



Questions and Answers

Q: What will the residents be voting on?

Proposition 1 – authorization of the budget **Proposition 2** – the Mount Morris Public Library Election of 2 School Board Trustees

Q: What is the overall budget for 2020-2021 proposed in Proposition 1?

Proposition 1 asks residents to approve the district's budget of \$15,463,449. This is a budget increase of \$206,033 or 1.35% compared to the 2019-2020 budget and it contains a decrease of -0.36% in the tax levy.

Q: How does this budget compare to prior budgets?

The proposed 2020-2021 budget once again continues the trend of the last three years of NOT increasing taxes. In fact, after projecting all state and federal sources of revenue, the budget is supported by a tax levy decrease.

Q: What is this year's tax cap?

The tax cap legislation that passed a few years ago limits the local levy increase by a local tax growth factor and the lower of CPI or 2%. The maximum allowable levy for us is actually a decrease of -0.3% for the 2020-2021 school year. The proposed levy for the 2020-2021 school year is under the cap.

Q: How are taxes going down if the budget is increasing?

The tax levy is made up of support for general operations/ programs and debt service related to approved capital projects. The total debt service budget is increasing by \$208,191; this accounts for the entire increase in the budget of \$206,033 from 19-20 to 20-21. The remaining budgetary components (administrative, program, operations & maintenance, and all related benefits) are staying relatively flat.

Furthermore, the district has been very strategic with its debt to finance past and current projects. Building Aid related to all completed projects will be increasing by about \$240,000 which is more than enough to cover the increase in debt service.

Q: What State Aid impact is the district facing?

Governor Cuomo has warned of additional "significant cuts" if the pandemic continues to affect revenues and the federal government does not come through with more aid to States. Therefore, our budget reflects further reductions in State Aid by appropriating more fund balance and reserves to prepare for such a scenario. In light of this, the District is committed to continue maximizing the use of its federal grants, finding other sources of revenue, and controlling expenditures to minimize the impact of supporting the budget with fund balance and reserves.

Q. What is a Capital Outlay Project?

The Capital Outlay Program is an expense driven aid that allows the district to make necessary facility improvements one year and receive the full state aid on the work the following year. In other words, once you are into the cycle of completing an annual Capital Outlay Project, the aid from the prior year project significantly covers the cost of the project in the current year. The 2020-2021 general fund budget includes \$100,000 as a transfer to the capital fund for a project to continue to address some or all of the following: building security enhancements, replacement of control systems in various areas throughout the building, HVAC and mechanical improvements, and window replacements. The project and work will be completed upon submission of the scope to the State Education Department (SED) and receipt of the commissioner's approval. However, the project is 98% funded by aid generated from the 2019-2020 year. The net result is a cost to the community of \$2.00 for every \$100 worth of work.

Q. When is the annual budget hearing & vote?

The hearing is the presentation of the budget and will be held on Wednesday, May 27, 2019, at 6 p.m. Due to COVID-19 and the implementation of social distancing, the presentation will be held virtually. Information on how to view the hearing will be available on the district website. The vote is Tuesday, June 9, 2020, and will be done by absentee ballot only. Ballots must be received by 5:00pm on that date in order to be counted.

Q. What is a contingent (austerity) budget?

A contingent budget includes only expenses necessary to provide the minimum services legally required to operate and maintain school buildings and educational programs, preserve the property of the school district and ensure the health and safety of the students and staff. A contingent budget requires that there be no increase in the tax levy over the previous year.

Q. Why is there a separate proposition for the public library?

New York State Education Law requires a separate proposition for the public library. The school district is obligated by law to levy taxes for voter approved library funding on the school tax bill. The school district collects the money and turns it over to the library. Our library, located on Main Street, is seeking approval of a library tax levy of \$103,950.

Q. How can I vote on the budget?

Absentee ballots have been mailed. If you did not receive one please call 658-5010. All absentee ballots must be received by 5:00 pm on June 9th to be counted. You can mail it in, or you can drop it off from 8:00 am-5:00 pm on June 9th at the door of the bug gymnasium off of the parking circle.







State Launches Contact Tracing Program

New York State recently created the NYS Contact Tracing Program, an initiative to help slow the spread of COVID-19.

If you test positive for COVID-19, a contact tracer will reach out and connect you with the support and resources you may need to quarantine. The contact tracer also works with you to identify anyone you have been in contact with over the past 14 days to trace the spread of the virus. These individuals will then hear from a contact tracer via phone and text. If they are determined to be close contacts, then they are asked to stay home to help stop the spread of COVID-19. Quarantine support and resources are arranged for these individuals, if necessary.

Any information you share with the NYS Contact Tracing Program is strictly confidential and treated as a private medical record. A contact tracer will never ask you for Social Security Numbers, bank or credit card numbers, or any other financial information.

If a contact tracer is calling you, the caller ID will most likely say "NYS Contact Tracing" (518-387-9993). The Governor's office is strongly encouraging you to answer these phone calls in order to help protect your loved ones and community.


