering brought back that same joy I felt riding home beside Pa that night. Pa had given me much more than a rifle that night; he had given me the best Christmas of my life

Since 1993, we have received a grant from the E. Stuart James Grant Charitable Trust for spaying and neutering In fact, we have spent programs. approximately \$1 million on our various spay/neuter programs.

We have received \$50,000 for the next year, so we will be able to continue our rebate program for residents of Danville and Pittsylvania County. A certificate must be picked up from the shelter at least the day before the animal is taken to the veterinary clinic for the surgery.

The general guidelines are:

1. The money is to be used for residents of Danville and Pittsylvania County. The pets must live with them.

2. Clients will not be able to use our rebate program if they have been approved for any of our other programs, including grants that we give to local veterinary clinics.

3. No money can be used to facilitate the adoption of any animal from any other rescue group or shelter.

4. No money can be used for any animal being fostered for another group.

5. The money cannot be used for general trap/neuter/release programs. The exception would be if an individual will take legal responsibility of the feral cat's lifetime care, including providing food, water, shelter, and veterinary care and the cats are released on the person's personal property.

The real math is this: Every minute in the United States, 50 dogs, 50 cats, and 8 humans are born. That means that a family of four must have 25 pets in order for there to be no homeless dogs and





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The medical benefits for a spayed/ neutered dog or cat are numerous. Neutering males decreases and often eliminates diseases that intact male dogs are prone to later in life, including diseases of the prostate, testicles, and other tissues influenced by male hormones.

Spaying female dogs and cats entirely eliminates diseases of the ovaries and uterus, and if performed befOore the first heat, greatly reduces the chance of mammary cancer. Behavior is only positively affected by the sterilization surgery. A neutered male cat's territorial spraying is decreased. And spayed or neutered dogs and cats fight less and wander less.

The reality is that larger shelters and more adoptions cannot solve all of the problems with pet overpopulation. Ending the unwanted litters is the only solution; everything else just puts a bandage on the situation.

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

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



DCC Hosts Amazon, Sumitomo Fiber Optic Fusion Training



Danville, Va., December 12, 2019 — Danville Community College (DCC) hosted 30 trainees during Amazon Web Services' (AWS) first fusion splicing training on the east coast this week.

Of those 30 students, two are full-time DCC instructors, one is a part-time instructor, a teacher trainer from Go-TEC (Great Opportunities in Technology and Engineering Careers), an instructor from Pittsylvania Career & Technical Center (PCTC), and current students from DCC and PCTC.

According to The Fiber Optic Association, Inc., fusion splicing is the process of fusing or welding two fibers together, usually by an electric arc.

"An average office building has one pair, or two strands. This cable can contain approximately seven thousand strands. The fiber optic cables you were trained on over the last two days are a critical element to our data center and network infrastructure, but those same cutting edge cables are going to be more widely adopted as data center usage proliferates, along with the growth of 5G and rural broadband initiatives," said AWS Economic Development, Public Policy, Infrastructure Global Expansion Principal Roger Wehner during a graduation ceremony on Tuesday, December 10.





Holiday Baked Brie

- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 8 ounces button mushrooms, sliced kosher salt ground black pepper
- 1 brie round (8 ounces) 3 tablespoons honey
- 1/4 cup pomegranate arils 1/4 cup shelled pistachios

Heat oven to 350 F. In large skillet, heat butter over medium-high heat. Add mushrooms; cook 8-10 minutes, or until deep golden brown, stirring frequently. Season with salt and pepper; remove from heat.

Place brie on parchment-lined rimmed baking pan; drizzle with honey. Transfer to oven and bake 5-7 minutes, or until inside of cheese is softened but outside remains intact.

Roasted Garlic-Whipped Feta Crostini

- 1 bulb garlic (about
- 12 cloves) tablespoons olive
- oil, divided teaspoon salt, divided

- 8 ounces feta cheese 1/2 cup whole milk
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 cup pomegranate seeds 1/4 cup parsley, minced

Heat oven to 400 F. Slice garlic bulb in half. exposing garlic heads; place in center of large piece of foil. Drizzle each half with 1 tablespoon olive oil, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Wrap foil tightly around garlic and roast until caramelized, about 30 minutes.

Place baguette slices on large baking sheet and drizzle with olive oil. Bake on middle rack until golden brown, about 10 minutes; set aside.

Place feta cheese, milk, lemon juice, remaining salt and remaining pepper in high-speed food processor. Once garlic finishes roasting, add garlic cloves to food processor. Pulse until whipped and creamy, adding more milk as needed to reach desired consistency. Adjust

seasonings, to taste, if necessary. To serve, spread each crostini with whipped feta and sprinkle with pomegranate seeds and





Cheese Buds

- 1 cup cake flour or all-purpose flour

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
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








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
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
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Baked Ham with the Best Glaze



Ingredients

11.5 lb fully cooked bone-in ham spiral cut (10-15 lb ham)

1/2 cup apricot preserves

1/4 cup honey

1/4 cup brown sugar packed

1/4 cup dijon mustard

3 Tbsp unsalted butter

Instructions

Let ham sit covered at room temperature 2 hours (or 1 hr for a 6-7 lb ham) before roasting, then remove packaging.

While ham is coming to room temperature, make the sauce. In a small saucepan over medium heat, combine apricot preserves, honey, brown sugar, dijon, and butter. Bring to a simmer and cook 1 minute, whisking constantly then remove from heat. The sauce should be the consistency of loose honey.

Heat oven to 325°F with the oven rack in the lower third of the oven. Line your roasting pan with foil for easier cleanup. Place ham in a roasting pan cut-side down. Brush on 1/3 of the glaze and cover tightly with foil. Bake at 325 for 10-11 minutes per pound (about 2 hours for an 11.5 lb ham). Keep in mind ham is already cooked, and you just want to heat it up to about 110°F. Use an oven-safe, internal temperature probe to test for doneness.

Increase oven to 425° F. Remove ham from the oven and brush with 1/3 of glaze. Return to oven and bake uncovered 10 minutes.

Remove from oven and brush with remaining 1/3 glaze and roast uncovered another 10 minutes until a brown crust has formed and the internal temperature reaches $130-135^{\circ}F$. Keep in mind once the ham is removed from the oven, the temperature will rise another 5-10 degrees to bring it to the recommended $140^{\circ}F$

Transfer ham to a serving dish and rest ham 15-20 minutes before serving. Strain pan juices through a sieve, skim off the fat that floats to the top. Spoon pan juices over ham slices when serving.
