### Agencies take extra precautions to keep the water supply safe by monitoring workers

s the coronavirus pandemic spreads, water agencies across the Bay Area are taking unprecedented steps to keep the water safe.

The main goal of all water districts is preventing workers who run the drinking water treatment plants from getting sick and contaminating the water.

"This event is unique," said Alexander Gordon, emergency services and security manager for the Santa Clara Valley Water District, which provides drinking water to 2 million people in and around San Jose. You have an emergency where people are the problem, in terms of passing potential infection."

Many water districts are initiating contingency plans to instruct workers to live on-site at their job site to assure they do not come into contact with anyone except each other.

In San Diego County, 10 employees are currently living in rented RVs at the massive ocean desalination plant in Carlsbad.

### Meha Gaba of Evergreen makes protective masks for health care workers and essential personnel

s the Bay Area and U.S. COVID-19 cases increased, Meha and Parth Gaba of Evergreen Valley felt the need to step up and do something positive for the community, specifically health care workers and essential personnel.

Before the pandemic caused the shutdown, Meha, a freshman at Basis Independent, barely had enough time to get through her school work along with extracurricular activities. Now at home all day she has the extra time she wanted to contribute to those at the frontline of the fight against COVID-19.

After Meha learned about the acute shortage of personal protection equipment (PPE) for health care and the essential services workforce, she thought to get her family's sewing machine and sewing kit out from the garage to make cloth masks.

"Many of them are worried about their own safety as well as their family's health but they are doing everything possible to help so we should do something to protect them: that was  $% \left( x\right) =\left( x\right) +\left( x$ the motivation," Meha said. "The thought that our medical staff and essential services workers are exposed to dangers while helping us, gave me goosebumps. I wanted to do something to keep them safe."

After viewing a couple of YouTube videos

Meha taught herself how to hand make a protective mask with two layers of tightly knit cotton fabric and elastic. Procuring the material during the pandemic was challenging, but JOANN Fabric Store pick up made it possible.

With no experience in sewing, at first it looked a little daunting and Meha wasn't sure how it would work, but 30 minutes into it and 10 completed masks made her feel much See GABA, page 2

### **Coronavirus: wearing face coverings** will help slow the spread of COVID-19

ay Area health officials' recommendation that people who leave their homes for essential travel cover their nose and mouth with a mask, scarf, bandana or towel to slow the spread of COVID-19.

"Wearing a mask in public is an important tool to stop the community spread of this disease because people with no or mild symptoms may have coronavirus and not know it," said Scott Morrow, MD, San Mateo County health officer.

The regional recommendation

is in addition to shelter-in-place and social distancing requirements.

The release issued by San Mateo County urged the public to avoid using medical masks such as N-95 or surgical masks, which are in short supply and must be preserved for healthcare work-

California Gov. Gavin Newsom has resisted issuing statewide guidance on face coverings and instead reminded people that they are not a substitute for physical or See MASKS, page 2

better and she got her Mom and brother involved in cutting the fabric and adding finishing touches by removing extra thread. Pretty soon their kitchen table was filled with more than 70 masks. As soon as a photo of the masks on her table was posted on her mom's WhatsApp, news spread like wildfire as friends and acquaintances started texting and leaving messages about how they knew where the masks would be best utilized.

The first batch of 75 face masks went to Sunrise Hospital Medical Center and University Medical Center in Las Vegas. Soon after, three local grocery stores reached out to her to request 30 face masks for their employees. Then a request came in from San Jose Gurdwara and many more. As of now Meha and her brother Parth have sewn and distributed nearly 300 masks.

"The next step to this project includes making protective transparent shields as well as sewing nurse caps for the medical staff," Meha said. "I hope our small effort can make a difference in their lives."

Santa Clara County Health officials warned that face coverings should not be medical masks or other similar products but include any type of breathable material that will cover nose and mouth. Medical masks are in short supply and need to be reserved for health care personnel.

Covering the nose and mouth with cloth may also help serve as a reminder to keep physical distancing after a report was issued that a person can become infected by the virus from someone nearby breathing.

A research panel cited several studies out of Hong Kong, the University of Nebraska, The New England Journal of Medicine and others that found evidence of the viral RNA in the air where infected patients were present.

### Distance learning amid COVID-19 crisis explained

s we all adjust to the
new normal, while

on educators, students and families has increased the fear and anxiety among all of

Although schools across the Bay Area have been closed, we are thankful for Gov. Gavin Newsom's Executive Order N-26-20 to continue funding schools at current levels this year, reduce the instructional calendar and keep public employees on paid status, which is critical to deliver ongoing educational opportunities for all students in Santa Clara County and the greater Bay Area.

There has been a push by many to move straight into distance or online learning. Each district is responsible for providing resources, digital platforms and opportunities to learn while schools are closed.

The California Department of Education defines "distance learning" as instruction in which the student and instructor are in different locations. This may include interacting through the use of computer and communications technology, as well as delivering instruction and check-in time with their teacher. Distance learning may include video or audio instruction in which the primary mode of communication between the student and instructor is online interaction, instructional television, video, telecourses, or other instruction that relies on computer or communications technology.

It may also include the use of print materials incorporating assignments that are the subject of written or oral feedback.

Taking the complex structures of the school day and transforming it to an online experience simply cannot be duplicated nor

can it happen overnight. East Side Union High School District (ESUHSD) took the first two weeks of school closures to take a more balanced approach to distance learning in order to complete the spring semester of the 2019-2020 school year.

Like any organization, we have staff who are early adopters with digital platforms and others who are digital immigrants, less savvy tech enthusiasts. Our teachers have been involved in online professional development using digital platforms such as Google Classroom, Google Hangouts, Zoom and School Loop. As educators, it is important we provide support to all technology users in

order to not further the opportunity gaps that exists in education.

It is important to remember that while students are not physically in the classroom, school is still in session and we expect students to engage in their coursework.

ESUHSD officially launched its distance learning on March 31. Each teacher will provide a Distance Learning Green Sheet (syllabus) and will communicate, post assignments, resources and grades internally through School Loop or Canvas.

All classes have a designated time for students to engage with their teacher for that specific period. These are dedicated times for students to connect with their teacher to review content and assignments, have small group discussions, and/or interact with their classmates. Each teacher will be able to conduct class check-ins through an online meeting using Zoom, Google Hangout,



School Loop, Google Docs, an email exchange, or some other method the teacher has specified to demonstrate that students are engaged in the class (ESUHSD Distance Learning Plan).

How does grading work with distance learning? Some districts are taking the approach of eliminating grades for the spring semester and moving toward a pass/fail grade.

In ESUHSD, grades are to be formative and not punitive. During these times, we must allow for flexibility and to a certain degree leniency given the various factors that are currently out of our control. We must take a culturally, trauma-informed lens as we shift to distance learning as we determine how our students will be graded and/or assessed. We recognize that this learning environment cannot replace the in person experience, yet our goal is to maintain a level of learning to prevent regression

or loss of learning. Students can only improve their grades moving forward.

This is a new paradigm facing all educators: K-12, community colleges and four-year universities. We must allow for a learning curve to take place for both educators and students. Moving forward, distance learning will become more of a hybrid approach to everyday learning for schools.

Another key component to the governor's order is to provide free lunches to students during the closure period. All public schools across the Bay Area are participating in the Summer Food Service Program and the Seamless Summer Option to provide meals to students.

In East Side, we are providing a hot, brown bag lunch five days per

week to any student who is 18 years or younger, regardless if they attend one of our high schools. For many of our students, they depend on the meals they receive at school for their main source of food. During this COVID-19 crisis, providing these meals is critical to support our community.

I want to personally acknowledge the amazing staff at all our schools in Santa Clara County who are working diligently to provide meals to our communities and for continuing to provide ongoing, meaningful learning opportunities to our students. I appreciate the shared, coordinated leadership from the 31 Santa Clara County district superintendents and from Dr. Mary Ann Dewan, our Santa Clara County Superintendent of Schools, for her facilitated leadership.

We are all in this together and we will get through this period together.

### **EVHS** students start Supplies2Seniors, aiding the elderly during the ongoing COVID-19 crisis

team of Evergreen Valley High School eleventh grade students founded an or-Aganization named Supplies 2 Seniors that delivers essentials such as groceries, medications, and meals to the elderly and those with health conditions free of charge in the Ever-

The new free delivery service is accepting PayPal, Zelle, and Venmo as payment services to avoid the handling of cash. The payment is only for the items; there is no delivery fee.

"As the pandemic continues to spread throughout the nation, something must be done to help the elderly survive," said Om Goswami, co-founder of Supplies 2 Seniors. "Something must be done to ensure they have food on their table every day. Something must be done to help them re-stock on household necessities. Something must be done to protect our beloved senior citizens from this deadly virus. That's why Supplies 2 Seniors was founded."

As the public limits their contact with the outdoors by staying at home to take precautions and the elderly population, who are at heightened risk from the virus, the Supplies-2Seniors team is taking orders for groceries online and buying their essentials for them so that the elderly do not have to leave their homes. Their groceries will be delivered to their doorstep by sanitized teens wearing gloves and masks to keep the elderly and vulnerable out of danger.

"Recently some of our friends were walking from the parking lot into Costco in Almaden when we noticed a senior couple begging several shoppers to purchase their groceries for them because they were afraid of catching the coronavirus," the team said. "Every single shopper rejected their request, even though it is well known that seniors are the most vulnerable. They and their families, wearing masks and gloves, lent their helping hands to the couple and took their grocery list and money to buy them their essentials safely."

The team believes that healthy youths and adults must not be selfish in this desperate time of need by panic buying and hoarding food and household items. They say, "We cannot afford to let our senior citizens down in this time of crisis. Rather, we must help the elderly."

### Low-wage worker in San Jose to receive paid sick leave if they become ill on the job

ow-wage workers in San Jose employed during the coronavirus pandemic will soon receive paid sick leave if they start to feel ill on the job.

The San Jose City Council decided to move forward after a unanimous vote for a new emergency ordinance, one week after Mayor Sam Liccardo introduced policy.

"We believe that compliance is the most important thing," said Kim Walesh, the city's economic development director. "Workers at essential businesses. If they are sick they should stay home to protect those essential business operations and the broader public health."

The city's new paid sick leave ordinance will give all essential workers impacted by COVID-19 an immediate 40 hours of paid sick leave with an additional hour of sick leave for every two hours worked, up to a cap of 80 hours for the duration of the public health emergency.

California law only requires 24 hours or 3



days of sick leave a year. The new ordinance will cover an employee for the duration of two weeks, equivalent to the incubation period of

San Jose City Councilmember - District 8, Sylvia Arenas said the ordinance will prevent people like custodial workers, childcare providers and grocery store clerks from getting others sick and avoid overwhelming the region's health care system with new coronavirus cases.

"Now more than ever, our working families living paycheck to paycheck need access to paid sick leave to be able to stay home when necessary without having to further strain their limited resources," she said.

Councilmember Johnny Khamis voted for the ordinance, but didn't support it at a committee meeting last week because it doesn't exempt small businesses with 35 employees

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### **Med Life Plus donates emergency** kits to serve local communities

nikitha Banda of Evergreen Valley founded Med Life Plus last August to serve communities. Banda is a ninth grader at Notre Dame High School in San

Med Life Plus (MLP) is an international non-profit organization that donates firstaid kits used to treat illnesses and injuries in emergency situations and portable medical information kits that can help paramedics treat patients on-site in emergencies.

While volunteering at programs at the local Sunday Friends, Banda realized that families lacked medical supplies at home because they often requested first-aid kits from the organization. The Med Life Plus initiative was established to supply these first-aid kits. Sunday Friends Foundation Executive Director James C. McCaskill quoted, "You are gifting very low-income families not only with your donation, but also with the sense of preparedness and safety. Many of our families do not have the money to purchase medical supplies. We are inspired by your generosity and leadership to take care of the impoverished communities across the world."

One day, as a volunteer at Sunrise Villa Senior Living, Banda witnessed a resident she had worked with for two years on a stretcher, hyperventilating; she had suffered a heart attack. Because her extended medical information was unavailable for the paramedics who arrived on the scene. complications arose leading to her hospitalization. After observing this same situation repeated with other patients, Med Life Plus was used to distribute portable medical information kits with essential health information that would be helpful to first

Firefighter/Paramedic Kyle Trevino from Fire Station 31 says, "This program would vastly improve the ease-of-access of patient's important medical records for emergency personnel. In emergency medicine, it is essential to gather these records quickly to determine potentially life-saving treatment during someone's medical crisis."

From these firsthand experiences with the lack of first-aid kits and medical information, Med Life Plus has grown and now addresses the healthcare gaps prevalent at homeless shelters, senior living centers, day worker centers, and other impoverished and vulnerable (underprivileged, unemployed, low-income, poor health) communities around the world. Med Life Plus currently partners with the Salvation Army Emmanuel House - Homeless Shelters, Sunday Friends, Day Worker Center of Mountain View, Sunrise Villa Senior Living,

Cambodia (Kampot), Mexico (Mexicali), and South Africa

Day Worker Center of Mountain View Executive Director Maria Marroquin quoted, "Your generosity allows us to continue providing vital services to our day labor community at this time of emergency."

Combining her passion for teaching and serving others, MLP founder, Snikitha, has tutored middle and high school students since June of 2019 to raise funds for the organization. She says, "Starting this nonprofit organization has introduced me to a community of humble people who only need the support and generosity from their community to have the basic medical supplies they deserve. 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### Evergreen Valley College receives \$400,000 grant for mental health services

vergreen Valley College (EVC) has received a \$400,000 grant from the California State Chancellor's Community College Mental Health Services Program to address the mental health needs of students at EVC. Evergreen Valley College is one of 16 to be awarded this grant.

The California State Legislature approved \$10 million of one-time funding in the 2018-19 State Budget for California Community Colleges (CCC) designed to support mental health services and training.

It's estimated that as many as one in four students has a diagnosable mental illness, but as many as 40 percent of those students are not currently seeking mental health services. Stigma is one of the leading barriers to students accessing mental health services and supports.

Addressing student mental health leads to greater learning outcomes, fewer instances of homelessness and a reduction in suicide rates, which is the second leading cause of death among college students. In addition, According to research by the

National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), 27 percent of college students live with some kind of depression. Depression can take many forms, from a major depressive episode to general feelings of sadness. The NAMI study identifies bipolar disorder as the second most common mental health issue for college students, with 24 percent of survey respondents identifying themselves as having the disorder.

"This grant could not have come at a better time," said Evergreen Valley College Acting President Denise F. Noldon, Ph.D. "With both anxiety and depression rates likely to soar as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, having these additional resources are going to be critical to allow us to support the holistic needs of our student population."

EVC is planning to use these funds to improve students' access to mental health services and support, it will also allow EVC to develop and expand existing programs and resources, provide pertinent education and training to faculty, staff, and students, and establish partnerships with community and county agencies. Furthermore this grant provides EVC with the resources to address campus safety and focus on early intervention, prevention, and support for the campus community while reducing the stigma attached to mental health.

### States with biggest increases in the unemployment rate

ith the U.S. experiencing a record number of initial unemployment claims, WalletHub today released its report on the States with the Biggest Increases in Unemployment Due to Coronavirus.

- 2293.05% increase in the Number of Unemployment Insurance Initial Claims from 36,720 in the first week of the year to 878,727 the week of March 23, 2020. 17th highest increase in the U.S.

### WalletHub Q&A

How do red states and blue states compare when it comes to increases in unemployment?

"With an average unemployment rank of 25, Blue States suffered a higher increase of their unemployment during the coronavirus outbreak than Red States,



which rank 27 on average," said Jill Gonzalez, WalletHub analyst. "The lower the rank, the higher the increase in initial unemployment claims that state received during the coronavirus pandemic."

The state with the current largest number of COVID-19 cases in the U.S. is New York. How has New York's unemployment rate been affected?

"New York has seen a 717% increase in initial unemployment claims from the beginning of 2020 to the 13th week," said Jill Gonzalez, WalletHub analyst. "This is better than the average increase of 2,002%."

### What can states do in order to minimize the rise in their unemployment rates?

"States should aggressively focus on helping the companies in the most need. The federal response will include sending checks to most citizens, even those whose income has not been affected by the coronavirus. States can use a more targeted approach to divert resources to the companies affected the most, thus having maximum impact for the money spent," said Jill Gonzalez, WalletHub analyst.



We are supported in our endeavors by the Succulent Gardens Nursery in Castroville, local succulent lovers who donate their succulents and generous local patrons who buy our succulents. To date, we have raised more than 1000 dollars and conducted several STEM classes and science fair boot camps. We have also distributed more than 500 care cards that raise climate change awareness by providing tips to reduce our carbon footprint in addition to instructions on how to take care of succulents.

### IRS extends tax filing deadline to July 15

The IRS is extending the federal income tax filing deadline to July 15 as part of a growing effort to stem the financial pain from the coronavirus pandemic,

The move gives Americans three months more than they normally would have to file their income tax returns for the 2019 tax year, without incurring interest or penalties.

### Newsom orders statewide ban on evictions

California, Gov. Gavin Newsom on Friday ordered a statewide ban on evictions through the month of May.

Renters are required to declare in writing that they have lost work due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Evictions are also on hold for those that have fallen ill or who have been forced to care for family members, according to the order.

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





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### How downtime forced by coronavirus could be an entrepreneurial opportunity

For would-be entrepreneurs who have longed to turn a side hustle into their main hustle, the shutdown created by the coronavirus may have provided that long-awaited opportunity.

Often, a lack of time is one of the major reasons people give for not starting their own businesses. "My parents supported my decision even though they knew it would be challenging," he says.
- Be interested in everything and observe closely. You never know when opportunities to expand your knowledge and be inspired by new ideas will present themselves. Parsi says he learned this lesson at age 14. His father was a doctor who himself invested in real estate as a passive investment, and was having a two-story house built one story for the family and one as a rental. "He pointed out that I had time to kill over summer vacation and recommended I watch the process," Parsi says. "So my brother and I watched the construction and supervised the contractors. It left a strong impression on me."
- Pivot when necessary. Life doesn't always go as planned as the coronavirus has shown so you need to be prepared to change direction, Parsi says. As an example, Parsi originally planned to follow in his father's footsteps and become a doctor. But admission to medical school in India is highly competitive and he missed the cutoff criteria by one-tenth of a point. That's when he pivoted and became a pharmaceutical scientist instead.
- Learn how to sell anything. At different periods in his life, Parsi worked in a cell phone store, sold Amway products, and sold nutritional supplements. Those experiences weren't always the best, he acknowledges, but he did gain something

from them. "I realized that if I can sell the products and a story and recruit others, then I can sell anything," Parsi says. "Selling is a pivotal skill most entrepreneurs must have."

Anyone who is inspired to get their entrepreneurial drive moving during the current downtime should not completely throw caution to the wind, Parsi says.

"I did not quit my pharmaceutical job right away," he says. "I had an objective to stay in that job until the real estate income was twice the value of my salary. When I hit that objective – when real estate was no longer a side hustle – I decided it made sense to invest more time in real estate than the scientific position."

Now American Ventures is a successful multifamily and commercial real estate investment firm with a proven track record.

"Never settle for less," Parsi says.

### Extreme weather forecasting in the Bay Area has a new high-tech tool

Valley Water unveils first permanent x-band radar in Santa Clara County

Valley Water joined local, regional, state, and federal agencies in the unveiling of the first permanent X-Band radar in the San Francisco Bay Advanced Quantitative Precipitation Information (AQPI) System.

The radar, located on top of the Penitencia Water Treatment Plant in San Jose, is the cornerstone in a new network of high-resolution, low-elevation radars that will improve weather forecasting of atmospheric rivers and extreme weather events across the region.

"Today marks a great milestone in a collaboration that will provide vital information during storms," said Valley Water CEO Norma Camacho. "We and our partners across the region are committed to helping keep our communities safe from floods."

Forecasting rainfall from powerful Pacific storms can be a challenge for meteorologists due to the complex terrain of the San Francisco Bay Area. Precipitation from these storms often forms at low levels, well below the range of existing radars. Once complete, the AQPI network will consist of four X-Band Radars and one C-Band Radar placed at strategic locations across nine counties in the Bay Area.

"We are aligning our regional expertise and resources to provide critical information for flood emergency response and integrated water management tailored to a specific area's needs," said Michael Anderson, State Climatologist for the California Department of Water Resources. "This is an excellent demonstration of our Weather-Ready Nation initiative, to help communities prepare for extreme weather, water, and climate events," added NOAA'S Rob Cifelli, who will monitor the system, designed by Colorado State University.

The system will provide improved data for forecasting, which will assist water managers, reservoir operators, wastewater plant managers, flood, and emergency responders to make operational and safety decisions during extreme weather events.

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
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### Evergreen 6th grade/12u girls basketball team win national championship



### Is REAL ID a real security solution?

3 ways it's designed to protect you

Soon, your driver's license may not be enough to get you through airport security in the United States.

Oct. 1, 2020 is the deadline for U.S. citizens to have REAL ID-compliant state driver's licenses, a requirement passed by Congress in 2005 in the wake of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. Without a compliant driver's license, those who are 18 and over won't be able to board a domestic flight, unless possessing other specific forms of acceptable identification.

"The thought behind this was that with standardization, it will become a lot harder to forge documents and gain access to aircraft," says Stephen Hyduchak, CEO of Aver (www. goaver. com), an identity-verification service

While the main idea of REAL ID is to better protect U.S. citizens and their identity, there is controversy over the law. Critics cite privacy issues. Some states delayed getting cards in circulation because residents and legislators worried REAL ID was a way for the federal government to collect personal information for a national database. The Department of Homeland Security, however, says REAL ID is not a national ID card, and each jurisdiction maintains its own records and controls who gets access to those records.

Hyduchak thinks the security features of REAL ID outweigh privacy concerns, and says the technology behind the card makes keeping people safer more achievable.

"Government agencies say this is a significant step forward in the battle against terrorism, identity theft and other crimes, and illegal immigration," Hyduchak says. "New technologies like facial recognition have advanced our security capability at a time we dearly need it."

Hyduchak analyzes the different ways the technology within REAL ID can protect U.S. citizens:

Document verification. The Department of Homeland Security requires applicants for the REAL ID driver's license to show more documentation. "Artificial intelligence leads

the way in document verification," Hyduchak says. "More personal information is contained in the new card, and new things will be standardized, like barcodes, in a universal machinereadable format. The features and standards of the card cover everything from the process of verifying cardholders' identities to the facilities storage of those credentials where they are produced. This will aid in the avoidance of tampering with and counterfeiting documents."

Facial recognition. The new images on the cards will be compatible for facial recognition searches. "One piece of technology that could give states an upper hand in detecting the kind of fraud that REAL ID wants to deter is biometric identification," Hyduchak says. "This is the ability to verify the identity of a person through digitized images of fingerprints or facial features. Facial recognition technology is most effective; it uses a database of photos, such as driver's licenses, to identify people in security photos and videos. Using facial recognition surveillance technology, digital photos in the Homeland Security data bank can be used to match anyone anywhere. Facial recognition uses biometrics to map facial details and verify identity through those key features.'

Linking state and international databases. While some states were already sharing some of their Department of Motor Vehicles-collected details, the REAL ID Act mandates that this national pool of private information has to include photographs conducive to facial recognition, which can make identification faster from state to state or from U.S. to foreign country. "The reasoning behind connecting the data bases has to do almost entirely with catching potential terrorists, duplicate applications and illegal immigrants," Hyduchak says. "Because the U.S. exchanges information with other governments and global organizations, the digital photos will probably be shared with foreign and international intelligence and police agencies."

"REAL ID is a great way of using the latest technology to confirm identification and protect U.S. citizens," Hyduchak says. "As soon as new document standards are processed, we can update our machine learning models, and everyone benefits."

### Do some DIY


Finally get round to those household tasks you've been putting off for a long time, such as fixing a broken shelf, or painting a tired looking wall.

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
