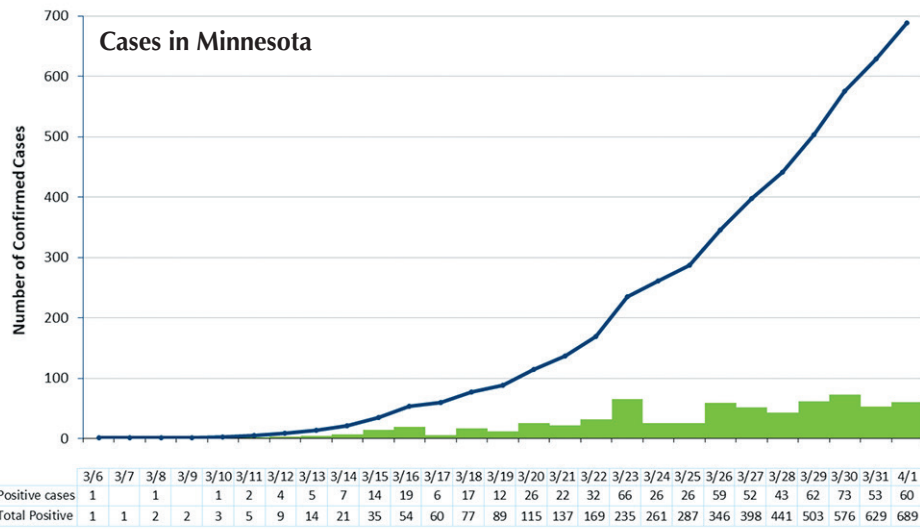

First Crow Wing County COVID-19 resident case confirmed



A patient from Crow Wing County cared for at Cuyuna Regional Medical Center tested positive for COVID-19 on Tuesday, March 31. The resident is a male in his 20's and the case doesn't appear to be travel related. The individual is isolated at home with home contacts.

In a press release, CRMC noted that they are well prepared and are continuing to take every precaution to ensure the health and safety of all patients, providers and staff. All people entering CRMC's facilities are being screened, visitors are restricted and a special Respiratory Clinic with a

separate entrance was developed to treat patients with COVID-19 symptoms. Virtual visits are being offered, as well as, free phone visits with a nurse. Nurses will screen and evaluate respiratory symptoms and concerns related to COVID-19. No appointment is necessary, and all are welcome to call 218-546-7000.

"CRMC recognizes and is grateful for the commitment and compassion our staff are showing in caring for all patients," said CEO Kyle Bauer. "I just want to thank all of them, not just for the current situation, but the dedication and compassion they demon-

strate every single day and I know we will get through this together."

"We take this very serious and are mobilizing efforts to decrease exposure to others in the community," said Crow Wing County Public Health Supervisor Michelle Moritz.

"Communicating with other counties that have already had cases of COVID-19 has provided valuable information and great resources for us as we move forward to slow the spread of COVID-19 in Crow Wing County. I want to remind people to please stay home, use E-visit and phone triage being offered by our healthcare facilities and

continue to practice good hand washing."

Crow Wing County Public Health team is working closely Minnesota health officials from the Minnesota Department of Health to evaluate with whom this man might have come in contact within recent days. People identified will be asked to quarantine themselves for 14 days from their exposure date and will be monitored for fever and respiratory symptoms.

Non-Resident Case

An earlier case of COVID-19 confirmed in Crow Wing County on Saturday, March 28 was an individual whom did not live in Crow Wing County that was in the area temporarily. He will be counted in a different county in Minnesota and is at home there in quarantine. He came to Brainerd, as a client at Minnesota Adult and Teen Challenge. The client arrived for treatment at the Brainerd facility about two weeks before and was not symptomatic at the time.

"People that travel to different places could be tested and confirmed in one location but the actual COVID-19 confirmed case will count in the individual's county of

permanent residence." said Crow Wing County Public Health Supervisor Michelle Moritz. "Our number one goal is to keep our residents safe and healthy."

COVID-19 Symptoms

In a majority of cases, COVID-19 causes mild or moderate symptoms, such as fever, cough, and shortness of breath. For some, especially older adults and people with

Political influence tramples safety

Due to my recent writing in regards to MNDOT's finalized plans regarding the future size increase of Crosby's sidewalks, I was invited to talk with a select group of building and business owners that feel they will be negatively impacted by the 2021 MNDOT project that will end up placing these bicycle friendly 13 foot wide sidewalks in front of their structures.

These tax paying citizens are also frustrated with how the city was able to achieve this, without even using the same notification process that items such as variances would require. The established practice of hiding notifications of upcoming council meetings and workshop notifications in a three inch block towards the rear pages of the local paper isn't exactly transparent. Their attorney apparently

feels there's multiple reasons to threaten or even pursue legal action against the City of Crosby, our mayor, city administrator, council and MNDOT. If it comes down to yet another lawsuit, we will witness, amongst other things, just how much these various city officials plotted with the bicycle mafia to manipulate MNDOT's own established safety policies and practices to get a bicycle route past the front doors of a couple of the mayor's commercial properties and his administration's favored business venues. Emergency loan program

Minnesota has launched a new Small Business Emergency Loan Program with \$30 million available to help Minnesota small-business owners who need immediate assistance amid COVID-19 closures.

Rep. Dale Lueck, R-Aitkin, said this new state program administered by the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development will help bridge gaps that the federal Small Business Administration Disaster Loan Assistance Program may not address.

"This is a Minnesota-specific financial tool for small businesses as they work through the challenges we face today," Lueck said. "Loans of between \$2,500 and \$35,000 will be made for qualifying small businesses. A portion of the loan

may be forgivable. The loans are offered at a 0% interest rate. Taking out additional debt may not be the answer for every business, but this program provides another tool with very favorable loan terms."

These emergency loans will be made by an existing network of lenders DEED works with across the state. According to DEED, if other financing becomes available to small businesses that received an emergency loan, such as federal funding, the emergency loan must be repaid. Depending on the size of the loans offered to businesses, DEED estimates this emergency loan program will provide needed resources to between 1,200 and 5,000 businesses.

DEED indicates it expects loan applications to be available later this week. Minnesota small businesses

should send questions about this emergency loan program to ELP@state.mn.us.

The program is the product of an executive order (20-15) issued Monday by Gov. Tim Walz. It directs the DEED to conduct the program via special revenue funds.

The executive order also allows local units of government or lending partners which have a revolving loan fund to use those funds to issue loans to retail and service providers for the next 90 days. DEED estimates that up to \$28 million in capital could be accessible through local revolving loan funds and local governments through this action. Local partners will be looking at ways to deploy these resources to support their local businesses.

Rep. Dale Lueck legislative update

The Legislature returned to St. Paul on Thursday to pass legislation that included numerous special provisions designed to assist Minnesotans as we battle through the COVID-19 pandemic.

The bill authorized up to \$330.6 million in additional emergency funding to provide financial support for workers, businesses and students that are being negatively impacted by the many emergency measures imposed in order to stop the spread of the coronavirus. Click this link for more details on the bill which passed the House 99-4 and the Senate 67-0.

Gov. Walz has issued a "Stay at Home" order limiting movement outside homes beyond essential trips for two weeks. It is effective at 11:59 p.m. today (March 27) through April 10. The order allows

Minnesotans to leave their residences to perform the following activities: Health/safety activities, outdoor activities, purchasing necessary supplies and services like groceries and medicine, essential and interstate travel, care of others, displacement, relocation to ensure safety. This is not a comprehensive list click here for FAQs related to Minnesota's Stay at Home order.

Workers providing critical services are exempt for the purposes of job-related travel. If you have question about your work status, please contact your employer.

If you have school age children, as you are already aware schools have implemented "distance learning" procedures. Please check your school district's website for the latest information.

Hats off to our local officials

for the excellent job of rapidly adapting to the unique circumstances we find ourselves in today. While the current emergency orders are asking our citizens and businesses to make huge sacrifices, working together will weather this temporary storm.

existing health problems, it can cause more severe illness, including pneumonia.

According to the World Health Organization, people with mild illness recover in about two weeks, while those

with more severe illness may take three to six weeks to recover. Health officials recommend individuals and families make a plan in case someone gets sick. They also suggest following the same steps for

avoiding the flu:

- Stay home and away from others if you are sick.
• Cover your coughs and sneezes with your elbow or a tissue.
• Wash your hands fre-

quently for 20 seconds with soap and water.

- Avoid touching your face.
The Minnesota Department of Health has set up COVID-19 Hotlines available every day from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Rainfall monitoring network seeks volunteers

The State Climatology Office is looking for volunteer rainfall monitors for the Community Collaborative Rain, Hail and Snow Network (CoCoRaHS). The network includes more than 20,000 volunteers nationwide who measure precipitation in their backyards using a standard 4-inch rain gauge.

These rainfall monitoring activities are performed by individuals at home who submit their reports online. Volunteers should follow Minnesota Department of Health

guidelines for social distancing in connection with this volunteer opportunity. Climatologist and state CoCoRaHS coordinator Pete Boulay said the data from backyard rain gauges are helpful and important in many ways.

"The information provided

by volunteers helps to verify high rain totals after big events, monitor drought and flooding, make our precipitation maps more accurate, and it provides needed guidance on Minnesota's changing climate," Boulay said. "We need more volunteers to help fill gaps where people aren't observing and reporting precipitation values."

Volunteers are particularly needed outside the immediate Twin Cities metro area.

Aitkin County Growth

License Center closes in Aitkin County

Effective at close of business on March 27, 2020 until April 10, 2020, the Aitkin County License Center will be closed.

Per Emergency Executive Order 20-20, Governor Tim Walz issued a stay-at-

home order for Minnesota effective Friday, March 27, at 11:59 p.m. through April 10. Only essential services will remain open.

Per Notice received from the Department of Public Safety, Driver and Vehicle

Services, all driver's license agents and deputy registrar offices must close.

Granting extensions for driver's licenses and ID cards requires a change to state law. The Minnesota legislature is scheduled

to consider this topic on March 26. The Minnesota Department of Public Safety Driver and Vehicle Services division (DPS-DVS) will provide additional information and guidance if anything changes.

Bob and his four brothers and two sisters grew up in Mason City, IA in high school. He had a part-time job at Earl's Fruit Market. When he quit school in his junior year, he went to work at the market full time. Shortly after that, the Putnam family moved to Eagle Lake near Robbinsdale, MN. Bob attended trade schools and worked as a mechanic. At 18, in 1943, he was drafted into the U.S. Army and was assigned to the survey section of the 561st Field Artillery Battalion (he surveyed gun positions). Medal, Silver Star and Honorable Service Lapel.

He and Delora later divorced and he moved to Askov, MN married Rose, a teacher and Bob operated his own service station.
