# Russellville City Board of Education approves new contract for superintendent

The Russellville City Board of Education approved a contract extension for Superintendent Heath Grimes at a special meeting held Monday afternoon.

The board voted 4-0 to approve the 45-month contract. Board member Greg Trapp was absent from the meeting.

The contract, which Grimes is expected to sign this week, supplants Grimes' current contract, which was set to expire after the 2020-21 school year.

Grimes' contract includes a raise in the base salary and an annual

# Absentee voting deadline extended for municipal elections

For voters who want to cast absentee ballots in the upcoming Alabama municipal elections, that process just became easier thanks to Alabama Secretary of State John Merrill.

Merrill announced Monday that absentee ballot applications may be submitted through Thursday, August 20 for the August 25, 2020, municipal election.

The deadline to hand-deliver an absentee ballot is the close of business Monday, August 24, the day before the election. If an absentee ballot is returned by mail, it must be postmarked by August 24 and received by noon on August 25.

The deadline to register to vote in time for municipal elections is Monday, August 10.

Additionally, Merrill has authorized any Alabama voter concerned about contracting or spreading COVID-19 to cast an absentee ballot in order to avoid the polls on election day.

"We have worked to provide safe, secure and free elections to the people of Alabama through offering an extended absentee voting period during the recent Primary Runoff Election, and we will continue to see that Alabamians have the opportunity to safely participate in the electoral process during these challenging times," Merrill said.



#### Grissom looking to continue teamwork in third term as mayor

David Grissom spent the evening of July 21 putting up political signs around the city.

Nothing unusual about that, as Grissom was seeking a third term as mayor of Russellville. But on this particular evening, Grissom was erecting "Thank You" signs.

Strange, considering the August 25, 2020, municipal elections were more than a month away.

But when the clock struck 5 p.m., on July 21, qualifying for municipal office ended with no challenger to Grissom having entered the race. Alabama law provides that a certificate of election be prepared in cases of unopposed municipal races, so Grissom won't even appear on the August 25 ballot.

That's the way elected officials like their races to be—unopposed.

"I want to thank the people of the City of Russellville for the confidence they have placed in me," Grissom said last week. "It's an honor to continue serving the people of my hometown as mayor. I look forward to working with our city council members as we continue to move Russellville forward.

First elected as mayor in 2012, Grissom faced competition in both of his previous mayoral campaigns. He was unopposed when he ran for City Council District Five in 2008 and served a four-year term.

Since his election eight years ago, Grissom has stressed a teamworkbased strategy for moving Russellville forward. That includes not only the mayor and council working together, but a teamwork approach with county, state and federal officials all working toward the same goals.

"We have many positive things taking place in and around Russellville. We continue to add new jobs, improve our infrastructure and improve our city services, and we continue to redevelop our downtown district," Grissom said.

"One of the main things I campaigned on eight years ago, and it continues to be just as important today, is that we all work together as a team to accomplish what we want for the city. I think we have built relationships with people across the state and country that will help us keep moving forward," he added.

Grissom is the son of Judy Keeton Grissom and the late Bob Grissom. He



The ones who bought to resale made money, but didn't stop to think about what would be the




I wonder who the mastermind is that sits around thinking of the next "panic," but we have a new one in the making, called "the coin-shortage." Greed will prevail again.

dent's comments portion of the meeting.

"I want to thank the board for its renewal of my contract. I appreciate the strong board support both of me and what takes place in our school system," Grimes said.

The 45-month contract will run through the 2022-23 school year.

Grimes serves as the president and a founding member of the Council for Leaders in Alabama Schools (CLAS) affiliate organization Alabama Leaders Advocating for English Learners.

The organization is comprised of a group of educators across Alabama who are striving to improve on and strengthen the way English language learning is taught, funded and prioritized in Alabama's public school systems.

The Alabama Leaders group's efforts led to increased funding for educating English language learner students.

Those increases have brought almost \$1 million into Russellville City Schools the past two years.

Russellville City Schools has approximately 625 students whose primary language is something other than English. The system's ELL percentage, which exceeds 20 percent, is one of the highest in Alabama.

Grimes also serves as president of the District Eight Superintendents Association, part of School Superintendents of Alabama. He is on the Board of Directors of CLAS and serves on the Board of Directors of the School Superintendents of Alabama.

In addition to renewing Grimes' contract, the board approved several personnel moves, including:

Landers seeks reelection to Phil Campbell City Council Place Four seat


After witnessing the devastation and destruction left as a result of the April 27, 2011 tornado, I decided it was time for me to step up and do my part. We had hundreds of volunteers coming to our aid, not only to my family personally but throughout Phil Campbell, Franklin County and the great State of

Several months later, I started attending City Council meetings and learning all I could about what was going on in the City of Phil Campbell. When election time came around in 2012, I decided it was time to throw my hat into the political ring. I was elected and served my 4-year term, after which I ran again for the same council position as an incumbent and was reelected for a second term.

On July 10, 2020, I publicly made my intentions known by qualifying for reelection for City Council Place 4. The last eight years have been a real learning experience for me. I've learned that it takes time to make changes and to witness the outcome. I've learned there are guidelines as well as laws to follow; that you can't go in and start making all sorts of changes without following each and every step of the process.

I will not take credit for what we, as a council have done as a whole, but in the last four years we have acquired approximately \$14.4 million dollars in grant monies that, although is unseen, went into the infrastructure of the city such as the new sewer system. Many of the city streets were repaved. The Industrial Park was completed along with a new water tank that serves both the park and has eliminated the lack of water pressure for the people of the Spruce Pine area. We have one business, Montgomery Distributing, in the industrial park that has created 43 jobs and is still growing and making plans for a new addition. Our administration was instrumental in bringing Mar-Jac Poultry to Franklin County. A new feed mill was constructed. Also, a new hatchery was built in our Industrial Park to accompany the feed mill. The hatchery is currently undergoing an expansion in order to run at full capaci-

Due to the costs of reinstalling the swimming pool, a decision was made to go with the splash pad idea. This eliminated the problem and expense of becoming ADA compliant as the splash pad is accessible for those with dis-

abilities. After numerous years, we have finally completed a new concessions area along with storage areas and restroom facilities. Since the splash pad opened, we have had numerous residents rent it for birthday parties and other events. We started out charging \$1 for entry, over the years, it has increased to \$2 which offsets the cost of hiring an employee to oversee its operations. Chemicals and filters are a big expense as well as maintaining the system. When the swimming pool was in operation, an entrance fee was charged as well.

#### A deep dive: Examining the Golden Tigers history with 2020 non-region opponents

RUSSELLVILLE - In last week's issue of the *Franklin Free Press*, we took a quick look at the history between the Golden Tigers and their 2020 region opponents. We premised the observations last

week with the statement that head coach John Ritter was still searching for an opponent for week one after Deshler pushed their schedule back and cancelled their matchup with the Golden Tigers.

After about a week of searching, the Golden Tigers now have a new week one jamboree opponent in the Florence Falcons, scheduled for August 28th at home.

So now that we have more clarity as to who will be lining up opposite the Golden Tigers this season in their non-region games, we thought it would be a good idea to take another deep dive and examine Russellville's history with these opponents and recent results from the past few seasons for each respective team as well.

So without further ado, let's take a look...

Decatur - week 0/August 20th (Thursday)
Having last played the Red Raiders back in
2007 (which ended in an overtime 24-23 loss for
the Golden Tigers), Russellville has historically
done very well against Decatur.

Finishing at 2-8 last season, just ahead of a winless Columbia team, the Red Raiders averaged an offensive output of 21.7 points per game while allowing a staggering 32.7 points per game in 2019

# To the next level

PHIL CAMPBELL - When Ridge Raper takes the mound, the number one priority for the Phil Campbell senior is to do one thing: execute.

The ace of the Bobcats staff will look to continue to have that mindset as he will make the transition to the collegiate level once he closes the book on his high school career after the spring in 2021. Raper recently committed to play baseball at Wallace State Community College in Hanceville as a pitcher.

For the Phil Campbell stand out, Raper knew that Wallace State was the perfect place for him to continue honing his craft while competing against more advanced competition.

"It's a great program and they have some great coaches. They have a great history of moving guys onto the next level and even onto the majors," Raper said. "They definitely know what they're doing and I'm excited to be a part of the program."

Being able to sign on to play college ball has long been a dream of Raper's and he says that seeing his hard work culminate into this kind of opportunity has meant everything to him.

"This means the world to me. This is everything that I've worked for and it's everything that my dad and I have worked for as well. All the work and time that we have put in is finally paying off," Raper said.

The aforementioned mindset that Raper has every night that he's on the mound plays a pivotal role in his dominance. Raper says that having the right kind of mentality night in and night out has been key for his performances.

"I just try to go out there and have that bulldog type of mentality. You just got to go at guys with every single pitch and just try and get the next guy out," Raper said. "I try not to dwell on anything that happens before. Just look ahead and execute my pitches every single pitch."

With a 17-2 career record and a 1.74 ERA on the mound for the 2020 AHSAA all-state selectee, Raper will once again anchor the impressive rota-

tion for Phil Campbell head coach (and Ridge's father) Jonathan Raper.

After advancing to the 2A state semifinals where the Phil Campbell fell to the hands of Piedmont, Raper says the Bobcats have unfinished business to attend to in 2021.

"We've worked in this program every year to win a state championship. Of course we want to win the county and area championships every year too. But a state championship is the ultimate goal for us and we're committed to getting there this year," Raper said.

Of course Raper has had a unique high school career in the sense that his father Johnathan has been right alongside him as he has progressed on the field and Ridge says that had it not been for his father helping him along the way, the dream of pitching at the college level might not have come to fruition.

"My dad has meant the world to me. I honestly could not have asked for a better father or a better situation to be in. He's pushed me harder than anyone else has but he's also helped me more than anyone else has too," Raper said. "Not every

Allowing a total of 327 points last season was a team record for the Red Raiders.

The first meeting between Russellville and Decatur came nearly 100 years ago in 1926 which ended in a 14-0 victory for Russellville.

Russellville leads the all-time series between the Golden Tigers and Red Raiders at 6-4.

#### Florence - week 1/August 28th

After merging Bradshaw and Coffee High Schools in 2004 to form Florence High School, the series between Russellville and Florence has been very even-matched over the four meetings between the Falcons and the Golden Tigers.

The last meeting between Russellville and Florence (2011) ended in a loss for the Golden Tigers by a final of 18-35. However, the year before that the Golden Tigers were victorious against the Falcons by a final of 35-7.

Having made the playoffs every year since 2016, last season Florence was able to compile a 7-5 record while advancing to the second round of the 7A playoffs where they fell to the eventual state champions in Thompson High School.

Last year the Falcons averaged 26.8 points per game while allowing just 25.8 points per game.

The all-time series between Russellville and Florence stands tied at 2-2. Hartselle - week 6/September 25th

Going 4-7 and having a 2-3 record in a region loaded with talent at Muscle Shoals, Athens and Cullman is fairly impressive for a Hartselle squad with a new head coach in Bo Culver.

The Tigers would eventually fall to Fort Payne in the first round of the playoffs in 2019.

The offense averaged 27.5 points per game for the Tigers while they allowed a meager 20 points per game last season.

Out of all of the Golden Tigers opponents for 2020, Hartselle has the most history with Russellville in terms of football matchups.

As for the history between Russellville and Hartselle, the Tigers have had the upper hand in recent matchups with the Golden Tigers having won 6 out of the previous 7 games. However, in terms of the all-time series


