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Maine students selected for United States Senate Youth Program

The United States Senate Youth Program (USS-YP) announces that high school students Ms. Elena Ray Clothier and Mr. Michael Paul Delorge will join Senator Susan M. Collins and Senator Angus S. King in representing Maine in the nation's capital during the 58th annual USSYP Washington Week, to be held March 7 through 14. Elena Clothier of Lewiston and Michael Delorge of Biddeford were selected from among the state's top student leaders to be part of the 104 national student delegation who will also each receive a \$10,000 college scholarship for undergraduate study.

The USSYP was created by Senate Resolution 324 in 1962 and has been sponsored by the Senate and fully funded by The Hearst Foundations since inception. Originally proposed by Senators Kuchel, Mansfield, Dirksen and Humphrey, the impetus for the program as stated in Senate testimony is "to increase young Americans' understanding of the interrelationships of the three branches of government, learn the caliber and responsibilities of federally elected and appointed officials, and emphasize the vital importance of democratic decision making not only for America but for people around the world."

Each year this extremely competitive merit-based program brings the most outstanding high school students-two from each state, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity-to Washington, D.C. for an intensive weeklong study of the federal government and the people who lead it. The overall mission of the program is to help instill within each class of USSYP student delegates more profound knowledge of the American political process and a life-

service. In addition to the program week, The Hearst Foundations provide each student with a \$10,000 undergraduate college scholarship with encouragement to continue coursework in government, history and public affairs. Transportation and all expenses for Washington Week are also provided by The Hearst Foundations; as stipulated in S.Res.324, no government funds are utilized.

Elena Clothier, a junior at Lewiston High School, serves on the Principal's Advisory Group at her school. She is a member of the state champion Lewiston Mock Trial team while also being a member of the school lacrosse team and the Blue Notes vocal group. She has been selected to participate in programming from the Androscoggin Valley Education Collaborative. Outside of school, Elena volunteers with SEARCH (Seek Elderly Alone, Renew Courage and Hope) and visits with members of her community. Upon graduation, she plans to pursue a degree in political science and journalism.

Michael Delorge, a senior at the Maine School of Science and Mathematics. serves as a member of his school's Student Senate. He also chairs the Senate's Academic Committee, is the president of his school's robotics club, and an active member of his astronomy club. He is an award-winning jazz saxophonist and avid cross country runner. A Biddeford native, Michael is an Eagle Scout and a participant in the state YMCA Youth in Government program. Michael holds a great interest in public health policy and upon graduation, he plans to major in biomedical engineering with a minor in political science. Chosen as alternates to the 2020 program were Mr. Lance Dinino, a resident of Kennebunk, who attends Kennebunk High School

and Ms. Kristen Caldwell, a resident of Scarborough, who attends Scarborough High School.

Delegates and alternates are selected by the state departments of education nationwide and the District of Columbia and Department of Defense Education Activity, after nomination by teachers and principals. The chief state school officer for each jurisdiction confirms the final selection. This year's Maine delegates and alternates were designated by Pender Makin, Commissioner of Education.

While in Washington the student delegates attend meetings and briefings with senators, members of the House of Representatives, Congressional staff, the president, a justice of the Supreme Court, leaders of cabinet agencies, an ambassador to the United States and senior members of the national media.

In addition to outstanding leadership abilities and a strong commitment to volunteer work, the student delegates rank academically in the top one percent of their states among high school juniors and seniors. Now more than 5,700 strong, alumni of the program continue to excel and develop impressive qualities that are often directed toward public service. Among the many distinguished alumni are: Senator Susan Collins, the first alumnus to be elected U.S. senator; Senator Cory Gardner, the second alumnus to be elected U.S. senator and the first to be elected to the U.S. House of Representatives; former New Jersey Governor Chris Christie, the first alumnus to be elected governor; former Chief Judge Robert Henry, U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit; former Ambassador to West Germany Richard Burt, former presidential advisors Thomas "Mack" McLarty See Youth, page 12

Educate Maine releases "Education Indicators for Maine" 2019 Report

Educate Maine released its seventh annual Education Indicators for Maine report Monday. The report is an in-depth examination of Maine's education system beginning in early childhood and continuing through postsecondary education. The ten indicators measure access, participation, and performance across the system, providing a snapshot of what is working well and where investments in Maine's education system are needed.

New this year, the report includes disaggregated data based on race/ ethnicity and gender. This information is essential to understanding how to better support all Maine students, including Maine's increasingly diverse student population.

"The main takeaways from this year's Education Indicators for Maine are consistent with previous reports, with additional valuable data regarding diverse students," said Educate Maine Executive Director Jason Judd, Ed.D. "In summary, to well prepare Maine students for postsecondary education and the workforce requires continued investment in expanding access to early learning programs beginning at birth, especially for economically disadvantaged and diverse students. Maine also must remain committed to efforts to close the achievement gap for disadvantaged and diverse youth, improve proficiency at every grade level for all students, and increase the number of Mainers with postsecondary degrees or credentials."

Education Indicators for Maine finds progress has been made in several key areas. Notably, the number of Maine people achieving a post-secondary credential of value, (a skilled trade certificate or a college degree that connects a person to a good job and career in Maine), has increased from 37% in 2013 to 45%, surpassing the original 2019 goal of 44%. Educate Maine and its partners in the Maine-Spark coalition are working toward 60% by 2025, the state-based attainment goal that will ensure Maine's workforce is productive and competitive.

Additional positive findings in Education Indicators for Maineinclude that the proportion of school districts offering full-day kindergarten has increased to 98% from 87% in 2013, with Maine doing slightly better than New England on this measure (96%). College completion rates also have increased: 62% of students who enter college complete within 150% of normal program time, compared to 50% in 2013.

Data indicates the on-going achievement gap for Maine's economically disadvantaged students (those eligible for the National School Lunch Program) continues to be a challenge. Lower income students start school well behind their peers, continuously perform below their peers by wide margins, and attend college well below the rate of their non-economically disadvantaged peers (50% vs. 75%). 45% of students who are economically disadvantaged complete degrees vs. 70%

of those who are not.

Achievement gaps are also significant by race/ ethnicity. Reading and math proficiency are lower among American Indian, Alaska Native, Black, and Hispanic students. Four-year high school graduation rates for these students, as well as students of two or more races, is lower than Maine's total high school graduation rate, which was 87% in 2018. Supporting diverse students is the focus of a recent Educate Maine and Maine State Chamber of Commerce policy brief, Helping Diverse Students Thrive.

"It is encouraging that Maine education, business and policy leaders are already building on the successes the report identifies and working to address challenge areas head on," added Judd. "It is our collective responsibility to prepare today's students for postsecondary education and the workforce. Success in school will result in bright futures and promising career paths for Maine youth, and a strong workforce to help grow Maine's economy."

Lewiston Adult Promise collaborative bolsters higher education support for adults

In a creative display of collaboration and coordination, a host of educational institutions and community partners in Androscoggin County have joined forces to support adult learners beginning or completing their degrees, obtaining certifications, and seeking trainings. Led by the University of Maine at Augusta (UMA) and the University of Southern Maine (USM), this joint effort received a \$10,000 pilot grant from MaineSpark's Adult Promise which was used to assemble the Lewiston Adult Promise (LeAP) collaborative. LeAP participants include the following schools: UMA, USM, Central Maine Community College, and Maine College of Healthcare Professions. Other involved community groups include Community Concepts, Lewiston-Auburn Adult Ed, Maine Immigrant and Refugee Services, YWCA, Lewiston Public Library, and LA Metro Chamber of Commerce.

support in achieving their goals. Often financial aid is provided to aspiring adults who are having difficulty completing their schooling due to external or unexpected factors.

For the last year and a half, representatives have been meeting with local community partners to discuss current resources, struggles that students face, and how to work together to broadcast the message that support for credential attainment is available. Since last summer, LeAP awarded nearly \$75,000 in scholarships and emergency funds to 58 local adult learners, funded by a special grant from the Maine Community Foundation. These funds were used for expenses such as tuition, car repairs, childcare, books, housing costs, and more.

"Without this collaborative support, the higher education aspirations of adults in this region may not have been realized," stated Jonathan Henry, LeAP Co-Chair and UMA Vice President of Enrollment Management and Marketing. "Small, unexpected disruptions or barriers can derail an adult from pursuing or completing a credential of value, with the goal of obtaining well-paying employment," Henry continued. "The LeAP collaborative seeks to fill the gap in Maine's workforce, and provide wrap around support to get adult students to the finish line–a college degree or post-secondary credential."

MaineSpark is a 10vear commitment from Maine's most influential education and business leaders to work together to ensure that Maine's workforce is productive and competitive. The Lewiston Adult Promise, LeAP's pilot grant, is composed of a network of agencies and institutions working on providing information, support, and resources for those looking to start or finish a degree or certificate, switch industries, or move up in their field. The goal is to have over 60% of adults in the region with a credential of value that will advance workforce needs and personal career goals by the year 2025. 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Maine Harvest for Hunger reaches 3 million pounds of produce donated for those in need

Since 2000, Maine Harvest for Hunger, a program coordinated by University of Maine Cooperative Extension, has distributed more than 3 million pounds of food to citizens grappling with hunger.

This year, the program donated more than 193,000 pounds of fresh produce from over 120 farms in the state. The donations went to 207 hunger-alleviation distribution sites.

Maine Harvest for Hunger had 365 volunteers this year, including UMaine Extension Master Gardeners, and eight corporate partners from 12 counties who logged over 6,000 hours. The value of the produce they harvested is estimated at over \$327,000.

According to the USDA Economic Research Service, Maine has the highest rate of food insecurity in New England. The USDA estimates over 13.6% of Maine households—over 182,000 individuals-are food insecure. According to Feeding America, 18.5% of Maine children experienced food insecurity in 2017.

Since 2000, UMaine Extension's Maine Harvest for Hunger has mobilized Master Gardener Volunteers, home gardeners, farmers, businesses, schools, and civic groups to grow, glean, and donate quality produce to distribution sites (pantries, shelters, community meals) and directly to neighbors in need. The goal is to mitigate hunger, improve nutrition and health, and help recipients develop lifelong positive nutritional habits.

tional programs, such as Hancock County's Eat Well Volunteers, have focused on engaging food pantry recipients in learning appropriate methods of cooking and using fresh produce. Statewide Extension programs help teach Mainers to grow more of their own fresh garden produce.

Now in its 20th season, Maine Harvest for Hunger has continued to improve the efficiency of supplying fresh produce to food pantries across Maine through building partnerships. For example, through Maine Harvest for Hunger volunteer planning and communications, several food pantries are now sending trucks and vans directly to the farm where gleaning is taking place.

Maine has approximately 130 community gardens and many of them are supported by Extension staff and Master Gardener Volunteers. As a result, more than 30 of them now have added a Maine Harvest for Hunger area to their community garden and contributed almost 20,000 pounds in 2019.

Lewiston's Adult Learning Center moves upstairs to new home

Lewiston Adult Education's Adult Learning Center has headed upstairs in Longley Elementary School.

Adult education teachers moved desks and chairs from the basement to spaces once occupied by the elementary school. The rooms and the library became vacant last fall after the closure of Longley and Martel schools and the opening of Connors Elementary School.

The new Adult Learning Center opened in their new location on Monday, January 13.

Lewiston Adult Edu-

put up a large banner at the entrance on the left-hand side of Longley School to help students find the new location of the learning center. Orange traffic cones with arrow signs point from the main entrance of Longley School to the side door beyond the front playground.

Lewiston High School's alternative education program has classrooms at the front of the building. Alternative education and adult education are in separate areas of Longley School, with the former cafeteria between them.

The Adult Learning cation Director Bill Grant Center offers high school

equivalency tests, English language lessons and citizenship classes. The school library now has computers used for High School Equivalency Test, the HiSET, which has replaced the GED in Maine.

Adult Education teacher Don Roux said when he began teaching the late 1980s, room one in the basement was being used for pottery classes and had a kiln. The room could be very hot from the pottery being fired but it was the only classroom with a window.

"30 years and I've finally moved up to the first floor," he said.

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'Man Vs. Bear' on the Discovery Channel features Auburn resident



For thousands of years, Grizzly Bears have stood at the top of the evolutionary food chain with unchallenged dominance. Now for the first time ever, humans will be entering the bears' territory and take them on in a competition like never attempted. "Man Vs. 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MDIFW biologists and helicopter crews plan to capture and collar 130 moose next week

Next week, Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife biologists will be capturing and collaring 130 moose as Maine's moose survival study enters its sixth year and focuses on a new study area.

Maine's moose population fluctuates in response to many factors, including calf birth and adult survival rates. MDIFW, in cooperation and collaboration with the University of New Hampshire, New Hampshire Fish and Game, Vermont Fish and Game, and the University of Maine-Animal Health Lab has been conducting a study that monitors calf and adult survival rates and closely examines causes of death for moose.

The study, which began in the winter of 2014, started in western Maine (WMD 8), and, in 2016, a second study area in northern Maine (WMD 2) was added. In those five years, 475 moose were captured by helicopter-launched nets and fitted with a GPS collar. These collars enable staff to remotely track moose locations and movements over time, and to be notified via text/email message if a moose dies. Adult cows are monitored each spring and summer to determine birth rates and survival rates of calves. For each collared moose, biologists collect detailed health information, including a blood sample, parasite loads, body condition, and winter tick loads. This

information is providing our researchers with an unprecedented, in-depth look at moose health, including the impact of parasites on survival and reproduction. In the coming weeks,

Maine's moose biologist Lee Kantar, several other MDIFW staff members and Native Range Wildlife Capture Services will first be collaring 35 calves in northern Aroostook county (WMD 2), and collaring 35 calves in western Maine (WMD 8) and another 60 calves will be collared in WMD 4, which is located north of Moosehead Lake (northern Somerset and Piscataquis counties).

Expanding the study to WMD 4 will provide vital information documenting the impact of winter tick on Maine's moose. Winter tick significantly impacts the survival of calves and may be impacting pregnant cows during the end of their pregnancy, causing extra stress on body condition due to blood loss. This increase in winter tick is partially a consequence of the changing climate, resulting in milder winters and creating a greater opportunity for tick survival. With parasites and disease, a larger moose population leads to greater chance of transfer, ultimately causing higher mortality rates. It is a high priority for MDIFW to find ways to diminish the impacts of parasites and disease. For this reason, the agency is considering methods of selectively

lowering the moose population in certain parts of the state to decrease the chance for parasite and disease transfer, eventually leading to a healthier population.

MDIFW also conducts aerial surveys to estimate moose abundance and the composition (bull, cow, and calf) across Maine's core range of moose. This aerial survey data, combined with reproductive data from female moose (ovaries) and age data from moose teeth (removed at registration stations), is providing biologists with a more complete picture of Maine's moose population size and composition than ever before.

Maine's moose hunters also contribute to Maine's moose study. Successful hunters with a cow permit must provide the ovaries from their harvested cow moose so biologists can continue to evaluate ovulation and reproductive rates; two critical pieces of information to monitor population growth and decline.

MDIFW contracts with Native Range Capture Services out of Elko, Nevada to capture and collar the moose. The crew specializes in capturing and collaring large animals by helicopter and using net guns to capture and collar female moose and calves. Funding for the study comes from a federal Pittman-Robertson grant (funded by the sale of hunting equipment) and the state's dedicated moose fund (funded through sale of non-resident moose applications and permits).

MCCS President Daigler offers workforce solutions at Eggs & Issues



Maine's community colleges are steadily increasing job training opportunities across the state, but additional funding is needed to train more people, Maine Community College System President David Daigler said last Wednesday.

"Maine's community colleges are working to give people the 21st-century skills they need," he told the audience at Eggs & Issues, a Portland Regional Chamber of Commerce event.

Daigler said that in the last two years, funds from the legislature, bonds, grants, gifts and strategic reserves have been used to purchase new equipment and expand programs, such as new offerings in additive manufacturing, plumbing and heating, healthcare, hospitality and tourism management, sustainable construction and residential and commercial electricity.

New equipment includes nursing simulation centers, life-size virtual anatomy tables, an esports gaming arena and vehicles for the commercial driving license programs.

The system's shortterm training programs are also expanding, but Daigler said additional funding is needed to meet the high demand from both businesses seeking skilled workers and trainees looking to gain or improve their job skills. The training is funded by the MCCS Maine Quality Centers (MQC) program, which partners with Maine employers to provide customized training that is free to trainees.

"Two years ago, we trained just under 1,000 employees" through MQC programs, Daigler said. "This year, in the first six months, we've committed to train 2,000. We are well on track to train 4,000 by the end of this fiscal year, but for one small problem: We don't have funding to support that level of training," Daigler said.

The state's new 10-year strategic economic develop-

ment plan calls for adding 75,000 people to Maine's workforce over the next 10 years.

"The truth is, Maine needs new investment across its entire educational portfolio, but right now our most critical need is in the shortterm training programs," Daigler said. "I hope you'll support me as I seek additional funding to keep this momentum."

In the last month, the Portland Press Herald and the Bangor Daily Newshave both had editorials noting the community college system's key role in providing job training.

President Daigler also appeared this week on Maine Public's "Maine Calling" program, as part of a panel discussing the state's new 10-year strategic economic development plan. A recording of the show is available here.
