"Food" sign appears to be on

the road to resurrection once again. Realtor Judy Bibbings who had listed the Main Street diner on the open market shortly before Thanksgiving confirmed recently that the building has been sold. When the oversized "For Sale" sign disappeared, I reached out to Bibbings who is with the **Bibbings Property Group at Keller-Williams Realty** of Southwest Michigan, and she confirmed that the property at 325 W. Main Street has been sold. The selling price on the MLS system site is listed as \$268,000. What's next for the 2,200 square foot diner has not been revealed, however sources indicate that it will be "another casual restaurant," much the same as it has been off and on over the eight decades or so that it has been in existence. The most recent tenant, Flagship True North Fish Market, closed up shop in early November of last year, just six months after dropping anchor at that location as a satellite to their original location in Harbor Country, Flagship Specialty Foods & Fish Market in Lakeside, which continues to operate from that site on Red Arrow Highway. A number of food service entities have held court at the high visibility location over the years including the Mosaic on Main diner which operated there for one year, the former King Kong Xpress, the popular Harbor Dogs & Sliders, the short-lived run of Rio's Mexican, the All American Diner, Bonnie's Breakfast Nook, and Bob's Snappy Service. In recent years, the building has undergone substantial updates and upgrades with quality kitchen gear, building renovations, fresh paint jobs, and lots of care poured into the property. The building was pitched as a veritable turnkey operation for the right buyer, and indications are that the next operator hopes to be in business there by early to mid-Spring. The building was built in 1940 on a plot of just over a third of an acre along Main Street with 125 of frontage on what is also Business Loop 94, just blocks away from Whirlpool's Riverview Campus. It features parking for some 17 vehicles on site. As for exactly what's on the menu next...stay tuned.

The Southwest Michigan Regional es in our community. This week, I'd like to share just a few of the ways we advocate and engage with elected officials on your behalf. To start, we have a dedicated

Government Affairs Committee that helps set the advocacy priorities for the chamber by identifying important regulatory and legisla-*Continued on page 2* tive issues affecting our community. We hold Chief Elected Official (CEO) Meetings on a monthly basis where local, state, and federal officials from across Berrien County convene to discuss policies and practices that strengthen our area's economy. We also hold regular Eye Opener Breakfasts to keep our members informed about emerging policy issues that may affect the outlook of their companies or the community-at-large.

Speaking of outlook, I recently attended Governor Whitmer's annual State of the State Address at the Capitol. It was encouraging to hear her commitment to tackling important issues such as workforce development. We hope this means, among other things, the restoration of her \$37.3 million line-item veto of Michigan's Going PRO workforce development program.

The number one issue by far for our members is winning the war for talent. That's why continued funding for the Going Pro initiative in the State of Michigan is so vital. The Kinexus Group spearheads these on how your business or organization efforts locally and has helped our region receive over \$4.6 million to train 2,842 existing workers and 1,202 new hires over the last three years. It is estimated that 22,000 Michigan workers will be denied critical training and potential salary gains if the Talent Fund monies are not restored. Our Chamber believes we need critical initiatives like Going Pro to ensure Southwest Michigan remains place where business thrives and talent resides.

Similarly, we hope to see the immediate restoration of the \$37.5 million in funding for the critically acclaimed Pure Michigan advertisement campaign. Not only has it done well to promote our state as a vacation destination, it has delivered economic benefits too! Estimates predict it generated \$2.5 billion in spending for local communities and businesses in 2018. This amounts to a return on investment of \$9.28 in state tax revenue for every \$1 spent! If the state is unable to make ad buys in certain markets soon, we will lose the momentum built up from years of a consistent message. Should it remain cut, our tourism-driven area will be

among those most affected by the loss. While the success of those programs should speak for themselves, they need voices like ours to speak on their behalf. Look for us to advocate for these priorities and more as we strive to advance the business interests of Southwest Michigan.

How to Bounce Back played a game of pickup basketball for the first time since I played for the Watervliet Panthers in 7th grade. It was brutal, but it brought back some great memories. And also dry heaves. I remember when my dad had our

basketball hoop first put in. I waited anxiously all day to start practicing my free throws. That evening after the concrete settled, he warned me, "Do not leave the ball outside when you come in." But just before heading in for the night I aired out a three pointer and it rolled farther than I cared to walk, so I turned and headed inside the house. The next morning, I woke up early to get back out and shoot around. Fresh dew-covered grass and a bit of a chill in the air felt great, but apparently not for the ball. I headed out to where the ball rolled (after the embarrassing miss from the night before) and walked on to the court and began to dribble. Or I should say, I attempted to dribble. What happened? The cold morning caused a change in the ball's air pressure. As I dribbled, I noticed the ball had lost its bounce. To dribble the ball I really had to push. My shot was off because the ball had some dead weight to it. In fact, it made it tough to even aim for the goal. The change in pressure caused the ball to lose its bounce. I don't know about you, but there have been times in my life where the pressure has gotten to me. Every effort was a push. Every day I felt off. Every task felt as if the weight of the world was on my shoulders. But I didn't stay there, and should you find yourself in a similar situation, neither should you. Here's Three Steps to Bounce Back

1) Check your ATTITUDE. Unfortunately, we approach our attitudes as something that happens to us. Meaning, our good or bad attitude is a byproduct

never been able to put anything

aside for an emergency fund. Our mortgage payment is 35 percent of our take home pay each month. We have two young children, so we eat out a lot. but we have no debt other than our house. Do you think we should refinance our home?

Jeff Dear Jeff,

You two are making good money, and you're debt-free except for your home. You can't tighten up your budget enough to save up an emergency fund? Stay out of restaurants, dude! There's no law stating you have to eat out a lot just because there are kids in the house. I mean, you've got no emergency fund. That's a pretty basic thing.

You guys need to get on a written, detailed plan, and start hitting your goals. I'm talking about a strict, monthly budget. Now, I'll admit your mortgage payment isn't exactly what I would've signed you up for. Your house payments, or rent, should be no more than 25 percent of your monthly take home pay. But your house payment isn't what's holding you two back. What's holding you two back is the fact that you haven't been willing to tighten up the finances in other areas of your life to offset biting off more than you could chew in terms of a home.

No, I wouldn't refinance. You're fairly close where the mortgage payments are concerned, so I think you can make it through this by looking at ways to increase your income and selling stuff you don't need to build an emergency fund. You two have been smarter than some, but you're really going to have to buckle down and rearrange your priorities to make this happen! -Dave

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booksellers will tell you not to judge a book bv its cover. Fitness professionals will tell you not to judge a workout by your level of soreness. Muscle soreness happens for a variety of reasons, and is not always the first indication of a great

workout. Here's why: If you are exercising correctly and effectively, you may not always experience muscle soreness. Or, you may not experience it in the hours immediately following your workout Furthermore muscle soreness can also be a good indication that you've taken it too far. Let's take a look at this.

There are two types of muscle soreness: Immediate and delayed.

Immediate muscle soreness is what you feel during or right after your workout. Basically, it's the way your muscles respond to the work you've asked them to do.

Delayed onset muscle soreness (DOMS) is what happens a day or two after your workout, and it can linger for an additional day or two after that. When you exercise, you create microscopic tears in your muscles that ultimately heal to create greater strength. And that healing process is what you feel when you experience DOMS

Unfortunately, it can happen to anyone. Conditioned exercisers who change the weights, repetitions, frequency or duration of their workout can experience it. Trying a new group fitness class for the first time, or coming back to exercise after a significant break? Don't be surprised if DOMS creeps up on you.

.but don't let it discourage you. It's is a natural part of the process, and here's the good news: Once you experience DOMS, you likely won't experience it again until you take your workout up a notch or switch things up again. Studies show that DOMS produces a rapid adaptation to exercise, which means you'll need to switch, change or rearrange the intensity of your workouts again to experience it.

Friendly reminder: DOMS is not the goal. Gradual progression is, which will effectively ward off the most uncomfortable form of muscle soreness. In fact, gradual

progression is the best approach to any fitness routine. Librarians than it should. If it leads to a decrease in activities of daily living, bruising, immobility in certain areas of the body, extensive pain...you get the idea. Be careful with your workouts. Intense muscle soreness should not, once again, be the goal. Successful completion of the workout. That's what you want out of every session. Because if you get hurt, or can't move for days on end,

you're really not progressing yourself. So what do you do when the DOMS hits? Rest. Stretch. Avoid that particular muscle group at the gym until the DOMS disappears. Or drop the intensity of your workout and move through the soreness to "flush out" the pain a bit. So if leg day leaves you unable to squat two days later take it to the treadmill for a light walk, then hit the foam roller. Or focus on upper body and core exercises.

When is DOMS a bad thing? If it lasts longer

What's up with sore muscles?

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Some medications like Advil and Ibuprofen or Icy Hot and arnica gel can help, but you should always speak with your physician first. Medications can be tricky like that. Epsom salt baths may give you some relief, too. The salts break down into magnesium and sulfate, which your body can absorb. The verdict is out whether or not this actually leads to relaxed muscles and joints, but many swear by the effects (and you can't deny the effects of a nice hot bath, let's be honest).

Bottom line: Be diligent about the intensity levels of your workout. Progress safely and efficiently, and you'll avoid DOMS. Which means, of course, that your workouts don't have to leave you sore to the point of immobility to be successful.

And if they do, there's always your best friend the heating pad, right?
