



On behalf of the City of Cheyenne's Governing Body and the residents of Cheyenne, I am pleased to welcome you to our community. Cheyenne was founded in 1867 and within five months boasted a population of over 4,000 people, earning the nickname "The Magic City of the Plains." I believe our community truly is magical.

The City of Cheyenne is inextricably linked with the military. In fact, the city was "born" on the same day Fort D.A. Russell (now F.E. Warren Air Force Base) was selected as a site for an Army Post. Cheyenne is home of the Wyoming Air Guard and Army National Guard and will soon have the only National Veteran's Cemetery in the state of Wyoming. Cheyenne deeply values our military personnel and those who have served.

While you are here, I hope you will enjoy the rich history that makes Cheyenne great. During the last full week of July, Cheyenne will host the 124th Cheyenne Frontier Days™ also known as the "Daddy of 'em All"<sup>®</sup>. This annual western celebration is the largest outdoor rodeo in the world and is the pride of our city. The "Daddy" is staffed by thousands of volunteers who dedicate countless hours year-round to make the last full week of July a one-of-a-kind experience. These men and women are the backbone for the CFD™ experience – a 10-day celebration chocked full of parades, pancake breakfasts, the biggest names in country music, Championship Bull Riding, western art shows, Native American arts and culture, and of course, the famous award-winning rodeo itself. The addition of a newly constructed multi-purpose building located in the heart of the CFD™ park provides a modern upgrade to this world-class event and opens the door for year-round opportunities for conferences, events, and so much more.

Cheyenne boasts cultural and recreational opportunities as well. Our Civic Center, home of the Cheyenne Symphony Orchestra, offers numerous productions throughout the year. Cheyenne Little Theatre productions are some of the finest you will attend, with performances shared between the Mary Godfrey Theater and the Historic Atlas Theater. The historic Union Pacific Depot is the crown jewel of our downtown. The first train rolled into town over 150 years ago and since that day Cheyenne and the Union Pacific have been close partners. Although this downtown fixture is noted for its historical significance, the area received a modern upgrade thanks to a \$150,000 donation by Microsoft to install free public Wi-Fi in the Historic Depot and nearby Depot Plaza.

Our parks and Greenway system are some of the best you will find. I encourage you to visit my personal favorite addition to our community, the Grand Conservatory and Orangerie at the Cheyenne Botanic Gardens located in Lions Park. One is never too old to visit the Paul Smith Children's Village while you are there. The High Plains Arboretum is located just five miles northwest of Cheyenne at an elevation of 6,200 feet and is one of our hidden gems.

A 40-mile, non-motorized Greenway path allows hikers, bikers, skateboarders, and strollers to navigate around the city. We have numerous public and private museums including the Wyoming State Museum, Historic Governors' Mansion, and the Old West Museum. Our state Capitol recently completed a monumental renovation and restoration in 2019 and the results are remarkable; ensuring this historic landmark remains vibrant for generations to come.

Again, welcome to Cheyenne, the "Magic City of the Plains". I hope your time spent here is memorable and magical.

heyenne, Wyoming, "The Magic City of the Plains," is the State's Capital as well as home to one of the nation's foremost military installations, F.E. Warren Air Force Base, and host to the largest outdoor rodeo in America, Cheyenne Frontier Days<sup>TM</sup>.

With a population of over 64,000 people, Cheyenne has become an anchor in the growing economy of the Front Range of the Rockies. It is home to numerous museums, art galleries, theaters, parks and Laramie County Community College. "The Magic City of the Plains" sprang into existence in 1867, when General Grenville Dodge of the Union Pacific Railroad established a tent city here for workers of the first transcontinental railroad. Shortly thereafter, Army General C.C. Auger established Fort D.A. Russell for the protection of the growing new community. Soon settlers began to arrive and brought with them new cultures, as well as new businesses, which included cattle, trading and mining. This influx of new people to the open prairie forever altered the lifestyle of many of the nomadic Plains Indians, including the Cheyenne, after whom the city was named.

The Transcontinental Railroad, eventually connecting both coasts, was the first modern mode of transportation linking Cheyenne to the rest of the country. Today, Cheyenne remains a major hub for interstate transportation with I-25 North and South, and I-80 East and West.

We welcome you to Cheyenne, whether you are just visiting or planning to stay. We know you'll love it here as much as we do.

The mission of the Cowgirls is to provide a free museum where the public may learn of the rich heritage of women and their role in settling the Wild West that continues to this day. The museum and gift shop are located at 203/205 West 17th Street in downtown Cheyenne.



tory and many stories of the families who homesteaded or founded businesses in the West. All events are open to the public as the Cowgirls of the West continue in their role to help educate and share the rich history of the area. Women's suffrage is also featured in our museum. There is a plaque on 17th Street, downtown Cheyenne, honoring the women who won the right to vote. The Cowgirls of the West membership of both women and men host an annual brunch/fashion show on the first Monday of Frontier Days. This fundraiser enables our volunteers to open the museum free of charge during the months of April thru September. This year, the brunch will be on July 20, 2020. It is held at Little America. This brunch is the major event for ladies attending Frontier Days, hosting nearly 600 women and men. Our membership does not require that you rope or ride but that you have the Spirit of the West inside. Our museum was noted in the New York Times, Cowboys and Indians and several other magazines as a place not to be missed when visiting Wyoming. #### Civic Center Commons (Across from 2101 O'Neil Ave.)

What used to be a rarely used parking lot is now a gorgeous multi-level park in the hip West Edge District of Cheyenne. This park hosts a number of performances, movie screenings, vendor fairs, and food truck picnics. It is also available for the community to rent for their own entertainment needs.

#### **Depot Plaza (Corner of Capitol Ave. & Lincolnway)**

Designated a National Historic Landmark, this former Union Pacific Depot has been restored to its original glory. Home to a visitor center and restaurant, the Depot also features the Cheyenne Depot Museum, rich with railroad history, exhibits, and interactive displays. The interior lobby often hosts the Winter Farmer's Markets, national tech conferences, bull auctions, art shows, and more. Outside, the Cheyenne Depot Plaza plays host to Fridays on the Plaza, a Friday night concert series, as well as Hispanic Festival, Celtic Festival, Brew Fest, and other Fests that are too fun, and too numerous to count.

#### **Cheyenne Rec**

Your one-stop-shop for all things recreation related within the City, Cheyenne Rec has combined the get-up-and-go power of Cheyenne Aquatic Center, Golf Courses, Ice & Events Center, Recreation, & our partners (Cheyenne Soccer Club, Cheyenne Tennis, and more). Here you can find the digital version of the Recreate guide, which is typically mailed to homes within Cheyenne 3 times a year; class schedules, league & tournament play rules & schedules; and weekly venue schedules.

#### **Cheyenne Aquatic Center (931 Martin Esquibel St.)**

The Cheyenne Aquatics Center recently renovated and opened two water slides, a lazy river, a zero-depth entry pool with play features, and three additional lap lanes. This pool is located on the outskirts of Lions Park. Across town, in South Cheyenne, the Johnson Pool is outdoors and offers a water slide and diving board. Open swim is offered daily during the summer, weather permitting. Looking for something more unstructured? Head over to Sloan's Lake to take a spin in the paddleboats, canoes or kayaks that are available during the summer for rental. A lifeguard is always on hand to get you set up and ensure safety!

#### **Golf Courses**

Cheyenne's prime golf season runs from mid-to late-May through October. Cheyenne has four golf courses, two of which are maintained by the City: Airport Golf Course (18-hole), Kingham Prairie View Golf Course (9-hole), Little America Golf Course (9-hole), and Cheyenne Country Club (18-hole). The Airport Course hosts the Wyoming Open every July. The County Club Course is by membership only. If you're looking to take up the game, try a lesson from the pros at the Airport Course, or take your time and learn with the best over at Kingham, where it's a show-up-and-play kind of game.



#### Ice & Events Center (1530 W. Lincolnway)

The Ice and Events Center is available for year-round fun. Outside is a world-class mini golf course with land-marks you might recognize from the state or around town! In the winter, ice-skating is available on the NHL sized rink. Learn to skate in both figure and hockey styles during the entire ice season (mid-August to late-March). There's also roller skating, Cheyenne's only Laser Tag room, and bumper cars with lights and wheels that can be used both on and off the ice! This facility is available for birthday parties, corporate outings, weddings, and more! Keep an eye out for our concerts, sporting events, trade conventions, and home/antique shows.





#### **Recreation Division (1317 Parsley Blvd.)**

If you're looking for something long-term to get you up and moving, look no further! The City of Cheyenne Recreation Division offers basketball, softball, dodge ball, baseball, horseback riding, dog obedience, stained glass art classes, HIIT (high-intensity interval training) cardio classes, Zumba, and so, so much more to ensure your heart rate stays up! Most classes require a sign-up in advance, but if you're looking to jump on a team solo, there's always a spot for you. Be sure to check out the Recreate Guide, located on www.CheyenneRec.org for descriptions on the classes. Not here for the activity? This division is also in charge of the childcare and afterschool programs, which offer shuttles to/from schools to the Youth Activity Center (kiddos get to burn off energy, play games, make crafts and have a snack for a low, low price!).

#### **Cheyenne Parks**

Did you know that Cheyenne has more than 140 public green spaces, including parks, right of ways, and fields? Combine that with the 40+ miles of Greenway, and there's a whole lot of outdoors here in town. While Cheyenne Parks will eventually offer a website and Face-

book (coming soon!), for now, we're trying to spread the word through the other websites the City has to offer (Cheyenne



Events and Cheyenne Rec). Soon, you'll be able to get even more information about the Parks, Cemetery, and Weed & Pest Divisions, as well as the upcoming projects happening within our sports complexes, greenways, and parks!

#### **David R. Romero Park**

The David R. Romero South Cheyenne Community Park, located off Parsley Blvd. in South Cheyenne, is the newest of our locations, and features rehabilitated wetlands, eight acres of parkland, and the Youth Activity and Community Center. The wetlands rehabilitation included restoring the original path of the waterway and re-vegetating the area with more than 10,000 wetland plants. The park itself includes a large picnic shelter that can be used as an amphitheater, with a large play space for sports practice. The Community Center is available to rent for weddings, reunions, birthday parties and seminars. There's a large community room and an activity side, complete with a computer lab, arts and crafts area, social area, and large activity space. The City uses the space for after school programs and summer youth programs, as well.



#### **Lions Park**


Lions Park is located across from Frontier Park, home to Cheyenne Frontier Days™, and has something for everyone. At the center of the park is Sloan's Lake, open to boating, fishing, and paddleboats. Just to the west of the lake sits the City of Cheyenne Kiwanis Community House. The facility is available to rent for weddings, reunions, birthday parties and seminars. Behind the Community House is the William N. Brimmer Amphitheater, where summer concerts and movie viewings are held. Don't miss the tree house from the Urban Forestry Division, hiding on the edge of the park! This multi-story structure gives you the opportunity to look at Chevenne from a bird's point of view. Lions Park also has a mini golf course, the Cheyenne Aquatic Center and Spray Park, Botanic Gardens, playgrounds, covered shelters (some are rentable!), volleyball courts, softball, and soccer fields. **Holliday Park** 

Holliday Park is located on Lincolnway, east of downtown Cheyenne, and is home to the largest steam locomotive ever built, the "Big Boy 4004." Tipping the scales at 540,000 pounds, it's 1 of only 8 surviving of the original 25 made. In the park, there are two large shelters that can be reserved for any special event. Holliday Park wraps around Lake Minnehaha, and if you're lucky, you might see the City of Cheyenne abatement dog helping keep the park free from bird overcrowding. The park has basketball, volleyball, tennis courts, horseshoe pits, and two playgrounds.

#### **Greenway Bike and Walking Path**

Forty-three miles of concrete path connects parks, schools, neighborhoods and shopping areas throughout Chevenne. It's 100% handicapped accessible and is continually expanding for more access throughout the city! Check out the map for the closest location near you! **Activity and Sports** 

Check out the Clay Sturman Bike, Blade, and Skate Park. Opened in 2007, it has half pipes, ledges, rails, and bowls for the beginning to extreme riders, bladers, and skaters. The skate park is in Brimmer Park on Pershing Blvd. If you're looking for indoor sports, pick up a recreation guide, printed 3 times a year, for a list of classes and programs at low or no cost to residents!



# Laramie County Library System: Experience the Best of the West

aramie County is a frontier community with deep western roots, and there is no better place to become immersed in the western history, culture, and experience than Laramie County Library System! From the moment you walk past our 8-foot tall cowboy boot near the western entrance of our Cheyenne branch library, you will see why Laramie County Library System is an integral part of the community.

The library is the best place to learn about Laramie County and Western history with our extensive nonfiction collection. We also have an expansive collection of books, DVDs, and CDs, all with Wyoming authors, settings, or connections, indicated by a sticker on the spine. You can enjoy a hot drink or cool lemonade from our Library Café

while you check out the incredible view of the Wyoming State Capitol Building from the third floor. With colors



selected to match a Wyoming prairie in bloom, even our walls will help you experience the west! You will feel truly immersed in the Wyoming experience while visiting Laramie County Library System.

Named Library of the Year in 2008 and one of the country's top children's libraries in 2012 and 2015, the Laramie County Library System is one of the best in the west. With eBooks, DVDs, magazines, newspapers, and popular reading and reference collections, we have everything you'd expect in our region's top public library, plus:

 Free Wi-Fi throughout the building and 10¢ per page Wi-Fi printing

- A Library Café for drinks, sandwiches and bakery items baked fresh in the library
- A 50-station public computer center for work, play or communicating
- Five meeting rooms available to book online for public and private events
- Eight study rooms for individual and group work sessions
- Programs and events tailored and targeted for all ages and abilities
- Renowned exhibits that explore history, art, science, and more
- The Early Literacy Center, an interactive play space where children can begin to hone emergent and early literacy skills.
- A Teen Zone with dedicated computers, spaces, and materials for teens

All of our programs and exhibits are free to the public, as are most of our services. With a library card, you can check out any of our materials to take home and enjoy! Library cards are free to Laramie County residents; just come in with a valid ID and proof of address, fill out an application and choose a card!

If you're just visiting Laramie County, we accept all Wyoming library cards, and can also issue one-dollar day passes for our computer center. Anyone is welcome at any time to peruse our stacks, attend a program, or check out our exhibits! All visitors are also welcome to utilize our free Wi-Fi and 10¢ per page Wi-Fi printing.

As you enter the library, look for the Library Café at the end of the first floor gallery near the east entrance. On the west end of the gallery, you'll find the entrance to our collections and the Greeter Desk where library staff can point you in the right direction. On each floor, you'll find library staff at the Ask Here desks to assist you.

As we mentioned, the library's colors are inspired by the Wyoming prairie in bloom. On each floor, you can find the elevators and stairs on the yellow walls, the meeting rooms on the purple walls, the restrooms on the green walls, and copiers on the blue walls.

Our first floor is home to our multimedia, magazine, and fiction collections, along with our Cards and Accounts desk where you can get a library card and find

more information about your account. You can check out the Book Sale Room and purchase books to help support the Library Foundation, and return your books in our energy-efficient, user-friendly sort machine.

Our second floor is dedicated to children from birth to teens. This vibrant space is full of computers, books, and interactive play stations

for kids of all ages. ### Cheyenne Regional Medical Center Designated as One of America's 250 Best Hospitals

CRMC recognized for being among the top 5 percent of U.S. hospitals for clinical outcomes for the second year in a row

Earlier this year Healthgrades officials announced that Cheyenne Regional Medical Center had once again been recognized by Healthgrades as one of America's 250 Best Hospitals.

The distinction places CRMC in the top 5 percent of more than 4,500 hospitals assessed nationwide for its superior clinical performance as measured by Healthgrades, the leading online resource for helping consumers make informed choices about hospitals and physicians.

This is the second year in a row for CRMC to receive the top 250 hospital distinction. CRMC is the only hospital in Wyoming to receive this award for 2020

"This year has been an incredible one with both the top 250 hospital announcement in February and also the news that the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services gave our hospital a top five-star quality rating in January," CRMC President and Chief Executive Officer Timothy Thornell said. "Taken together, these two prestigious recognitions are a validation of the exceptional care provided at Chevenne Regional Medical Center, which is at the core

of our mission of inspiring great health. On behalf of our leaders and trustees, I want to thank our workforce and providers for the outstanding care and service they provide to our community and region and congratulate them on these wonderful quality achievements."

Every year Healthgrades analyzes three years of Medicare patient data to produce a detailed report on mortality and complication rates in America's hospitals. For the 2020 report, approximately 45 million patient records were analyzed between 2016 and 2018, assessing hospital performance on 32 common conditions and procedures.

According to Health-grades, the hospitals rated as being among the 250 best in America show superior performance in clinical outcomes for Medicare patients across at least 21 of 32 of the most common inpatient conditions and procedures, as measured by objective performance data that considered risk-adjusted mortality and inhospital complications.

Patients treated in hospitals achieving this award had, on average, a 26.6 percent lower risk of dying than if they were treated in hospitals that did not receive the award, as measured across 19 rated conditions and procedures for which mortality is the outcome.\* If all hospitals performed similarly those receiving this award, 161.930 lives could potentially have been saved.

"It is apparent that recipients of the Healthgrades America's 250 Best Hospital Award are dedicated to providing quality care for their patients," said Brad Bowman, MD, Chief Medical Officer for Healthgrades. "We congratulate the hospitals that received this award for their commitment to consistently providing top care and exceptional clinical outcomes for patients."

CRMC has also been recognized by Healthgrades for being one of America's 100 best hospitals for general surgery for 2020, for being among the top 5 percent of hospitals in the nation for overall pulmonary services for two years in a row (2019-2020) and for general surgery for 2020 and for being among the top 10 percent of hospitals in the nation for cardiology services, stroke treatment, overall gastrointestinal services and general surgery for two years in a row (2019-2020) as well as for overall pulmonary services for four years in a row (2017-2020).

According to Healthgrades, patients are more likely to have a successful treatment without major complications, and have a lower chance of dying, at hospitals that are rated as one of America's 250 best.

"This award is the result of evidence-based, quality care being provided to our patients," CRMC Chief Medical Officer Jeffrey Chapman, MD, said. ach July, thousands of visitors descend on our friendly western town to enjoy the World's Largest Outdoor Rodeo & Western Celebration. "The Daddy of 'em All®" celebrates its 124th year as the leader of rodeo action. Over 1,000 contestants will compete for cash and prizes, worth approximately \$1 million during the 2020 season rodeo tour.

Cheyenne Frontier Days™ (CFD) all began in 1897. It seemed the "Magic City of the Plains" that had grown so rapidly needed a tourism boost. In late August, Frederick

Angier, Traveling Passenger Agent of the Union Pacific Railroad, approached Colonel E.A. Slack, editor of the Cheyenne Sun-Leader, about staging an event in Cheyenne that would attract train travelers from Denver. Angier cited successful excursions earlier that summer to Loveland, Colorado, for Corn Day and Greeley, Colorado, for Potato Day.

Angier and Slack convinced the new mayor, William M. Schnitger and local businessmen to have the first Frontier Day on September 23. The first CFD committee



was formed to develop an event that would attract visitors and attention to Cheyenne. They had less than one month to publicize it; and some critics said it wouldn't amount to much. They were mistaken.

Cheyenne Frontier Days™ has grown from a small event into the World's Largest Outdoor Rodeo and Western Celebration. For Cheyenne, it is the biggest attraction a city could hope to create. Visitors from all over the nation and different parts of the world travel to Wyoming each July to take part in the "Daddy of 'em All®."

Historically, the rodeo has been the main event of Cheyenne Frontier Days™. Other activities have come and gone through the years. Baseball games were popular during the first years. Riding, roping and bison wrestling were also part of the week's events. Until the mid-1920s, non-rodeo activities took place downtown. In 1927, the licenses for street-side entertainment were denied, and the midway and carnivals began. In 1929, "Frontier Nights®" opened as an evening attraction. Visitors could also gamble in false saloons or spend the evening in the dance hall.

Beginning in the early 1930s, an increasing number of celebrities began to attend the festivities. Actors came to have fun and promote their new films. In the 1950s and 1960s, stars from television westerns participated in Cheyenne Frontier Days<sup>TM</sup>.



Native Americans weren't a part of the first event, but public demand brought them to the second annual Cheyenne Frontier Days™. Shoshones from the Wind River Reservation took part in the early years. By the late 1920s, Oglala Lakotas represented the Native Americans. The Southern Plains Indian Dancers participated for the first time in 1980 and they returned each year until 1996. Several different groups have taken part since 1997, including the Wind River Dancers and the Little Sun Drum and Dance Group.



Parades have long been a part of CFD, and the early parades featured cowboys and military regiments. Dazee
Bristol, a prominent citizen and CFD volunteer, designed floats for the parades and created saloons and a lynching bee. Some of these historic floats can still be seen in the parades.

Through all the charges

Through all the changes, the rodeo has been the heart of it all. By the 1920s, two or three women's events were included in the rodeo. The economy and World War II changed women's roles, and by 1948 women's events were no longer part of CFD. In 1973, barrel racing was offered and then dropped after 1981; and brought back as a night show feature in 1991.

The rodeos have brought fame and glory as well as tragedy and sadness to Cheyenne. In 1989, bull rider Lane Frost was killed after completing one of his best rides during that year's CFD. A statue now stands in tribute to his life and legacy outside the Old West Museum.

Cheyenne Frontier Days™ is a special gathering, and it couldn't happen without volunteers who donate their time and effort to the event. Tasks range from sorting

stock; caring for the world's largest horse-drawn carriage collection and a remarkable period clothing collection; mucking horse stalls; directing traffic; manning gates; the care of a large media contingent; serving as hosts to the tens of thousands of spectators who enjoy the variety of

events; the care and maintenance of a 100-acre park with barns, grandstands, exhibit halls, food facilities and arenas and thousands of other grizzly little details that must be accomplished for the event to succeed.

Visitors from around the globe make Cheyenne Frontier Days™ a destination for an authentic Western experience, and a learning opportunity

about the history and culture of the West. The past 123 years have seen millions of people travel to Cheyenne to experience this great event, located in the heart of the American West.



From our interactive Hole in the Wall Children's Gallery to permanent pieces in the Museum's collection, including our extensive carriage exhibit, the Museum brings the past to life and invites visitors to immerse themselves in this thrilling history. 

## Discover Science & Supercomputing in Cheyenne

here is a place in Cheyenne where you can stand beside a machine capable of nearly five and a half quadrillion computations per second, where the most advanced models of our climate are being used, and where scientists try to answer important questions about water, energy, health, severe weather, wildfires, and much more. The NCAR-Wyoming Supercomputing Center (NWSC) is a world-class supercomputing facility created through a partnership between the National Center for Atmospheric Research (NCAR) and several Wyoming government and business entities. It opened to the public in 2012 and welcomes visitors Monday-Friday 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and on Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. (except holidays). Visitors to the NWSC can take a self-guided tour through exhibits in the educational visitor center to learn more about climate, extreme weather, supercomputing, and the facility itself. There is a "Young Scientist" section with hands-on activities and interactive games. Group visits should be scheduled

in advance by contacting nwscinfo@ucar.edu.

#### What's it about?

The scientific mission of the NWSC is to help scientists better understand our planet and how human activities are affecting it. For centuries, science has relied on theories and experiments to explain how things work. Today, computing power is so essential to improving our

understanding of our complex world that computation is being called the third pillar of the scientific method. Computers help us understand the processes that churn inside stars and thunderstorms, visualize the Earth's future climate, and predict the paths of hurricanes—problems that cannot be tackled with a pencil and paper. The NWSC's newest flagship supercomputer is named

Cheyenne and is capable of performing 5.34 quadrillion operations every second. For perspective, it would take a person nearly 170 million years to count to that number if they could count one number per second. Scientists use Cheyenne to learn about many important physical processes, including severe weather, climate change, wildfire dynamics, water and energy resources, air pollution, and solar storms. The NWSC is operated by NCAR under sponsorship of the National Science Foundation.

#### The Building

The NWSC's mission inspires the guiding principle at the heart of its design: to maximize the benefits of the facility to society while minimizing its environmental impact. The NWSC was designed to use energy and water resources efficiently, be adaptable to new technologies, make use of sustainable and recycled materials, and reduce or eliminate waste both during construction and during operations. During its construction, more than 70% of construction waste was diverted from landfills

and used for recycling, and the building itself is made with over 510 tons of recycled concrete, 60 tons of recycled wood, and 26 tons of recycled metal. The facility is powered in part by renewable wind energy, and it also boasts super-efficient office space and systems that save up to 6,000,000 gallons of water per year. The NWSC was awarded LEED Gold

certification from the U.S. Green Building Council, in recognition of its outstanding sustainable design and construction.

'essenger's Old West Museum, located at 616 Crook Avenue, contains one of the area's largest private collections of Old West Memorabilia. Charlie and Katie Messenger started the collection over 30 years ago and opened the museum to the public 19 years ago.

The museum now has nearly 30 horse-drawn vehicles on display including Buffalo Bill Cody's personal carriage and harness. Several are presented in natural settings. They have a collection of firearms dating back to the early

1800s and an impressive 600-piece Indian arrowhead collection. Come see their Old Fashioned kitchen, bedroom, spinning wheel, rope maker and much, much more. Take a stroll down memory lane as you view the historic wagons in a realistic setting as they crossed the United States in the 1800s and cars dating back to 1903. Their Royal Coach is a must see, as it is similar to the Royal Coach the Queen of England may have ridden in.



Tucked away in a grove of trees, nearly hidden from the view of modern-day travelers, is a piece of Wyoming history.

The old Little Bear Inn is nestled on a ranch north of Cheyenne (2 miles north on I-25 to exit 16 - Horse Creek Road, left on Horse Creek Road, over the interchange bridge to Little Bear Road, right on Little Bear Road, 2 miles to The Little Bear Inn on the left). In its heyday, it was a stop for weary travelers. A saloon and casino.

The Cheyenne Deadwood stage route passed by the inn, and though it was not a scheduled stop, the stage often would use the inn as a rest

stop. The post office at Horse Creek closed in 1877, moving to Little Bear and making it a regular stop.

The next life of the Little Bear Inn was as a gambling hall, saloon and restaurant. When gambling was outlawed in the 1950's, it became a restaurant and bar. Little Bear Inn is Cheyenne's original steakhouse, and has been operating since 1958 at the current location.

Laramie County Shooting Sports Complex, located at the Archer Exit (exit 370) off of Interstate 80 near Cheyenne, offers shooters facilities for pistol, rifle, shotgun, air gun and archery recreational activities. The range's indoor facilities include an expanded 50' pistol/small bore rifle range,

ith the restoration efforts completed in July 2019, the return of the Wyoming Capitol's original grandeur will certainly astound visitors, especially considering that the decorative paint designs, higher ceilings, and hidden archways have not been seen for many decades.

The Capitol has undergone extensive rehabilitation to replace outdated building systems, add critical life safety infrastructure, and address public space needs, especially the need for larger meeting rooms. Fixing the Capitol required the addition of fire suppression and smoke evacuation systems, mechanical rooms, larger elevators, restrooms on every floor, and two internal stairways extending from the third floor to the garden level. In the process, the Capitol lost usable space.

To address space needs, the project added the rehabilitation and expansion of the Herschler Building and the Capitol Extension. The addition of a new Central Utility Plant allowed the State of Wyoming to handle the mechanical and electrical needs of five State buildings more efficiently while its relocation made room for the

expansion of the Capitol Extension.

In the Capitol, the invasive work necessary to upgrade mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems allowed the restoration of historic features,



including decorative paint, throughout the building. The removal of the suspended ceiling tiles exposed not only stencil designs but also the original ceiling heights, historic arches, coffered ceilings, and decorative column capitals. The restoration of lay lights and skylights have returned more natural light into the building.

No room in the Capitol has been more radically transformed by this project than the Historic Supreme Court Chamber, where the state's Constitution was signed, affirming women the right to vote in 1889. The chamber has been returned to its original size by eliminating a par-



tition wall and reclaiming the two-story volume and public balcony. Beyond its historical significance, the ornate decorative elements make the Supreme Court Chamber unique. Historic paint studies revealed extensive trompe l'oeil paint in a vibrant color palette dating back to 1888. The stained glass lay light and chandelier have now been restored to their original location in the chamber.

Additionally, visitors can view the "Four Sisters," a group of allegorical bronze sculptures, representing Truth, Justice, Courage, and Hope, now standing guard in the four niches just below the stained-glass and restored decorative paint in the Capitol rotunda.

The Wyoming Capitol is now open for self-guided tours 8 a.m. - 5 p.m., Monday - Friday. ■

# Cheyenne Little Theatre Players 91st Season!

n the late 1920's and early 30's, the vaudeville circuit was dying. With the advent and popularity of motion pictures, live travelling performances were becoming less profitable, and so communities across the country had access to fewer and fewer opportunities to experience live theatre. In order to fill this gap, many cities and towns started up their own acting groups and began performing plays with community members doing the acting and directing. It was known as "little theatre".

In February of 1930, here in Cheyenne, a group of friends had met for their usual bridge night, and as the evening wore on this idea of "little theatre" was brought up and discussed. Four of the attendees felt that this type of performance theatre was just what Cheyenne needed to fill the cultural gap that was growing as live touring shows became scarcer, and in May of 1930 the Cheyenne Little Theatre Players produced their first performance, beginning a decades long tradition of quality regional theatre.

2020-2021 marks the 91st season of The Cheyenne Little Theatre Players! And we still look pretty good for our age! The season will be announced on March 17th at 6pm at the Historic Atlas Theatre. Season tickets will be available at that time.

We kick off season 91 with THE 64TH OLD FASH-IONED MELODRAMA: Devious Deeds of the Duplicate Dirty Dastards or A Tale That's Two Gritty or a Villain in the Hand is Worth Two of the Bush Whackers written by Rory Mack and directed by Cathie Chadwick and Rory Mack. Not one, but two villains battle over control of the Old Cheyenne this summer! With all the humor and fun you expect from The Old Fashioned Melodrama, this show runs July 9th – August 2nd, 2020 at The Historic Atlas Theatre.

Our YOUTH SUMMER STOCK 2020 will be presenting James and the Giant Peach Jr. for students grades 2-6 during session 1. This session will run Monday, June 8th-Sunday, June 28th. Session 2, for grades 7-12 will present Legally Blonde Jr. This session will run Monday, June 29th

Milo learns of the argument between King Azaz and his brother, the Mathemagician, whose disagreement over words and numbers has led to the banishment of Princesses Sweet Rhyme and Pure Reason. Milo is dispatched to rescue the princesses from the Land of Ignorance. The knowledge and skills Milo picks up on his journey help him to save the princesses. # Francis E. Warren ir Force lase

rancis E. Warren Air Force Base is celebrating 153 years of active duty on July 4, 2020. Warren is the oldest continually active base in the Air Force and is the home of the 90th Missile Wing, charged with maintaining about 150 Minuteman III Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles. The complex spans 9,600 square miles across Wyoming, Colorado and Nebraska. The base is one of Cheyenne's leading employers; more than 4,300 civilians and military personnel work on the base.

F.E. Warren AFB today is a far cry from its beginning as Fort D.A. Russell back in July of 1867. Fort Russell was established to protect Union Pacific Railway workers from

attacks during the construction of the Transcontinental Railway. The first troops stationed at Fort Russell, under the command of Colonel John D. Stevenson. lived in tents during the first year while building wood framed quarters. The fort was made a permanent post in 1884 and rebuilding

began in 1885 with \$100,000 from the War Department. The original wood structures were replaced with 27 brick buildings and the fort was landscaped with over 1,000 trees. Fort Russell was the training center for the Artillery along with being a cavalry post. In 1889, the Medical Corp was established with Fort D. A. Russell as one of two posts chosen to officially train Hospital Stewards. As you can see, the post had a varied military past.

During the Spanish-American War in 1898, the 8th Infantry departed Fort D.A. Russell for Cuba along with the Wyoming National Guard, which was mobilized and mustered into Army service in the Philippines during the Battle of Manila. During the 1901 Philippine Insurrection, units from Fort D. A. Russell served in the Philippines. The 10th Infantry returned with a Queen Mary Tudor cannon forged in 1557, and that cannon is still displayed on base today.

Times were changing, however, and the cavalry was becoming obsolete. After 60 years of service, the cavalry left the fort in 1927, with the last horse leaving in 1943. While being used as a training facility during World War

> II, Fort Russell became one of the largest military posts in the country.

In January 1930, the post was renamed Francis E. War-




Warren became an Air Force base in 1947. Interestingly enough, the post has had only one dirt airstrip, which was built as a cross-country mail airstrip. Although modern pilots never used the field, it was made famous when WWI Ace Captain Eddie Rickenbacker survived a crash on the field. In 1919, the "Western Flying Circus," led by Major Carl Spaatz also used the field.

On February 1, 1958, the 4320th Strategic Missile Wing was activated at F.E. Warren. The wing was re-designated shortly thereafter as the 706th Strategic Missile Wing with three squadrons: the 549th, 564th and 565th Strategic Missile Squadrons. These Airmen stood up the first Atlas D model ICBMs on Warren. The first missiles arrived in November 1959, from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California. The wing re-designated on July 1, 1961, as the 389th Strategic Missile Wing. The wing deactivated on March 25, 1965, and was replaced as the 90 Strategic Missile Wing. With the deactivation went the Atlas D missiles.

For nearly 60 years, the base has gone through much realignment of missile systems. From the Atlas D to Minuteman I, Minuteman III and to the Peacekeeper, the base has transitioned from Strategic Air Command, Air Combat Command, and Air Force Space Command to Air Force Global Strike Command. On July 1, 2008, the wing at F.E. Warren AFB was re-designated the 90th Missile Wing.

Some famous people have been stationed at F.E. Warren AFB over the years. They include: General Billy Mitchell, General Mark Clark and General Benjamin O. Davis, Sr., Doctor Walter Reed, Sammy Davis Jr., country singer Chris LeDoux and music legend Neil Diamond.





## Serving Our Veterans

n May 4, 1934, 67 years after the first tents were pitched on the prairie known today as Cheyenne, the US Veterans Hospital of Cheyenne was opened and dedicated. The facility capable of accommodating 100 patients was built at a cost of approximately \$750,000, which included the site, buildings, equipment and landscaping and took only 20 months to complete.

Construction began in 1932 to consist of seven red brick buildings with shingle tile roof and with a capacity of 133 beds. The only services to be provided were general medicine and surgery. There were to be no beds for tuberculosis or mental patients.

At the dedication, bureau officials stated that the hospital "will continue to be active for more than 50 years, at least."

Today, more than 86 years later, the Cheyenne VA Medical and Regional Office Center serves Veterans in

one of the largest geographical service areas in the VA system.

The medical center also provides outpatient care in the following eight communities in the tri-state service area: Fort Collins, Loveland and Sterling, CO; Laramie, Rawlins, Torrington and Wheatland, WY and Sidney, NE.

Presently, the Cheyenne VA Medical Center operates 16 medical and surgical beds, 6 Intensive Care Unit beds, 41 beds in the Community Living Center, and 10 beds in the Psychosocial Residential Rehabilitation Treatment facility located within the main hospital building.

In 2019, all divisions of the medical center provided service to 24,818 Veterans in the tri-state service area, for a total of 469,294 outpatient visits. The Cheyenne VA Healthcare System employs more than 1,000 professionals, and runs on an annual budget of approximately \$196 Million.

aramie County School District 1 is the largest school district in Wyoming serving more than 14,200 students, which is nearly 15 percent of the state's student population. The district has seen consistent growth over the last few years at a rate of 1% to 2% a year. This rate is expected to continue over the next few years.

LCSD1 covers 1,592 square miles in southeast Wyoming, which includes three rural elementary schools, 26 urban elementary schools, a charter elementary and secondary school, three junior highs, three high schools and one alternative high school.

The district has 2,214 full-time equivalent staff working at all levels to ensure students receive a quality education. This daily commitment is exemplified by the transportation personnel that make sure our students are safe on their journey to school, nutrition services employees that serve nutritious food, and the support staff that clean and maintain functional facilities. Our teachers, professional support staff, Para educators, and substitute teachers do more than teach, and our principals and supervisors focus on continuous improvement.

LCSD1's Board of Trustees makes decisions, which help LCSD1 grow, and our legislators ensure we have operational funds and facilities so that we can provide quality educational opportunities for our students.

The mission of Laramie County School District 1, in cooperation with students, parents, staff and the community, is to guarantee a high-quality education in a safe and orderly environment for all students, inspiring them to become lifelong learners and responsible, productive citizens.

#### Accreditation

In 2019-2020, the Wyoming Department of Education conducted a site visit for Accreditation examining all aspects of the Laramie County School District 1 educational system. This work included an extensive document

review, interviews with stakeholders, and visits to individual schools. The district received high commendations through this process as well as suggestions for next steps within the system. The team also reviewed the school improvement plans that each school develops and revises throughout each school year in response to changing needs. School improvement plans are developed based upon both State and Federal accountability measures. Additionally, action plans are developed and implemented in the areas of Student Achievement, Professional Expectations and Growth, Instructional Leadership, Safe and Orderly Environment and Effective and Efficient Use of Resources. The action plans provide a detailed roadmap for achieving each of the district's goals.

The district's strategic plan guides and focuses all the schools' efforts to improve. The Board of Trustees' 2016–2019 plan was adopted and approved during the fall of 2016. The district goal was to ensure all students will achieve academic success, graduate from high school prepared for post-secondary education, be career ready and be responsible, productive citizens. Because the strategic plan expires in 2019, the Superintendent and Board of Trustees have begun the lengthy process of updating the Strategic Plan. Stakeholders across the district and community are contributing to the needs assessment to guide the planning efforts.

#### **Curriculum Development**

Laramie County School District 1 continues to refine curriculum in all content areas and courses at the secondary level and continues to revise and improve the corresponding curriculum maps. Along with the new curriculum documents, LCSD1 continues to improve and revise the district assessment system.

For the last several years, district staff has updated and revised curriculum through the lens of standardsreferenced grading. Curriculum has been prioritized to determine which state standards are most critical for

students to know and be able to do. Likewise, proficiency scales have been built for each course to describe varying degrees of mastery for these state standards. Beginning with the first quarter of 2016, our elementary schools adopted a district wide process for standards-referenced reporting.

#### **Testing & Accountability**

At the direction of the Wyoming Legislature, the Wyoming Department of Education has developed an assessment plan to guide district and school accountability. WY-TOPP is the primary assessment used in grades 3 through 10. The assessment is administered in the late spring with interim tests given in the fall and winter to track progress toward the summative test date. Additionally, teachers can administer WY-TOPP modular assessments to individual students as needed to track areas of student difficulty. WY-TOPP results are used to measure district and school-level accountability as called for by the state accountability plan and U.S. Department of Education's Every Student Succeeds Act.

High schools are required to administer the WY-TOPP in grades nine–10 and the ACT exam to all students in 11th grade. ACT is a measure of college and career readiness, and it is used as part of the criteria for the Hathaway Scholarship. The ACT assessment, provided by the state of Wyoming, assesses students in English, mathematics, reading, science and writing. Results are used as an accountability measure for high schools and to determine if a student is college and career ready. College-bound students who score below a targeted score may be required to take a remediation course at their college. **Teaching & Learning** 

All district efforts are directed systemically to ensure we meet the goals of our strategic plan. These goals state students will achieve academic success, graduate from high school, be college and career ready and be responsible citizens.

In order to keep students on track for graduation, LCSD1 notifies those who have a deficiency so they can correct it with options such as summer school, extended-day, correspondence courses, credit recovery labs, and the district CAP (Comprehensive Academic Preparation) program, enabling them to graduate with their class. Community Partners

The district offers several forums to unite parents, schools, students and the community. These forums promote communication and joint problem solving as well as ensure academic success for all children. Examples include:

 District parent advisory committee, building collaborative decision-making team, district and building school improvement teams, district standards and curriculum committees (in each content area), district calendar, policy and building advisory teams.

- The Parent Engagement & Educational Partnerships with Schools (PEEPS) program employs two family engagement facilitators who are committed to supporting families throughout their journey at LCSD1. These facilitators offer support and skills to parents and guardians through parent education, resource locating and partnering with schools to maximize student success.
- Olweus Bully Proofing surveys to collect data, which continues to show improvement in the reduction of bullying in elementary and junior high schools
- Periodical parent surveys
- Open houses for families and students at the beginning of each school year
- Parent/teacher organizations/associations (PTO/PTA)
- District wide student/parent handbooks for every elementary, junior and senior high family
- School newsletters
- District Facebook and Twitter
- District Website, <u>www.laramie1.org</u>
- District wide newspaper—the Public Schools' Chronicle—published five times a year and mailed to every home and business in the Cheyenne area
- District annual Report Card to the Community provides updates from the previous school year as well as information on strategic initiatives for the upcoming school year

he Wyoming Executive Mansion, located on the corner of 21st St. and House Ave., served as home to 19 of Wyoming's governors and their families, including the nation's first female governor, Nellie Tayloe Ross. Stepping onto the political stage in 1924 to win this monumental election, she changed America's history as well as the history of Wyoming. The mansion has been host to United States presidents, famous authors, and neighborhood children. It is now your turn to be our quest.

The stately mansion, designed by Charles Murdock, was modern in 1905 because of its central plumbing, hot water heat, and combination gas and electrical fixtures. This two-and-a-half story structure's portico features solid sandstone Corinthian columns that were quarried in four sections, carved on-site and assembled. Construction of the mansion began in the spring of 1904 and was completed that fall. Governor Bryant Brooks and First Lady Mary Naomi Brooks opened the house in January of 1905, beginning a long tradition of entertaining and community service at the mansion by Wyoming's first families.

Governor Stanley and First Lady Bobby Hathaway were instrumental in listing this historic home on the National Register of Historic Places in 1969. In July 1977, the Historic Governors' Mansion opened to the public as a historic house museum. In 2004, an extensive restoration was done on the mansion and it now reflects the history of the home through the various eras throughout.

Enjoy self-guided tours enhanced with cell phone audio tours, as well as videos providing information about Wyoming and its first Executive Residence.

Looking for some Wyoming and railroad memorabilia or a souvenir? You will be pleased to find a variety of unique railroad, western and Wyoming related items in our gift shop, where there is a little something for everybody.

Designed in Richardsonian Romanesque style and constructed from polychromatic sandstone, the Union Pacific Depot is widely acknowledged to be one of the most beautiful railroad stations in North America. The Depot is next to the very active main line of Union Pacific, with over 90 trains passing through each day. The Union Pacific Steam Shop is home to the famous Big Boy 4014, 844 and 3985 steam locomotives.

The Transcontinental Railroad map embedded in the terrazzo floor of the Cheyenne Depot lobby is just one of the building's highlights. The original wood benches in the lobby still bear the cigarette burns from soldiers in transport. The "Coupler Building" is a gorgeous addition to the Depot. The building serves as a beautiful viewing

area of trains passing by and an entrance in the second floor baggage attic where the world famous Union Central and Northern HNo3 Model Railroad reside. Built over 30 years by Harry Brunk, this unique 65-foot layout replicates the Colorado and Southern narrow gauge

> railroads along Clear Creek in Colorado. The towns of Blackhawk, Idaho Springs, Silver Plume and Georgetown are replicated in exquisite detail on this fabulous model.




