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## Moody on The Market



In Michigan's Great Southwest, "We went from 4-percent unemployment to 20-percent unemployment

back down to 9-percent unemployment, and as you can imagine that kind of disruption causes a lot of issues for employers, job-seekers, and everybody else." That's the scene-setter recently from Kinexus Group Vice President of Public Relations & Government Affairs Al Pscholka who joined President & CEO Todd Gustafson and Chief Operating Officer Jake Gustafson in a media roundtable. Jake Gustafson provided the vast majority of the commentary as the unofficial "Data Nerd," sharing a lot of statistical data and anecdotal information regarding the region's ability to bounce back from the economic ravages of the coronavirus pandemic. He launched right into the data telling us, 'It's really good news, the job bounce-back is much better than we expected." He explained, "The concern had been we thought we would be in double-digit unemployment numbers, in a pretty conservative estimate, through the end of the year at least. However, due to some really strong consumer spending numbers, some rebounds in the hospitality and manufacturing sectors, and even a few other odd sectors like census hiring and some other components that have come in and had a higher impact than we expected, not just Michigan, but also especially our region of Berrien, Cass and Van Buren Counties have really experienced a high degree of growth. In fact, we're below double digits a quarter early here by registering in this month at 9.9-percent unemployment." Gustafson quickly noted, "Not that we're celebrating 9.9-percent unemployment, since that's still more than double what we were sitting at in February, but you have to recognize that's a onemonth change — a positive change — of over 3-percent, whereas at the end of July we were sitting at a mid-13-percent range, now we're in the high 9's. Michigan as a whole is in the high 9 range, and Michigan had a really good August, especially compared to the rest of the country." Michigan had been trailing by a few tenths of a percent through most of the summer, but actually had a really strong end of the summer season, and has come back to even with the national average for unemployment. For the management team at the Kinexus Group, anchored in Benton Harbor, "That's great news," as Jake continued, "We're beating expectations. As disruptive as the COVID 19 lockdown and pandemic and all of the associated lockdown effects have been, we'd really be remiss not to talk about the good progress that we have made. The reopening is work-

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

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## The Veterans Voice – NSC Pensions (Part 2)

Veterans Affairs offers Non-Service Connected (NSC) Veterans Pension and Survivors Pension for those

Housebound (HB) and/ or in need of Aid and Attendance (A&A). This program is for wartime era veterans and survivors. The veteran must have at least "one day" of active duty service during a wartime era (e.g. WWII, Korea, Vietnam, etc.). They must meet certain limited income and net worth thresholds to qualify which currently cannot exceed a combined net worth of \$129,094. If you go to www.veteransaidbenefit. org/aid and attendance pension benefit.htm you will get a comprehensive review of the HB and A&A programs. Most veterans or survivors use the A&A program when they are in a nursing home or an assisted living facility, however, you can remain in your home and have caregivers assist you. In either case, a medical doctor, in addition to other required forms, needs to complete a 21-2680 - Examination for HB Status or Permanent need for Regular A&A. Currently, claims filed for HB or A&A take an average of six to nine months to be approved by the VA. A veteran who is married can currently get as much as \$27,195 a year toward their nursing home or assisted living facility costs (see www.va.gov/pension/veterans-pension-rates for all the rates). A surviving spouse in a nursing home or assisted living facility can currently get as much as \$17,586 a year toward their respective care (see www.va.gov/pension/survivors-pensionrates for all the rates). As stated last week, this benefit is a needs-based benefit program for wartime era veterans or surviving dependent who

have limited income and net worth. You need to

The Department of be more seriously disabled and/or in a nursing home or assisted living facility to qualify for the housebound or aid and attendance rates. In recent years the VA has really cracked down on what we call "Pension Poachers." For example, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has an excellent article titled, "Veterans' Pensions - Protect Your Money From Poachers" at www.consumer.ftc.gov/ articles/0349-veterans-pensions. The article states that, "these unscrupulous brokers try to convince veterans to transfer their assets to a trust or to invest in insurance products so they can qualify for Aid and Attendance benefits." The article from the FTC goes on to state, "Adding insult to injury, the advisers are charging fees that range from hundreds to thousands of dollars for their services." For many years, attorneys, financial planners and insurance agents have been able to get away with this until the VA initiated a three year look back and changed this and other rules on October 18. 2018. These benefits should be "FREE" to apply for (see Pension Programs and Representation https://benefits.va.gov/BENEFITS/ factsheets/limitedincome/pensionprogram-and-

representation.pdf). Anyone receiving these VA Pension programs will be reduced to \$90 a month once they enter a nursing home or assisted living facility and qualify for Medicaid. The \$90 does not necessarily go to the facility, but rather can be added to their "personal needs allowance" and used for personal expenses.

ing, and we're starting to see some jobs come back. There's still a big hill to climb, and we still have ground to make up before we get to the pre-COVID levels, which was an historically low unemployment level in our region. While we're still double that, we're clawing back in." The numbers-oriented exec took an even deeper dive saying, "If you look at the unemployment rate, you often look at a few other things, including the total size of the labor force, and ours is doing very well. In Berrien, Cass and Van Buren Counties, we've actually avoided a trend that is a little bit disconcerting in the rest of the state, where we're seeing a shrinking of the labor force. The general trend in our region is stable, if not just a slight amount of growth. One of the component trends that we've seen across the state of Michigan as a whole is a decrease in the size of the labor force, especially when you get close to the Detroit Metro area, where areas like Oakland County has experienced an almost 80,000 person decline in their workforce." So how does that add up for the region as we still have businesses hurting from the pandemic? Gustafson says, "If we were to put our crystal ball cap on and ask where do we think we are headed from here, we believe we will have at least one more month of incremental growth, or positive gains, and maybe drop us down around 8-percent unemployment come October, but after that there are a few things to raise a red flag of caution on, like the seasonal nature of the local marketplace, that give us concern - not a crisis, like the pandemic was

- but there are things that might slow growth slightly." By way of reasoning, Jake adds, "There are some things that you can't fix when you have a big economic crisis like this if your labor force leaves, or migrates to another area, but we're not seeing that now, nor any effects of that, so that's in the realm of good news, that is something that we can build on and will be the foundation for a strong economy here regionally." The CEO, Todd Gustafson, notes, "Historically that number has shrunk here as well over the past decade, so to see the trends that we're seeing now is actually very encouraging."

Drilling beyond just the numbers, Jake returned to what it means to the Average Joe out looking for work, saying, "If you take an x-ray and look at the opportunities for folks that are looking for work today, what do they look like? That's a bit more mixed news, but there's still the notion that there's probably no better time to be entering the workforce, strangely enough, in the recent history, especially if you're interested in careers like manufacturing, or hospitality, but really advanced manufacturing, the numbers are really unusual there." Manufacturing in Southwest Michigan got hit hard, like everyone else did. In fact, the Kinexus Group team says that manufacturing in the region took a 10-percent hit on its labor force thanks to COVID, and they're still building back. Jake points out, "I think manufacturing is a really resilient resilient sector and there are some indicators that (according to the Institute for Supply Management) indicate that there might be some positive growth trends coming, but what we

have seen is manufacturers are starting to hire again." A prime role at the Kinexus Group is making the match between those employers with jobs that need to be filled and the potential talent to fill them. In that regard. Jake Gustafson reiterates, "It might be the best time for those who are looking for a job to join the workforce. Our overall hirings, if you take a look at all of the jobs that are posted, we are down, with slightly fewer jobs being advertised in the region - 6,000 as opposed to this time last year when there were 8,500, however inside of that number, the entry level to mid-point manufacturing jobs have actually grown," and adds, "If you're looking to enter fields like advanced manufacturing, there's actually more opportunity now than there has been before, and a really important message that we've tried to start amplifying is that while you may hear a lot of things - and it's true that there's high unemployment, and there are a lot of headwinds in some sectors — but if you're entering the workforce, or if you've been on the sidelines for a while, or you're a young parent who took some time out to be with your family or whatever the reason, if you're looking for opportunities to enter into a field like advanced manufacturing, now is a very competitive time for you to do that." At Kinexus, 58-percent of the job postings are positions requiring few, if any, special qualifications, and their leaders suggest that for those looking for mobility, or a career change and are willing to make a lateral or parallel move to another career, it's actually a good time for that, especially in fields like manufacturing and hospital-



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Although they're encouraged, saying, "This spike of activity is great, and it has probably helped keep them afloat and moving forward as a viable business," Jake adds, "You can't undo almost two quarters of no economic activity, and for those folks who often use that time to build up a cushion to take them through lean times, we're going to expect to see a second period of - not necessarily crisis - but just difficult operating times for small businesses especially in the retail and hospitality industry." Looking into his crystal ball again, Jake says, "If we had to peg it and determine when it will most likely occur, it would be at a time when we expect low business activity anyway, so likely the first quarter of 2021. Kinexus Group would probably want to ring the bell and say there was a lot of programs here from the State of Michigan, things that Cornerstone Alliance did that we were very proud of, and Market Van Buren, to help small businesses in the April, May, June time frame, and they all had great effect and you could point to a lot of tangible success." That said, he suggests, "We may need to do some of those things again, because we're probably not out of the woods just yet. It could be more targeted, and likely not to the same scale, but some assistance may well be needed." Todd Gustafson reminds us, "We were looking at it as a sprint, and it's become a marathon. The one-time assistance that was provided to a lot of businesses may not be enough. We have to think through that and figure out what it looks like going That's it for this week, folks. ity. Todd Gustafson says, "Anecdotally, many of us have had conversations with manufacturers who are actually taking orders into next year - January and February — who are also hiring people now, and they're thinking about growth, and being able to hire people to not only maintain, but to grow as well, so I think there are a lot of positive signs out there.' Jake doubles down on that comment suggesting, "We have empirical data right now which says while the volume of pure openings are down, there is a decided unique opportunity for folks entering the job market. There are still opportunities where manufacturers do need skilled talent, but aren't able to rely on the typical pipelines. Before it might have been just word of mouth, while employers may now be looking for different techniques or tactics to be able to find talent." He adds, "That's not just due to the pandemic, it has been a challenge for employers in our area even previously to find the right skilled talent for specific jobs, particularly in advanced manufacturing and health care. That's something that the Kinexus Group tries its best to help employers match up to talent, or to skill up talent where possible." Amid all of the other myriad stats that the Gustafsons (who are not related to one another, by the way) and Pscholka have at hand is a new set of metrics we hear about frequently on the national scale: the rate of Consumer Spending. Kinexus is venturing into track that data for the first time, working to determine how consumers are spending their money and some of the broader factors that influence the economy, and the workforce in Southwest Michigan. Jake admits, "We've never tracked the data before, but we have been over the summer, with the idea of consumer spending and consumer confidence, recognizing that it has an impact on all sectors, but especially in the leisure and hospitality sectors. The news for our region (Berrien, Cass and Van Buren Counties) has been very good." Looking at the chart graphing the data, Gustafson says, "If I just told you, that the region had a great summer, you could pick out the trend line very easily. Berrien, Cass and Van

Buren have done a great job of being open for business, and being the destination of choice over the summer months. It reflects a more than 20-percent growth in consumer spending with most of that directly tied to leisure and hospitality. Most of it derived from the height of summer in the region. It's great news. Looking back over the late spring and early

summer, Jake says, "We were deeply concerned, and with many businesses closed, we were down about a third compared to most years, but what we were seeing towards the end of summer was that start to equalize back out, and to even out that negative trend line. That helps move us back closer to levels that are sustainable or status quo. It's really great to see that come out of the back end of summer with a little bit more of what would be a normal economic activity level, especially for those areas in leisure and hospitality.

They openly admit, the battle has not been won yet, as Jake says, "There's no doubt there are areas that are still struggling, with gyms only being allowed to reopen this week, bowling alleys and entertainment centers are areas that have been affected longer than most by some of the regulations placed upon them through the lockdown. But when you look at the bread and butter of hospitality accommodations, restaurants and retail – it has done really well." Nevertheless he adds, "We know no matter what in a non-COVID year, Southwest Michigan has a high degree of seasonality with a lot of business in the summer, and then we tend to trail off. In the fall and winter there's still some business. especially around the holidays, but the first quarter of almost any year is a tough one for many of our restaurants and retailers, and you'd be hard-pressed to say who doesn't have a tough first quarter around here that does business locally. It's great to see this spike of business activity going into the winter, to help smooth out some of those lean times that we would expect to come ahead no matter what." But, it doesn't take a genius to take a look at the charts and say we didn't have a full year of positive or even normal economic growth, and Gustafson says, "Our

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

I have \$11,000 in a mutual fund account that is not a retirement account. My wife has a retirement

account through her job as a teacher, but I do not have one at all. We're in Baby Step 2, so should we cash out the \$11,000 in the investment account to help pay off

Dear Chris,

If this money is designated as non-retirement funds, I'd say go ahead and cash it out. Use the money to pay down debt, and continue to stay focused working the Baby Steps. Get that debt paid off, build an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses, then it's your turn to start investing.

The quickest way to build wealth is to get control of your largest wealth-building tool-your income. When all your money is going out the door to other people, you don't have that tool at your disposal when it comes to important things like saving and investing. There's some math in there, but it's also about behavior and being intentional. Getting out of debt dramatically shortens the distance between you and wealth.

A lot of people are having some major "never again" moments right now in the wake of COVID-19 and all the other stuff 2020 has thrown at us. They're

#### Zero-based budgeting explained Dear Dave,

What exactly is a zero-based budget?

Dean

Simply put, a zero-based budget is income minus outgo equals zero. If you earn \$4,000 a month, and you're doing a zero-based budget, every item you spend, save, give and invest should add up to \$4,000. It's a method of knowing where every single one of your dollars is going. Most people don't live on a budget. They just cash checks, write checks, then they look up and wonder where all their money went. Not having a plan, especially for your money, is a bad plan.

List all your income from all sources for the month. Next, list every single expense you have each month. Rent, food, cable, phones, and anything else you pay for gets added to the list. Your expenses vary from one month to the next, which is why you make a new spending plan each month.

Now, here's where it gets real. Subtract your income from your expenses. Ideally, this number will be zero. It might take some practice, so don't be discouraged if everything doesn't balance out perfectly the first few times. All that means is you need to find a way to bring one of the numbers up, the other one down—or

both. But whatever you do, don't spend a dime that's not accounted for.

If you have a problem with spending more than you make, make some cuts in order to equalize your income and your outgo. Using coupons, cutting back on groceries, or carpooling to work are great ideas to reduce spending. If you want to generate more money, get a second job on weekends or sell some stuff.

You're the boss of the budget—in the beginning. Once it's committed to paper, in a spreadsheet, or on an app like EveryDollar, the budget is the boss!



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## Considering an energy audit? Get informed

Overconsumption of energy is a problem that plagues many homeowners. Wasting energy can hurt homeowners' bottom lines and the planet. But many homeowners aren't aware just how much energy their homes are consuming and even wasting. That's why a home energy audit can be so important.

A home energy audit or assessment investigates just how much energy a home consumes so homeowners can make their homes more energy efficient. Audits identify where energy is being wasted and can offer suggestions to fix the problem.

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The U.S. Department of Energy advises that the average U.S. household consumes around 90 million btus in a year. Of the energy used in homes, nearly 50 percent goes to heating and cooling. Water heating, appliances, electronics, and lighting account for the remaining consumption. Consumers can save between 5 and 30 percent on home energy bills by getting a home energy audit and making the adjustments advised by auditors.

There are two types of energy audits: professional and do-it-yourself. Professional auditors will go room-to-room to assess a home's energy use. Typical testing includes thermographic scans and infrared cameras to determine air leakage and insulation; a blower door test, which depressurizes the home and simulates the effect of a 20 mph wind to find air leaks; and watt meter measurements to test energy usage by various devices throughout the house

Before an auditor comes to the house, homeowners can make a list of any problems or concerns they want to discuss with the auditor. The auditor also may interview the homeowner to learn about how the home normally runs and can analyze energy bills to determine typical energy consumption. Windows, doors, HVAC systems, insulation, fireplaces, and lighting fixtures all may be assessed during a professional audit.

Even though a professional audit is usually the best way to determine where a home is losing energy, homeowners can conduct their own audits to detect and fix problems. Locating and sealing air leaks, addressing inadequate ventilation, checking that insulation levels and vapor barriers are at recommended levels, and inspecting HVAC systems should be part of any DIY audit. If a heating/cooling unit is more than 15 years old, the DOE suggests having it replaced with a newer, energy-efficient unit

An energy audit can identify areas around a home where improvements can be made to reduce energy consumption and waste. Upgrading to new appliances, replacing light bulbs, sealing drafts, improving insulation, and addressing moisture and water leaks can be good for the environment and help homeowners save money.







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#### How to prepare your lawn and garden for winter

Winter weather can be harsh. Homeowners who spend much of the year tending to their lawns and gardens may worry that winter will undo all of their hard work. Though homeowners cannot do anything to prevent snow, wind and ice from affecting their properties, they can take various steps to prepare their lawns and gardens for whatever winter has in store.

• Mulch leaves. Falling leaves are a telltale sign that winter is coming. In lieu of raking leaves as they begin to fall, homeowners

can mulch them into their lawns. Scotts®, an industry leader in lawn care, notes that mulching leaves is a great way for homeowners to recycle a natural resource and enrich the soil of their lawns. While it might not be possible to mulch fallen leaves in late autumn when they begin to fall en masse, doing so in the early stages of fall should be possible so long as the lawn is not being suffocated. Scotts® recommends mulching the leaves to dime-size pieces to a point where half an inch of grass can be seen through the

mulched leaf layer.

• Rake leaves as they start to fall more heavily. Once leaves begin to fall more heavily, rake them up and add them to compost piles. The resource GardeningKnowHow.com notes composting leaves creates a dark, rich and organic matter that can add nutrients to garden soil and loosen compacted earth. Leaving leaves on the lawn once they start to fall in great

numbers makes it hard for grass blades to breathe, and the leaves can block moisture from reaching the soil, which needs water to maintain strong roots. In addition, potentially harmful pathogens can breed on damp leaves left on a lawn, and such bacteria can cause significant damage to the turf over time

- Apply a winterizing fertilizer. Winterizing fertilizers can help lawns store food they need to survive through winter and also can help them bounce back strong in spring. Such fertilizers are typically formulated for cool-season grasses such as fescue and bluegrass and are often best applied after the final cut of fall. Warm-season grasses go dormant in winter, so homeowners whose lawns contain these types of grasses won't want to apply a winterizing fertilizer. Homeowners who don't know which type of grass they have or are concerned about when to apply a winterizing fertilizer should consult with a lawncare professional before fertilizing.
- Remove annuals from the garden. Annuals won't be coming back in spring, so it's best to remove ones that are no longer producing from the garden before the arrival of

winter. Doing so can prevent the onset of fungal diseases that may adversely affect the garden in spring.

Fall is the perfect time for homeowners who spend months making their lawns and gardens as lush as possible to take steps to prepare such areas for potentially harsh winter weather

The home improvement experts at HGTV note that moisture can get trapped between deck boards and plastic, wood or ceramic containers in cold weather, and that can contribute to mildew, discoloration or decay.

- Store unnecessary furniture. Homeowners who like to sit on their decks in winter will no doubt want to leave some furniture out over the winter. But those with lots of furniture for entertaining guests can likely move the majority of that furniture into a garage or shed for the winter. HGTV notes that doing so will prevent the potential formation of blemishes on the deck that can result from inconsistent weathering.
- Remove snow, but do so carefully. Prolonged contact with snow and ice can damage a deck. As a result, homeowners should clear snow from their decks when accumulation is significant. HGTV recommends using a snow blower on the deck to avoid scarring. If a shovel must be used, push snow with the planks to reduce the risk of damaging the deck.

Homeowners who take steps to protect their decks throughout the winter months can ensure these popular areas are ready once entertaining season returns in the spring.









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#### **Steps for hanging holiday lights outdoors**

It begins to look a lot like Christmas when twinkling lights brighten up homes inside and out. Few things liven up the season more than holiday decorations, particularly clear and colored lights.

Prior to taking out the lights, ladder and thermos of coffee to get you through the job, it's important to note that there are right and wrong ways to hang holiday lights.

- Sketch out your plan. Start by taking a few photos of your home from various vantage points. Print out the photos on regular paper so that you can draw your lighting arrangement and decoration placement right on the photos to see how things will look.
- Measure the area. Use a measuring tape to roughly measure the width and height of eaves or other areas of the home where you plan to hang light strands. Calculate how much overall footage you will need so you can purchase all of the lights in one shopping trip.
- Test the lights first. Plug in the lights to be sure all strands are operational.
- Begin where the lights will be plugged in. Start where the lights will be plugged in and then work your way around the house.
- Add to shrubs and trees. Lights also can adorn shrubs and trees. Lowes Home Improvement says a good rule of thumb is 100 lights for every 11/2-feet of tree or shrub to cover. A 6-foot evergreen needs at least 400 lights joy the splendor of a well-decorated house. for a basic level of lighting.

- Exercise extreme caution. Accidents can happen when stringing lights. While many professionals use harnesses, homeowners are not always so cautious. Utilize a spotter to hold the ladder and make sure things are safe. Never set foot on a wet or icy roof. Do not attempt to string lights in inclement weather.
- Know the wattage. Each outlet can generally hold about 17 amps or 1,870 watts if the lights are not sharing a circuit with another outlet, says Parrish. Plan accordingly to ensure you have enough power to handle your lights.
- Use plastic clips. Plastic light clips hang strands along eaves and gables. They're specially designed for hanging lights over the gutters. Some slip under the edges of roof shingles. Lights can be hung without staples or nails, which can damage exterior surfaces. Plastic zip-ties or deck clips also can attach lights along a handrail.
- Use only outdoor extension cords. Be sure the extension cords you use are designed specifically for out-
- Use a timer. Timers can make sure the lights turn on and off even if homeowners forget.

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#### Improve indoor air quality in advance of winter

Upon the arrival of winter, people in regions where winter is marked by cold weather tend to spend significantly more time indoors. Because windows tend to be closed during winter, indoor air quality can suffer, making conditions inside a home less than desirable.

According to the American Lung Association, poor air circulation in a home can promote the spread of bacteria and viruses. Once such bacteria or viruses are inhaled, coughs, colds and flu can spread. In addition, asthma and allergy sufferers may experience



worsening symptoms thanks to the presence of endotoxins, which are substances that come from the broken-down cells of dead bacteria

Because many people spend significantly more time indoors during winter than other times of the year, it's essential that they take measures to improve indoor air quality in the months ahead.

• Cut back on chemicals. It's ideal to avoid heavy chemical usage inside a home throughout the year, but it's especially important to do so during winter. Solvent-based

cleaners or cleaning products with strong fragrances can negatively affect indoor air quality and potentially trigger allergic reactions. In lieu of chemically-enhanced cleaning products, use natural products that get the job done without sacrificing indoor air quality.

• Stop smoking indoors. Tobacco smoke can affect smokers and nonsmokers alike. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention note that secondhand smoke causes numerous health problems in in-

fants and children. Those include more frequent and severe asthma attacks and respiratory infections. In addition, reports from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services have linked secondhand smoke to an increased risk of sudden infant death syndrome. Adults exposed to secondhand smoke are at greater risk for coronary heart disease, stroke and lung cancer. Tobacco smoke contains thousands of pollutants that can greatly diminish indoor air quality, so make sure smokers limit their smoking to outside the home throughout the year, but especially during winter.

- Take off your shoes when entering the home. Snowy conditions often require a home's inhabitants and guests to remove their footwear upon entering a home, but it helps to remove footwear in a mudroom or just inside the front door when entering a home even when it's not snowing. Shoes can pick up dirt, dust and a host of other particles during winter, and if tracked inside those unwanted guests can negatively affect indoor air quality.
- Routinely inspect bathrooms for mold. During winter, mold can grow in rooms that are exposed to moisture but not properly ventilated. In many homes, that's the bath-

room. Even if a bathroom has a ventilation fan, routinely inspect the ceiling and shower for mold growth. Exposure to mold can cause a host of negative side effects, including nasal and sinus congestion and sore throat. Mold also can exacerbate asthma symptoms.

Improving and maintaining indoor air quality in winter can help a home's inhabitants stay healthy during the colder months.



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### Things to consider before warming up next to your first fire this winter

A warm fire can make even the coldest winter day more enjoyable. Fireplaces may not get much use in spring or summer, but come late fall and throughout the winter, the fireplace can be a great place for families to gather.

Before fireplace season hits full swing, homeowners might want to brush up on a few fireplace facts so they can safely enjoy nights spent sitting by the crackling flames.

The Chimney Safety Institute of America advises homeowners with fireplaces to hire a CSIA-certified chimney sweep to clean their fireplaces. After a lengthly period of non-use, various issues could be affecting the chimney, many of which might not be noticeable to an untrained eye. Professional, certified chimney sweeps have extensive knowledge of fireplaces, making them valuable resources who can let homeowners know if any safety issues developed since fireplaces were last used. The National Protection Agency recommends that chimneys be swept at least once per year.

A full inspection of the chimney might be in order as well. Chimney service technicians will conduct thorough examinations of readily accessible portions of the chimney exterior and interior and accessible portions of the appliance and the chimney connection. The CSIA recommends that homeowners who plan to use their chimneys as they have in the past request a Level 1 inspection, which will examine the soundness of the chimney structure and flue as well as the basic appliance installation and connections. Technicians also will verify if the chimney is free of obstruction and combustingles.

Homeowners also should inspect their it's well-seachimney dampers before lighting their first soned and havfires of the season. Dampers should open ing a chimney and close smoothly. If not, a service technician can help fix or replace the damper. it's well-seasoned and having a chimney professionally cleaned can re-

Firewood is another thing homeowners must consider before lighting their first fires of the season. The CSIA says that well-seasoned firewood works best, noting that wood that is not well-seasoned will produce more smoke than heat. In addition, the home improvement resource This Old House recommends using dense wood that's been split

and stored in a high and dry place for at least six months. Oak is an example of dense wood that, when stored properly, can make for an enjoyable fireplace experience. Avoid softwoods like pine. Pine can produce a lot of creosote, which is a byproduct of wood combustion. Creosote is highly flammable, and as it builds up in a chimney, the risk for

increases.
Choosing the right wood, making sure it's well-seasoned and having a chimney professionally cleaned can reduce the risk of a creosote-related chimney fire.
A Level 1 inspection in should determine if there

are potentially dangerous levels of creosote deposits in the chimney.

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#### 7 uses for fallen leaves

By the time autumn hits full swing, many trees will have shed their leaves for the season, and the last vestiges of red, yellow and orange magic will have faded to brown. Raking, blowing and collecting leaves be-



comes the primary chores of lawn and yard maintenance, and presents most homeowners with large piles of gathered leaves to tend

It is impossible to count just how many leaves fall to the ground each year, or just how many pounds of leaves get collected curbside, but the numbers are substantial. Cleaning up leaves is considerable work, but spot so they can be used in the spring as a not all of those leaves need to be carted away. In fact, there are several different uses of leaves that can be beneficial.

- 1. Spread leaves as a protective mulch to cover tender perennials or root crops/ bulbs in the ground. The leaves will form a natural insulating cover that keeps the soil and the plants within a bit warmer over win-
- 2. Create a pile of leaves that will break down and form a crumbly, compost-like material called leaf mold. Even though leaf mold may sound like a blight, it's actually a good amendment to garden soil, improving its structure and ability to hold water. Leaf mold also attracts beneficial organisms that are vital in healthy soil.

- 3. Brown leaves can be added to green materials in compost piles to improve the leaves and preserve them. Use an iron on a health of the compost being formed. According to the healthy living resource Care2, the ideal ratio is 75 percent brown to 25 percent green materials in compost. Turn compost piles regularly to aerate them.
- 4. Store dried, mulched leaves in a dry weed barrier for spring plantings. They will keep weeds at bay and help retain soil moisture to ensure small sprouts have the resources to grow.
- 5. Use shredded leaves as a lawn supplement. Pass a lawn mower over leaves left on the lawn to break them down into pieces too small to rake. This will help keep the lawn healthy throughout the winter without blocking out needed sunlight.
- 6. Bag dried leaves and pack them tightly together in cold areas of the home, such as basements or garages. They can act as added insulation. Bags of leaves also can be placed around planting containers to protect them from frost.

7. Gather a few of the best-looking low setting and press leaves between two pieces of waxed paper until the waxed paper seals together. Or use clear contact paper to achieve the same effect.

Fallen leaves can be used in many different ways throughout the year.
