

BASE SERVICES UPDATE

SANGB adjusts services due to COVID-19

As of March 20, 2020, in an effort to maintain mission readiness and protect the health of everyone on base, measures are being implemented to minimize the spread of the novel Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). Please look ahead to review temporary services and access adjustments.

CUSTOMER SERVICE PROTOCOL

In order to initiate social distancing and minimize areas where people may group together in lobbies or waiting rooms, all customer support functions within the 127th Wing will be by appointment only effective March 19, 2020.

GATE ACCESS

The main gate adjacent to the Visitors Center, on Jefferson Ave, remains open to all traffic. Effective March 21, 2020, the South Gate will close to all traffic until further notice.

COMMISSARY AND BASE EXCHANGE

The Commissary and Base Exchange will remain open. The Commissary specifically, remains open Tuesdays through Friday between 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday and Sunday between 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., with the first hour dedicated to high-risk or vulnerable Veterans and their family members aged 60 and older. This allows CDC-determined high-risk individuals to shop in a less-crowded environment, ensuring effec-

tive social distancing. As always, the Commissary is closed on Monday.

DEERS OFFICE & ID CARDS

Appointments with the DEERS office and ID Cards are available from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday through Friday by calling, (586) 239-4044, or via the online appointment scheduler at https://rapids-appointments.dmdc.osd.mil/.

BASE PASSES

Only issued for official business until further notice. To make an appointment for a base pass, call the Visitor Center Monday through Saturday from 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. at (586) 239-4159.

PSYCHOLOGICAL HEALTH

To schedule an appointment with the 127th Medical Group Psychological Health office call, (586) 239-2510 or (586) 764-7233.

FITNESS CENTER

The 127th Wing Fitness Center, typically open only to Wing members, is closed until further notice.

MEDICAL CLINIC CUSTOMER SERVICE

The 127th Medical Group will continue providing customer care and support. "Walk-in-Wednesday" is now by appointment only. In the absence of a previously scheduled appointment, Wing members must call before coming to see a

provider. To speak with a technical or to make an appointment, please call the customer service number at (586) 239-4972. When reporting to the clinic for your appointment, utilize the phone provided at the customer service desk. As a reminder, if you are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19, please contact your Primary Care Manager.


