ongtime Evergreen Valley resident Eric Espinoza spent most of 2019 in Germany where he was given the responsibility as captain leading the 70-year-old European soccer team, FCA04 Darmstadt.

Espinoza led his European soccer teammates to win the league title, the first American to accomplish this incredible feat. The team's coach named Espinoza captain because of his emotional intelligence, dedication and honesty.

"I am very proud and fortunate to be named the captain of a very diverse, international team," Espinoza said. "I feel as though this story could motivate young athletes, as well as give positive news to our city in a rather tumultuous time."

Learned to speak two additional languages to raise communication with team

Espinoza explained that the players who make up the FACA04 Team came from a variety of countries: Colombia, USA, Germany, Brazil, Ukraine, Trinidad and Tobago, Grenada,

Educators, political candidates in San Jose declare support for Universal Child Care

School board member says "working families cannot afford rent and childcare"

A coalition of six education leaders and political candidates in San Jose are declaring support for a bold policy proposal for universal child care.

San Jose City Council District 6 candidate Jake Tonkel, San Jose Unified Trustees Teresa Castellanos and Carla Collins, along with County Board of Education candidate Ketzal Gomez, Alum Rock Union Board Vice President Corina Herrera-Loera, and Campbell Union High School District candidate Basil Saleh joined together to call for immediate action to make high-quality childcare available to all in the aftermath of COVID-19.

The coalition is concerned with ensuring that those recently unemployed, along with essential workers struggling during this crisis, can receive childcare services catered to their needs. The economic disparities in San Jose's predominantly Latino and Vietnamese communities, many which predate the pandemic, motivate the coalition's urgency in appealing to

all levels of local government.

Pandemic has put great pressure on parents

"The pandemic has created a situation in which parents and mothers must simultaneously be the worker, the caretaker and the coteacher," said Castellanos. "Universal childcare will provide relief for all the parents who are carrying the weight of this pandemic."

"We have changing needs in our community. Working families cannot afford rent and childcare," said Collins. "Let's meet this moment by investing in success for our families and children in San Jose."

"Our East Side of San Jose is heavily impacted by this pandemic," said Herrera-Loera. "Many of our parents are essential workers with the lowest-paying jobs in our county. Universal childcare will allow our children to be cared for in safe, healthy environments and relieve some of the financial burdens parents face, resulting in their children having greater access to critical needs like food, school supplies, and less stressors so they can focus on education, extracurricular activities, and most of all, being a kid."

"A high-quality, reliable public option for child care ensures equity and prevents raising a family from becoming a luxury," said Saleh. "We must de-commodify child care, something so essential to the financial stability of family units. The united vision of a universal program helps us secure key partnerships between private employers, public agencies, labor groups, child advocates, and school districts."

Other cities are expanding free emergency child care

"There is absolutely precedent for the creation of a citywide program geared toward addressing the needs of underserved communities in our city," said Tonkel. "For example, San Francisco is expanding free emergency child care hours which provide child care for low-income families affected by the pandemic. We must take similar action in San Jose right now and vigorously pursue a child care system that leaves no one behind during reopening. In the process, we will create new and safe job opportunities in the hardest-hit communities which will only accelerate our collective recovery."



\$3M allocated to clean up increased in illegal dumping in San Jose

Officials agree dumping has gotten out of hand since pandemic began

s a result of hundreds of calls and emails to San Jose City leaders, San Jose is pumping an additional \$3 million to clean up the growing blight and illegal dumping mounting in several areas in the city.

San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo and council members Lan Diep, Sergio Jimenez and Dev Davis last week announced a plan to allocate additional monies toward cleaning up the most "highly visible" and "high-traffic" illegal dump sites in the city over the next three months.

"We look forward to having a cleaner community because we know that then we'll have a better chance of attracting tourists again and new businesses as we recover from the economic fallout of COVID-19," Davis said.

The new funding, which would triple the budget within the city's Emergency Operations Center for blight response for the remainder of the year, will be used to hire more contractors and bring back some furloughed city employees to increase clean-ups at "sore spots that have had the greatest impact on residents' perception of their community," the council members' memo states.

Children's Discovery Museum of SJ announces phased re-opening with outdoor play space September 26

New inflatable discovery duck with purple mask now perched on museum's roof

elebrating its 30th anniversary this year, Children's Discovery Museum of San Jose will open Bill's Backyard, the museum's half-acre outdoor play space, on Saturday, September 26.

The opening will be available for museum members only in accordance with the Santa Clara County Public Health Department's Reopening Plan.

The museum will offer two weekends for members' only: September 26 - 27 and October 2 - 4. Bill's Backyard will then welcome all visitors on Friday, October 9, with a three-day a week schedule every Friday, Saturday, and Sunday for the foreseeable future.

Reservations are required for the two play sessions per day: 10:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 – 4:00 p.m., with an hour cleaning break between sessions. A date for reopening the inside of the museum will be announced later this fall.

"A children's museum without children is not a very happy place, so we're beyond excited to welcome back our valued members and then all visitors to Bill's Backyard," said Marilee Jennings, executive director of Children's Discovery Museum of San Jose.

"Families and children can expect the same fun-filled experience that inspires creativity, curiosity, and shrieks of laughter and joy. Our number one priority is to provide a safe and comfortable experience for everyone by applying the latest science with the best practices as outlined by our public health professionals, and with participation and support from our visitors. We know that play is essential to children's healthy development and we're eager to fulfill this role by offering much-needed fun and socialization for families," said Jennings.

To prioritize visitor and staff safety, protocols have been put in place that meet and often exceed the county's mandates. These include a 25% attendance cap, online reservations for contactless ticketing, Plexiglas shields at admissions for staff and visitors,



a mask-requirement for anyone over six years old, per the City of San Jose's ordinance, and additional hand sanitizers.

Space and exhibit modifications have been made and signage in English, Spanish and Vietnamese has been installed to make social distancing easier. The museum's already robust cleaning and disinfecting procedures have been stepped up to include CDC and EPA-recommended products, nano septic tape, and an hour-long cleaning and disinfecting break between morning and afternoon sessions.

New at the museum

Find out what all the buzz is about at the recently installed beehive observation site in the Junior Ranger Station in Bill's Backyard. Visitors can witness the industrious bees hard at work.

Upon reopening, the museum remains committed to equity and inclusion with the continuation of the Museums for All program. This national initiative provides all families the opportunity to visit regardless of ability to pay. Admission is only \$2 per person (regular ticket price is \$15) with the presentation of an electronic benefit card or other specific documentation.

TICKET INFORMATION: Ticket prices for Bill's Backyard are \$5 per child or adult; \$4 for seniors; and museum members are free. This ticket price is reduced from the regular price of \$15 per person while each visit is limited to the museum's outdoor space, Bill's Backyard.





Burglary suspect captured on surveillance camera.

Multiple crimes against Evergreen resident are not being prosecuted by authorities

Follow-up from July 17, 2020 Evergreen Times burglary article (page 8)

vergreen resident Brian was the victim of two bank thefts in March and April 2020.

The funds in Brian's business bank account were fraudulently stolen and following an investigation, the bank subsequently credited back the full amount into the account.

An investigation by the Morgan Hill Police Department (MHPD) resulted in finding the identity of the bank thief. When questioned by MHPD later, the bank thief admitted to taking those funds, yet no prosecution has been initiated.

Just one week after the April bank theft, Brian's Evergreen-San Jose residence was broken into and ransacked. The address was the same address registered on his bank account. This burglary incident was reported by the *Evergreen Times* (see evergreentimes.com) on July 17, 2020.

Upon reviewing the surveillance videos of the burglary, Brian said he recognized the suspect as someone he was very familiar with

"The burglar who broke into my residence was the same person who had also stolen funds from my business bank account," said Brian. "Furthermore, after the burglary article was published, several witnesses have stated that they recognize the burglary suspect from the surveillance videos as the same person who I had recognized previously. Separately, there were also photos found of that person wearing clothing that matched with the one worn by the burglar during the crime."

In a recently publicized Santa Cruz theft case of a firefighter's wallet, a citizen's tip and clothing matching what was shown in surveillance images of the wallet theft suspect were taken into consideration. This led police to apprehend that wallet theft suspect within 48 hours. But for Brian, it has been more than four months.

Multiple witnesses have recognized this burglar, photos were found of clothing matching that worn by the burglar, and this burglary suspect is allegedly the same person involved in the bank thefts. However, authorities have yet to prosecute this criminal.

Last year, Brian's neighbor, who was also a Vietnamese American, was murdered while his home was burglarized. In Brian's case, he arrived home while the burglary was in progress.

"I feel very fortunate to not have been a homicide victim that day," Brian said.

Brian feels that justice has not been served, and public safety is at risk. Brian asked "Is my life, the life of a Vietnamese American living in San Jose, not important enough for authorities to take action? Will it take another Vietnamese American being murdered for authorities to prosecute this criminal?"

Fair Political Practices Commission opens investigation into Assemblyman Kansen Chu's campaign spending

bly District 25, is running for the San-

ta Clara County Board of Supervisors

Assemblyman Kansen Chu (D-San Jose) is being investigated by the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC).

The state watchdog is looking into Chu potentially violating state campaign finance laws, according to a letter from the agency. This is the fourth complaint against Chu investigated by the FPPC.

"These FPPC complaints are often filed by opponents or their supporters solely to generate negative publicity," Chu said. "The timing of the filing is so obvious. Other legislators are also facing audits. "I will fully cooperate with the FPPC's investigation."

Chu, who represents Assembly District 25, is running for the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors District 3 seat against Otto Lee, a former Sunnyvale councilman. Chu said he decided to give up his Assembly seat and run for Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors because "the commute from Sacramento back to the Bay Area has been rough for me and my family.

The complaint, which was submitted in July by former Assemblyman Paul Fong; Evergreen resident, Citizens for Fiscal Responsibility President Pat Waite; former Mil-

pitas Vice Mayor Marsha Grilli; and Democratic Club Sunnyvale board president Mike Serrone, accuses Chu of using his former campaign bank account to circumvent and to help fund his Santa Clara County supervisor campaign.

In the sworn complaint, Fong, Waite, Grilli and Serrone allege that between May 2019 and February 2020, Chu accepted 185 Kansen Chu, who represents Assemdonations to his assembly campaign that were greater than the \$1,000 limit for a District 3 seat against Otto Lee. supervisor campaign. The

board has a donation limit of \$1,000—which is much less than the maximum allowed donation of \$4,700 for state assembly campaigns.

In a July complaint letter to the FPPC, the

group claimed Chu violated campaign laws by using his Assembly campaign committee bank account to "promote his supervisor campaign," including sending a mailer with

COVID-19 safety information to voters in the District 3 supervisor district but outside his Assembly district. The mailer stated it was paid for by Chu's Assembly campaign committee but included his supervisor campaign website ad-

"Chu is promoting himself, he's getting his name out there," Fong said. "He spent \$33,262.84 from his Assembly account to pay for the mailers. This distinction allowed him to skirt fundraising restric-

tions and send misleading mailers to people outside of his assembly district."

Chu denies he acted unethically when he sent the mailers. "There was definitely a miscommunication between myself and the graphic designer when I sent out a COVID-19 resource card that included my supervisor campaign website, Chu said. "I was trying to provide a 'civil service' about the virus and the content of the mailer had nothing to do with my campaign. That was a mistake on my part not to catch the fine print."

Chu said he has already refunded his Assembly account from his supervisor account.

The FPPC complaint also alleges Chu and his wife Daisy "repeatedly underreported travel, food and miscellaneous expenses for their own gain and failed to disclose key information required by the state's Political Re-

Chu claims Fong, Grilli and others who lodged the complaint did so because they support Otto Lee, his opponent for the supervisor seat. "It's just a campaign smear strategy, that's pretty much it," Chu said.

Fong said that he thinks the FPPC made the right decision in deciding to investigate. "Although I support Lee, that's not what's motivated the complaint. Transparency and accountability is really important for our lawmakers and they must be honest about every-





Halloween: Trick-ortreating 'not advised' this year, top California health official says

How much candy should you purchase for Halloween this year?

No one knows for sure, but according to California Health and Human Services Di-



rector Dr. Mark Ghaly, Oct. 31 will "be quite a different Halloween," due to the Coronavirus

'You might wonder, 'Should I pick up a couple of bags of candy, because I am going to anticipate, like I do every year, trick or treaters at the door?" Ghaly said. "Trick or treating — the type of mixing that comes in our traditional trick or treating festivities is really not advised under COVID."

No one is certain whether local health officials plan to prohibit trick-or-treating or allow it with mask-wearing and social distancing. The ultimate rules for the state are expected to be announced by Gov. Gavin Newsom in the coming weeks.

Most counties in California are currently studying the issue. Most health officials are more concerned about large gatherings, especially indoor parties than door to door trick or treating. Researchers report that the risk of contracting COVID outdoors is far lower than indoors.

"I can't see public safety officers handing out tickets to parents or kids who are trick or treating," said Jason Hoppin, a spokesman for Santa Cruz County.

Fantastical primes and where to find them

i everyone! I'm Apoorva, a local highschool sophomore who thoroughly enjoys mathematics (and terrible jokes, as seen from the title).

I've loved math ever since I was a kid and have been involved in math competitions since elementary school. Additionally, I've co-authored two published papers in number theory, and currently have a couple more in the works!

In this new column, I'll be sharing STEM topics I'm excited about, and that I hope will excite you too. Everything written is meant to be fairly accessible with the occasional

advanced details weaved in. Future columns may include interesting social issues in STEM, its intersections with other subjects, and various other topics that are prominent in these fields. I hope you enjoy today's topic!

Why we care about primes

Today, we're going to discuss one of the most popular areas of math: primes! To recap: a prime number is an integer (AKA a whole number like ...,-2,-1,0,1,2,...) greater than one with exactly two divisors: 1 and itself. The first few prime numbers are 2,3,5,7,11,13,17, and so on. 2 is often jokingly called "the oddest prime number," as it's usually an outlier in theorems involving primes.


Okay, so? Why do we care about primes? We care because we can break down all numbers into their prime parts (known as the Fundamental Theorem of Arithmetic).

For example, $60 = 2 \times 2 \times 3 \times 5$. This is called a prime factorization, and is actually unique! Can you convince yourself why?

Now, a natural question arises: how many primes are there? The answer is infinitely many! How do we know this for sure? Well, in order to convince everyone that their conjectures (prospective theorems) are not crazy, mathematicians write proofs. So, let's prove this theorem! First, let's assume we're wrong and that there is a fixed, or finite, number of primes. Let's say there are exactly k primes. We'll put these primes in a set (you can think of it as a non-ordered list): $\{p_1, p_2, p_3, ..., p_k\}$. If we can somehow generate a number that cannot be factored by the primes in this list, we have proved this is an incomplete list of primes, which would show that there is an infinite number of primes. (Think about why this is true.) Continuing on, let's construct the number $n = (p_1 \times p_2 \times ... \times p_k) + 1$. We know that n must have a prime factorization with at least one prime factor. However, n has a remainder of 1 when divided by any of the primes in our list, meaning none of the prime factors of n are in our current list, meaning we cannot construct a finite list of primes. Therefore, there must be infinitely many primes!

Now, things may start to get a little more technical, but I'll try my best to frame it as simply as I can. The next question we can ask is. "How many primes are there that are less than or equal to a number x?" This is a significantly harder question, but still has an answer! First, define the prime counting function $\pi(x)$ as the number of primes less than or equal to x. For example, $\pi(13)$ =6, because we have six primes (2,3,5,7,11,13) that are ≤13. Now, back to our question. The answer to this is known as the Prime Number Theorem, which states that $\pi(x)$ is asymptotic to $\frac{x}{\ln(x)}$, written $\pi(x) \sim \frac{x}{\ln(x)}$ Here ln(x) denotes the natural logarithm of x. (Typically, mathematicians denote the natural logarithm as log(x), but for some reason this isn't the notation used in most schools.) For readers who know some calculus, this asymptotic means that, given functions f(x) and g(x), $f(x) \sim g(x)$ is equivalent to $\lim_{x \to \infty} \frac{f(x)}{g(x)} = 1$.

To understand this better, let's think about it in terms of probability! Suppose we're choosing a random number from the first x numbers. This theorem says that the probability of us choosing a prime number is roughly $\frac{x}{\ln(x)} / x = \frac{1}{\ln(x)}$, or that a number x is prime "with probability" $\frac{1}{\ln(x)}$.



Now I want to leave you with a few questions to think about. We know that there are infinitely many primes, but what if we consider different subsets of primes? Are there infinitely many primes of the form 2^n-1 for integers n>1? Or the form n^2+1 ? These simple-to-state questions about prime distribution are actually currently unsolved. Another popular question is the twin prime conjecture, which states that there are infinitely many pairs of primes that differ by 2. These unsuspecting questions reveal a hard truth: we really don't know a lot about primes! If you're currently thinking, "Well these don't seem that hard," prove one! (And if you do manage to do this, mention me when you receive the Fields

Finally, are you in your prime? Check your age to see! I'm 15, so unfortunately I'm not in my prime (as 15 is not prime), but I am in my semi-prime, $(15=3\times5)$.

one reason to hold on.





New program guides East San Jose parents through online learning with digital tools

s school districts across Silicon Valley extend online learning to stop the spread of COVID-19, one local school district is helping parents — mostly immigrants and communities of color — get comfortable with the technology.

The San Jose Evergreen Community College District began its Parent Academy, a series of courses that train East San Jose parents on digital tools, including Google Drive, Zoom and LinkedIn over the summer. On the first day, dozens of families joined with their children, speaking in English. Spanish and Vietnamese.

"We heard the needs of the parents," said Alexandra Duran, dean of workforce and economic development at the district. "We are enhancing the program as we go because we learn from them."

Duran said the idea for the program emerged from conversations with the school district's parent coordinators in East Side Union High School District, Alum Rock Union School District and Milpitas Unified School District. Roughly 140 parents registered for the program orientation on Wednesday.

According to Duran, 54 percent of parents enrolled in the program do not have a high school diploma.

The district tested its Parent Academy curriculum on a pilot group of 108 parents this summer. Most of the curricula were based on already-existing classes in the district's Workforce Institute course catalog, and parents who participate in the program enroll as non-credit college students and have access to the district's other classes and services.

"Now the parents are saying, 'We love the fact that you're helping us help our children, but we are also going to better our lives,'" Duran said. Following their participation in the program, many parents have asked about how to obtain their GED.

District Chancellor Byron Clift Breland said bringing parents up to speed on essential technologies is crucial to ensuring students remain proficient in math and reading skills — and prepared to enroll in college after finishing high school. About 40 percent of the district's college students live in East San Jose, according to Clift Breland

"We don't know how long we'll be in this environment," Clift Breland said. "We see (the program) as a part of a larger ecosystem of support and encouragement and continuing to keep the pipeline primed."

In addition to teaching software, typing and basic math, program leaders instruct parents on time management and stress reduction techniques, as well as provide tips on how to keep students engaged during homeschooling. Classes are offered in English, Spanish and Vietnamese.

Duran said the district stays in touch with parents who participated in a summer pilot program, conferring with them once a month. Araceli Ortiz, who enrolled in the Parent Academy pilot, said the program enabled her to help other parents learn how to use digital tools.

Maria Martinez said the program helped her guide her son through the curriculum taught by the Jose Valdes Math Institute over the summer.

"Throughout my life here in the USA, no one had ever before offered me this type of class," Martinez said.

The district has scheduled Parent Academy sessions through November 4, and more will be added. Duran said there will be classes in spring.

How do I know when it's time to replace my shocks and struts?

our car's struts and shock absorbers are made to limit the amount of movement you feel while driving and/or stopping and to reinforce the moving components of the suspension.

This means that they are what keep you from hitting your head on the ceiling of your car every time you hit a bump and from vibration while driving on rough roads. Bad shocks and struts affect brakes, tires, and suspension, which are all very important parts on your car. Here are a few signs your car may be warning you that you need to replace the shocks and/ or struts.

Bumpy/Shaky Ride

Your car is designed to comfortably withstand a certain amount of movement, so if you experience bumpiness and/or shakiness while driving, chances are you're driving with bad shocks and/or struts.

Steering & Suspension Problems

Another sign people notice when their car needs new shocks or struts is poor steering response. The steering wheel will often become stiff and hard to turn. There may even be unusual noises when turning the steering wheel. Some cars even sway or lean on turns or when changing lanes. When your shocks and struts are bad they can cause premature failure to your car's suspension components as well.

Braking Issues

When shocks and struts are worn, your car will have to compensate in other ways. You can feel instability while braking and/or you may feel a "lurching forward" motion as well. If this is something you are experiencing it would be a good idea to have your vehicle looked at as soon as possible.

Visually Damaged Shocks & Struts

Typically, shock and strut damage is better felt rather than seen. Physical damage may or may not always be visible. While addressing physical damage, shocks and struts do leak which is also an indication they need to be replaced. Other components on the shocks and struts such as mounts and bushings can also become corroded and/or worn as aging occurs.

Bad shocks and struts can make your tires show uneven or unusual wear, meaning bad shocks and struts wear out your tires!! It's a good idea to have your tires replaced (if needed) or rotated at the same time you replace your shocks.

Mileage

Everyone has their own opinion when it comes to mileage. You should always go based on your manufactures recommendations but in our experience, we'd recommend replacing your shocks and struts somewhere between 50,000 miles to 90,000 miles. Instead of waiting to notice problems, make sure you bring in your ve-



hicle for an oil change. During your oil change, shocks and struts are one of the many things we inspect while we perform a visual inspection on your vehicle. Whether you're noticing problems or nearing a checkup, maintaining shocks and struts can prevent long-term damage. "In exchanging stories about experiences in our respective countries, we were not only able to truly understand life in China, but create lasting bonds with our students through which we continue to create more





Santa Clara County becomes state's first to recognize Juneteenth as a paid holiday

The County of Santa Clara became the first in the State to designate Juneteenth a paid County holiday with a unanimous vote for Supervisor Dave Cortese's proposal at today's Board of Supervisors meeting.

Starting June 19, 2021, Juneteenth will be a paid holiday for County employees to recognize the end of slavery in the U.S., 30 months and 19 days after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863. It wasn't until June 19, 1865, that Union soldiers led by Major General Gordon Granger landed at Galveston, Texas, with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free.

"Designating Juneteenth as a holiday in Santa Clara County is especially significant in the wake of protests over systemic racism here and across the nation," Supervisor Cortese said. "This historic vote recognizes the legacy of injustice to people of color and the work that still remains to ensure that freedom exists for

On August 21, the Board voted to allocate \$2.3 million to be put into a reserve to fund declaring Juneteenth as a County holiday. The final vote makes the holiday

official.

Report: States with most at-risk youth

With about one in nine young Americans today neither working nor in school, exposing them to greater risk of poverty and violence, the personal-finance website WalletHub today released its report on 2020's States with the Most At-Risk Youth, as well as accompanying videos.

To determine where young Americans are not faring as well as others in their age group, especially in a year made extremely stressful by the COVID-19 pandemic, WalletHub compared the 50 states and the District of Columbia across 16 key indicators of youth risk. The data set ranges from share of disconnected youth to labor force participation rate among youth to youth poverty

At-Risk Youth in California (1=Most at Risk; 25=Avg.):

- 20th % of Disconnected Youth
- 35th % of Youth Without a High School Diploma

Evergreen School District approves Black Lives Matter resolution

ast month the Evergreen School District Board of Trustees passed agenda litem 4.7 to create a resolution of support for Black Lives Matter.

The following is the text of the resolu-

Resolution Black Lives Matter

WHEREAS, throughout our nation's history, institutional and structural racism and injustice have led to deepening racial disparities across all sectors of society and have had lasting negative consequences for our communities, cities, and nation;

and WHEREAS, historically, when Black people have fought for a more democratic society, the lives of all people have improved and, conversely, each time barriers to Black people's potential have been erected, our whole society has suffered;

and WHEREAS, the continued and unnecessary loss of Black lives, such as George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, Tony McDade, Nina Pop, and countless others calls upon us to be visible in our outrage and, more importantly, in our resolve to work for change;

and WHEREAS, we are part of a society where the lives of Black, Indigenous, and other People of Color continue to be blighted by structural racism, lack of opportunity, health disparities, and direct violence. San Jose police can continue to use rubber bullets for violent protesters

an Jose police can continue to use rubber bullets for crowd control if people are being violent, despite Mayor Sam Liccardo's push to ban them in crowds altogether after protesters suffered serious injuries during demonstrations against the police killing of George Floyd in May.

Liccardo was the lone dissenter in the City Council's 10-1 decision, with councilmembers saying the safety of officers was at risk. The decision was part of a series of changes to police department policies the council approved September. 15.

The city's previous policy allowed the use of rubber bullets against protestors — violent or peaceful — but was met with backlash by residents and councilmembers, prompting Police Chief Eddie Garcia on June 16 to prohibit the use of rubber bullets as crowd control for nonviolent individuals.

The policy change means police officers can only use rubber bullets when someone is "actively attacking an officer or another person" or poses a threat, according to the police department's manual. In those situations, officers must be sure to "avoid striking unintended subjects."

Officers must use another form of crowd control if the crowds are too dense and an accurate shot can't be made.

But how do officers distinguish between violent and nonviolent protests when faced with large crowds and a highly-contentious situation?

Liccardo said the changes didn't go far enough and pressed for a ban of rubber bullets for all crowd control scenarios, leading to a heated exchange between the mayor and Acting Police Chief Dave Knopf.

"There is a very big distinction between people who are unlawfully present and those who are violent assailants and I think we both know people who are not violent assailants and got hit," Liccardo said. "They may have been unlawfully present but they still got hit."

Knopf said potential harm to bystanders is the exact reason the policy was changed to allow officers to fire only at violent protesters.

"Nothing is perfect," Knopf said, acknowledging that police are responsible for determining if they have a clear shot and sometimes misjudge.

"We need really clear policies so you don't expect people to be perfect in the middle of a chaotic scenario to be able to discern how and when to fire something that is a potentially lethal round," Liccardo said.

Knopf countered by saying rubber bullets are not considered a "lethal round" by the courts

A 2017 study found rubber bullets can be lethal in some cases or at the very least can cause injury. At a May 29 protest, a local musician was left with a black eye, blurry vision and scarring after being hit by a rubber bullet.

"I don't believe that as a council we should

allow for situations that we know are highly likely to cause serious injury or even death to our residents when we see what the evidence is around the country," Liccardo said.

Police officials acknowledged the potential danger posed by the projectiles but worried about officers' inability to defend themselves during protests marked by anger toward law enforcement.

"I'm not going to commit the officers in this department to stand on the line and not be able to defend themselves in a riotous situation," said Knopf. "You need to be prepared to deal with that situation if we can't go in and protect this city from burning when people are lighting things on fire, looting and wanting to take us on."

Alternative methods

Capt. Jason Dwyer said chemical agents such as tear gas and pepper spray, as well as wood batons, are some of the only other realistic alternatives for quelling crowds.

Dwyer said batons can be grabbed by protesters. One of the newly released body cam $\,$

videos from the police department shows an incident where a protester grabbed a baton and a fight ensued.

"We don't want to have that toe-to-toe confrontation," Dywer said. "The officers get attacked too."

As a former police officer, Councilmember Raul Peralez, who pushed for the ban of rubber bullets against peaceful protestors, said he understood the need for officers to have protective tools at their disposal.

"Ultimately, if other tools are ineffective, we should not take away the opportunity of this tool that we know is much less impactful and less lethal than a handgun," Peralez said.

The push to consider a rubber bullet ban began at the request of Liccardo, Peralez, Vice Mayor Chappie Jones and Councilmembers Lan Diep and Magdalena Carrasco following injuries of protesters in May.

Peralez, who now works as a reserve officer, said he was happy with the approved changes.

The City Council also approved other police policies, including the minimum age at which minors can be placed into handcuffs and prohibiting the hiring of people who have tattoos or body art that aligns with hate groups.

Officers will also be barred from covering their badge and will have to provide their name and badge number upon request.

In addition, officers will be prohibited from "no knock entries" where a warrant is required except where evidence is at risk of being destroyed if officers knock.

and Spanish. With time, I was able to speak to the German referees in German, speak Portuguese to my teammates, and effectively use my leadership abilities to their fullest effect."

"Being in a new country without knowing the language or having many native friends was extremely difficult," Espinoza said. "Being away from your family for so long and having little support in close proximity was daunting at times. What helped my psyche were the friends I was able to make. One, Valdrin Tahiri, Kosovo-German, helped immensely, as well as other players on the team."

"We had some difficulties at times with our share of the drama of disorganized aspects. However, the main appeal to being there was the talent of the players," said Espinoza.

"The team's raw talent is so impressive; the soccer club was granted the opportunity to play friendlies against a variety of higher league teams in the 5th Hessenliga division. As a result of winning the title, our team was promoted to a higher league."

Racist altercations

"The opposing teams were sometimes racist in their comments to our team because we were a team of essentially all foreigners," Espinoza explained. "The referees, the opposing fans, and the opposing players would say whatever they could to ease their anger and frustration. It was only magnified by the unsurpassable quality we had on the pitch. Their anger would increase as we would score again and again and again. At first I could not understand their remarks, then once I learned enough German, I would do my best to defend my teammates, who themselves really did not know what was being said, but unfortunately it was appalling at times."

The art of Winning

"Our strong team was the top of the table for the entirety of the season leading up to the league being cancelled due to COVID-19," Espinoza explained. "The most pivotal game was the 17th, and the last one before the winter break. On December 29th, we played against the 2nd place team called Groß Gerau. We were scored on very early in the game around the 1st minute. And all hell broke loose, where the team was ab-

solutely bashing one another in criticism. But as the leader I recognized the situation and focused on playing simply effective soccer. After some time, I began to heavily praise every single motion of my teammates; and as time went on, the moral improved immensely, where we were able to score the tying goal. From an interception I had a long pass to the winger, a cross to the attacking midfielder in the box and a wonderful finish."

"We ended up winning the game with seven minutes left, from a brilliant left footed curler towards the far post. The game extended our lead in the league by 11 points (3 for win 1 for draw 0 for loss). As we celebrated, I heard the chant from our club president, Derby Sieger... "Derby Sieger ay ay," translated to Derby Winner! I knew this would put us in phenomenal position to win the league when it resumed again in March 2020. The season ended up being suspended and finally cancelled. Speculation was looming as to whether the 1st place would be crowned champions, and if the last places would face relegation etc. However, in the end on June 20th 2020, the German Federation announced that FCA04 Darmstadt were the winners of the Kreißoberliga, and gained promotion to the GruppenLiga," stated Espinoza.

Team captain at Whitworth University

At Whitworth University as a Community Health and Psychology double major, Espinoza captained his soccer team to three conference championships and a national ranking each year he attended. After graduation, Espinoza moved to Europe so he could pursue a career in professional soccer.
