What All Kids Should Learn (Cont'd): #3 Teach Kids Independence & Self-Motivation

About the time I was to become a firsttime mother, I asked my grandmother what she would've done differently if given the chance. I assumed parents never had regrets because she looked shocked! I thought I'd insulted her (since she probably made no mistakes). Turns out she wasn't upset I had the gumption to ask, it was that she had to answer! After looking at the ceiling for a second, then at me, she said, "I wouldn't have helped my kids out so much". Of course, I didn't understand that then, but as a parent now, her words are a punch in the gut. (Did you feel it too?) I didn't know what she meant. Besides, I had it all (if not mostly) figured out. Besides, I was going to do it differently. Weren't we all? Quite frankly, I failed. I asked my grandmother the million-

dollar question, but didn't listen to the answer, or didn't ask enough follow-up questions. Guilty of my own pet peeve, that year, and many more, I'd go on to be the sweet little caregiver I am. Not sure about you, but I can attest to the fact that I've most definitely helped my kids too much.

With my recent discovery of self-care in the face of empty-nesting, I'm looking back on all the years I've served my family. I did too much. While it was fun, it eventually wasn't. While it felt good for a couple of decades, it doesn't anymore. While it wasn't always a problem, it became one. When my kids were small, I worked from home and enjoyed contributing financially while homeschooling, keeping my house clean, doing everyone's laundry, caring for pets,

gardening, cooking dinner (and dessert) nightly, helping my in-laws and more. The vear before my divorce, I wasn't working a job other than M.O.M. so it was even easier! But once separated, and alone, working two jobs outside the home, it was apparent I wasn't going to be able to care for three little ones on my own while keeping all that stuff going. I loved doing so much for my kids: cleaning and redecorating their rooms, making their beds, taking them to their activities on top of the other stuff. I was sad when I realized I'd need their help. I wrote about it, and the long-term benefits in 2012, "How to Teach Kids Responsibility" https:// www.familymatterswithamber.org/2012/03/ how-to-teach-kids-responsibility.html There were benefits for them!

However, I hadn't stuck with that strategy. Once relocated and situated, I returned to the overly-doting-happy-to-take-care-ofothers-no-matter-what-while-working F/T job. Was I crazy? No. It felt wonderful to be back to that Mommy-who-does-everything! It wasn't too smart. As they aged, I took more responsibility for them and their needs than they did themselves. I wanted people to be happy, so I helped. EHNNNT! Wrong Answer. I once wrote about feeling like a door mat: https://www.familymatterswithamber.org/2011/04/dont-be-doormat.html. I was exhausted and felt like my kids were running my life...they wouldn't listen to me for anything. What my kids said to me one night as I begged for insight, before posting my M.O.M. job in the classified section, shocked me! I immediately adjusted according to their perspective. To this day, my oldest regrets being honest with me. Well, while I had the formula (and it worked), sadly I still didn't stick with it. Almost always content to have the knowledge and experience to help the kids figure things out, feeling honored, not wanting them to ever feel abandoned or confused, lost or alone I went back to my old ways. Big mistake.

Suddenly, when my very vocal, sweet, middle child wanted something I'd try to find a way to buy it. Until a jolting issue with rebellion was enough of a wake-up call to put the brakes on! Backing off doting, while stiffening chore policies and increasing the 'N.O.' responses when she wanted something, I was on a roll! She wasn't perfect afterward, but at least I no longer felt taken advantage of. Play by play it's a blur, but I know the problem was more evident as they got older. I started seeing signs like they'd be upset if I said "no" (currently one of my major issues at home). I say yes more, because my dad said no to almost everything. Remember, I was going to do it differently. There's supposed to be balance. I didn't have it. Balance is key (at least I've said that before, even if I didn't always take my own advice). No matter how much we enjoy serving others and making them happy (I'm talking to you moms and grandmas especially), we should allow children to figure out things on their own and teach them to rely on themselves sometimes.

Entitlement is rampant! With adult children, some are motivated to do life on their own (adulting), others aren't. I wonder if helping kids too much stunts certain growth aspects and motivation. While I feel I taught them many skills, like how to dress themselves, keep good hygiene, communicate, earn a living, love one another, respect elders, etc., I think I overdid it on catering and unintentionally stunted their independence. I love helping people. There's that word again. Serving, helping, providing. There's a whole series of self-help books on this behavior. And these are the things that got me into trouble. You might have gotten into trouble too. Maybe you do more than they want/need/expect. It's like the children's books about giving a moose muffins or mice cookies. Read them. I swear that's my life...and I created it.

We always want to do better than our parents, we want our kids to have more. That's sweet, but that thinking and approach deserves serious contemplation. I walked up hill both ways a mile to school in the snow when I was in high school and walked alone in the snow both ways to and from elementary school. Today, my boy is grumpier than his sisters walking two blocks in the snow to the bus stop. We all did the same and none of us died from it.

For many years I've prided myself on listening, however, it seems I missed the mark during that conversation with my grandmother. My kids are not takers, it's just not been as balanced as it should be. They work, and always help monetarily if need be; purchasing many of their own things, helping me with others, treating their siblings and friends to eat, while tipping their server well. It's the fact that they've depended on me to be there for them at almost any capacity. That means last minute plans, emergency needs, forgotten items, assumed provisions, endless taxi rides...never-ending "Yes". The list does go on... never considering Mom's needs (that's my fault).

My two oldest think my youngest gets away with murder. He might have gotten more leniency, but I try to deny that. However, it's become impossible to deny. I'm learning too late with this one. I love him dearly, he's the bomb of a dude: huge heart,

talkative, giving, interesting personality, cool friend and for the most part excellent student, but he's got the makings of an entitled kid (pampered-obviously-Mom's-last-child-she's-tired-he's-the-baby-or-both). Turning it around now is harder than if I would've paid attention in the past (or listened to my Nanny).

To new or experienced parents: set rules, boundaries. Determine which ones are flexible, which aren't. Find balance. Expect your kids to do some of the work. Don't give in; if you say when bedtime is, make it so. If you say something is off limits due to discipline, stick to it. If they get themselves in a bind, let them try to work it out before you step in. Practice self-care.

It's hard to evaluate ourselves daily, but check in with your mate or yourself on a monthly basis. If you're solo, talk with your parents and ask their observation. Yep, I really did go there. Your children's grandparents are a wealth of knowledge. Remember the young-naïve-new-mom-Me? Remember the advice I was about to receive but apparently didn't need? I didn't inquire further to find out how to avoid what she regretted. I had it all figured out. Come on, none of us have it ALL figured out. So, whether it's a neighbor, friend, fellow parent, pastor, spouse or your own parents, ask questions about their opinions (they're on the outside looking in with fresh eyes). Be open, ask questions and listen. I don't have all the answers, but learn from my mistakes. 


