





Another founding father, Daniel Webster, said "History is God's providence in human affairs."


Our third president, Thomas Jefferson, said "History, by apprizing them of the past, will enable them to judge of the future."

Livingston County Board of Supervisors Amends Tax Foreclosure Timeline Amid COVID-19 Crisis

At its May 6, 2020 meeting, the Livingston County Board of Supervisors approved postponing the enforcement of unpaid 2018 property tax liens until 2021.

This Board action was taken in response to Governor Cuomo's Executive Order 202.8 and an Administrative Order issued by Chief Administrative Judge Lawrence K. Marks. Both Orders specifically prohibit New York State counties from engaging in any legal activity related to the foreclosure of properties under Real Property Tax Law Article 11.

Because these Orders have drastically impacted the County's tax foreclosure process with respect to unpaid 2018 Town and County taxes, a new date of redemption and a new auction date for the 2018 tax year have been established.

The newly established last day to redeem property under the Article 11 tax foreclosure process will be the close of County business on June 15, 2021. The auction date for properties the County acquires through the tax foreclosures process relative to the unpaid 2018 Town and County taxes will be July 22, 2021 at 6:00PM.





Livingston County Economic Development Launches Local Business Recovery Fund

Geneseo, NY, May 21, 2020 — Today, Livingston County Economic Development is launching a Local Business Recovery Fund to assist small businesses in Livingston County that have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The program will provide loans of no less than \$2,000 and no more than \$10,000 to eligible applicants for reopening their business within 30 days once government orders have been lifted. Loans will have a 48 month term and a 1% interest rate. No payments will be due in months 1 – 6.

To be eligible for this program, applicants must:

- · Be a for-profit business located in Livingston County
- Document injury to business as a result of COVID-19
- Have acceptable personal credit history and credit scores prior to the New York State Emergency Declaration
- · Be current with all property taxes, sales taxes, and state and federal income taxes

Allowable uses of program funds include:

- Modification of the existing business to adapt to governmental orders imposing restrictions on business operations, for example:
- o Physical changes to the location to enable take out or curb side pickup
- o Modifications to websites to enable on-line ordering
- o Marketing / business development expenses to attract customers or relaunch business once governmental restrictions have been lifted
- · Assistance in business continuity, for example:
- o Employee payroll
- o Employee health care
- o Rent
- o Inventory
- o Utilities
- o Accounts Payable

"The COVID-19 crisis has had a devastating impact on small businesses, which are the backbone of our Livingston County community," stated Bill Bacon, Director of Livingston County Economic Development. "Our goal with the recovery fund is to help our small businesses sustain their operations during this challenging time and offer assistance as they prepare to reopen their doors."

The application packet is available here. Applications will accepted beginning May 21, 2020 and reviewed in the order received. Livingston County Economic Development will accept applications until the earlier of the date that all program funds are committed or June 30, 2020. 


Jansel plans to attend Alfred State College in the fall and then SUNY Brockport for business.

May is Lyme Disease Awareness Month

Lyme disease is a bacterial infection that can be spread to humans by the bite of an infected deer tick. Ticks can be hard to see, as they may only be about the size of a pin-head. Lyme disease cases peak in the summer months, especially during May, June, and July.

Lyme disease is very serious and can become crippling or debilitating if not properly diagnosed and treated with antibiotics. Typical symptoms include fever, headache, fatigue, and a characteristic skin rash called erythema migrans. If left untreated, infection can spread to joints, the heart, and the nervous system. Serious risks from Lyme disease can be reduced if the tick is removed within 36 hours.

Anyone who plays or works outside is at an increased risk. Ticks most commonly live in cool, moist environments, and can be found in tall grassy areas, garden areas, around shrubs and in wooded areas. The public can be at risk while mowing lawns, picking up leaves, or other outdoor activities. Deer, birds, mice, and other animals can transport ticks into your yard.

There are several things you can do to protect yourself and your family from tick bites. Below are some basic tips to follow:

- ★ Keep your lawn mowed and cut down brushy areas.
- ◆ Avoid areas that may be infested such as, tall, grassy, moist areas.
- ♦ Use protective measures. If you know you will be walking in tall grass wear long sleeves and tuck your pants into your socks and shirt into your pants. Also, try to wear light color clothing so that ticks are more visible.
- ♦ Use repellent that contains 20 percent or more DEET, picaridin, or IR3535 on exposed skin for protection that lasts several hours.

- ◆ Perform a tick check on yourself, your pets and your children when finished with outside work or play.
- ♦ If a tick is found, do not apply mineral oil, petroleum jelly, or heat. Use fine-tipped tweezers to remove the tick. Contact your doctor if there are concerns about incomplete tick removal or if a rash or flu-like symptoms develop.

Memorial Day is a Time to Honor the Fallen

Mount Morris, NY, May 21, 2020 — In May of 1865, our nation faced the end of the Civil War. Over 620,000 deaths amassed between the Union and the Confederacy. This number represents 2.5% of the United States population at that time, which would be the equivalent of 8.275 million people today.

At the end of war, a local druggist, Henry C. Welles from Waterloo, New York mentioned that — while honoring living veterans was nice and celebrating the end of the war was good — more should be done to honor the deceased patriots. He wanted to place flowers and other decorations on their graves while grief was still eminent on the home front.

The following spring, Welles revisited this idea with General John B. Murray, a Brigadier General and a public servant. As Clerk of Seneca County, Murray was influential in setting Welles' ideas into motion. On May 5, 1866, to the beat of music, a group marched to three different cemeteries to decorate the graves of soldiers. This event was repeated again in 1867, and in subsequent years, other villages, towns, and cities followed in remembering our fallen service members.

Both the House of Representatives and Congress unanimously passed House Concurrent Resolution 587 in 1966 which states in part, "...one Hundred years ago in the Village of Waterloo, NY, does hereby officially recognize Waterloo, New York as the birthplace of Memorial Day..." It is a federal holiday to honor and mourn our fallen service members who took the oath to uphold the Constitution of the United States and never came home to their families on their own accord. Some, to this day, have never made it home.

Memorial Day was once recognized with closed storefronts, residential flags at half mast, and the marking of graves to honor the fallen. Today, many consider Memorial Day as an unofficial start to the summer season with parades, grilling, picnics, and other fond activities with family. Though celebrations have evolved from one man's ideas in 1865 to remembrances across the nation today, the significance of Memorial Day has not changed.

Today, we are confronted with an unprecedented pandemic that has changed the way we interact with each other. While you may not celebrate this year's Memorial Day on May 25th in a manner you are accustomed to, may you – in your own way – honor the sacrifices of our fallen service members and celebrate the lives that once were.

To the families of our fallen service members of generations past to present day, WE SALUTE YOU with honor and gratitude of a grateful nation.


