Dear "Speak Out,"

As I set the remains of my plate of scrambled eggs aside to write this, I pause for a moment to reflect on how humanity has survived these last two post-apocalyptic decades since January 1, 2000. Today is the twentieth anniversary of that fateful day, commonly known as Y2K, and the ensuing chaos that swallowed us into the bowels of a digital crisis that hit a virtual reset: Cars wouldn't start, bank accounts were wiped. All was lost and we started from zero.

Obviously, none of that happened. Yet, we were convinced by vocal industry "experts" that crisis was inevitable. As an IT engineer at the time, I can assure that Y2K wasn't just a play to panic businesses into costly system upgrades. Senior engineers far more experienced than I were amassing fuel stores on their property up to the maximum legal limit to, I suppose, keep the lights on a couple more weeks than their powerless and looted neighbors.

Not only did the promise of a boot cut jeans-filled rehash of the Dark Ages fail to materialize, I struggle to recall even minor inconveniences. The nothingness landed with a resounding thud.

How could IT professionals - experts who designed and maintained the very systems expected to fail - have been caught up in the panic and so blind to the eventual outcome?

The answer is simple: Being an expert can make you, well, not.

Yeah, experience and expertise are the foundations of any profession. When an overwhelming variable like Y2K enters the picture, the playing field is drastically altered, and in extreme cases, human emotion enters the fray. As the mind struggles to solve a problem with insufficient data to form a well-vetted conclusion, it relies on the one resource it has: Experience. Anecdotal evidence is given credibility, and data relied on may be qualitative rather than quantitative. We'd never flipped the century odometer in the digital age, so the outcome was anyone's guess.

This sort of thing couldn't happen again, could it?

Yes. Despite its lessons, history does have a way of repeating itself. Mass anxiety, viral, sensationalized predictions of a crisisinducing outcome. New Year's 2020 features all that and more here in New York State. This is Y2K-2020.

What's the crisis? New York's cash bail reform, with changes set to go into effect on January 1, 2020. Were you to buy into the predictions floating around Social Media, you've probably set up your house with Home Alone-style booby traps to stave off the onslaught of accused, freed criminals running amok.

Bail simply allows people who can afford it to be released, while those who can't remain in jail until their trial. Presuming that bail prevents these individuals from skipping court implies logical thought in a group of citizens where logic is likely not what drives their actions. Terroristic threats, vehicular assault etc. Certain scenarios can drive extreme behavior: Poverty, rage, mental illness. Bail is not justice, nor is it a punishment. A fair trial will impose penalties once a trial by jury has found the person guilty.

We cannot pre-convict citizens accused of breaking the law. We are not Fascists. Yet, it seems the opposition to bail reform refer to the accused as "criminals" without affording them their constitutional right to a trial. Every American deserves the same opportunity to defend themselves - even those who can't afford bail.

District Attorneys, police officers are the industry insiders in this case; the experts. But like IT pros during Y2K, they are too close to the situation; the predictions are based on past experience and not an analysis arrived at scientifically. The reality is, they don't know what the outcome of bail reform will be. None of us do. And that scares them. Their concerns are anecdotal; nothing I've read follows the scientific method other than the assurance it will

have negative consequences. It's a good thing pharmaceutical companies don't employ this methodology when developing new drugs.

Of course, the concerns could be justified and the outcome could be pretty dire. I simply maintain that no one knows. In fact, the data we DO have comes from other states who have passed similar bail reform - like New Jersey - and in New Jersey, I've read that there was no increase in missed court dates or crimes committed by parties awaiting trial. Could similar reform fail in New York? Of course. If it does, fortunately, laws can change. It can be be rethought based on the results, or rescinded altogether. It is not carved in stone.

My prediction? The reality of bail reform will not warrant the level of widespread panic happening right now. I think the concerns are big on politics and small on logic.

My gut says things will be just fine. #Y2K2020

A Focus on Prevention for National Diabetes Awareness Month

During National Diabetes Awareness Month, the Livingston County Department of Health is encouraging residents to learn their risks for prediabetes and type 2 diabetes, and to take preventive steps to potentially reduce their chances of developing the disease.

Statistics for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) show that one in four Americans (86 million people) have prediabetes, up from 79 million in 2010. Prediabetes is a condition in which a person's blood glucose is elevated, but not high enough for a diabetes diagnosis. Only 10 percent of those with prediabetes know they have it but with awareness and simple actions, people with prediabetes may prevent the onset of diabetes.

"The Livingston County Department of Health works with community partners to provide education on risk factors and to encourage screening regarding diabetes to improve the health of our residents", stated Jennifer Rodriquez, Public Health Director.

Lifestyle choices and family history help determine the ultimate risk for developing the disease. Several factors that could put a person at risk for type 2 diabetes include race, age, weight, and activity level. If a person is at risk, a diabetes screening conducted by a physician can confirm a diabetes or prediabetes diagnosis. Making some basic lifestyle changes that contribute to weight loss and healthy living can decrease the risk for type 2 diabetes. Among these are:

- Eat fruits and vegetables every day.
- Choose fish, lean meats and poultry without skin.
- Aim for whole grains with every meal.
- Be moderately active at least 30 minutes per day five days a week.
- Choose water to drink instead of beverages with added sugar.

Fall Prevention Awareness

Among older adults, falls are the leading cause of injury deaths, unintentional injuries, and hospital admissions for trauma. Falls can take a serious toll on older adults' quality of life and independence.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends the following to significantly reduce the risk of falling:

• Speak Up — Talk openly with your medical provider, family members and friends about falling or a fear of falling.

• Review Medications — With your doctor, have your medications reviewed to identify any that cause dizziness. See whether taking vitamin D supplements is right for you to improve your bone, muscle, and nerve health.

• Check your footwear — Wear properly fitting, sturdy shoes with nonskid soles.

• Keep Moving — Find activities and exercises that improve strength, mobility, and balance. Consider joining a falls prevention class in your community, such as Tai Chi, Bone Builders or other courses.

• Check Your Eyes — Have your vision checked once a year and update your glasses as needed.

• Make Your Home Safe — Most falls happen at home. Keep your floors clutter free, remove or secure small rugs, add grab bars to bathrooms, have handrails and lights installed near all staircases, and make sure your home is well-lit. Be careful of pets that get underfoot.

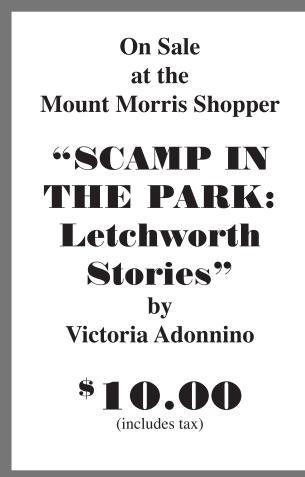
