My son was helping a co-worker and was injured on the job. When they took him to the ER he tested positive for marijuana which he said he used the weekend prior to the accident. Now his employer refuses to pay his medical bills or pay him for being off work. Can they do this?

Well we know he didn't have a prescription for marijuana in Alabama.

The Alabama Workers Comp Statute provides that no compensation shall be paid "due to the injured employee being intoxicated" and that includes alcohol or illegal drugs.

It's hard to say whether employers misunderstand the statute purposefully or whether they simply don't understand

they simply don't understand that "no compensation shall be allowed" doesn't have anything to do with payment of the medical bills.

The first misunderstanding that employers have is that if an employee tests positive for alcohol or illegal drugs, they take the position that they are entirely free from liability for medical bills, temporary total disability (TTD) or permanent partial disability (PPD). The fact is that the employer is still responsible for the medical bills of an employee who tests positive for drugs or alcohol if the employee was injured in the line and scope of their employment.

The second misunderstanding is that the intoxication has to have contributed to the occurrence of the accident. In other words, if the employee can show that the accident occurred without the contribution of any mind altering substance, then this is not a valid defense for the employer.

The defense of intoxication is an affirmative defense. Affirmative defenses are those defenses which must be pled by the defendant and then proven by the defendant.

I don't know the facts of your son's case but I do know that the employer has to pay for his medical

If a good worker's compensation attorney looks at the facts of how the accident occurred and believes there is a pretty good chance that if your son really smoked pot a week ago and was by no means still affected, and believes that there is substantial proof of that, such as that he had worked the entire day without a problem and had received instructions from a supervisor who detected no impairment and the instructions had been followed without any sign of intoxication, it may be a case to put before a judge to obtain full benefits. Remember that the only way an attorney gets paid in a worker's compensation case is if the worker is injured to the extent that the injury results in a permanent impairment. In worker compensation cases in Alabama attorneys are limited to 15% of the amount awarded by the Court or agreed upon by the parties in settlement of the claim.

What's the difference between Palliative Care (PC) and hospice?

To palliate means to make the effects less painful, harmful, or harsh [M.Webster - from the Latin palliatus]. Both Palliative Care and hospice are comfort-focused, helping people to live comfortably rather than just be kept alive! PC can be provided <u>simultaneously</u> with

other medical treatments - sometimes for years - improving the quality of life for those with any serious or life-limiting illness (which refers to incurable diseases usually leading to death, such as Alzheimer's Dementia, cancers, end-stage heart disease), by:

- 1. Helping patients/families clarify their goals so they can make more informed decisions and avoid treatments or drugs that won't benefit them;
- 2. Improving symptoms, such as pain or shortness of breath; and,
- 3. Ensuring patients have the opportunity to choose a comfortable and dignified natural death.

It needs to be emphasized that PC is not just for the actively dying—that is primarily hospice's role, which is palliative care for the last six months of life.

Studies confirm people receiving PC often live better and longer when we focus on comfort and avoid attempts to cure the incurable. For example, when 150 patients with stage 4 lung cancer [cancer spread everywhere] were treated with chemotherapy, but with half (75) also receiving PC simultaneously, the PC group lived an average of three months longer (11 compared to 8 months) than the group with only chemotherapy!

So, if you have a life-limiting disease and want to live longer and more comfortably, ask your doctor to include PC principles when treating you (meaning, avoid tests and treatments that have shown little benefit, while using those which improve comfort); and ask for a referral to Hospice of the Shoals if he feels your prognosis is less than six months.

First-Year UNA Freshmen Up

FLORENCE-Official enrollment numbers for the fall semester have been released by the University of North Alabama, and it appears that a record has been broken. According to the data, first-time, full-time freshmen enrolled for the current school year is the largest in the university's 185-year history.

According to the numbers that were released last week, UNA's freshmen 'cohort' grew from 912 students during this time last year to 1,159 students currently enrolled. That's a 24.5% increase from the previous year.

"Our strong enrollment this fall tells me that students and parents are beginning to recognize our university for its quality, beauty, safety and value, said Dr. Ken Kitts, UNA president. "I've been in this business for decades and have never seen an increase in the freshman class of this magnitude."

UNA also showed an overall enrollment increase of 3.46%, bringing the total campus population to 7,078 compared to 6,840 during this time last year.

The university also saw a large increase in credit hour production (CHP). CHP is directly related to the number of classes students are enrolled in on campus. During this time last year UNA experienced 77,260 total CHP. As of this year JNA has seen an incre of nearly 6.1% with 81,963 CHP for fall 2015.

Coming off a win at the Earl Jacoby Memorial Invitational in Huntsville and a third place finish at the Sewanee Invitational

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

Clean Water is Costly

Editor:

Water is a necessity for all living things. We have a responsibility to act as good stewards of our water now and for future generations.

Nitrates in drinking water can be hazardous to the health of pregnant women, nursing mothers, infant children, and the elderly. Excess nitrogen can enter the water supply anytime rainfall, snow melt, or excess irrigation flows over land and the water picks up pollutants. This is due often to the overuse of chemical fertilizers on lawns and croplands and poorly managed animal waste from livestock

In March of this year the Des Moines, Iowa Water Works filed a lawsuit against Buena Vista, Sac, and Calhoun counties in Northwest Iowa. They claim drainage districts in those counties are polluting the Raccoon River, an important source of drinking water

for 500,000 residents in the city of Des role in its protection. Moines. In order to meet safe drinking water standards, Des Moines may be forced to spend between \$76 million and \$183.5 million to construct a new water treatment facility.

The cause of that pollution is nitrate contamination. Much of it comes from agricultural activities including the 960,000 cattle, 1.2 million hogs, and just over 1 million turkeys raised there.

When water is polluted our neighbors downstream must suffer the burden of building costly treatment infrastructure too expensive for many communities. Water connects us all. And because we all benefit from it, we must each play a



So, Microsoft is telling you that they will spy on your every move and use that data for their own ends, whatever that may be.

Another part of the EULA says that Microsoft's Edge browser will "automatically sync your settings and data with Microsoft servers. This includes web browser history, favorites, and websites you have open in addition to saved app, website,

mobile hotspot, and Wi-Fi network names and passwords". WHAT? Why in the world would Microsoft need to know that? Crazy, huh?

Another scary part reads, "The ads we select may be based on your current location, search query, or the content you are viewing. Other ads are targeted based on your likely interests or other information that we learn about you over time".

It all certainly sounds pretty darn intrusive but the fact is this: Google, Apple, all internet service providers and all cell phone companies have been

collecting the same type of data on us for years. Microsoft is late to the game. Just like Google and Apple, Microsoft must collect this data so they can provide you with cool features. For example, Microsoft's search robot named Cortana (and Google Now and Apple's Siri) all need to search through your emails and calendar to provide you with reminders of upcoming events such as football games and travel plans. They need to record your voice pattern so they can understand your speech. They need access to your contacts so that when you say, "Call my wife" it will make the connection. They want to deliver advertisements that are relevant to your tastes. They want you to be able to synchronize your bookmarks between your home and office computers. They can't deliver any of those cool services

if they do not have access to your "private" stuff.

Microsoft knew that bad press was coming over the privacy concerns. As a result, they have all sorts of settings that you can dig into that give you lots of control over what you share. But every time you disable something, you lose a bit of functionality. My advice: Don't worry. Be happy. This is a new world where privacy no longer exists. Deal with it.

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

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

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
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Figure These Out

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

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FERRET FUN

Mischievous and curious, ferrets are a hoot to live with, but they have some special needs. Here's what to expect if you're planning to acquire one of the slinky critters

n love with the furry tube of fun that is the ferret? These members of the mustelid Lefamily (hint: that means they're stinkers) are inquisitive and energetic — think toddler-onchocolate energetic. Their busy nature makes them entertaining companions, but it also means they get in to everything. As you can imagine, ferrets have some special needs, some that you might not be aware of. Here are 11 tips on living with them.

❖ Ferrets are carnivores with higher protein and fat requirements than cats. Feed them a high-protein diet made for ferrets, and avoid sugary treats such as raisins and carrots. In a pinch, you can feed canned kitten food, but it's not appropriate as a full-time diet. Because ferrets can be prone to insulinomas (pancreatic tumors), it's best to avoid highcarbohydrate dry foods, recommends Scott Weldy, DVM, of Serrano Animal and Bird Hospital in Lake Forest, California. Choose a food that's at least 32 percent animal protein and 20 percent fat with minimal amounts of plant-based ingredients.

❖ Ferrets are hunters. They can be great friends with cats and dogs, but pocket pets and birds aren't safe around them. On the plus side, you won't have a problem with mice, rats or other vermin in your home.

❖ Ferrets have sharp, pointy teeth, and they can be nippy in play. Supervise their interactions with young children, and protect valued items. Grandma's piano can make a fine ferret chew toy if you don't keep Ferdinand away from it and give him acceptable items to play with.

❖ Ferrets steal stuff. "They are worse than any 2-year-old," says Kristi Krause, DVM, who also practices at Serrano Animal and Bird Hospital. They will take off with your car keys. Your wallet is gone. Your slippers are gone.'

Ferret-proofing a home is a difficult art. errets fit through tiny spaces. Never assum they can't get to something or get in or out of a certain area. If they can squeeze their head through an opening, the body will follow. And of course they can use their paws to manipulate objects. Don't be surprised to find your ferret inside the dishwasher or in the back of your kitchen cabinets.

❖ Ferrets need large living quarters for when you're not home to keep them out of trouble. Choose a cage that's at least two feet wide and four feet high with two or more levels. Flooring or bedding can range from carpet or wood to pine shavings or artificial grass, but get rid of anything your ferret chews up.

Ferrets are nocturnal, but they will adapt to your schedule. When they're not playing hard, they're sleeping hard, up to 16 hours a day.

❖ Ferrets enjoy playing on large exercise wheels and running through tunnels. An easy, inexpensive option for a tunnel is a flexible clothes dryer vent, Dr. Weldy says. Ferrets will play in them all day, especially if you toss treats inside for them to find.

* Ferrets smell. With their noses, of course, but they also have an odor, unique to each animal, produced by their musk glands. Some

people like the scent; some don't. Be sure you

can live with it before getting a ferret. ❖ Ferrets need distemper and rabies vaccinations as well as flea and heartworm preventives.

❖ Ferrets must be spayed or neutered or have birth control implants. Spaying protects a female ferret's health by limiting the secretion of estrogen, which at high levels can cause fatal anemia. Altered ferrets stink less, and neutered males have less aggressive behavior.

Ferrets can bring their people many hours of joy, but they're not for everyone.

'I think you have to be a special person to be tolerant of their behaviors," Dr. Weldy says. "They're unique animals."

Missing parrot returns with new language

Happy ending: Chick decided to give Nigel to them after hearing how heartbroken they were at his disappearance.



· Watching fish is calming and distracting, boosts your mood and lowers blood pressure and heart rate, research shows. Scientists at Great Britain's National Marine Aquarium, Plymouth University and the University of Exeter measured the heart rate and blood pressure and assessed the mood of volunteers as they watched tanks with gradually increasing numbers of fish. The more fish, the better, they found.

"This study has, for the first time, provided robust evidence that 'doses' of exposure to underwater settings could actually have a positive impact on people's well-being,' says Deborah Cracknell of the National Marine Aquarium.





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
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Bring the Light



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
