Councilwoman Sylvia Arenas wins 2nd term representing Evergreen

.

🗖 an Jose City Councilmember Sylvia Arenas won by double digits over her single opponent for the District 8 seat, Jim Zito, an Evergreen School District board member on Super Tuesday.

With 100 percent of the precincts reporting, Arenas received 59.38% of the vote and Zito garnered 40.62%.

The Arenas election watch party was hosted at community activist Daniel Reyes' Evergreen home, where Arenas gathered with supporters and volunteers to celebrate the end of her race against her business-backed opponent, Evergreen School District board member Jim Zito. Zito recently lost all his big-name endorsements in the wake of publicity surrounding his 2007 divorce case.

Arenas said she's excited to get back to work. Because she received more

than 50 percent of the vote, she won reelection on March 3rd, and will not face a runoff in November

"I'm honored by the strong support that I'm receiving from our Evergreen community - it shows that my focus on supporting our families, strengthening neighborhoods and improving public safety is resonating in District 8, Arenas said. "I was proud to run a positive, issue-oriented campaign that only sent out mail about my vision for the city."

Through her position in City Council, Arenas has championed issues that she says affect the everyday lives of San José women and families.

"I've led efforts to reform the city's response to rising rates of sexual assaults and improve public safety. One of my greatest accomplishments was my launch of the City San José's Family Friendly Initiative, which is working to increase access to early education, after school programs, safe housing, family friendly public facilities, and paid family leave. I continue to make strides to support economic development in Council District 8, while working to make our streets safer, better maintained, and less congested."

Mayor's request to cancel large gatherings honored by Sikh Gurdwara leaders

Hola Mohalla Festival Sunday, March 15 cancelled

he San Jose Public Health Department is now recommending postponing or can-

celing mass gatherings and large community events where groups of people are within arm's length of another. This suggested mandate is due to all work-

ing together to combat the new virus throughout the world.

The leaders and membership of the San Jose

Gurdwara have decided with great courage and respect for the community to cancel the Sunday, March 15 festival called the Hola Mohalla. As one member stated, "We are all part of the fine country called the United States and this is our way to show we are patriotic in following in accordance the health announcements of our City, State and Country."

President of the San Jose Sikh Gurdwara, Mr. Bob Dhillon states, "We will be praying for the world and we are asking all to stay home

and pray with us."

"The most important thing for us to do is to continue to be vigilant and follow the advice of our medical and public health experts," said Mayor Sam Liccardo "I'm thankful for partners like the San Jose Sikh Gurdwara who recognize the seriousness of the situation and put the health of their community members first."

Measure E initiative passes while Measure J and V fail

Measure E, a San Jose initiative passed 53%-46%. The measure will enact a permanent transfer tax on property sales of \$2 million or more in the city for affordable housing.

Mayor Sam Liccardo said, "Last night, San Jose showed the world our heart. I am proud to serve a compassionate community, committed to ensuring that we don't leave our neighbors behind." The measure will go into effect July 1.

San Jose City Councilmember Johnny Khamis was an early opponent of Measure E. "Measure E is a General Fund tax measure, which means the city council can spend the funds it generates on whatever they deem necessary. When the housing crisis is eventually solved, the use of the General Fund dollars by subsequent city councils cannot be restricted," Khamis said.

Measure J fails (East Side Union High School District)

East Side Union School District administrators, teachers and the board of trustees were pushing Measure J, in hopes of easing the financial burden on school employees struggling to find affordable housing. Measure J, which would have established a \$60 million bond to build a 100-unit rental housing development on school property, lost with 52% percent support, short of the 55 percent threshold needed for the measure to pass.

Measure V fails (Evergreen School District)

Evergreen School District wanted to increase access to technology by asking voters to approve a \$125 million bond, Measure V. The measure would have also been used to improve security alarm and monitoring systems, as well as expand school pick-up and drop-off areas which have become a traffic nightmare. The bond would have raised more than \$7 million annually, but failed with 52 percent of the vote, short of the required 55 percent threshold, the measure failed.

Proposition 13 fails

California's statewide ballot measure Proposition 13 failed to win passage. The See MEASURES, next page

Cortese and Ravel in runoff this fall

State Senator District 15 candidates Dave Cortese and Ann Ravel will advance to the November runoff. Cortese's percentage of the vote was 33.78% and Ann Ravel garnered 21.66%.

Cortese and Ravel ran against San Jose Councilmember Johnny Khamis, former California Assemblymember Nora Campos, paratransit operator Tim Gildersleeve, Army Staff Sgt. Ken Del Valle and mechanical equipment manufacturer Robert Howell.

Cortese, 63, who raised more than \$1 million for his campaign, has long served as a Santa Clara County supervisor. He has served on multiple transportation boards and committees. Cortese also serves on the Association of Bay Area Governments.

Cortese's campaign was built around funding public safety, promoting equal pay and a living wage, expanding education to support teachers and students and ensuring that everyone can afford health care.

"I'm very excited to move on to the November general election and beyond that, to the state Senate," Cortese said. "I am extremely grateful to the hundreds of volunteers who have come out since last year to make calls and knock on doors, and to the voters who have entrusted me to continue to represent them."

Ann Ravel, 70, who raised nearly \$750,000, is an attorney who served as the Santa Clara County counsel for more than a decade before becoming the deputy assistant attorney general in the U.S. Department of Justice and was a former Fed-

eral Election Commission Chair.

Ravel's campaign focused on protections for renters and creating homes and shelters, lowering the cost of prescription drugs, fighting global warming, raising teacher pay and making community college free.

"I am so proud of the campaign because it represents my values, ethics, and integrity," Ravel said. "All my life I have focused on making a difference in the lives of people and I will continue to fight for justice and equal rights for all. As State Senator, government transparency, affordable healthcare, childcare and housing, combatting climate change, and holding wrongdoers accountable will be my top priorities."

This year, for the first time, voters were able to cast a ballot at any of the 110 vote centers as opposed to assigned precincts. Voters also received a vote-by-mail ballot as part of the

county's shift to comply with the Voter's Choice Act. Additionally, the California Legislature approved same-day voting, which means you can change your party status, register or re-register to vote at any voting center. Total voters turnout in Santa Clara County was 50 percent.







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LETTER Political primaries are preliminary

Dear Editor,

A political primary is a preliminary election in which the registered voters of a political party nominate candidates for office. The key word here is preliminary.

The current system allows small states such as Iowa and New Hampshire {assisted by the media} to award front-runner status to the victorious candidate. From there the candidates travel a path determined by which states wants to "leap frog" the other by moving up their primary dates. Candidates are whisked across the country without any real ability to distinguish regional issues from national issues. Consequently, party platforms are determined by a make-it-up-as-you-go approach.

If the primary process were organized on a regional basis, candidates would be able to study the regional issues, campaign to confirm those issues and then receive votes based on the solutions they propose. A regional approach would also prevent a premature selection of a front runner because success in one region certainly would not guarantee success in the next region. This would also further validate the process because each state would still have a say all the way down to the end. Finally, the number of delegates awarded in each state should be determined by the percentage of votes won by each candidate.

Accordingly, the political primaries should occur between January and June of each presidential election year. Each of the six regions would be assigned a particular month. A lottery held *See LETTER, page 6*

COVID-19 UPDATES ArtsSPARK canceled due to COVID-19

The tenth anniversary performances of ArtSPARK, Symphony Silicon Valley's educational outreach program, have been cancelled due to the COVID-19 outbreak. The performances entitled "It's About Time: Music, Math & More" will not be rescheduled for this school year, but we fully intend to bring ArtSPARK back to the Symphony's programming for next year.

Symphony Silicon Valley cancels Beethoven concert

Symphony Silicon Valley announced that it has cancelled the Nakamatsu Plays Beethoven concert on Saturday, March 21 at 8 p.m. and Sunday, March 22 due to the closure of the California Theatre for three weeks amid concerns regarding the growing outbreak of COVID-19.

The Santa Clara County Public Health Department Officer announced a mandatory order requiring the cancelation of mass gatherings in the County.

The concert has been rescheduled to June 6th and 7th.

County of Santa Clara issues order to cancel mass gatherings due to increasing rates of covid-19

In light of significantly increasing rates of COVID-19 in Santa Clara County, the County's Public Health Department is taking further steps to protect the health of the community. The Public Health Department announced on Monday, March 9 a mandatory order requiring the cancelation of mass gatherings in the County. This order will remain in place for three weeks as more widespread testing becomes available and the County is able to learn more about the spread of COVID-19.

"This is a critical moment in the growing outbreak of COVID-19 in Santa Clara County. The strong measures are designed to slow the spread of disease," said Dr. Sara Cody, Santa Clara Countv Health Officer. "Today's order and new recommendations will reduce the number of people who develop severe illness and will help prevent our healthcare system from becoming overwhelmed. This is critically important for anyone with healthcare needs, not just those most vulnerable to serious illness from COVID-19."

It is important that all individuals, including those who are not at higher risk for severe illness, follow this guidance. Even individuals who are not a higher risk can inadvertently transmit the virus to vulnerable people.

In-person classes cancelled at Evergreen Valley College

In-person classes at San José City College, Evergreen Valley College, and the Milpitas College Extension have suspended until Monday, March 16.

When classes resume on March 16, they will be offered in an online or other distance learning format, to the extent that it is possible, and remain in this alternate mode of delivery through at least April 6.

There are currently no reported cases among students or employees at Evergreen Valley College and San Jose City College. The decision to cancel in-person classes was taken to minimize close contact among groups of people as a means of restraining the spread of COVID-19.

All welcome to pray with us

In lieu of this event, in spirit of Sarbat Da Bhalla, we will do Ardas (Prayers) for health of everyone in this world. We urge all the Sangat members to join us remotely in the Akhand Path and Ardas. You can do that by downloading the "Sikh Gurdwara Sahib-San Jose" app which is available both for IPhone and Android phones. You can also regularly listen to Gurdwara Sahib Programs using this App, without coming to Gurdwara Sahib (Prayer Area). We will all still be together as a part of Cyber Sangat.

We also urge those in all other religions to pray with us too on this important issue facing our world.

We will keep the regular Gurdwara Sahib Programs running. We urge the Sangat to donate regularly using the App. We still need to pay for the salaries of our employees, utilities and the mortgage. Your financial support during these unusual times will be highly appreciated.

One big issue with Coronavirus is that once a person is infected, the symptoms can take up to two weeks to appear. Meanwhile this person can infect others. The infection occurs through the droplets that a person exhales while talking, breathing, coughing or sneezing. These droplets can travel as far as 6 feet and deposit on the surfaces. If they get onto the face of a person, he/she can get infected. Once on a surface, they are active up to nine days. If someone happens to touch that surface with hands and later touch his mouth, nose or eyes with that hand, he or she can get infected.

At present there is no vaccine against this virus.

The current only recourse is to isolate (quarantine) that person and keep him/her away from others. The people he or she has come in contact during the incubation period also need to be quarantined (basically confined to a room and not allowed to come in contact with anyone else.)

Because of these reasons if a person in a community setting like our Gurdwara Sahib is found to be infected, a very large number of people he or she might have come in contact in preceding two weeks may need to be quarantined and tested for the virus. This number could be in several hundreds and cause a large disruption in lives of members of our community. The seniors in our community need to be especially careful, as the virus seems to affect them the most.

Please note there is no reason to panic, but we all have to do the right things to stay healthy as individuals and community.

We have also closed our Guru Nanak Khalsa School for an indefinite period. We will be watching the situation and when we feel that it is safe to reopen the Guru Nanak Khalsa School, we will inform our fellowship and association (Sangat).

"San Jose showed the world our heart, and I'm proud to serve a compassionate community, committed to ensuring that we don't leave our neighbors behind," said Mayor Sam Liccardo.

Licardo said he will keep the trust of the voters when he releases his Budget Message that affirms the spending priorities identified by the Council to dedicate 100% of Measure E revenue to building affordable housing.

For affordable housing construction, 45% of the funds prioritized for extremely low-income affordable housing; and 35% for lowincome affordable housing; 10% for moderate-income housing solutions including rent-restricted forgivable loans, down payment assistance, and first-time homeownership opportunities

The new transfer tax would go into effect on July 1, 2020.

Evergreen Senior Citizen Property Owners Are Eligible for Measure EE Parcel Tax Exemption

Evergreen property owners age 65 by June 30, 2021 or older are eligible to file for exemption from the annual \$125 Evergreen School District parcel tax for parcels they occupy as their principal residence.

For joint owners of a principal residence, only one owner needs to be age 65.

More information regarding the parcel tax exemption, including a form to request exemption, can be found on our District website at www.eesd.org/page.cfm?p=2896.

To complete the exemption, the form and supporting documents may be brought into the District Office located at 3188 Quimby Road, San Jose.

District representatives will be at The Villages Golf and Country Club, located at 5000 Cribari Lane, San Jose, CA, to accept new exemption requests for Village Residents on March 13, 2020 or April 17, 2020 from 1:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the Foothill Center.

Residents must file for the exemption in person with documents to prove their home ownership, residency, and age eligibility.

Those who have previously been granted an exemption from the Measure H Parcel Tax, their exemption will continue to be automatically renewed each year as long as you remain eligible for the exemption.

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Low-Cost Microchip Clinic at Pup Plaza on March 14

Microchip ID can help a lost pet get back to its home

Silicon Valley Pet Project is inviting pets and their parents to a low-cost microchip clinic on March 14, 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., at Pup Plaza, 14408 Union Ave., San Jose.

For \$20 each, pet owners can

get a permanent ID for their dogs and cats. The fee includes insertion and registration with a national pet recovery database. No appointments are needed and walk-ins are welcomed.

Statistics support this life-saving measure. According to the American Kennel Club (AKC), one in three pets is likely to be lost at

some time in its life. Studies show that cats are 20 times more likely to be reunited with their families when microchipped and dogs are 2.5 times more likely to be reunited. Without a collar or microchip, shelters have no way of finding a lost pet's owner.

Microchipping is a safe and standard practice. The microchip



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is the size of a grain of rice and is injected under the loose skin between a dog's or cat's shoulder blades. It carries a unique identification number and when scanned by a vet or shelter, the chip transmits the ID number that corresponds to the owner's contact information in the pet recovery database.

database. "Collars, while important, can be lost. Microchips are perma-

nent," said Melissa Lisbon, SVPP CEO. "We invite everyone who needs a pet microchip to come and participate. This is truly the best way to make sure a lost pet can get home again."

Before you go to a doctor's office or emergency room, call ahead and tell them about your recent travel and your symptoms.

Answers to your most common coronavirus questions:

What is a coronavirus?

It is a novel virus named for the crownlike spikes that protrude from its surface. The coronavirus can infect both animals and people and can cause a range of respiratory illnesses from the common cold to more dangerous conditions like Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome, or SARS.

How worried should I be?

New outbreaks in U.S., Asia, Europe and the Middle East are renewing fears of a global pandemic. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention warned this week that Americans should brace for the likelihood that the virus will spread in the United States.

How do I keep myself and others safe? Washing your hands frequently is the most important thing you can do, along with staying at home when you're sick.

What if I'm traveling?

The C.D.C. has warned older and at-risk travelers to avoid Japan, Italy and Iran. The agency also has advised against all nonessential travel to South Korea and China.

How can I prepare for a possible outbreak?

Keep a 30-day supply of essential medicines. Get a flu shot. Have essential household items on hand. Have a support system in place for elderly family members.

Where has the virus spread?

The virus, which originated in Wuhan, China, has sickened more than 80,000 people in at least 33 countries, including Italy, Iran and South Korea.

How contagious is the virus?

According to preliminary research, it seems moderately infectious, similar to SARS, and is probably transmitted through sneezes, coughs and contaminated surfaces. Scientists have estimated that each infected person could spread it to somewhere between 1.5 and 3.5 people without effective containment measures.

Who is working to contain the virus?

World Health Organization officials have been working with officials in China, where growth has slowed. But this week, as confirmed cases spiked on two continents, experts warned that the world was not ready for a major outbreak.

\$13.2 million available to help California homeowners prepare for 'the big one'

Today, there are more than 1.2 million vulnerable homes in California that reside in high-seismic-hazard areas.

Many homeowners know that their homes are at-risk when an earthquake occurs but are unaware that they can protect their homes with a seismic retrofit.

California's Earthquake Brace + Bolt grant program provides homeowners in eligibile ZIP Codes with \$3,000 to help offset the cost of completing a seismic retrofit.

"By undergoing a seismic retrofit, older houses that were not built to withstand an earthquake are braced and bolted into their foundation," said Janiele Maffei, Chief Mitigation Officer for the California Earthquake Authority. "This helps to prevent the home from sliding off its foundation in the event of an earthquake and reduces the amount of damage a house can incur."

With \$13.2 million in funding, EBB will offer over 4,400 retrofit grants in 2020. To date, almost 10,000 Californians have strengthened their homes by successfully completing the retrofitting process with EBB.

Home prices on the rise again amid a lack of inventory, low interest rates

Klitgaard first Principal

Silver Creek High School's first principal, Guy Klitgaard, will be attending the anniversary event. Klitgaard, who served as Principal from 1969-1973, hired many of the school's teachers in 1969 that have had a profound influence on thousands of Evergreen students.

"I was asked to be Principal of Silver Creek by Eastside Union High School District in 1969 by Superintendent Frank Fiscalini, who served at superintendent for 25 years," Klitgaard explained. "There had already been two Planning Principals for Silver Creek and they had already ordered all the equipment so my responsibility was to staff the school and get everything else ready for opening September 1969. Before Silver Creek opened, students attended Overfelt or Mt. Pleasant High Schools."

Klitgaard later became Planning Principal for Independence High School - East Side Educational Park, and also was appointed as Principal at Oak Grove High School.

In addition to Klitgaard, Principals John Sellarole and Dan Ordaz will be attending the Sunday event and will be the honored guests, along with teachers Robert Poynter, Dick De La Rosa, Julia Lawrence, Joe Moseley and Elias Chamorro.

Principal Sellarole, who served as Principal from 1984-1990, said there was a nationwide study developed in 1986 in order to measure school effectiveness. The National Institute of Education of Washington D.C. undertook a study of 40 urban schools and Silver Creek H. S. was asked to participate in the study.

"A large team of educational researchers spent a week at our school visiting classrooms, interviewing students, teachers, parents and staff in order to determine how we measured up against 15 areas of topics which characterize effective schools," Sellarole said.

"What they found was that most schools were working on two or three areas, while the better schools were working on 9 or 10 areas. Silver Creek was the only school nationwide that met all 15 areas related to school effectiveness."

The study team concluded, after their nationwide study, that there were exciting ideas and examples taking place at Silver Creek worthy of use in their Effective School Handbook which was published a year after completion of the study.

School emblem

Conroy said the Silver Creek High School emblem represents the student body that attended the school in the early 70's.

"This symbol is and will always be an important part of our school experience and what it meant to be unified and connected to one another and to demonstrate how much we valued diversity and respect for people of all races in the early 70's," Conroy *See ANNIVRSARY, next page*

Klitgaard said that the diversity of Silver Creek High School when it started was 30% Hispanic, 10% Black, 4% Asian and the remainder White. "The socio-economic mix was also diverse, from the more affluent Evergreen Valley at the time combined with the Mayfair District on the Northside of the Overfelt attendance boundary and much of the attendance are of Yerba Buena High School which spit off rom Silver Creek two years after its opening," Klitgaard said.

There have been some great achievements by Silver Creek High School alumni, including **Boris Bandov** (class of '71) who was a pro soccer player with San Jose Earthquakes

Bandov was born in Livno, Bosnia and Herzegovina. He played on Silver Creek High School's boys soccer team. Bandov began his professional U.S. soccer career with the San Jose Earthquakes of the North American Soccer League on May 5, 1974. He played two seasons with the Earthquakes as a forward/midfield winger before moving to the Seattle Sounders after the 1975 season. He currently coaches for the FC Westchester U-17 boys and at various soccer camps and clinics.

Millard Frank Hampton Jr. (Class of '74), competed in the 1976 Montreal

Olympics with a gold medal in the 4×100 m relay, and a silver medal in the 200 m. He continues to hold the school record in the 100 m at 10.4 sec. and the 200 m record at 20.8 sec. While at Silver Creek, in 1974 he won the CIF California State Meet title that had eluded his father. Next Hampton went to San Jose City College where he was coached by Bobby Poynter and Bert Bonanno. While at SICC, Hampton won the 1976 Olympic

Trials and at the Montreal Olympics, Hampton won a silver medal in the 200 meters and ran the third leg in the gold medal winning American 4×100 meters relay team. Hampton currently resides in Elk Grove, CA.

Federal Reserve cuts interest rate

The Federal Reserve announced a 50 basis point cut to its target rate as an emergency response to economic concerns stemming from the coronavirus.

This is the Fed's first emergency rate cut since 2008 and the fourth cut overall since the start of 2019. Below, you can find some key statistics that help illustrate the significance of today's rate reduction, followed by commentary from WalletHub CEO Odysseas Papadimitriou.

Here's how WalletHub projects the rate cut will affect consumer financial products:

• Credit Cards: APRs on new credit card offers will decrease by an average of 8 basis points.

• Auto Loans: APRs will decrease by an average of 8 basis points.

• Mortgages: APRs will decrease by an average of 26 basis points.

• Deposit Accounts: APRs will decrease by an average of 16 basis points.

Q&A with WalletHub CEO Odysseas Papadimitriou

Is it a good idea for the Federal Reserve to cut its target rate?

"It is a good idea for the Federal Reserve to cut its target rate in response to the coronavirus because the risk of the virus turning into a pandemic before an effective treatment becomes available, let alone a vaccine, is very real. That is not to be alarmist, but being proactive is the best strategy in insulating the economy," said WalletHub CEO Odysseas Papadimitriou.

"Consumer spending will go down if people stay home because of the coronavirus. That in turn will hit a number of industries particularly hard, including small businesses in the service industry such as bars and restaurants, as well as travel providers, live entertainment venues, movie theaters, and more. And that could lead to a domino effect, with turmoil in one industry spilling over to another. For example, if a restaurant owner can no longer pay rent, the property owner might not be able to pay its loan, and the bank that made the loan might end up suffering as well."

What else can the government do to protect the economy?

"A rate cut is better than nothing, but the federal government should be prepared to step in to support distressed industries if things get considerably worse. That obviously should take a backseat to immediate investments in healthcare capabilities. But if the coronavirus spreads throughout the economy and the fear we're seeing in markets really manifests itself in hard economic data, that would only compound our problems," said WalletHub CEO Odysseas Papadimitriou. "This should be politically palatable, too, considering the support the administration has given to farmers during the trade war with China."

What should businesses be doing to prepare?

"The Fed rate cut should be a wake-up call for businesses to begin preparing coronavirus contingency plans in earnest, if they haven't already," said WalletHub CEO Odysseas Papadimitriou. "Companies have two major objectives in doing so: minimizing interruptions to business processes and safeguarding human capital. They go handin-hand, too. In particular, making adjustments to operate remotely is especially important right now."

What should consumers do to prepare?

"The first thing people should do is follow the advice from healthcare professionals and the CDC. Dr. Fauci knows what he's talking about. Other than that, now is the time to really start expanding your emergency fund," said WalletHub CEO Odysseas Papadimitriou. "Even if the worst does not happen, which is the most likely scenario, winding up with more savings than you need will pay dividends in the future."

fter a collision, law enforcement typically arrive to assess the scene and determine fault. Don't wait until after a collision to decide if you should get one. I can't tell you the countless stories we've heard ending in "If only I had a dash cam!" Here's 3 reasons why we think it's a good investment.

1. A dash cam is like a black box for your car

Police officers consider a number of sources when establishing fault in an accident, including the scene, drivers and witnesses. Those three alone can create conflicting perspectives.

A dash cam provides an impartial account of what happened, so long as what happened occurred in the camera's field of view. (Keep in mind, though, that having evidence of what happened doesn't necessarily answer why it happened.)

Man dies of injuries suffered in car crash
