

How do you play during a pandemic?

The season begins Thursday with uncertainty if there will be a finish

Football coaches don't like surprises.

They spend hours of preparation to take the unexpected out of the game.

Whether it is notes written on pages in a playbook, filed in a computer or just memories stuffed inside a noggin, football coaches want to be ready for every possibility.

Before this summer, it's doubtful that any coaches had a plan on how to play football during a pandemic. If there's ever been a season to prepare for the unexpected, this is it.

It was in March when the COVID-19 pandemic hit and all high school spring sports in Alabama shut down. That also raised concerns about football this fall. Even though the numbers for those suffering with COVID-19 continue to rise, it's full speed ahead for football season, which begins Thursday.

"I really don't know how all this is going to work," said R.A. Hubbard head coach Mac Hampton. "Are we going to go through all this work to get prepared to play only to have the plug pulled after something like two games? I hope not."

Steve Savarese, executive director of the Alabama High School Athletic Association, sees getting started as a good first step, but it doesn't mean there will be a complete season.

"We felt like let's get as many games in as we can," Savarese said. "If we can get them all in, that will be great. If not, if the health situation deteriorates, then we will stop at that time under a health order.

"Right now we wanted to get started,

get our folks out there, let our children return to their childhood, let our kids have a senior year."

High school organizations across the country have grappled with how to play football during a pandemic. At last check, 37 states are playing this fall. Utah started first on Aug. 13. Some states are delaying starts. Twelve states and the District of Columbia have pushed their seasons to after the first of 2021.

"It's scary to me because I want to play football my senior season," Austin's Tre Shackelford said. "I had friends who lost their senior seasons last spring, and I know how bad they were hurt.

"I wear a mask out in public for my safety and for the safety of others. I wear it because I want to play football."

The camaraderie of a football team can help teammates deal with the uncertainty.

"The best thing to do is enjoy every minute with your teammates," Decatur's Grayson Vermeire said. "I'm fearful about what could happen to our season. I just try to be positive all the time."

Masks and social distancing of at least 6 feet will be part of the playbook for this football season. The sidelines will look different for social distancing, with the team box for players, which was from the 25-yard line to the other 25, being expanded from 10 to 10. Coaches are still limited from the 25 to the other 25.

Only one captain will represent each team for the coin toss. Protective shields on helmets may be the norm rather than an exception. The footballs used in the game will be constantly wiped down.

How will the experience of Friday Night Lights be during the pandemic?

"I feel like most high school football fans have been cooped up for so long that they are itching to get out and watch some good football," Brewer head coach Geoff Walters said. "I just hope everyone wears a mask and follows the guidelines and we can all be safe."

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AUSTIN BLACK BEARS

Lay of the land

There was some talk before last fall's reclassification that Austin might slide back to Class 6A. When the numbers came out from the Alabama High School Athletic Association, the average enrollment for Austin was 1,139.45. That's seven from the bottom among the 32 schools in 7A.

The Class 7A, Region 4 rivals are James Clemens, Florence, Sparkman, Bob Jones, Grissom, Huntsville and Albertville. James Clemens and Florence were first and second in the region last year. Sparkman and Austin were third and fourth. James Clemens and Florence won first-round playoff games before falling in the quarterfinals.

Austin's out-of-region foes are the season opener at Hartselle on Friday, vs. Decatur on Friday and the last game of the season Oct. 29 vs. Mountain Brook, which is now the largest school in Class 6A.

Head coach

Jeremy Perkins is beginning his 11th season at Austin. The former Thompson and Hoover assistant coach is Austin's winningest football coach with a 71-44 record. Over the last five years, Austin has gone 46-17 with two region championships and five trips to the playoffs.

Last season

After winning their first five games, the Black Bears lost three of their next five. The three losses were close region games: 24-21 at Sparkman, 36-28 vs. Bob Jones and 27-24 at James Clemens.

Austin finished fourth in Region 4 and lost in the first round of the playoffs at Thompson, 54-20.

Last three seasons


After going 12-1 in the last season in Class 6A in 2017, the Black Bears have gone 7-4 and 7-4 in their first two years in Class 7A.

Words to grow on

"I'm excited about this season," Perkins said. "This team has a world of potential. For everybody's sake I hope we get to play it out and see how far we can go."

Quarterback

Senior Quincy Crittendon is back

for a second season as the starter. The Class 7A All-State honorable mention selection threw for 2,217 yards and 21 touchdowns last season while completing 114 of 198 passes with just four

interceptions.

Offense

The Black Bears have the potential to be explosive on this side of the ball. Along

with Crittendon returning, Austin also has back All-State receiver Tre Shackelford and running back Jevon Jackson. Both

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DECATUR RED RAIDERS

Lay of the land

Class 6A, Region 8 is the new home for the Red Raiders. It looks a lot like Class 6A, Region 7 did the last two years with Hartselle, Athens, Cullman, Muscle Shoals and Columbia. Madison County schools Hazel Green and Buckhorn round out to make it an eight-team region.

Decatur's out-of-region games are vs. Russellville in Thursday's season opener, at Austin on Aug. 28 and at Huntsville in the season finale. Huntsville is Decatur's longest-running rivalry with 90 meetings. Decatur leads the series 52-32-6.

Head coach

This is season No. 25 as the Decatur head coach for Jere Adcock. His record is 172-102. The 64-year-old is just the fifth head coach at Decatur since 1933, when H.L. "Shorty" Ogle came to the River City.

Last season

The 2019 season was not a good one for the Red Raiders (2-8). The defense

matched a school record by giving up 327 points. The 1966 team went 0-10 while giving up the same number of points. The last time Decatur won as few as two games was in 1994 (2-8). That was two years before Adcock became head coach.

Last three seasons

The Red Raiders are 13-19 over the last three seasons. It's been a decade of winning records in the even years and losing records in the odd years.


Words to grow on

"I did a poor job last year getting our team to where we needed to be so we could be as competitive as possible," Adcock said. "It was like we were searching for answers all season and could never find them."



pounds) will be directing the offense. The senior saw quite a bit of duty last season after starter Turner Stepp was lost for the season with a shoulder injury. According to Adcock, Vermeire ended the season with a solid performance in a 21-14 loss at Sparkman.

"Grayson has worked hard to improve at quarterback, and he's really taken on the role of leader of this team," Adcock said.

Offense

The Red Raiders return seven starters with Vermeire, running back Keandre Williams (5-9, 150, Jr.), receiver Charlie Taylor (6-1, 145, Sr.), H-back

Ethan Bates (6-1, 160, Sr.) and linemen Banks Murphree (6-3, 240, Sr.), Carter McCollum (5-10, 205, Sr.) and Hunter Claborn (6-3, 265, Jr.).

The hope is that experience from 2019 can lead to improvement in 2020. Last season, the Red Raiders scored more than 17 points in just three games.

Defense

Adcock said improving the defense depends on how well the Red Raiders can stop the run.

"Even though most teams line up in the spread, the game has evolved more into a physical game (when) running the football," Adcock said. "If you can't stop the run, you can't win."

The coach hopes a couple of position changes make a big difference. Kamerin Sandlin (5-8, 225, Sr.) moves from linebacker to nose tackle. Paxtin Dupper (5-9, 165, Soph.) moves from linebacker to safety.

"Kamerin is the strongest player on the team," Adcock said. "His low center of gravity makes him perfect for the position.

"Paxtin will be like our quarterback on defense. He's got a lot of football smarts. His job is to get everybody in the right position to make plays, and we have confidence in him."

The linebackers will be Chase Jones (5-11, 165, Sr.) and Banks Dement (6-1, 205, Jr.). Jacob McRae (6-1, 235, Jr.) is a returning starter at defensive end. He's started since he was a freshman.

The defensive backfield will be young with a chance that the four starters could all be sophomores.

Must-see games

The River City Rivalry with Austin is always the big game. It's the second game of the season, Aug. 28 at Austin. The Black Bears will be going for a sixth straight win in the series.

In reality the biggest game of the season could be the season opener at home Thursday with Russellville. If the Red Raiders are going to bounce back from a bad season, a win in the first game would be huge.

Final word

"We are going to be a sophomore heavy football team this season," Adcock said. "I like the work ethic and I see a lot of good chemistry in the field house and on the field. I really enjoy watching this team grow."

Lay of the land

Decatur Heritage makes the move to Class 1A, Region 8. R.A. Hubbard continues to be perhaps the biggest region rival. Other region opponents this season are Cherokee, Hackleburg, Phillips, Shoals Christian, Vina and Waterloo.

Decatur Heritage is familiar with most of the new region opponents. The Eagles played Phillips and Shoals Christian as non-region opponents last season. This year's non-region opponents are Falkville, Colbert Heights and Woodville.

Head coach

Steve Meek is beginning his 10th season leading the Eagles. His record at Decatur

Heritage is 67-36 with two region championships and six consecutive playoff appearances.

Last season

The Eagles (12-1) matched a school record with 12 wins last season before falling to Mars Hill Bible in the third round of the 1A state playoffs, 42-21. Mars Hill Bible advanced to the state championship game before losing to Lanett, 41-30.

Decatur Heritage lost 14 seniors from last year's team. That includes four All-State players in offensive lineman Carter Sample, linebacker Hank Davis, running back Colton Keith and defensive back Jackson Kyle.

Last three seasons

It's been three years of success with a 27-8 record and three playoff appearances.

Words to grow on

"We lost a lot from last year, but I'm excited about what we have coming back," Meek said. "It's an opportunity for a lot of young guys to step up. It's always exciting to see how young players accept a new challenge."

Ouarterback

After two years in a three-player rotation, junior Brayden Kyle (6-foot-2, 215 pounds) is ready to be the man leading

the offense. Kyle has experience after playing many meaningful minutes at the position over the last two seasons.

Sophomore Bo Solley will be backing up Kyle.

Offense

For the previous five seasons, the Decatur Heritage offensive scheme has been to pound the defense with one of the Keith brothers at running back.

You can't argue with the success. Older brother Jackson in 2015 and 2016 and younger brother Colton for the last three years combined for 5,851 yards and

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WEST MORGAN REBELS

Lay of the land

West Morgan joins Priceville in moving west to compete with Shoalsarea teams in Class 4A. The Rebels will be in Region 8 with Brooks, Central-Florence, Deshler, Priceville, Rogers, West Limestone and Wilson. West Morgan fell to Priceville, 24-22, last season but did not face any of its new region opponents in 2019.

It plays at home against Good Hope (Thursday), on the road vs. East Lawrence (Aug. 28) and on the road against Leeds (Sept. 25) for its non-region games. Its region schedule opens with Priceville on Sept. 4 at home.

"Historically speaking, it does hurt not having all of those Morgan County games we had the first two years," West Morgan coach Mikel Riggs said. "We're gonna miss those, but it will be neat to go play some people who we haven't played in a long time."

Head coach

The Rebels made minor improvements in their second year under Riggs. After going 1-9 two seasons ago, his team went 3-7 last year. Three of West Morgan's four wins under Riggs have come in region play.

Last season


The Rebels rallied in the back half of the season after losing the first four games, including region losses to Randolph, 32-25, and Danville, 35-8. They then strung together two wins in a row and went 3-3 in their final six games to earn a 3-7 record overall and a 2-5 record in region play.

Last three seasons

A big senior class led West Morgan to its best season of the 2010s in 2017 the final year with coach John Ritter. The Rebels went 10-2 and made it to the Class 3A playoffs where they beat Holly Pond, 35-0, before losing to Sylvania, 48-21, in the second round. Ritter left to coach Russellville. Riggs took over, going 1-9 and 3-7 in his first two years. West Morgan is 14-18 in the last three seasons.

Words to grow on

"We have a lot of potential because we have a lot of returning players," Riggs said. "Potential is useless if you

Riggs also expects the team to be strong up front with multiple multi-year starters, including seniors Elijah Dumas, Evan Newman and Nate Alexander as well as juniors Marcus Jones and Owen Coffey.

Defense

West Morgan will have seven returning starters on defense, but the Rebels lost Tyler Pendegraph, who had 48 tackles with 6.5 for loss last season. Newman and Nate Alexander return on the defensive line. Junior Cade Alexander will lead the linebackers. Senior Drew Bradford, senior Caleb Terry and junior Kaden Cook will be key pieces in the secondary.

Must-see games

West Morgan will face East Lawrence on Aug. 28 for the first time since 2017 when the Rebels won 55-0. The two teams have met 35 times dating to 1979. All but four of the matchups have been non-region games.

"Our kids are already excited about that one," Riggs said. "When I told the players that game was back on the schedule, they were chomping at the bit to start getting ready."

Final word

"Our goal is to get to October and play our best football," Riggs said. "Hopefully, at that point, we will have won enough to make the playoffs. I think this group has a chance to do that."

Lay of the land

The Tigers are competing in Class 6A, Region 8 with seven other teams including longtime rivals Decatur, Cullman and Athens. Muscle Shoals is the defending region champion and probably the favorite to take the region championship this season. Filling out the rest of the region are Buckhorn, Hazel Green and Columbia.

Head coach

Bryan Moore is the new man in charge. This is his sixth season to be a head coach. His record is 49-12 with five playoff appearances at Eufaula (three years) and Jasper (two years).

Moore is the Tigers' third head coach in three years. That's unusual for a program that prides itself on stability. Between 1957 and 2018, the Tigers had just five head coaches — J.P. Cain, Bucky Pitts, Don Woods, Michael Smith and Bob Godsey.

Last season

The Tigers went 4-7 in Bo Culver's one season as head coach. The four teams Hartselle beat were Brooks, Columbia, Decatur and Hazel Green. Those four teams were a combined 9-32.

Last three seasons

Hartselle has gone 21-12, including a region championship in 2018 with an 11-1 record.

Words to grow on

"We got a lot of new around here," Moore said. "How well we do this season depends on how quickly our young players can compete. We'll need them to grow up in a hurry and be ready to go Friday nights."

Hartselle's roster is dominated by youth. There are eight seniors, 14 juniors and 76 sophomores and freshmen.

Quarterback

A lot of the new starts at the quarterback position. Last year's starter, Cal George, is now playing at Athens.

Parker Sawyer, who was the starting quarterback at Jasper last season, has followed Moore to Hartselle for his senior season.

Offense

The Tigers have weapons on offense. Start with receiver Izayah Fletcher. The speedster stepped in as a freshman last season and made an impact. His younger brother, freshman Ri, could have a role on offense this year.

Two new faces in the receiving group were recruited from the basketball team. They are senior Trent Wright and sophomore Coleman Mizell. Freshman Eli Tidwell is also expected to contribute.

The running game starts with junior Kaleb Moore, who will be looking to the offensive line to open holes up front. Seniors Mac Hardin and Ryan Garrison are both returning starters. Junior Braxton Quattlebaum and sophomore Andrew Crittenden are expected to fill two of the open spots in the line. Sophomores Tyde Witt and Jagen Barnette should also see playing time.

Defense

The defensive line got a big boost when Kelvin Morris (6-2, 250) moved in from Clay-Chalkville. The college prospect teams with returning starter Seth

Lockett to give the Tigers two experienced seniors up front. Junior Isaac Osteen and sophomore Traece Oden will lead the linebackers.

Junior Devron Turney returns to be a leader in the defensive backfield. New to the group will be junior Dominic Simmons, who comes over from the basketball team.

Must-see games

Hartselle opens the season with home games vs. Austin, Mae Jemison and Cullman. Austin has won four of the last five meetings with the Tigers. Those three opening games in front of the home crowd at J.P. Cain Stadium should help the youthful Tigers jell as a team. On the flip side, it means five of the last seven will be road games.

Final word

"This has been a great summer for our team," Moore said. "I think we've made up a lot of ground after not having a spring practice, but we're still a really young team. We're not quite sure what we have since we didn't have the opportunity to go through a spring of blocking and tackling."

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BREWER PATRIOTS

Lay of the land

Brewer gained four new region opponents in Russellville, Mae Jemison, Lee-Huntsville and Lawrence County. They join East Limestone and Ardmore in the region. The Patriots are 1-7 all-time against Lee, 0-6 against Russellville and 8-8 against Lawrence County. They have not played Mae Jemison. Their region schedule opens with back-to-back road trips to Ardmore and Russellville. Brewer's home opener in region play is on Sept. 18 against East Limestone.

Head coach

Geoff Walters enters his sixth season as coach of the Patriots with a 17-34 record as the team's head coach. Overall, Walters has a 49-68 record as a head coach in Alabama with previous stops in Sylacauga (one year) and Shelby County (five years) in the early 2000s.

His most successful season with Brewer came two seasons ago when the Patriots went 8-3 and made the playoffs. That's Brewer's only winning season of the millennium.

"Work habits and all are established," Walters said. "They're ingrained in Brewer football now."

Last season

Record-wise, it was a step back for Brewer last year after making the playoffs in 2018 with only three losses. The Patriots went 3-7 despite opening the season with two wins in a row. Brewer lost seven of eight games to end the season, with its only win coming against Ardmore, 24-17. Its other wins came against Danville, 37-8, and Arab, 29-21.

Last three seasons

Sandwiched in between that eight-win season and playoff appearance are two 3-7 seasons. Brewer is a combined 14-17 in the last three seasons, which gives it its best three-year run since 1997-1999, when the Patriots made the playoffs three years in a row under coach Glenn Lang.

Words to grow on

"It may not be the most talented team that prevails this season. It may be the most unified team. There have been a lot of teams and programs that are disjointed by all of this."

Quarterback

Junior Wyatt Styles steps in after starting seven games last season when Patrick Johnson went down with a season-ending injury. Styles is a strong player whom Walters plans to use in the running game because of his size.

"He'll have to be a decision-maker and

a runner," Walters said. "When you have that it's a different type of threat. We feel like Wyatt will be tough to tackle, because he is a big kid."

Offense

Walters expects Cole Rathbun, who is one of four seniors, to anchor the offensive line. He missed half of last season with an injury. Micah Steffen, a junior, returns at inside receiver while senior Braden Rusk will play out wide. Both will be important targets in the passing game. Sophomore Lukas Simpson and junior Gonzalo Ramirez will share the backfield after seeing some playing time last year.

Defense

Walters said his defense will shift around this year to fit the personnel he has. The defense's strength is at linebacker, where Steffen will be the leader. Junior Lee Murray is a returning starter in the secondary to anchor the group with some younger players. Walters also said Rusk will be a key player at safety.

"We're tweaking our scheme to fit what we have," Walters said. "We're going to use multiple fronts. We still want to preach the same things of complete, intense hustle on defense."

Must-see games

A Sept. 11 road trip to Russellville will be a big test for Walters' team. The Golden Tigers went 8-3 last season and will be a contender for the region title this season.

Final word

"Each team has a different personality," Walters said. "You have to learn those and work on those even though it's still Brewer football overall."

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PRICEVILLE BULLDOGS

Lay of the land

Priceville moves west in Class 4A, joining a region mostly made up of teams from the Shoals area. The Bulldogs' only carryover opponent is West Morgan, which Priceville beat, 24-22, last season.

It will be in Class 4A, Region 8 with Brooks, Central-Florence, Deshler, Rogers, West Limestone, West Morgan and Wilson. Its non-region opponents are Brewer (Aug. 28), Danville (Sept. 25) and St. John Paul II (Oct. 30).

Head coach

Chris Foster enters his second season with the Bulldogs after a historical first year last season. Foster joined Priceville late in the summer and led his team to an 8-4 record and its first playoff appearance since 2015. It is his first time being a varsity head coach.

"They know what I expect now," Foster said. "I understand where they're strong and weak at. I look for it to be a more comfortable environment and more streamlined this year."

Last season

Priceville experienced just its fifth winning season since the program started in 2002. Priceville won seven of its 10 regular-season games and was close to earning a region title. The Bulldogs then won their first playoff game in program history, beating Rogers 44-23. Priceville's season came to an end in the second round with a 41-14 loss to Northside.

Last three seasons

Before last year's playoff run, Priceyille experienced a pair of 2-8 seasons under Jason Simmons, who left to be an assistant coach at Oxford, and Dirk Strunk. Priceville is 12-20 in its last three seasons.

Words to grow on

"We want our kids to push each other to be better. That's really been the goal," Foster said. "Competition is what is going to drive us to get better."

Ouarterback

Wyatt Hurt returns as the team's quarterback after starting the entire season last year. While most of Priceville's offense centered on the running game, Hurt was a reliable leader. He enters his senior season.

Offense

The center of Priceville's offense, running back Jerry Burton, will be back after a productive junior season. The finalist for the Alabama Sports Writers Association's Class 4A Back of the Year rushed for 2,510 yards and 33 touchdowns. That came after rushing for 1,350 yards his sophomore

Priceville will have some work to do on the offensive line, however, after losing three seniors. Foster expects a lot of open competition on the offensive line and also sees Burton playing a big part in the offense once again. Senior Koal Legg and junior Tyler Cappi return up front.

"(Jerry) wants to help his team compete and win any chance he gets," Foster said. "He does anything the coach asks him to do."

Defense

Outside linebackers Tristan Holmes and John Looney will lead the Priceville defense. They're returning starters who enter their senior seasons. Looney had 94 tackles, and Holmes recorded 93 tackles.

Hurt and senior James Calvin Estes are also players who will return for their senior seasons on defense. Burton is also expected to play a big role on defense.

Foster described the unit as a "bend, don't break" type of defense that picks and chooses when it will be aggressive.

Must-see games

"Anytime you open with a game that's both in your county and a region game, that's always going to be a big game," Foster said.

Final word

"It's our second year, so I want to see our returning kids show that they have a good grasp of what we were doing last year, so we can build that," Foster said. "We don't want to restart from the ground up."

62 touchdowns in 62 games.

The Keith pipeline has gone dry, but that may be OK. Because of Kyle's arm the Eagles might become more of a passing team. There's a talented group of receivers returning in Alex Malone, Maddux Terry, Tyler Founds, Cole O'Brien and Ty Tyson.

Two newcomers could make the pass receiving group even better. Seniors Sean Zerkle and Jack Slyman have transferred from St. John Paul II in Huntsville. Zerkle (6-1, 175) was a Class 4A first-team All-State selection last year with 80 receptions for 1,720 yards and 25 touchdowns. He averaged 21.5 yards a catch and 143.5 yards a game. The 80 catches were the most in any classification last season.

When Decatur Heritage does run the ball, expect senior Michael Cheng and junior Tyler Olive to be the main backs.

The biggest challenge for Decatur Heritage could be in the offensive line. There's just one starter back in senior Justin Densmore. Linemen being counted on to step up are Sam Waters, Lemzel Johnson, Saxon Sample and

Charlie Hellard. The Eagles may have to count on some eighth-graders for depth.

Defense

There are six starters returning on an undersized defense that counts on quick-hitting gang tackling.

One of the returning starters is Founds, an All-State defensive back. He had six interceptions and 57 tackles in nine games.

Olive and Cheng are expected to man the inside linebacker spots with Nash Rippen at outside linebacker. Sample will be the nose guard. Tyson will be in the defensive backfield.

Must-see games

The Falkville game is always big. This season the rivalry is the season opener on Friday at Falkville. Decatur Heritage has won two out of the last three meetings, but Falkville leads the series, 4-2.

Final word

"Last year was a special season with a special group of young men," Meek said. "I hope this group can recapture the way we played last year."

Lay of the land

Danville moves down to Class 3A after spending six years in Class 4A. The Hawks competed in Region 7 and Region 8 during its last run in Class 3A, which lasted from 1984-2013. (The AHSAA's region format began in 2000.) Danville will be in Region 8 this time around with Clements, Colbert Heights, East Lawrence, Elkmont, Lauderdale County and Phil Campbell. It opens its region schedule with a road contest against Colbert Heights on Sept. 4. Its home opener in region play will be two weeks later against East Lawrence on Sept. 18.

Danville will face Brewer at home on Friday for its first non-region game. Its other non-region contests include a road game against Falkville on Aug. 28, a home game against Priceville on Sept. 25 and a road game against Lawrence County on Oct. 30.

Head coach

Shannon McGregory enters his third year as head coach, with a record of 5-16 at Danville. He is 50-79 in the state of Alabama. He had previous stops at Colbert Heights (1998-2004) and South Lamar (2013-2015) before becoming the defensive coordinator at Danville and later head coach.

Last season

If McGregory promised improvements in year two, he lived up to them. The Hawks went 5-6 with a playoff appearance a year after going 0-10 in his first year. Danville won four region games against North Jackson, West Morgan, Priceville and DAR. It was 5-3 before losing the last three games of the season, including a 44-6 loss to Deshler in the first round of the

"I think that was a very good step for us," McGregory said. "This year is going to be interesting regardless because of everything going on."

Last three seasons

Danville went 3-7 in 2017 – its last season under Josh LouAllen. McGregory took over in 2018, and the Hawks failed to win a game before making the playoffs last year. Danville is 8-23 in its last three seasons. Its last winning season came in 2009 when it went 7-4.

Words to grow on

"In order to have success, you have to experience success," McGregory said. "It increases your appetite for success. It makes you hungrier."

Ouarterback

McGregory said the quarterback position is wide open heading into the season. The Hawks lost senior Luke Nail, who will play for North Alabama this year. Nail threw for 1,197 yards and six touchdowns while rushing for 854 yards and 14 touchdowns. Dylan Parker, Gage Taylor and Percy Smith will compete for the position.

Offense

Running back Cameron Moore returns after a productive junior season. He rushed for 915 yards and 12 touchdowns on 157 carries. He also had 235 receiving yards and one touchdown. McGregory said Tyler Sumerel and Lane Flowers will be key players on the offensive line as seniors.

Defense

McGregory said Ryan Jones will be a key player up front but said the unit will have a lot of question marks. He also pointed out Justice Huff, a linebacker, as another key player on defense.

"We're not going to have a lot of depth on defense," McGregory said. "We're going to need more guys to step up and fill some holes."

Must-see games

Danville opens its season with Morgan County rival Brewer in a non-region game. That will be a test for Danville, which lost to the Patriots 37-8 last season.

Final word

"We have talent and potential to be a pretty good team," McGregory said. "Depth will be an issue. Everything is good until someone gets hurt, so if we stay away from injuries and get better every day, we can end up having a positive season."

Lay of the land

Falkville moves up to Class 2A after spending two years in Class 1A. The Blue Devils will be in Region 7 with just one common opponent, Tanner, from their last stint in Class 2A in 2017. Falkville's other region opponents are Ider, North Sand Mountain, Pisgah, Section and Whitesburg Christian.

It opens the season with two nonregion home games against Decatur Heritage (Friday) and Danville (Aug. 28). Its other two non-region games feature road trips to Cold Springs on Sept. 25 and Winston County on Oct. 30. Its region opener will be at home against Whitesburg Christian on Sept. 4.

Head coach

Tyler Mitchell enters his second year, taking over for Joel Schrenk before the start of last season. He was previously an assistant at East Limestone. This is his first head coaching job.

Last season

Mitchell kept up the success that Schrenk had with the Blue Devils in his seven

years as head coach. The Blue Devils went 7-5 overall and 4-2 in region games. Falkville made the playoffs and won its first-round game before losing to Pickens County, 21-20, in the second round.

"We want to continue to have the same attitude of coming to work every day," Mitchell said. "We control what we can control and learn and improve. Our players are becoming leaders."

Last three seasons

Falkville went 7-4 in 2017 and made the playoffs before losing in the first round. It followed that up with its highest win total in school history, going 11-1. Words to grow on

Mitchell pointed to leadership and arm strength as positives for Sallee and noted Burnett's work ethic as a strength for him.

"We're fortunate to have two guys that we trust to have the ball in their hands," Mitchell said.

Offense

Two All-State players in senior running back Christian Angulo and senior wide receiver Mikel Philyaw return for the Blue Devils. Angulo rushed for 1,300 yards and 18 touchdowns. He has been an All-State selection all three years of his career with his first two selections coming at wide receiver. Philyaw caught 48 passes for 721 yards and nine touchdowns.

Defense

Angulo and Philyaw also shined on — Matthew Speakman

defense. Angulo had 68 tackles and an interception last season. Philyaw recorded 69 stops and an interception. Senior linebacker Luke Fitzgerald returns as well after having 94 tackles last season. He was an All-State selection. Wyatt Tomlin will play middle linebacker. Mitchell also said Lorenzo Ochoa, a sophomore, will earn some more playing time after a strong end to last season.

Must-see games

Falkville will open up the season with rival Decatur Heritage at home. The Blue Devils came close to handing the Eagles their first regular-season loss in 2019, losing 21-14 on the road.

Final word

"If we stay healthy and take care of business, we have a chance to win any of our games," Mitchell said. "Again, we have to play the game. There's going to be some type of adversity that comes up."

Ouarterback

Not too many high school coaches would be excited about having a sophomore at starting quarterback, but when the sophomore is a returning starter, it's a different story.

Sophomore Briley Kerby (5-foot-11, 185 pounds) is back to direct the attack. Midway through last season the Hornets changed offensive formations from the Wing-T to the spread. That seemed to be a better fit for Kerby's skills. After scoring a total of just 41 points in the first five games (1-4), Hatton scored 139 in the last five games (4-1).

"Briley stepped up and did a great job last season," Bowling said. "He can run and he can throw. He's our guy who can get the job done."

Offense

Two of Kerby's main weapons are seniors Jaxson Mitchell and Carter Reed. Mitchell (5-6, 175) was a firstteam All-State selection at defensive back, where he had six interceptions. He's just as valuable on offense with nine rushing touchdowns last season. He had 1,220 all-purpose yards.

"Jaxson is an exceptional kid and great leader for our football team," Bowling said. "We have to get the ball in his hands as much as possible."

Reed (5-10, 174) is another receiver/ running back who brings a lot of talent to the table. Zane Harville (5-5, 126) is another shifty senior receiver.

Senior Ridge Harrison (6-2, 180) could be an intriguing addition to the offense from the basketball program. He runs a 4.5-second 40-yard dash and has a 38-inch vertical leap.


"The only athlete I have ever coached with a higher vertical jump was Bo Scarbrough (at Northridge in Tuscaloosa)," Bowling said. "Ridge could be another big weapon for us."

James Jones (6-0, 155, Jr.) is another big target for the Hornets.

Defense

Senior Brock Pace (5-10, 184), a three-year starter, is the leader of the

Mitchell and Reed are both four-year starters on defense. Mitchell will be in the defensive backfield. Reed will be at linebacker.

Also at linebacker will be Wil Terry (5-8, 156, Sr.) and Blake Whitaker (5-8, 167, Soph.). Another possibility at the position is senior Gunner Lovelady (5-8, 188), who has missed two seasons with injuries.

Must-see games

After hosting Lawrence County in a jamboree contest the first week of the season, Hatton hits the road for nonregion games vs. Central-Florence and Winston County. The first home game of the season is a region contest with Mars

"What that program has done is amazing," Bowling said. "I know it was in 1A, but it would be amazing if it was 6A."

Final word

"Putting a football program together is like doing a jigsaw puzzle," Bowling said. "You start with the edge pieces and work your way to the middle. I feel like we are finally working on the middle pieces. The final pieces would mean a trip to the playoffs. That's the goal for our program."

Lay of the land

East Lawrence will compete in Class 3A, Region 8 with Clements, Colbert Heights, Danville, Elkmont, Lauderdale County and Phil Campbell. East Lawrence opens its region schedule against Lauderdale County on Sept. 4. Its first road game in region play will be against Danville on Sept. 18.

The Eagles' non-region games include home games against Sulligent (Friday) and West Morgan (Aug. 28) to start the season. Road games against Hatton (Sept. 25) and Sheffield (Oct. 29) round out the non-region games.

Head coach

Bo Culver comes to East Lawrence after spending one year at Hartselle. The Tigers went 4-7 and made the Class 6A playoffs. Culver previously coached at Deshler, Haleyville and Phil Campbell before heading to Hartselle. He spent three years or less at each stop and has a record of 54-48 in 10 years as a head coach in Alabama.

"I've spent individual time with position groups," Culver said. "Those are things that I haven't done in the past but have been forced to do right now.

It's been really good as far as getting to know the kids on a more personal level faster."

Last season

East Lawrence went 5-5 under coach James Moore, winning two games in its region. The Eagles finished fifth in their region and went 3-1 in non-region games. Their five wins were the most since 1997 when they went 7-4 and won the 4A, Area 15 title.

Last three seasons

East Lawrence definitely showed improvement when Moore took over. The Eagles won no games the year before he arrived. They then won two in 2018 and five in 2019. East Lawrence has not been to the playoffs since 2008, when it went 4-7. It is 7-23 in three years.

Words to grow on

"Our ultimate goal is to always build men of character and do things the right way," Culver said. "We're going to do that, but we still count wins and losses. If you do that, the goal is always going to be to win every game and win a state title. That's never going to change."

Quarterback

Senior Levi Barnes will lead the offense this year. The 5-foot-10 signal caller played some quarterback his sophomore year before breaking his collarbone. Barnes switched positions last season before coming back to quarterback this offseason.

"He's a very good athlete," Culver said.
"He has a natural wiggle to him. He has things you can't coach. He is explosive and is the first one at practice almost every single day."

Offense

East Lawrence returns three starters on the offensive line in seniors Blaine Fagan, Zack Terry and Gabe Terry.

"We have some good size," Culver said "We also have some guys who have experience. I think we're doing a good job right now of preparing them to do what we need to do."

Senior Nate Tucker at 6-foot-1 is going to be a big target for Barnes at wide receiver. Culver said Tucker will be a big part of the offense, which he expects to look similar to the offenses he ran at stops before Hartselle.

"We were probably as different at Hartselle as we've been," he said. "It's

still going to be what we do. Each place is different, though, so you have to cater to the personnel. We will still base out of the spread."

Defense

Culver pointed to senior Karson Terry as a key player up front for the Eagles. Seniors Juan Lopez and Zachary LeMay will head up the linebacker unit. Senior Neal Blaxton will start at outside linebacker. In the secondary, senior Payton Davenport will lead the group at safety. Junior Dawson Terry will be a strong corner.

Must-see games

A home game against Sulligent, which went 9-3 last season, on Friday to open the season will be a strong test for the Eagles. A rivalry game against West Morgan follows, with the region opener against Lauderdale County occurring the week after.

Final word

"We're not going to carry the weight of the past 22 years on our back," Culver said. "We're going to be worried about this team and this year right now."

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

Lay of the land

Lawrence County joins Brewer, East Limestone and Ardmore in Class 5A, Region 8 after playing opponents to the south before the realignment. Lee-Huntsville, Mae Jemison and Russellville round out the schedule. Lawrence County opens its region schedule with a road trip to Ardmore on Sept. 11. It plays at Hazel Green, at West Point, at Westminster Christian and at home against Danville for its non-region schedule.

"I like the travel," Lawrence County coach Rich Dutton said. "The travel will be a lot easier. We've faced these teams in the past as well."

Head coach

Dutton enters his ninth season as Lawrence County coach, providing the team with some long-term stability after the previous four coaches left after three years or less. So far, Dutton has a 33-50 record with three playoff appearances in three straight years from 2015-2017. The Red Devils lost in the first round all three years.

Last season

Lawrence County went 4-6 with a 2-5 record in its region. It beat Hayden, 27-14, and Dora, 37-14. Its non-region wins came against Decatur, 27-25, and Rogers, 41-20. A run of four straight region losses in the back half of the season kept Lawrence County from a playoff appearance.

Last three seasons

It's been three years of losing seasons for the Red Devils, but one did come with a playoff appearance. In 2017, Lawrence County lost to Mortimer Jordan in the Class 5A first round to finish 5-6. Lawrence County followed that with a disappointing 2-8 season and a 4-6 season last year. It is 11-20 in its last three seasons.

Words to grow on

"Be thankful that we all have the opportunity to show up," Dutton said. "Don't forget to enjoy this. We want to sit back and enjoy everything, because it's all uncharted waters."

Ouarterback

Offense

Seniors Allen Johnson and Gage Dutton will get most of the carries at running back. Both have experience carrying the ball. Senior Kaden Edwards will be a main target at receiver. At tight end, senior Garrett Lee returns for his fourth year as a starter. The offensive line will return all five starters from last year, including seniors Chandler Stevenson and Colton Reeves.

Defense

The defensive line will be a mix of vouth and experience. Senior Xander

Montgomery pairs with junior Cameron Gholston at defensive end. Lee will also play on defense at linebacker. The Red Devils lost important players in Colton Johnson, who had 129 total tackles last season, and Tayi Strickland, who recorded five interceptions. Dutton expects his secondary to be inexperienced.

Must-see games

Lawrence County opens with a road trip Aug. 28 to Hazel Green. Dutton also pointed to region games against Ardmore (Sept. 11), Russellville (Sept. 18) and East Limestone (Oct. 2).

"Hazel Green will be a really good test for us right off the bat," Dutton said. "We're taking on a Class 6A program on the road. We will see where we are."

Final word

"The energy level is high for us," Dutton said. "We want to have fun playing this sport and play to our potential. We want to let the chips fall where they may."

Reclassification has moved the Chiefs into Class 1A, Region 8 with a lot of familiar opponents. The region lineup includes Decatur Heritage, Cherokee, Hackleburg, Phillips, Shoals Christian, Vina and Waterloo. The non-region opponents are Sheffield, Colbert County and New Hope.

R.A. Hubbard is the seventh smallest school in the AHSAA that fields a football team. The average daily attendance is listed at 63. The largest school in the state is Hoover with an average of 2,126.15.

Head coach

Mac Hampton is in his fourth season as head coach. The Chiefs have gone 15-16, including a playoff appearance in 2018.

Last season

Last year's 5-5 record was a disappointment for a team with 10 experienced seniors.

"I really thought we could win at least seven and maybe eight or nine games," Hampton said. "I think we learned a lesson that it's the little mistakes that can beat

Must-see games



Elkmont will compete in Class 3A, Region 8 with Danville, East Lawrence, Clements, Lauderdale County, Colbert Heights and Phil Campbell. The Red Devils' non-region opponents are Randolph, at Ardmore, at Lexington and Hanceville.

Head coach

Duane Wales is starting his fourth season as head coach at his alma mater. His combined record is 4-26.

Last season

Elkmont went 1-9 with a 16-14 win over Lexington. The Red Devils averaged 8.6 points a game on offense while allowing an average of 51.5 points on defense.

Last three seasons

It's been a rough last three years for the Red Devils with a 4-26 record that includes a forfeit from Deshler in 2018.

Words to grow on

"We are excited to be back in Class 3A," Wales said. "We are in a competitive region with no clear favorite. We can be competitive and win some games. When it comes to making the playoffs, I say why not us?"

Ouarterback

Senior Gage Hill leads the defensive backfield at safety. Corbin Lacy and Garrett King also return. Junior Brendan Abernathy, a transfer from Muscle Shoals, is expected to contribute.

Must-see games

The Indians open the season with two home games vs. non-region opponents Guntersville and Mars Hill. Guntersville was a region rival last season. Last three seasons

After a string of 1-9 seasons from 2010-2015, Clements went 4-6 in backto-back seasons in 2016 and 2017. The Colts went 4-7 in Parker's first year and made the playoffs for the first time since 2009. It went 6-5 last season. Clements is 14-18 in the last three seasons.

"They know we go to work now," Parker said. "They don't even ask if we're working out or practicing anymore. They are ready to go."

Words to grow on

"We try to emphasize integrity in everything that we do," Parker said. "Every rep we do, we try to do it perfectly. If we can't do that, we try again."

Quarterback

Clements has a senior in Seth Fraze and a freshman in Jaden Gilbert battling for the right to start at quarterback. Fraze was the backup quarterback the previous two seasons and is recovering from an ACL tear. Parker said Gilbert is a "natural athlete" with a strong arm who catches on to concepts quickly. He added that Fraze is a strong athlete and that he knows the offense really well from experience.

"It's going to be a fun battle for us leading up to the season," Parker said.

Offense

The biggest question mark for Clements is replacing running back Jairrice Pryor, who ran for 1,755 yards and 28 touchdowns. He was a Class 3A All-State selection. Junior Ian Ezell and sophomore Riley Gosser are expected to replace him.

"(Gosser) is a bruiser who will try to run over you," Parker said. "Ian Ezell is an athlete. He returns kicks for us. He returned three for touchdowns last season."

Senior Colin Hargrove returns as a three-year starter at center to anchor the offensive line. Senior Hunter Hall returns at receiver to give either Fraze or Gilbert a playmaker on the outside. Senior Deontae Crenshaw is another player that Parker expects to have an impact at receiver.

Defense

Sophomore Brady Moore will play — Matthew Speakman

inside linebacker and will be a leader for the Colts. Senior Josh Gallien will pair with him at the other inside linebacker position. Fraze is also expected to play outside linebacker. Senior Alan Aguirre, an addition to the Colts after sitting out last season, is a 6-foot-3 defensive lineman that Parker described as a "hoss."


Must-see games

Clements starts the season with two non-region tests on the road against Wilson and West Limestone. The Colts host Colbert Heights in a rematch of a double-overtime win for Clements last season. That will be on Sept. 18.

"We're not going to dominate anyone in our region," Parker said. "I still think we can compete with them. We're going to compete, and we can be in every game we play."

Final word

"I think it could be something special for us this season," Parker said. "We just need to stay healthy. I think we can be really competitive. It will be a fun year for us."

Lay of the Land

West Limestone competes in Class 4A, Region 8 with Brooks, Central-Florence, Deshler, Priceville, Rogers, West Morgan and Wilson. The Wildcats lose Elkmont, which dropped to Class 3A, but gain Priceville and West Morgan.

They open their region schedule with a trip to Central-Florence on Sept. 11 and close it out with a home game against Priceville on Oct. 23. Their non-region opponents are Clements, East Limestone and Ardmore.

Head coach

Shelby Davis, in his first stint as a head coach, is heading into his third year with the Wildcats after seeing solid improvement in year two. The Wildcats improved their win total by three in his second season, finishing 6-4 and barely missing out on the playoffs. His first year didn't go as well, but West Limestone still managed to win three games. The Wildcats are 9-11 in two years under Davis.

Last season

West Limestone had an up-and-down year for the most part, matching almost every win with a loss. Its one streak came when it won two games in a row against Clements, 41-8, and Wilson, 45-12, midway through the season. The Wildcats finished 6-4 but missed out on the playoffs thanks to a tiebreaker because of a 3-3 region record that featured losses to Rogers, 23-19, and Central-Florence, 42-37, which both made the playoffs.

"That was a huge stride from year one to year two," Davis said. "I could not have been more pleased with the ground that we covered, but we could have been a lot more consistent."

Last three seasons

Before Davis took over, West Limestone went 4-7 under Jordan Cantrell and made the playoffs but lost in the first round. The Wildcats then went 3-7 in Davis' first year before going 6-4 last season. They are 13-18 in the last three seasons.

Words to grow on

"We just want to focus on what we can control," Davis said. "With everything going on, you can't worry about what you can't control. Control your attitude and effort."

Quarterback

The quarterback position is undecided. Davis said the team had "three or four" guys competing for the position when the team entered preseason camp.

"That's a big question mark right now for us," Davis said.

Offense

Wide receiver River Helms returns for his senior season and is commanding a lot of attention from college coaches. Helms, who is 6-foot-4, has offers from blue blood programs such as Georgia and Florida State. He had 13 touchdowns.

The running back position is not a concern for Davis, who said he has as many as five players who can play that position. Running back Thorne Slaton, a senior, is another player Davis pointed to as key for the offense. Seniors Travis Newman, Brady Adams and Ryan Britt are returning players on the offensive line.

Defense

West Limestone will have to replace nearly its entire secondary and defensive line after the key players in those units graduated. Junior Brett Beckworth is a two-year starter who will play middle linebacker. Junior Dakota Hilliard is another two-year starter coming back who will play defensive end.


"We're having some young guys that are going to step in," Davis said. "Those two guys that really have had the most experience who are coming back."

Must-see games

A Sept. 4 home game against Deshler will serve as the team's region opener and its second game of the season. Deshler made it to the state title game two years ago and won a region title last season. A road trip to East Limestone on Sept. 25 for a rivalry game, and a region game at Brooks on Oct. 2 should be big as well.

Final word

"This group shows up and goes to work," Davis said. "I feel like they're really bought in to what we're trying to accomplish. They want to try and go out and win a region championship."

New regions change landscape on path to playoffs

If you have turned the pages in this section looking for some predictions, you are at the right place.

This is where we look at the regions for all 20 schools and make as "educated" a guess as possible.

This is the first football season since the reclassification after the 2019 season. Some of the new is just a different region number for a group of schools that annually battle it out. Three area schools did change classification. Danville and Elkmont dropped to Class 3A. Falkville moved up to Class 2A.

Last year, eight area teams advanced to the playoffs. Only four made it to the second week. Decatur Heritage was the only area team to go to the third round.

Here's a look at each region followed

by our predictions:

Class 7A, Region 4: Austin (7-4 last season), Bob Jones (4-6), Florence (7-5), Grissom (3-7), Huntsville (6-4), James Clemens (9-3), Sparkman (8-3), Albertville (5-6). Combined records: 49-38.

Prediction: Austin, Florence, Sparkman and James Clemens will again be the four teams out of Region 4. Where Austin falls in this order could be mostly decided before October. The Black Bears' region schedule for September is vs. Florence, vs. James Clemens and at Sparkman.

Class 6A, Region 8: Decatur (2-8 last season), Hartselle (4-7), Athens (8-4), Columbia (0-10), Cullman (6-6), Muscle Shoals (12-1), Buckhorn (4-7), Hazel Green (1-9). Combined records: 37-52.

Prediction: Muscle Shoals, Athens, Cullman and Decatur. The last decade saw Decatur posting winning records in even years and losing records in odd years. This is an even year. Hartselle at Decatur on Sept. 11 is an early game that could be key to deciding if the Tigers or Red Raiders are in the playoffs.

Class 5A, Region 8: Brewer (3-7), Ardmore (2-8), East Limestone (4-6), Lawrence County (4-6), Lee (1-9), Mae Jemison (5-6), Russellville (8-3). Combined records: 27-45.

Prediction: Russellville, East Limestone, Mae Jemison, Lawrence County. The last playoff spot could be decided in the last week of region play when Brewer visits Lawrence County on Oct. 23.

Class 4A, Region 8: Priceville (8-4), West Morgan (3-7), West Limestone (6-4), Brooks (6-5), Central-Florence (3-8), Deshler (9-4), Rogers (3-8), Wilson (2-7). Combined records: 40-47.

Prediction: Deshler, Brooks, Priceville, West Limestone. If West Morgan can find a way to win one of its first two region games (vs. Priceville and at Deshler) the momentum could mean the Rebels make the playoffs.

Class 3A, Region 8: Danville (5-6), Clements (6-5), East Lawrence (5-5), Elkmont (1-9), Colbert Heights (6-5), Lauderdale County (9-3), Phil Campbell (4-6). Combined records: 36-39.

Prediction: Lauderdale County, Clements, Colbert Heights, Danville. Moving to 3A should help Danville's chances of back-to-back playoff seasons for the first time since 1994 and 1995.

Class 2A, Region 7: Falkville (7-5), Tanner (1-9), Ider (2-8), North Sand Mountain (9-4), Pisgah (4-7),

Section (3-7), Whitesburg Christian (first season). Combined records: 26-40. **Prediction:** North Sand Mountain,

Falkville, Section, Tanner. Winner of the Pisgah at Tanner game on Oct. 23 makes the playoffs. Class 2A, Region 8: Hatton (5-5),

Colbert County (6-5), Sheffield (6-5), Tharptown (2-7), Red Bay (12-1), Mars Hill Bible (14-1), Lexington (1-9). Combined records: 46-33.

Prediction: Mars Hill, Red Bay, Colbert County, Sheffield. This is probably the toughest region in 2A, if not the state.

Class 1A, Region 8: Decatur Heritage (12-1), R.A. Hubbard (5-5), Cherokee (0-10), Hackleburg (5-7), Phillips (2-8), Shoals Christian (1-9), Vina (3-8), Waterloo (8-3). Combined records: 36-51.

Prediction: Decatur Heritage, Waterloo, Hackleburg, R.A. Hubbard. The season for R.A. Hubbard could come down to its last three region games, all at home vs. Decatur Heritage, Waterloo and Shoals Christian.

Ouarterback
