C-I School District community support under pandemic shutdown

The support of his community, colleagues, staff, students and families have made the shutting down of the Crosby-Ironton School District go smoother for Superintendent Jamie Skjevelend.

"The great thing about the C-I school district, as soon down to close school our phone started ringing off the hook," observed Skjevelend. "My desk was full of post-it note messages of people who want to help."

as the governor's order came

Communication from his fellow superintendents, staff, students and families have kept him positive.

He said the best way the public can help now is to make donations to the school food service program. "Food is free now, but it may not always be and we can use those funds for families who can't afford to buy breakfast and lunch."

"We had eight days," he said about the time frame to transition from in-person school to distance learning with students staying at home.

The hardest thing is the absence of in-person relationships among staff, students and their families.

Buses deliver assignments to children and collect them and 260 breakfasts and lunches are delivered every day to students.

The food service staff is working every day and volunteers can't be used, as there are strict guidelines in handling food. He said he's heard that local restaurants are also offering free meals to students of all ages — no questions asked.

One concern, from the start, is students who may be struggling at home on their own. "We are determined that no students will fall off the grid," he emphasized.

There are protocols that are triggered when required communications aren't made by students. "They absolutely have to make communication

Missing 11-year-old boy found safe

An 11-year old boy was reported missing from his home southwest of Ironton on Tuesday, April 28.

Isaiah Ringhand had been missing for approximately two hours when Crow Wing County Sheriff's Office dep-

uties, along with a Brainerd Police K9 unit, and the CWC Drone team responded to the call at 12:10 p.m. at the address in Irondale Township.

A Brainerd Police K9 track team, as well as an aerial search, commenced in the immediate area of the residence located on the 2100 block of Crow Wing County Road 128, which is near Little Black Hoof Lake and Hay Lake.

The Deerwood Fire Department arrived with personnel and began an organized grid search pattern on over 40 acres of property near the residence and eventually over 160 acres was gridded out and searched on foot by area fire departments and the **Crow Wing County**

Mounted Patrol.

Ringhand was located at approximately 7:20 p.m. by drone team pilots, hiding in a wooded area near the residence. The search was helped by

the lack of foliage on plants and trees, but hindered by muddy and swampy areas.

According to a press release from the Crow Wing County Sheriff's Office, "Incredible professionalism was displayed by all agencies who responded. The Sheriff's Office would like to thank all agencies involved, including: The Deerwood, Crosby, Ironton, and Cuyuna Fire Departments; the Brainerd, Deerwood, and Crosby Police Departments; the MN DNR Enforcement Division, the MN State Patrol, including a State Patrol helicopter unit; the CRMC Ambulance Service; Life Link III Air Medical Transport; the Crow Wing County Mounted Patrol; the Crow Wing County Unmanned Aerial Systems Team (drone); and the Central Lakes Search and Rescue K9 search team.

"A special thanks to all of the public volunteers lending their support to the family of the boy. Several volunteers provided assistance by driving area roads and trails that was crucial to allow more police and fire personnel to focus on wooded areas."

Great Fishing: has your fishing pole caught more cobwebs than fish?

Fishing seasons are open all year for some species like bluegill. Seasons open on Saturday, May 9, for walleye, northern pike, bass, and trout in lakes. Trout season in streams is open.

Ray Ruiz is a fishing and hunting skills liaison with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, he has tips on how to get fishing.

As part of Minnesota's COVID-19 response, anglers should fish close to home rather than traveling long distances to go fish.

"I often get asked. 'Ray, what is the best lake to fish?" I reply, 'What is the closest lake to you? That is the best lake.' Fishing close to home allows you more time with your line in the water and that time leads to learning, which leads to catching more fish." **High water and fast Currents**

"Pay attention to water fluctuation," said Ruiz. "High water can be dangerous, so safety should always be a priority. High water also creates fast current. This current is hard to fish because it drags

your bait out of position. When fishing heavy or fast current, use a moving bait. This will allow you to catch active fish. Also remember that high water gives the fish a lot more real estate to work with. The fish will be scattered and harder to find. This is why moving baits are critical when fishing high water levels. High water means "dirty," or turbid, water. Use a noisy and flashy bait to get the attention of the fish."

Early season bass

"I love bass fishing," he

some of the most exciting fishing you will ever do in your life. With that said, when fishing early in the spring, remember that the water is still cold and fish are not as active as they normally are during the summer or fall. You also have to take into consideration that all the bait fish and crustaceans that bass feed on are small during the early season, so you need to 'match the hatch.' That means that you need to use small crank baits and soft plastic baits that imitate bait fish and crustaceans."


Avoid the crowds

"I highly recommend fishing early in the morning," said Ruiz. "This will help you avoid both traffic and crowds. The morning bite is some of the best fishing, because fish are very active in low light

said. "In my opinion, it is conditions — especially in the morning before the sun comes up. If you have the means, fishing in a boat, kayak or canoe will help to avoid crowds too. If you do plan on fishing from the shore or a dock, I suggest doing some research to find spots where you can fish while practicing social distancing."

Helpful tips

"We've been updating our 'Learn to Fish' webpage to make it more user-friendly for those who want to learn how to fish," said Ruiz. "The goal is to provide Minnesotans with accurate and practical fishing information that they can use to go out on and enjoy the lakes, rivers and natural resources that Minnesota has to offer.

If you are like me, growing a garden inside right now does not seem appealing. I would rather be out and about frolicking in the parks, playing and visiting with my family and friends. Radish sprouts for instance, have as high of vitamin C content as citrus fruit. Eight of the small trays can yield up to 1 ½ to 2 pounds of fresh spouts every 10 days! There are a large variety of greens that can be grown and can be cut to go straight from your tray to the table.

Once these easy to master methods are learned, this takes minutes, not hours. I know some are thinking "But I don't have a south facing window". The good news is that any window can work. "If you can see, you can sprout greens" is a mantra for this method. So, any home, apartment, dorm, etc. with a window will do. Oh, and the eight trays I mentioned above, together they measure a whopping one square foot.

So, get your shelf and a

window ready for the coming weeks and we'll begin your conversion to an indoor gardener.

He now attends eighth grade at Coon Rapids Middle School. He is a great athlete in hockey and lacrosse and a top student. He talked to us from his home in Coon Rapids.

Question: Nolan, tell us about a typical day in distance learning.

Question: Are you a procrastinator?

Answer: No, I do what I need to for each assignment each day. And then I get my exercise when my classes are

His mom Kelly, who works for a school district, is doing her job from home about seven hours a day. The two work in separate rooms, but spend a lot of time together and exercise every day.

Not seeing his friends is the hardest thing for Nolan during the Covid-19 pandemic. But he and his friends communicate through the SnapChat app on their phones and challenge one another with online video games.

Nolan was able to complete his Bantam hockey season, where his home ice is the Coon Rapids Ice Arena. But the lacrosse season is a bust. It would have started in mid-April and lasted through the summer.

COVID-19 lessons: accountability (Part 1)

Our government made a series of mistakes in managing this "pandemic." People who will not admit to a mistake, and who make others pay for the price of their mistakes, should never hold a public office.

We have begun scapegoating China where the totalitarian government did not inform the world about the outbreak which began there. We are to believe that our government had no reason to think that the CCP would act to protect itself, to put its own interests first, like our government does.

Missouri, likely the first of many states, has joined in the lawsuits against China. The governor and attorney general of Missouri want China to pay for the costs of the lockdown they ordered.

It is debatable whether social distancing was a mistake. For the first time, as I understand, we quarantined people who were healthy rather than sick. We sent the kids home, and then the "unessential" workers and did not first quarantine the elderly and others at high risk, which led to more deaths in those groups later.

If governors had to lock things down it should have been elder care facilities, hospitals and medical centers to avoid "overburdening." The lockdowns ratcheted up the public fear and stress, which weakened immune systems, making everyone higher risk for later waves of the virus. The lockdowns enabled later waves because fewer healthy people caught the virus and were "herd immunized" in the first wave.

The lockdowns were na-

tional suicide. The lemmings came out of governors' mansions to lead us over the cliff into a Greater Depression.

Twenty-seven million jobs vanished in five weeks, followed by suicides, drinking, domestic abuse, abortions, family breakups, and demands on mental health services. 
