Home prices jump in June

Low inventory and record low interest rates spur demand

anta Clara County home prices jumped in June due to super-scarce inventory which drove bidding wars and fast sales while home sales decreased.

The median price in June for existing homes in Santa Clara County rose 2.4% to \$1.28 million, according to real estate data firm DQNews. The median sale price in the Bay Area rose 3.4% from last year to \$925,000.

Selma Hepp, deputy chief economist at Core-Logic, said millennials, typically first-time home-buyers in their early 30s, were the quickest to move back into the real estate market.

From mid-May, Hepp said, "the rebound was across the board." Record low interest rates also expanded buyers' budgets and enticed more people into the market. Interest rates dipped below 3% for a 30-year fixed home loan, according to Freddie Mac.

Sellers backed off from listing homes over health and safety See PRICES, page 2

Meena Kumar of Evergreen helps senior dogs find a forever home, just like she did

eena Kumar of Evergreen Valley was featured in a CNN feature story which was picked up by news outlets worldwide, including the Today Show.

The story describes how 14-year-old Kumar raised \$14,000 for senior dogs who have been left behind with the goal of helping them find a forever home like she did when she was adopted.

When Meena was nine months old, she was found abandoned in a basket on a college campus in Pune, India. After spending a year in an orphanage, she was adopted by a couple in Mumbai and brought to Evergreen Valley where she graduated from Silver Oak Elementary School and Chaboya Middle School.

In Mumbai, Meena would watch over a litter of puppies at her home. When she came to the Unit-

ed States, almost every weekend included a trip to the Humane Society or to Muttville Senior Dog Rescue.

Muttville is a cage-free dog res-

cue that gives senior dogs a "second chance at life," according to their website. The organization was founded by 2016 CNN Hero Sherri Franklin and rescues about

1,000 dogs per year and runs mostly with the help of volunteers.

East Side Union High School District superintendent Chris Funk to quit

ty and budget challenges, Chris Funk said this will be his last year as superintendent of East Side Union High School District.

"I can't lead in this environment anymore," Funk said. "I want to help us get through this pandemic and hopefully release some of the pressure allowing new thoughts for solving the deficit to come to fruition. That's the only reason

why I'm stepping down."

In an email sent to teachers, parents, students and staff Thursday, Funk said he will depart when the school year ends in June.

"Chris Funk will be greatly missed," said Councilmember Magdalena Carrasco, who previously served on the ESUHSD board of trustees. "His visionary leadership helped pass a technology bond years ago which now has put the district in a great position to expand Wi-Fi for thousands of families on the East Side of San Jose and allows our stu-

dents to complete their distance learning.

Funk raised the bar for our students and our community."

Referring to COVID-19 and distance learning, Funk said "we're just in uncharted territory" with this pandemic. In his nearly nine years serving as Superintendent and 30 years in education, Funk said "never have we faced the challenges that we are facing this school year."

Funk said his focus for the school year is helping the district See FUNK, page 2

navigate COVID-19 concerns safely while providing "the very best educational platform."

Although the district is planning a fourphase approach to returning to the classroom — all distance learning, in-person learning for the most vulnerable and specialty classes, a combination of distance and in-person learning and fully in-person instruction — Funk said phase four may not occur until a vaccine is widely accessible.

Regarding racial equality, Funk recognized the "systemic oppression baked into the public-school system" and the need for social equity. He said the educational system has become one of privilege rather than a right, especially for low-income students of color. "Every student should receive a

world-class education regardless of economic, gender or cultural background," he said.

"We are at an inflection point in our nation's history where the time to tear down the walls of oppression in our public school system is now," Funk said, "...we will continue to knock down the wall of oppression brick by brick." Funk applauded Gov. Gavin Newsom's directive to include ethnic studies as a graduation requirement, adding any policy or practice that contributes to inequalities of ethnic groups leads to systemic racism.

"When you look at our black and brown kids suspended at a higher rate than other groups, when you see there's a disproportionality of kids of color in special ed, or graduating," he said, "that is systemic racism in the public school system."

Funk said economic uncertainty has hurt the stability of the school district, eroding the trust needed to create more equitable communities in East Side. Fiscal insecurity like potential layoffs, reductions in salary and health benefits for district employees also pose a distraction from creating change, he said.

"The fiscal issue needs to get resolved in order to fully concentrate on the systemic racial issues," he said. "I hope this announcement provides the opportunity for all stakeholders to come together to solve the fiscal constraints."

Funk said the lack of agreement between unions and the school district has resulted in not only a structural deficit but ongoing issues with social equity, and led to his resignation.

"The bargaining units refuse to come to the table and use me as their excuse," he said. "It's been two, three years of battling this. It's the elephant in the room regarding battling social injustice issues. Since we're stuck around that deficit, by me removing myself, that excuse is now removed. I'm hoping that might help bring the unions to the table to solve this."

Funk said he sees budget cuts as the only other solution, which would gut district safety nets.

He said he is proud of passing an equity policy during his first year and increasing performance measures. He said that under his leadership, district drop-out and suspension rates decreased while graduation rates increased. Students meeting college entrance requirements are the highest they've ever been, he said.

Creating an Eastside Alliance with seven feeder districts brought focus, partnership and collaboration, especially around math development, he said. He said he also is proud of helping create the Spartan East Side Promise, a collaboration between the district and San Jose State University, which offers guaranteed admission to qualified students.

Funk said he is excited about closing the digital divide on the East Side through a partnership with the city to expand WIFI to underserved schools, including Overfelt and James Lick high schools.

"I'm proud we have an ongoing revenue stream to support our teachers in imbedding technology in their curriculum," he said. "Our kids should not have to go to McDonald's or Starbucks to access Wi-Fi. That's an infrastructure that is more of a civil right and cities should be offering."


As Funk is seven years away from retirement, he said he announced his departure now to give him time to find the right fit with another district and the board ample time to find a new superintendent.

concerns, agents said. Pandemic restrictions limiting home tours also chilled transactions during a typically busy late spring and early summer buying season.

Sales of existing homes in the Bay Area dropped nearly 8% from the previous year, but existing home sales only fell 2.1% in Santa Clara County.

Meena began pet sitting in her own home for her neighbors and school friends with the goal of supporting Muttville. "You are never too young to start a business," says Meena.

Board moves toward recognizing 'Juneteenth' as a countywide holiday

he Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors moved forward on Tuesday, August 11, to declaring Juneteenth as a Countywide holiday starting next year, joining just a handful of counties across the country to recognize this day.

Supervisor Dave Cortese's proposal was approved unanimously by the Board to commemorate the ending of slavery in the United States 30 months and 19 days after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation on January 1.1863.

It wasn't until June 19, 1865, that Union soldiers led by Major General Gordon Granger landed at Galveston, Texas, with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free.

The vote followed dozens of speakers who asked the Board to approve the proposal and recognize the legacy of injustice against people of color. Supervisors also received many letters and other voices of support from the community

"Designating Juneteenth as a County holiday will be one of the ways to further correct the inequities of the past and our move toward ending systemic racism," Cortese said. "It is significant that this day be added to the County's holiday observances that include honoring Cesar Chavez, Dr. Martin Luther King, among others."

As each car pulls up the information asked for is the person's name, date of birth, address and how many people live in the occupancy. Once this information is given, upon next food pick up one only has to state their name and it is checked on a list for fast processing of deliv-

ering food to car.

On some days of the month the food distributed changes so sometimes chicken and eggs and milk will also be given out with a box of produce from a local farmer and a box of prepackaged goods with packaged meat.

During this COVID-19 pandemic national disaster, if you know anyone in need please let them know of this valuable service which takes place two times a month at Evergreen Community Center.

Eating fresh fruit and vegetables helps to improve one's well-being in fighting off any kind of health challenges. By their actions, Second Harvest and the many support companies that participate in ramping up help during this national emergency let all know that people are cared for and loved.

Garage excavation could prove disruptive to Evergreen locals

Dear Editor,

We are strongly urging neighbors to join the community meeting on Wednesday August 19th @ 6:00pm concerning the temple development at 2740 Ruby Avenue. This will be an online Zoom meeting (https://sanjoseca.zoom.us/j/97342330810) hosted by the city planning department. The meeting details are available at https://

bit.ly/3kyLc9W.

The new development application asks for rezoning from R-1-5 single-family residential to the PQP public/quasi-public zoning district at the intersection of Ruby/Norwood, and includes an acre of underground parking for 90+ vehicles. Among other changes, PQP zoning also increases the building height allowance from 35ft to 65ft and reduces setbacks significantly.

The city should not set the disruptive precedent of allowing large underground parking garages in Evergreen and other suburban residential neighborhoods. The excavation and subsequent construction will be intense and disruptful for years for the surrounding com-

munity. It also allows substantially larger above-ground development that would be grossly incompatible and out-of-scale in this quiet, peaceful, and mature neighborhood, and opens the door for similar future developments in other areas of San Jose. We would welcome an open focus-group dialog with the city and developers about a modest-sized temple and a fully above-ground development.

Since this meeting will be held virtually, the general public beyond Evergreen can also weigh in on the proposal. We need those Evergreen neighbors from the surrounding community who are concerned or will be directly impacted to speak up at this August 19th community

meeting. Our safety and quality of life as we know it today are at stake.

For those who cannot attend, we encourage them to submit comments by email to the city planning staff and the developer. For more information about submitting written comments, our EV-Ruby Temple core neighborhood group concerns, our engagements with the developer and the city, including Councilmember Arenas' office, please reach out to us at 2740Ruby-Concerns@gmail.com. Starting off the year in Distance Learning will be different for staff and families, and the district is dedicated and committed to providing students the best education possible. The following are some important updates as the district heads into beginning school on Au-

Distance Learning Updates

In the coming days, Evergreen families will receive communication from their schools regarding teacher assignments, school schedules, technology device needs, iPad/Chromebook and school materials distribution dates, Grab and Go meals, and other back to school activities. Families that need to complete the free and reduced lunch program application can do so online at: http://evergreen.schoollunchapp.com.

The schools' websites now have a Distance Learning tab that will have more information about Distance Learning and specific information from each school. Schools will stay in contact with families this school year through frequent and consistent communication via email, social media, phone calls and texts. More information about Distance Learning can be found on the district's Safe Together website at eesd.org/safetogether, including Frequently Asked Ouestions.

New Virtual Pathways, Pods4Learning **Homeschool Programs**

The Evergreen School District believes in offering choices to the parents. This coming year, the district is proud to offer a brand-new program for TK-8th grade families. Virtual Pathways, Evergreen School District's homeschool program, is intended for families who are interested in the homeschooling concept, where the parents are involved in most aspects of the student's learning and schooling process, and who also want the support of a credentialed teacher for goal-setting, one on one meeting and guidance.

As part of Virtual Pathways, the district is offering Pods4Learning, a new parent-led and district-supported homeschooling experience for TK and kindergarten students. Students learn standards-based curriculum with a group of up to five students in a virtual environment- ensuring social and emotional engagement with their peers. Two hours each week, parents and students receive personalized coaching from a credentialed teacher. Weekly learning success packets, supporting materials, along with an iPad, are also included in this program. More information will be posted on the district's website in the coming

This program is limited to 25 TK students and 25 Kindergarten students. The district is currently taking an interest list for this program, and those interested in registering a TK or

kindergartener in Pods4Learning are advised to send an email to pods4learning@eesd.org.

The Evergreen School District is also continuing to promote the district's traditional TK and kindergarten programs. Through the traditional TK and kindergarten experiences, students will grow as learners and classmates. Each day, teachers will use online and individual learning approaches to help students gain reading, math, social and life skills, so they are prepared for the next grade level. Students enrolled in these programs will start the school year in distance learning, and will be provided a personalized device, if needed. Combination Classes

In planning for distance learning, input and feedback from parents and teachers shows increasing concerns about combination classes, due to the dual curriculum that needs to be taught by the teacher. In the best interest of students, during distance learning, Evergreen is eliminating combo classes, and will be filling the need for the additional required teachers with additional teachers, including Evergreen's own art teachers, who are fully credentialed, experienced, and qualified teachers, and who are already familiar with Evergreen schools and students. This is a temporary solution as the district addresses the distinct needs that students and teachers have in distance learning. The district's traditional art program will resume once all students return to in-school learning. The district recognizes the value of arts education for students, and plans on offering a multitude of art classes during after school enrichment

Student Wellness

The social, mental and emotional health of Evergreen students is important to the district, and in addition to daily wellness checkins with students during distance learning, the district is also providing the district's social emotional learning curriculum, First Step, in addition to many social emotional resources provided by the district's mental health team of social workers and counselors throughout the school year. The district will soon be launching a Wellness website, which will provide social, mental and emotional wellness resources for district students, staff and families.

Equity and Justice

At the June 13th board meeting, the Evergreen School District Board of Trustees began the first step in taking an official position on the importance of equity and justice through the first reading of its Black Lives Matter resolution, which formally declares the district's commitments to join the movement to fight for freedom, liberation, and justice; creating an Equity Policy that will include restorative justice practices, implicit bias training, counseling, and other resources that foster dialogue and action that promotes racial and social justice for all; and to work tirelessly and collaboratively with staff, students, and families to dismantle institutionalized societal

Evergreen would like to thank the parents, staff and community members who have taken the time to email, call, attend Community Information Meetings, Board meetings, and Community Input Sessions over the past three months. This input is valuable to the district, and has shaped the district's plans during this dynamic time.

hen Sundar Vanchinathan started his online career development startup, Geek Girl Careers, in 2016, he had, among a ton of research and industry insight, one quote driving him forward: "Everyone is born to do something great. The only question is, what is it?" At the time, his daughter — me, the author — was about to start college, slowly figuring out what kind of career path she wanted to carve out for herself.

But how does any young person figure out what they're meant to do or what kind of career they want to build? It's daunting, and nearly impossible without the help of mentors and experience. If students are at a lack for these, they often box themselves into pursuits that society or their parents consider conventionally successful.

Geek Girl Careers is a one-of-a-kind platform that uses a personality assessment developed by psychologists at Columbia University — network of professional experts, opportunity listings and skill development tools to help young women who are in high school and college discover their ideal career in tech and break down the industry's gender gap.

The personality assessment takes just two minutes to complete

The personality assessment is deceivingly simple, as it only takes two minutes to complete, but is extremely accurate. When I took the assessment as an incoming freshman at Syracuse University, the top two careers the system suggested were public relations and marketing — and that's the degree I ended up graduating with four years later.

I'd always been passionate about writing and meeting new people, but before exploring Geek Girl Careers and talking to mentors in the field, I didn't realize I could translate those passions to a career beyond journalism. With a degree in PR and marketing, I can work in nearly any industry, even tech — something that's often overlooked by or not made clear to those students who are in high school or starting college.

Since graduating in May, I've taken over Geek Girl Careers as CEO, working to build partnerships and recruit new users and experts to the platform. Our mission — helping young women discover their dream careers in tech — is always relevant, but the platform is especially valuable in the cur-

rent state of things, when job opportunities are scarcer and it's difficult to meet new people and build personal mentoring relationships.




"History will remember Chief Eddie Garcia in the same way I've seen him embraced at countless community meetings: as a dynamic, exuberant leader who gave



Liccardo said the city will conduct a nationwide search for a new police chief.





New provisions expand opportunity for claiming California unemployment benefits

Pandemic Unemployment Assistance expanded in March but many may not have applied nor understand they qualify

You may currently be qualified to receive back monies for unemployment.

Take heed and tell others.

If you are out of work or your hours have been cut back, go to edd.ca.gov.

The pandemic has opened up new additional opportunities for Californians to apply and receive unemployment benefits and extra PANEDEMIC MONIES are now included in addition to whatever unemployment benefits one may be getting.

Even if you have not worked for a long time you might find you can now qualify to receive unemployment.

Key oversight people express it is best not to assume and instead apply for unemployment the worst that can happen is you might be denied but also you might be approved.

You might be surprised to find out that after taking a short amount of time in applying on line, you qualify! Don't assume you do not qualify.

Often people are hesitant to apply but new laws due to the Covid-19 virus have created more opportunity to help those in need. You may be entitled to back benefits

California's Employment Development

Department states: The sudden and immense impact of the COVID-19 pandemic is unprecedented. EDD program benefits are available to workers and employers whose earnings are impacted.

The federal CARES Act has added these provisions to expand unemployment benefits so we can help more Californians impacted by COVID-19:

- Pandemic Unemployment Assistance -New program to provide unemployment benefits for people who don't usually qualify for regular Unemployment Insurance.
- Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation - A 13-week benefit extension for people who have used all benefits available in their regular Unemployment Insurance claim.
- Pandemic Additional Compensation-An additional \$600 federal stimulus payment automatically added to each week of benefits received between March 29 and July 25, 2020. Any unemployment benefits through July 25 will still be eligible for the extra \$600, even if you are paid later.

If you use all your Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation benefits, you may qualify for a FED-ED extension

Remember, if you are out of work for any reason and if you do gigs or are also selfemployed, you might consider web searching California Unemployment Benefits or go to: edd.ca.gov

Reaching out to vulnerable populations hard hit by Coronavirus

uccessfully fighting COVID-19 relies on strong communication with residents

about the disease and how to avoid becoming infected or infecting others.

In Santa Clara County, strong communication heavily relies on the Internet connecting to our devices so that we receive emails, texts and links to websites that provide information and even allow us to raise our voices at government meetings.

That powerful connection is missing in some areas of our County, where residents not only face a digital divide but also are most likely to become infected with COVID-19.

On July 21, the Board of Supervisors approved my call for fixing this disparity with a new COVID-19 Outreach and Education Initiative, which employs community-based organizations that are already trusted messengers in these areas.

According to the County Public Health Department data, Latinos make up 25.8% of the County population and nearly half, 48.1%, of the COVID-19 cases. Zip codes with the highest rate of cases per 100,000 residents are in East San Jose: 95116 and 95127, and Evergreen: 85122 and 95148.

While we work to bridge the digital divide, the County will invest \$500,000 to contract with 25 to 30 organizations that will be able to use their networks in hard-to-reach communities. The contracts will be from three to six months, and will range from \$5,000 to \$10,000 each.

The Emergency Operations Center Public Information Officer will provide the organizations with weekly communications toolkits containing infographics, digital designs, newsletter templates and talking points.

It just makes sense to take advantage of

networks that are already working among the County's diverse populations.

The County is also developing three other outreach components:

· Community Health and Business Engagement Team: 67 trained community health workers will be deployed to neighborhoods to engage with residents and businesses to provide information about face coverings and hygiene, testing site locations and other tools to stop the spread of COVID-19. They will also use phone calls, text messages and so-

cial media to engage with community members.

· A Unified County COVID-19 Branding Campaign: The County will select a vendor to provide consultation and design services about a new branding campaign that will be developed with community input.

· Multicultural Arts Campaign: Multicultural and multimedia artists will be hired to develop, market, communicate and disseminate culturally relevant messaging about COVID-19, including documentaries and digital art to communicate the impact COVID-19 has had on their families and community. The campaign will also document residents' experiences to from prevention through recovery.



Tech Jargon of the Week Internet of Things (IoT)

ave you ever stumbled into a conversation where everyone is speaking around this "techie" word – and even after you've broken in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let us teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words:

Internet of Things (IoT)

The Internet today is evolving at a fast pace. With the broadband internet becoming widely available, more devices are being created with Wi-Fi capabilities and sensors built into them. Technology costs are coming down and smartphone apps penetration is increasing, all creating the perfect scenario for the Internet of Things or simply, "IoT".

The concept behind IoT is to basically connect any device which performs a function, to the Internet. The device can be any of the household appliances like the coffee maker, fridge, microwave, lamps, or wearable devices, or can even be machines at a factory. IoT build a giant network of these connected devices and forms a relationship using the data that is generated from these devices. Then it uses this relationship to make important decisions or provide recommendations.

So how do you use IoT in your every-day life?

Say, you kept an alarm for 6 AM in the morning. A voice controlled speaker like Amazon Echo wakes you up and tells you the temperature of the day, so you can dress for the office accordingly. Your coffee maker gets the notification that you are getting ready and starts brewing coffee for you. The lamps in your kitchen automatically switch on after sensing your presence. The fridge sensor detects that there is less milk at home, so Amazon Echo automatically orders milk for you and notifies this action to you. While you are leaving for the office, your mobile assistant detects the traffic in the vicinity and tells you the shortest way to reach the office. Wearable devices like Fitbit accumulate your data and tell you how active you have been and how fit you are keeping yourself. It can share this weekly report with you and/or your doctor as you

As we speak, there are thousands of people helping build the world of IoT, as more and more devices are joining the environment. Of all the technology trends in the market, IoT is the one that's going to give us the most disruption as well as the most opportunity to grow over the next five years.

The project proposes rezoning (File No. C20-012) the property from the R-1-5 Single-Family Residence zoning district to the PQP Public/Quasi-Public zoning district. It also requests a Special Use Permit (File No. SP20-024) to allow an approximately 17,749-square foot private gathering facility on the approximately 1.86-gross acre site.

This project has been designated as a project of

high interest by the city, and the developer application is available for public review on the city planning website. It shows a 42,410-square foot underground parking garage, classroom, & administrative and maintenance facilities. At grade, the buildings in the application include a 4,258-square foot temple, a 5,035-square foot community room, a 2,765-square foot monks' residence, a 910-square foot kitchen, a 710-square foot library, and over 3,000 square feet of additional facilities.

According to the city planning department, the purpose of the August 19th community meeting is to describe the applicant's proposed project, the city's review process, and to obtain community input on the project. The city states that comments, concerns, and questions raised at this meeting will become part of the public record and will help inform the project's design as it moves forward in

the review process. Additionally, there are continued opportunities throughout the permit process to publicly comment on the project.

Santa Clara County COVID-19 tax plan fails

anta Clara County's effort to tax residents to pay for COVID-19 relief measures failed after a short debate Tuesday, August 4.

County leaders proposed two options for asking voters in November to approve a 5/8-cent sales tax to help close the county's estimated \$300 to \$600 million budget deficit. The county has spent \$165.4 million so far on its COVID-19 response, officials said.

The first option — which required a "yes" vote from four of the five Board of Supervisors — was a general sales tax for five years. The second option, which would also tax residents for five years, was a special tax allocated for specific purposes. A special tax is harder to pass at the ballot box because it requires a two-thirds vote from the public.

But on Tuesday, supervisors failed to garner enough support for the general tax. Board President Cindy Chavez and Supervisors Susan Ellenberg and Dave Cortese voted in favor, while Supervisors Joe Simitian and Mike Wasserman opposed.

Ellenberg initially had expressed concern with the tax measure last month, but shifted her stance Tuesday.

Simitian said a general sales tax hike is regressive and it's uncertain how the money will be spent. He said the county's budget has ballooned 84% in the past seven years, indicating out-of-control spending as it continues to ask residents to pay more.

"It's important that folks understand that there is no guarantee that any of those funds in a general tax would ever be used to benefit the purposes that people spoke to," Simitian said. "That's the nature of a general tax, for better or for worse."

Wasserman said the tax would further burden struggling residents, adding it would make Santa Clara County the highest-taxed county in the state. "The idea of adding more to the cost-of-living in Santa Clara County is not something I want to support," he said.

After the failure of general sales tax, Chavez killed the vote on the special tax citing concerns about garnering two-thirds support from voters.

Chavez criticized the board for supporting a tax to keep Caltrain alive — which has a majority of riders who earn more than \$100,000 a year, she said — while failing to help poor people and people of color struggling amid the pandemic.

"The people who rebound the least are the communities who need us the most," Chavez said. "... I'd like to head off as much of the suffering as we possibly can... I don't think the cavalry is coming. I think we are the cavalry."

Many spoke in favor of letting voters decide if they should tax themselves to help patch up the deficit.

"I don't really like sales taxes, but we don't have a lot of choices," said Steve Eckert, CEO of the Alum Rock Counseling Center. "These extraordinary times cause us to consider every measure possible... right now, we can't afford to take any revenue options off the table."

County Executive Jeff Smith warned supervisors that layoffs are on the horizon without an additional revenue stream.

"We're fronting a lot of these (COVID-19) costs with general fund revenue," Smith said.


Despite the failed general tax measure, Cortese made a last-minute effort to revive talks for the special tax to no avail.

"I feel like we need to do something because we know what's coming," Cortese said. "What's being put out there in terms of the time limitation is very reasonable. I think the public would want the opportunity to do something about (the recession) themselves."

SJ Mayor Sam Liccardo sues to count undocumented immigrants in census

In an unusual move, San Jose Mayor Liccardo is a named plaintiff in a lawsuit against President Trump.

Liccardo said he has personally joined the City of San José and other concerned jurisdictions and individuals to stop President Donald Trump from excluding undocumented residents from being counted in the 2020 census — a violation of the Constitution.

"In San José, and under the U.S. Constitution, everyone counts," Mayor Liccardo said. "The explicit promise of the 14th Amendment that apportionment rely upon the 'counting of the whole number of persons in each State' does not countenance or allow the disregard of any one 'person,' as the White House seeks. It is astounding that 132 years after we wiped the abhorrent "three-fifths" clause from Article I of our U.S. Constitution, and as our nation yearns for racial equity, we have a Presidential Administration seeking to return to the days prior to the passage of the 14th Amendment."

On July 21, 2020 President Trump directed the secretary of commerce to statistically manipulate the completed 2020 census count to exclude undocumented immigrants living in the country from being considered for purposes of calculating the number of representatives to Congress from the various states.

The lawsuit was filed Wednesday, July 29, 2020 in San José by the City of San José, the Black Alliance for Just Immigration (BAJI), King County (Washington), Arlington County (Virginia), and individual plaintiffs Sam Liccardo, Zerihoun Yilma, and Lovette Kargbo-Thompson—alleges that the president's memorandum violates the Census Act, the Enumeration Clause of Article 1 of the U.S. Constitution, and the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution

County Supervisors approve placing Caltrain sales tax on November ballot

The Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors on Tuesday, August 4 unanimously voted to approve putting an eighth-cent sales tax on the November 3 ballot to fund Caltrain

Supporters believe the tax is crucial for the rail agency to survive its current financial downfall due to the Covid pandemic. Caltrain normally receives 70 percent of its operating funds from passenger fares.

The tax measure must win two-thirds approval at the ballot box. The proposed sales tax ballot measure is estimated to yield more than \$100 million a year for Caltrain.

Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors president Cindy Chavez said it is essential to fund Caltrain for climate protection and traffic mitigation.



The Y in partnership with the San Jose Public Library and the Santa Clara County Library District operated summer meal sites at at a total of 9 libraries, where whole families received free and nutritious meals all summer long.

Revolution Foods, known for fresh, healthy meals and kid-friendly dishes prepared the food served at all of our meal program sites.

Serving meals at local libraries, as well as at YMCAs and schools, means that we can bring free, healthy food to a variety of places most easily accessible to the community.

A parent participant from San Jose shared, "The YMCA meal program has helped our family make ends meet. Without this program I am not sure where we would be. The program gives me hope and the help I need to have a better life for my family. I know we can spend the afternoons at the library and my children can learn and nourish their minds and bodies."

Santa Clara County foster youth begin receiving universal basic income at \$1,000 monthly

aid rent, a full stomach and freedom to
pursue her dreams: that's what Santa
Clara County's new Basic Income Program means for Nayeli Grano, one of the 72
foster youth who have already started receiving funds.

As a 23-year-old sociology student transitioning out of the foster care system, Granco said she can now breathe easier knowing the money will not only help her survive and stay off the streets – especially in the increasingly expensive Bay Area – but also enjoy life.

"UBI (Universal Basic Income) is the least that we can do for our community to survive," Grano said Monday. "UBI represents the happiness and stress-free mindset that people can have, because after paying for their basic needs, they finally have some cents left over to go out and have fun – you know, live a little."

Santa Clara County's program is the first in the nation to provide unconditional \$1,000 monthly payments to foster youth between 21 to 24 years old who are struggling to find housing and jobs. The program runs from June 2020 to May 2021.

The payments were unanimously approved in May, after being fast-tracked from a committee in December. Supervisor Dave Cortese, who first introduced the proposal, said the timing couldn't be better with the ongoing pandemic, which has exacerbated issues of homelessness, immigration and child welfare.

But the veteran lawmaker and state Senate candidate said the program isn't a handout, especially as these "children of the

county" will maintain the autonomy on how to spend the money.

"They're not a charity case. It's our obligation to (help)," Cortese said. "That is the beauty of the UBI program: we are saying be empowered, make your decisions, invest in your life."

Dr. Sandhya Hermon, a deputy director in the county's Social Services Agency, said this population often has limited access to support systems, which can lead to lower educational achievements and unstable finances in the future.

According to Talk Poverty, 150 young people age out of the foster care system in Santa Clara County annually and 90% of foster youth across California don't have any source of income when they transition out. San Jose nonprofit Razing the Bar, which provides mentorship and housing support services to foster youth, said 45% of the homeless population under the age of 25 spent time in the foster system.

Cortese said the year-long program is a much-needed investment into the local community. He said the UBI program's funds will most likely go directly into schools and cash registers across the county — helping others prosper, too.

"Most of the time if you want to do fundamental change, you are challenged by the fact that the status quo is almost unmovable, but when it fails so drastically as it's failing before our eyes, you're way ahead of the game," stated Gisèle Huff, president of The Gerald Huff Fund for Humanity. "Every single instance of (universal basic income) is just another tile, and it's worth investing in or participating in, because it's part of the bigger picture."
