he Evergreen School District is awaiting school board approval to close two schools due to a \$12-million budget deficit and declining student enrollment.

During an emotional public nighttime meeting held on Jan. 22, parents worried about the possible closure of their children's school listened to Dr. Emy Flores, Evergreen School District Superintendent make the following anticipated announcement.

"This evening, I accepted the recommendation of Evergreen School District Superintendent's School Consolidation Advisory Committee to recommend the following schools for closure/consolidation at the end of the 2019-20 school year: Laurelwood and Dove Hill Elementary Schools," said Dr. Emy Flores, Evergreen School District Superintendent. 

'American Dream.' So, I'm here to answer questions so you understand my approach to solving problems as I have as a community advocate and a community volunteer. Hopefully you'll come away with a better understanding of how we can address the problems of San Jose."

Arenas: "So I've had the honor to serve you at city hall for the last three years and I had the Evergreen support that put me over the finish line despite it being the first time I ran for council. I'm a mom of two. One of my little kids is here. So families are really important to me. I have a master's in public administration. that's how I invested in myself. I have 23 years of public service. And I have served the community in different ways. This is the first time that I really served in this type of capacity, I never thought of myself as an elected official, but I wanted to change the rules for our families; because our families are hurting. As a school board member I saw 500 families leave the first year; 500 each consecutive year; we are up to 2000. We

affordability crisis, because housing prices keep going up, but our salaries are stagnant. On my end as an elected official we didn't really have the services that you all deserve because of the recession and some of the pension reforms, so we had to do a lot of reworking and re-establishing departments, especially the police force. And I'm really glad I supported it to make their salaries more competitive. We have 20 percent more and we have the burglary department which we need in this area.

Question: What new solutions would you help champion on the city council to build more affordable housing in the city of San Jose?


Zito: "We do have a housing shortage. We are also fighting a job housing imbalance which is another problem the city has as far as being able to provide services. To address the housing shortage it's basically that we don't build enough houses here in San Jose or the Bay Area. It's a simple concept of supply and demand. If we don't build houses at all levels, then the people who want to buy a house just scramble to get whatever they can get and they can basically outbid the people that can only afford the least affordable houses. So, we need to build houses at all levels. We need to encourage the development houses. We need to encourage density in proper places like the downtown and urban villages. And we need to get private corporate partnerships like Google. They have agreed to build 5000 homes. So it is a wonderful thing to build these partnerships with private companies and also to work with our developers to make sure there are enough houses to buy; enough houses to live in, to rent. Without having that you are really going to have a problem with meeting that need and it is going to force the people on the low end out and the people on the high end to take whatever they can get."

Arenas: "I don't know if there is any new solutions as there have been many, many efforts on behalf of the city council, the mayor. I have been included in many efforts to address housing. We have what we call the three 'p's,' the production, preservation, protection of housing. So we can't build our way out of this. We really have to have a real wholesome approach to it. So we have to protect the affordable housing that there already is in making sure that folks living in an apartment for 40 years don't get booted out; and really protecting those that have affordable housing. We don't really have affordable housing. The only site we have for affordable housing is near the Villages for senior living units. The other type of affordable housing is our mobile homes and we have four mobile homes here. Part of what we need to do, aside from protecting and preserving, is producing, producing in a smart way in a dense place, which is downtown and west San Jose. But we have to do these other things in order to protect and preserve. So our mobile home owners are very long term owners, and many are seniors and this is the most affordable way for them to stay in San Jose."

Question: The city is looking for new ways to generate money for affordable housing. The city council has approved a March 2020 ballot measure to tax voters with a real property transfer tax for affordable housing. Do you support the ballot measure and why?

Arenas: "Yes, I am absolutely supportive of Measure E. I think a majority of the council and the mayor is supportive of the measure. We need to really make sure that we do our part for all of those projects in the pipeline that haven't yet got to the end of the line; sometimes they need a little bit of a boost. We need to make sure that there are affordable housing units embedded into those projects. A lot of the time our developers they just payout their affordable housing fees; and sometimes they get to get out of that responsibility. In July, eight of our high-rise developers wanted a waiver on their affordable housing fees. One thing I wanted to make sure that we are not getting taxed because they didn't want to pay. So this Measure E actually is really only a commercial property tax because there is a \$2M minimum. So this is a transfer tax and it would be only business and I made sure that it is high enough to not compete with our small business owners."

Zito: "Even though Mayor Sam Liccardo has endorsed me, I told him watch out mayor, I may not support everything you put before the people. And I do not support Measure E. Unless they have changed things my understanding is that the transfer tax applies to all properties, residential, See FORUM, page 17

affected schools, and our district communitv.'

The Evergreen School District Board of Trustees will not take action on the school closings until the February 13, 2020 Board Meeting at the ESD Board Room, 3188 Quimby Road, San Jose. A vote on a third school that will need to be shut down at the end of next year will take place at a later date. "We are just in a very difficult situation and this is something that needs to happen," Dr. Flores said.

Dr. Flores' recommendation comes following two months of weekly meetings of the 24-member Superintendent's School Consolidation Advisory Committee and its subcommittees, and stakeholder community input sessions, meetings, and discussions. The committee considered and weighed a number of factors in making its recommendation, including, but not limited to, current and projected enrollment data, school boundaries, neighboring schools to receive a closed school's student population, transported students, and existing geographical neighborhoods.

The budget shortfall is a result of the district losing 2,500 students over the past five years. The District expects to lose another 1,500 over the next few years. The 10-year loss is more than 4,000 students. In addition to declining enrollment, the District is facing higher operating costs.

The District continues to lose students because many Evergreen homeowners' children are growing older and they are no longer attending K-12 classes. Due to low inventory of available homes, younger families are unable to move into the School District. However, some families are deciding to move away to more affordable communities. This trend is not limited to Evergreen School District, as other Bay Area districts are facing similar situations.

"This is a difficult recommendation to make because none of us want to have to close schools," said Dr. Flores. "However, we also know that we cannot ignore the rising operating costs and declining enrollment that we have been facing--and will continue to face as a district, resulting in a \$12 million financial shortfall. This decision keeps the best interests of our students in mind so that we can ensure that our schools maintain the level of excellence that our families expect and our students deserve. Ultimately, we must remain a fiscally-sound school district that supports innovative learning in the classroom and prepares students for our competitive global society."

The Human Resources staff is meeting with the district's employees' bargaining units to work out the details pertaining to staff members affected by the school closures/consolidations. The district will appoint a transition team to plan a number of different activities that will be planned to facilitate a smooth transition for students and staff at the affected schools over the next few months.

"I would like to thank the Superintendent's School Consolidation Advisory Committee and district staff for all of their hard work over the past two months," said Dr. Flores

given the Khmer Krom community's experience as a refugee group who sought protection and safety in this country. As such, the Temple will be a pillar of the community by sharing the Buddha's teachings and practice, while promoting and preserving the community's art, language and culture.

The Khmer Krom have faced war and genocide in Cam-

bodia. The fortunate ones were able to flee Vietnam, seeking refuge first in Thailand and later in the United States, and today are among the poorest and most traumatized of any refugee group in the nation.

The members, most of whom live nearby, cur-

rently worship in a small converted residence in East San Jose. They appreciate this community they have come to call home, brimming with active citizens who care about each other and who want what is best for their families and neighbors. And here is how the Temple, in turn, will be a good neighbor:

The Khmer Krom would be dream neighbors. We hope you join us in welcoming them as we work together to build a stronger and more diverse community that is open to everyone.

A Good Neighbor is Considerate

The new Temple will provide welcome and comfort as it opens its doors to celebrate the Theravada Buddhist religion of empathy and compassion and meet the community's spiritual and cultural needs.

This will be a quiet space. The Temple will be home for eight monks who will live on site and practice daily meditation. There will be daily activities with an approximate average of 10 members visiting the Temple, including elders or individuals who bring food to the monks; and a weekly service with an estimated attendance of 50,

where many of the families will carpool or walk. There will be occasional religious celebrations and private family events.

Furthering its quest to be a considerate neighbor, the Temple design offers an underground garage that will avoid the eyesore of a surface lot; minimize surface runoff, noise and fumes; and leave more space for the Temple garden. Any larger events will be handled via an offsite parking shuttle. **A Good Neighbor**

Listens to Feedback

The Temple planning team has made a genuine effort to reach out to neighbors and to listen to the community's feedback and potential concerns. As a result, they have made a variety of commitments, plans and changes to the original design in response to these concerns, including commitments to limiting noise and traffic impacts, plans to prevent parking in the neighborhood and design changes to reduce the footprint of the buildings.

Even though two-story buildings would meet the zoning requirements, they could impinge on the privacy of fence-line neighbors so they are proposing a onestory facility. And even though surface parking would be less expensive, it would require bright lights that shine into the neighbors' yards, thus the underground garage. The peaceful enjoyment of our beautiful neighborhood and the enhancement of our natural environment are the priorities we share with the Temple.

A Good Neighbor

Communicates All along the way, the Temple community has been open and

community has been open and communicative. There have been four neighborhood meetings and all the plans have been made digitally available to residents.

Once the Temple is completed, its team has committed to staying in touch with neighbors by giving everyone a phone number and email address to reach them, responding to questions and concerns, holding regular open house events, and providing advance notice of holidays and events.

As Fred Rogers said: "The more we can be in a relationship with those who might seem strange to us, the more we can feel like we're neighbors and all members of the human family." The Khmer Krom would be dream neighbors. We hope you join us in welcoming them as we work together to build a stronger and more diverse community that is open to everyone.

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Jamal Khan: 'I want to improve the lives of residents in my district'

amal Khan, 32, who grew up in San Jose and attended public K-12 schools, is running for the San Jose City Council seat District 4 because he believes he can improve the lives of residents in the district.

At a very early age, Jamal was keen on learning and solving issues he faced in school or in his neighborhood, where he grew up. He inherited the embedded values that all immigrant parents preach to their children about education, which is invaluable.

It is a parent's dream that their children attend a top university, and it was a dream come true for Jamal. He proved that any student from a public school has an equal chance to attend top universities like UC Berkeley and Harvard. At Berkeley, he completed three majors and one minor in four years. How was that possible? In high school, Jamal took and passed nine Advanced Placement (AP) exams. Additionally, he took classes from community colleges. As a result, by the end of his first semester at Berkeley, he became effectively a third-year student that allowed him to begin taking upper-division courses during the second semester.

Jamal planned his four years of university education during his senior year in high school. He researched all the academic requirements for graduation, from general education courses to the specific classes required for various majors. Jamal considered various options, creating five or six different combinations of majors in a spreadsheet, along with the requirements for each. Initially, he planned to complete a double major in three years. After he began, he realized that by adding a fourth year, he would be able to complete three majors. At one point, business administration and economics looked equally compelling. Because the two majors had similar prerequisites, Jamal was able to sample each one before settling on economics because he liked its theoretical nature. He added political science and rhetoric to his final plan, along with the minor: global poverty and practice.

There are well-known scholarships like the Rhodes and Marshall that accept applications from students who have recently completed a bachelor's degree. Jamal visited their websites and read the biographies of students who had previously been awarded those scholarships. One common characteristic was that they had completed an honors thesis during their senior year. Jamal decided to write an honors thesis during his senior year because he knew it would help him stand out from other applicants when he applied to graduate programs.

Jamal knew that excelling in academic

coursework would not be enough. He also had to distinguish himself outside the classroom. Virtually every university department has a weekly email newsletter with information about research, internships, scholarships, and other opportunities. Jamal followed those postings very closely and learned about an internship opportunity in Nancy Pelosi's San Francisco district office during her first term as Speaker of the US House of Representatives.

Jamal applied and was accepted for an internship during the fall of his junior year. Jamal knew that he wanted to apply to law school so he went to an online database of law firms called Martin-Dale Hubble and sent cold emails with his resume attached to attorneys expressing his interest in interning with them. He was able to land an internship with a bankruptcy attorney. Success is not simply about acing exams. What is equally important is staying alert for opportunities and seizing them when they come your way.

Jamal is an example to us all of dreaming high and not settling for less. Perseverance and dedication pushes us to the top. Jamal knew that to make any changes in a policy, one needs to be an integral part of policymaking and that required a law degree, which he obtained from Harvard Law School.

Jamal does not want to end his dream after completing a degree in law. He wants to give back to the life of all residents where he grew up with new and innovative ideas in education, public safety, traffic congestion, and affordable housing, to name a few. It is this quest that now has him firmly in place to compete in the next election in District 4 to become a member of the San Jose City Council. The time is now and he is ready. When elected, his ideas and brilliance will help all the community in ways we can only imagine.

Oscars 2020: What to look for at the biggest night in Hollywood

he Academy Awards, the biggest night in Hollywood, is fast approaching, and the list of nominated films represents a great sampling of what cinema had to offer in the past year.

Facing falling viewership due to a narrow focus on so called "Oscar bait" dramas with little or no popular appeal, the Academy seems to be committed to its recent turn in acknowledging films from a wide spectrum of appeal.

This year's nominees include not only films from veteran directors such as Quentin Tarintino's *Once Upon a Time in Hollywood* and Martin Scorsese's *The Irishman*, but also includes the widely popular one billion dollar hit comic book film *Joker*, which scored eleven nominations, the most of any other film.

Oscar's staples such as the period drama, represented by female driven *Little Women* and the war drama represented by *1917* were nominated, but so was the humorous and satirical *Jojo Rabbit* and the fast paced and energetic *Ford v Ferrari. Parasite* is only the twelfth foreign language film in the Oscar's ninety two year history to be nominated for the Best Picture award.

This year's nominations also explored a wide range of powerful and pertinent social themes such as mental health and social isolation, hate and anti-antisemitism, and class dynamics.

A major storyline to look out for at this

year's ceremony is how well streaming service Netflix's films, *The Irishman, Marriage Story*, and *The Two Popes* perform. While Netflix was able to win big with its film *Roma*, last year, it was not able to nab the top prize of Best Picture, and this year Netflix is hoping for another shot at the prize. A win for Netflix would cement its position as a top industry film maker and would symbolize the already shifting ways in which films are viewed and distributed.

Despite the wide range of films nominated, many movie goers are disappointed at the jarringly apparent lack of racial and gender diversity of this year's nominees. While the Academy has progressed in this area in recent years, nominating movies such as Moonlight (2017), Get Out (2018), and BlackkKlansman (2019), this year's nominees contain no movies by or about people of color. In addition, for the second year in a row, no women have been nominated for best director, despite many great contenders such as Greta Gerwing for her work on Little Women, Lulu Wang for her work on The Farwell, and Marielle Heller for her work on It's A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood.

This year's Academy Awards will be telecast on February 9 at 5 p.m. PST on ABC. Make sure to tune in to celebrate another great year in film. In the meantime, check out of these amazing nominated films from last year.

Americans polled: Good time to buy and sell home, NAR survey says

More than half of Americans recently polled believe that now is a good time to make a home purchase, according to the latest consumer findings from the National Association of Realtors (NAR).

The 2019 fourth quarter survey revealed that 63% of people believe now is a good time to buy a home, with 33% saying they strongly believe now is a good time to buy. Moreover, as to selling, 74% of those polled believe that now is a good time to sell.

Lawrence Yun, NAR's chief economist, said these positive sentiments can be linked to the strong job market and favorable economic conditions. "The mobility rate has been very low as many have opted to stay put for longer," said Yun. "However, this latest boost – Americans saying now is a good time to move – is good news. With mortgage rates low, the timing is indeed ideal for those who want to enter into homeownership and for those looking to move on to their next home."

Respondents from the silent generation (those born between 1925 and 1945) were most likely to state that now is a good time to buy (73%), while younger boomers (those born between 1955 and 1964) also overwhelmingly viewed the market favorably in terms of now being a good time to purchase (70%).

NAR's fourth quarter Housing Opportunities and Market Experience (HOME) survey found that 82% of those who earn \$100,000 or more said now is a good time to sell a home, with 81% of those in the West region agreeing.

"The Western region has seen home prices increase to the point that costs have outpaced income," said Yun. "So, it is no wonder that those living in the West would think that now is a perfect time to place a home on the market. California especially is seeing some of the highest prices ever."

The NAR study concurrently asked about home prices over the past year. Sixty-four percent of those polled said they believe prices have increased within their communities within the last 12 months. Thirty percent answered that they believe prices have remained about the same, while only 6% believe prices have decreased over that period.

Respondents were asked to share expectations of community home prices over the next six months. Forty-one percent predicted that prices will remain the same in *See HOME SALES, page 14*

ruary 21, 1920 and received its charter on March 24th of the same year. I think it is most appropriate that this is occurring in 2020 as 20/20 has always been associated with vision testing. In fact, In 1925, Helen Keller attended the Lions Clubs International Convention in Cedar Point Ohio, and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." Since then Lions from across the globe have worked tirelessly to aid the blind and visually impaired.

Of course, our club has upheld Ms. Keller's challenge for nearly a century with monthly collections of eyeglasses along with community vision screening events, both with our Lions district's AJ Robinson screening van and the use of our district's spot cameras. These cameras take a picture inside the eye and can determine vision issues in minutes!

At LCI International, clubs enter their service projects monthly to determine impact on their community. With the New Year, I thought you would be interested in our metrics or numbers so far. Since Lions uses a July 31st to June 30th club calendar, these numbers are only for six months. So far since July, we have had 20 service projects impacting 2,715 people in the Evergreen-East Valley area. Of course, our focus is always on vision and sight preservation but we do many other things too. These include our annual school backpack project, help in transporting clients from the San Jose Blind Center to doctor and dental appointments, working with the Leos Club at James Lick High school, staffing food pantries and much more. The real surprise this year was our involvement with the Grateful Garment Project which provides clothing and supplies to the victims of sexual assault after their medical examinations. Their clothing is taken from them for

DNA screening. We were asked to help collect small toiletries which are packaged into after exam kits. We collected shampoo, conditioner, soap, dental products, deodorant, body lotion, combs and brushes along with clothing, socks and undergarments. I asked for donations in this column and in the Villager Newspaper thinking I'd get a few hundred items. I got thousands, so much so that the boxes of supplies filled the entire back area of my gigantic

Ford Explorer. The drive was so successful, we are going to duplicate it in the spring! Thank you so very much to the Evergreen community for their support of this project.

Of course we have many special things planned for our special year with a celebratory banquet planned for April 19th. We have been contacted by the pediatric cancer unit of Stanford Hospital to help provide art supply kits for the children under their care and this will be the project for our centennial event. We also are planning the building of a greenhouse in conjunction with the Leos and Science department at James Lick High.

The motto of our club in 2020 (or it is that 20/20?) is "One Hundred Years of Service." A hundred years is a long time and I wonder how many people our club has helped in that hundred year period. Whether providing new eyeglasses or a school backpack, books or hearing aids, it is our pleasure to work in this most wonderful neighborhood. Here's to the next one hundred years of working together.

their communities during that period, while 48% said they believe prices will rise and 11% said they expect prices to fall in the next six months.

Millennials at 47% were most likely to believe prices will increase in their communities. Out of the four major regions, the South had the highest number of residents who said home prices would climb over six months.

Finally, the NAR survey found that 52% of those polled believe the U.S. economy is improving. This is consistent with the third quarter of 2019. For the fourth quarter, optimism is highest among individuals who earn \$100,000 compared to other income levels, as well as for those who reside in rural areas compared to other locations. Forty-seven percent of millennials said they believe the economy is improving, the lowest of all age groups. Forty-one percent

of those in urban areas said they believe the economy is improving, compared to 66% in rural areas.

Yun took note of the contrasts of viewpoints. "Whether it is a reflection of politics or true economic conditions, there is a difference of views between rural and urban areas," he said.

About NAR's HOME Survey

From October through December, a sample of U.S. households was surveyed via a random-digit-dial, including a mix of cell phones and landlines. The survey was conducted by an established survey research firm, TechnoMetrica Market Intelligence. Each month approximately 900 qualified households responded to the survey. The data was compiled for this report representing a total of 2,707 household responses.

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

Feline leukemia: This vaccine is for cats that come in contact with stray cats outdoors. Just like puppies, young kittens need several vaccination boosters.

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SOS AUTO REPAIR'S "Quick Tip" What's a serpentine belt?

ell, it won't keep your pants up, but it does transport power to your vital automotive components.

The serpentine belt is one long, snaking, winding belt that keeps your alternator, power steering pump, air conditioning and-in some cases-your water pump running smoothly and effectively. The belt may also be guided by an idler pulley and/or a belt tensioner to allow the belt to pass over more than three pulleys with a large enough wrap angle to avoid slipping. It's always recommended to replace the idler pulley and belt tensioner when replacing a serpentine belt. When one component wears, it puts your entire system at risk of failure.

Consider these consequences of a broken serpentine belt:

• A broken serpentine belt leads to a sudden loss of power assist for the steering system, where the steering wheel all-of-asudden becomes very hard to turn. Imagine that happening in the middle of a busy intersection!

• A broken serpentine belt stops the water pump from circulating coolant (antifreeze) through the cooling system, and the engine can overheat!

• A broken serpentine belt stops the alternator from generating power to operate the vehicle's electric (and electronic) systems and recharge the battery. The headlights will dim, the radio will not work, and the battery will go dead!

These things may not happen right away but can happen. Sometimes the belt falls off (rather than breaking) because the pulleys and tensioner are worn, damaged, or misaligned. In that case, simply replacing the belt will not fix the problem. The underlying issues will need to be addressed first.



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The belt may also fall off if it is improperly routed or if it is the wrong belt.

If this happens to you be sure to try and pull over to a safe place, turn on your hazard/emergency lights and call for a tow truck (we recommend Jose at Cruz Towing 408-648-7000, if you are local) to have you towed, hopefully to us ;) or to the nearest repair facility. Make sure you let him know SOS sent vou!

When to replace a serpentine belt is a judgment call by a repair technician, and it's up to the vehicle's owner to decide if the time is right based on the technician's recommendation and/or the last time it was replaced. We would stay on the side of caution, which is why serpentine belts are something we inspect at every oil change (when accessible). But it is said to have it inspected every 60k miles and replaced every 90k miles.

commercial and non-profit that are \$2 million dollars or more. And it's a three-quarter percent tax and it escalates from there. \$5 million and more and it's a percent and \$8 million or more and it's a percent and a quarter. So there are several reasons that I don't support it. First of all, do I think we need to have funds to help affordability and the homeless? Absolutely! No doubt about it. And that money needs to be earmarked and spent on the homeless and provide affordability. However, this tax goes into the general fund, and that means that even though there are some safeguards that the current council has said they would adopt, it is not binding on future councils. And any money that goes into the general fund can be spent on anything. The other thing is that there is no sunset; that means it goes on forever. There is no repeal. It's not five years and let's find out if it does the job or not. Not seven years and let's see if it did the job or not. If you solve the problem there is still a transfer tax. Where does the money go, it goes to the general fund? There's a quarter percent sales tax that was supposed to go to roads; it hasn't in years!"

Question: What would you prioritize as a way to improve public safety in the city of San Jose?

Zito: "Public safety is probably the number one issue for the city. We have hired more police, but there are still only 1000

police officers for a million people. That's a 1000 to 1 ratio. So for public safety, we need to strengthen our neighbored associations like there was when I first started a private District 8 Round Table with our community members and build them and have them be very effective and have that support and communications mechanisms so that the communities know what support efforts are available to them. Also they can report back to the District 8 Round Table and we can advocate as a group, as a community, as a District 8 for the things that we need. We need more policing and we need to leverage the community service officers that we have. We need to leverage the technology that we have such as Nest and Ring Doorbells. And work with those neighborhood associations to provide the police with the information that they need to capture these people that are committing burglaries. So it's a partnership with our community, it's partnership with our public safety, and it's a partnership with our county as well."

Arenas: "So we've been facing public safety issues in this district for a very long time. And sometimes this district gets hit really hard around the holidays. I know because I had an attempted burglary in my home. But fortunately, I interrupted them without even knowing. But nothing happened and I saved my home from a burglary; but not everyone is so lucky, right. And so I made sure that I supported any competitive salaries for our police officers; that was the first thing. And the second really was to build those neigh-

borhood associations; and I did; I doubled them. And I think you saw supervisor Cortese here earlier. Before I even came into office, I met with him and I asked him how did you preserve some of the safety, some of the good, just the wonderful things about Evergreen and one of the things he told me was the neighborhood association piece. And as you have heard earlier, he was the founder of the District 8 Round Table and he knows what he is talking about ... really. So I made sure I doubled our neighborhood associations. We connected them with Beautify San Jose grants. Many of our associations get up to \$5000 every year to beautify their area. We have a great relationship with our captains and we include them in our neighborhood associations and in our meetings; so part of that is called community policing. It's getting to know your police officer. It's getting to know your neighbors."

Question: What is your vision for transportation, land use and growth in the city and District 8?

Arenas: "Well, those things are a little different. Here in District 8 we're really not meant to grow. This is not the area, where we have more residential because we don't have these high transit areas. We don't have these transit friendly corridors, which is what we are trying to encourage in the downtown area, in west San Jose and north San Jose. But what we will have is a light rail extension to Eastridge, so that will facilitate our transportation needs. And so that's one of the things I plan to continue to support.

But really we are not meant to grow. We're meant to grow like I said in transit corridors. And I think if there are any opportunities it will be along Capitol Expressway. So for land use I really want to preserve. I fought really hard. Internally we developed a measure at City Hall to fight the measures that were placed on the ballot that were going to create a lot of housing back here without any benefits to the community. And so I also walked the streets along with many of you here. I see a lot of familiar faces. A lot of us walked together and really made sure we won and we won on both of those measures. So really my look at the future of Evergreen, I'm going to put it back on the audience; it's really what you all see... it's not my voice that needs to get heard...it's the voice of all of us collectivelv.'

Zito: "Transportation has to meet the needs of the people. Building light rail down Capitol Expressway when only 600 people are going to use it at a cost of \$460M is not my idea of the best way to use funds. Way back when Dave Cortese was a city council member he put together the Evergreen East Hills Vision Project which I sat on seven years. And we looked at the possibility of growing District 8. And what we did was put together a consortium of developers and community members and put together charrettes and working task force. That is the way to do it. Work with the community, work with the development community and the residents and find out what See FORUM, next page

we can do and what we can't do. Reid Hillview is a big wildcard coming up. Whether or not they close Reid Hillview and what happens to that is still undecided and it is something that the community needs to be engaged in. Having a good general plan that talks about urban villages and high density and the places where there is transit already that people will use, that is important. Land use and growth in areas where it makes sense, on the planning commission eight years and the general plan task force and those are the things we have been talking about on a day-to-day basis."

Question: If elected successful in March, what are your top three 90-day goals for District 8 and how would you measure and communicate your progress?

Zito: "Number one is to reach out to the community and create an effective communication plan, and that means go out and try to get those seeds of neighborhood associations. Make sure those neighborhood associations get started and keep working with them, and keep communicating with them so they don't fall. That's what seems to happen. You get a few meetings and then it falls apart. Number two is traffic assessment to find out where's our worst traffic problems, what times of the day, and work with DOT to find out what we can do to establish mitigating procedures for that. And, number three is to look into our homeless situation and find out where are the homeless in our District, what services do they need and work with the county and the city to effect a plan to address the homeless."

Arenas: "So if I was voted back and the voters were allowing me to continue to serve, my 90-day promise would be to continue to do the great work we are doing now for each other. And that's working in tandem with the police department, working with our neighborhood associations, and also added to that, bringing them in to some of the public safety strategies that we are working internally. And that is related to sexual assault. We have a higher average than the national trend in sexual assaults, especially for young girls under the age of 12. This is a crime that hasn't really been talked about. It's not a crime that people want to talk about and want to discuss, but it needs to get addressed. So, I will need all of you to come together so that we can address it through a victims unit so they can get the investigative support that they deserve. Also we have a retail study that we have kind of on the backburner. And I have heard some people say like ... I wish we had a Trader Joe's. I wish I had more places to eat. So, part of the commitment that I have from the city manager's office is to have more engagement in retail in making sure that some of these empty store fronts that we see here get filled up. And they get filled up with the needs of our community; not imposing something else outside of what we would like. So that is part of my promise. And third is my promise to support families and children.'

Questions from the audience What is your stance on the planned Buddhist Temple?

Zito: "As many of you know I was involved 20 years ago with the Sikh temple issue and I truly believe that the majority of people who are concerned with the Buddhist temple are like the ones who are concerned with the Sikh temple and that is its use, which is controlled by the conditional use permit. What needs to happen is the community and the owner, the occupier, the user of that facility needs to sit down and come to an agreement on what it can be used for as far as festivities, hours, noise, ingress and egress. And I know there's a lot of concerns about traffic, there are concerns about the possibility about how there will be a lot of people coming in and out at various times. And a lot of it has to do with communication and making sure that the community and the applicant sits down and comes to an understanding of what's really going to happen there. And then once the C.U.P. is approved, that the C.U.P is followed and that there is a grievance capability so that the community members can say I have a problem, can we address this situation and it can be addressed. So it's all about communication and working together."

Arenas: "So as a council member my role is really to listen to our community. It is not to tell others how to initially how to develop their land; how to develop their land because that is the responsibility of our planning department. So, in this segment of Buddhist temple my role is to make sure that all of the process these and all of the policies are adhered to and followed. One of the things that we have to make sure of is that we are equitable and fair to the applicant, so that there aren't any legal repercussions back to the city. And in that process there is an opportunity to really to negotiate and for them to hear some of the concerns and I've heard some of your concerns especially about underground parking in making sure that I as your advocate get that to those developers, into that applicant, to make sure that they shape it the way that you feel which you could live with. So there is a process already set up and I think I've talked about this in the past where this C. U. P. process, the planning department will give feedback to the application, it'll go to the commission and those commissioners will actually approve it or not. And you as community members can then appeal it when it gets appealed it comes to me and my council and so typically that's when we can have a little more of an opportunity to really have the reins on this. But throughout the whole process I'm here to advocate.'

What will you do to see that the Village Square is finally completed with the removal of the eyesore mound of dirt across from the library?

Arenas: "Oh, my gosh! Yes, actually my chief of staff, who now is taking some time off and is my campaign manager, Patrick McGarrity, we have heard this before and we're absolutely concerned and it's part of what we have seen in our general plan update. So, every four years we have a *See FORUM, page 20*

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general plan update. And in that general plan update we get to make some edits, if you will. There's more technical words for it, but I'm not a planner, I'm a council member. And so we kind of edit those things those zoning, so that they can fit into those land and the land use. So that particular area has, I think it's Shapell at this point, right? They're going to develop this same thing kind of units that you see all around Village Square, but they had an issue because the planning department made a mistake on their zoning and so that's what we're trying to fix. And as you all know the government sometimes takes a while, just a little bit, right? So it's taken us awhile to kind of fix that, but the company is still very much interested in having that completed, we want to make sure a gets done. And so part of that Evergreen Village has an urban village allotment for homes and what I did and I voted, I supported this in our general plan taskforce, is that we gave most of that residential allotment to downtown and north San Jose, but we kept a little bit so that those places could get developed."

Zito: "I'll deal with the easy question first which is the pile of dirt. And that is to work with the developer, work with the landowner and work with the city to essentially see what they can do about moving that if it is in fact a problem, right, because they may be well within their legal rights to keep it there whether we like it or not, but there's always negotiation. As far as finishing out the Square, yes the Evergreen Village Square was considered an urban village and it is now not. I'm on that task force and voted to remove the urban village designation for the Village Square. There are other urban villages in District 8, but to work with the developer now, work with the owner and to see what should be there. Now we've been told for years that commercial isn't the way to go, that they don't want to do commercial, they would rather do residential. And given the fact that we need residential it might make sense, I don't know we're not looking at all the P's and Q's if you will, that given the fact they were in a general plan update, given the fact that they're going to open up the EDP, the Evergreen Development Policy, that may be residential, but very low density in my opinion, residential would go there. So there is still some opportunity there. It was originally supposed to be commercial. Whether or not that's still viable is still worth looking at. So, working with the community, working with the owner, finding out what's best for that site."

It was reported that Penny's and Macy's are closing. What are you going to do to bolster retail?

Zito: "So, I had heard that rumor on Nextdoor as well. I went and checked with some people I know at city hall. They got back to me with the economic development department and there is no credible report that Penny's and Macy's is going to close...Sears yes, but not Penny's and Macy's. However, we all know that the brick and mortars are under, how can I say, a challenge. And Penny's, if you've been following them for a while, they have been struggling there's no question about it. So is it possible that some of the anchor stores may close, certainly. What are we going to do about the fact that Sears is closing? That's something that we could address working with the departments of economic development, working with the private sector, working with the owner of, is it still General Growth Properties? I'm not sure if they're still the owners of it ... and finding out who they can bring in. And then working with the community as far as who would they shop at? Do they want a Trader Joe's there? I don't know if Trader Joe's would come here. But you know who would they like to see there? So, again working with the community, working with the owner of the mall and finding out what can fill the shuttered storefronts. Hopefully Macy's and J.C. Penney won't close any time soon. And anybody who is still spreading that news please stop because I understand it's not true."

Arenas: "The reality is that we all shop really differently, don't we? During the holidays you probably see a lot of packages in the front porch, because we do a lot of online shopping; it's just so easy to do. I do it myself. Unfortunately, that really impacts our retailers and so whether it's Sears or J. C. Penny or Macy's, there's a trend that's changing just our nation, really. And so our malls recognize that. And Eastridge has actually done a really decent job in being responsive and so that's why you see 24 Hour Nautilus on site there. It's not necessarily an anchor store, but it anchors a lot of activity and then afterwards they're working out they can go to the food court, because they're really hungry! You know you have bowling; you have a place where the children can play. We also have recognized that we have recreation classes happening. My little girl used to go to ballet; we registered her twice there, right. So it just keeps some kind of vibrancy. And whether they make a change or not, I think we need to make sure that we express what we'd like to see. And that's why I had this retail strategy engagement process and commitment from our city manager so that I can learn some of those needs and wants and connect with the vendors in the same way to deliver."

What is your favorite place in District 8 and why is it your favorite?

Zito: "Wow, that's a hard one. I love District 8, been living there for almost 30 years. Besides my house, being able to relax and enjoy. I love the Village Square. I love Eastridge Mall. I love the Villages...I love to get out there and touch base with our older population there. I love going out on the trails. When I first moved in and I saw Evergreen Valley College, I looked at this place and I said this is a school? Now I'm from New York, you have to understand that seeing green things and open space to me was a real pleasure. Evergreen College is unique in so many ways. I can't really pick one, I'm sorry. There are so many gems that we have in Evergreen and they need to be preserved Continued, next page

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
