is something that makes you breathe with / a different kind of happiness," said Anni Albers, a German-born American textile artist and printmaker.



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
### Take a Trip to the Moon With the Artemis Moon Pod Essay Contest

Take remote learning a little further - as in 250,000 miles further. NASA collaborated with Future Engineers to create the Artemis Moon Pod Essay Contest. Open to U.S. students in grades K through 12, this contest runs through December 17, 2020, challenging participants to imagine leading a one-week expedition to the moon's South Pole.

Every student who submits an essay will receive an official certificate and be invited to a NASA virtual event featuring an astronaut. Semifinalists will be invited to represent their state or territory in a series of Artemis Explorer sessions with NASA experts. Nine finalists will have the opportunity to travel with a parent to NASA's Johnson Space Center next summer to learn about lunar exploration. The national winner in each grade division

will win a family trip to see the Artemis flight test and watch the most-powerful rocket in the world launch from NASA's Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

To enter the contest, students must submit their essay by December 17. The essays will be divided into three groups for judging by grade level, K-4, 5-8, and 9-12. Make sure to check out the full list of contest details, including that your essay should be no more than 100 words (grades K-4); 200 words (grades 5-8); or 300 words (grades 9-12). Students can sign up individually at the contest site or teachers can register the entire class.

### Local Nurses Honored at Virtual Event

The World Health Organization has designated 2020 as the year of the Nurse and Midwife, especially as they are also a large part of the health care worker shortage being experienced around the world. Many local nurses were recently awarded for their outstanding service during a virtual ceremony by The Kern County Chapter of the Association of California Nurse Leaders (KCACNL). Ten scholarship recipients were also presented \$1,000 each.



### California Dispatchers Become First Responders Under New Law

Assembly member Rudy Salas' AB 1945, which recognizes the heroic work of public safety dispatchers by reclassifying them as first responders, was recently signed into law by Governor Gavin Newsom after passing the Legislature with unanimous bipartisan support.



"This is a historic day for the thousands of emergency dispatchers who call California home," Salas says. "For years, dispatchers have been misclassified under titles that do not reflect the importance of the life-saving work they

perform every day. As wildfires ravage our state, the work of dispatchers coordinating emergency responses has never been more critical. I want to thank the Governor for signing this important bill, and I hope that other states will join the movement to properly reclassify their dispatchers. Our country depends on the incredible work of our emergency dispatchers who are the first to respond during a crisis and the last voice we hear on the phone.

California dispatchers answer approximately 27 million 911 calls per year. Public safety dispatchers play a vital role in the state's emergency response chain which extends far beyond dispatching calls for peace officers and firefighters. Dispatchers are often responsible for being the first to respond during life-threatening accidents, wildfires, active shooter situations, and potential suicides.

### Adults - Get Current On Your Immunizations

Three million lives are saved worldwide each year because of immunizations, but 68% of adults worldwide are not up-to-date on theirs. Only 44% of Americans get a yearly flu shot, and only 27% have had a Tdap vaccine and/or the booster, which protects against tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis. ### October is National Bullying Prevention Awareness Month: Know the Signs of Bullying

Despite the best efforts of educators and parents, bullying is a problem at many schools. According to StopBullying.gov, an official website of the United States government, as many as one in three American students say they have been bullied at school.

Bullied students often suffer in silence. As a result, the onus is on parents to learn the signs that a child is a victim of bullying. Such signs are not always easy to recognize, as StopBullying.gov notes that the most common types of bullying are verbal and social. Physical bullying happens less often, so kids who are being bullied may not exhibit physical symptoms like bruises or unexplained injuries, which are common indicators of physical bullying.



By learning the common signs of bullying, parents are in better position to recognize when their children are being bullied, whether that bullying is physical, social or verbal.

### SIGNS OF BULLYING

There are many signs of bullying and kids may not exhibit them all. In fact, StopBullying.gov notes that some bullied children exhibit no warning signs. So in addition to learning these signs of bullying, parents can make a concerted effort to communicate with their children ev-



ery day, asking youngsters about how their day went and if they encountered anything that adversely affected their mood.

- · Unexplainable injuries
- · Lost or destroyed clothing, books, electronics, or jewelry
- · Frequent headaches or stomach aches, feeling sick or faking illness
- Changes in eating habits, like suddenly skipping meals or binge eating. Kids may come home from school hungry because they did not eat lunch.
- · Difficulty sleeping or frequent nightmares
- Declining grades, loss of interest in schoolwork, or not wanting to go to school
- · Sudden loss of friends or avoidance of social situations
- · Feelings of helplessness or decreased self-esteem
- Self-destructive behaviors, such as running away from home, harming themselves, or talking about suicide

Parents are urged to report any concerns about bullying to educators immediately, as research indicates bullying can lead to or worsen feelings of isolation, rejection, exclusion, and despair. Bullying also can lead to or worsen feelings of depression and anxiety, which can contribute to suicidal behavior.

### It's Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Breast cancer affects millions of women across the globe every year. According to the World Health Organization, breast cancer is the most frequent cancer among women, affecting 2.1 million women each year. As daunting as that may seem, the WHO also notes that early diagnosis can greatly reduce a woman's risk of dying from breast cancer.



omen can be proactive in the fight against  ${\cal N}$  breast cancer by learning to identify early warning signs of the disease. The nonprofit breast cancer advocacy organization Susan G. Komen® notes that the warning signs for breast cancer are not the same for all women, but the most common signs include a change in the look or feel of the breast or a change in the look or feel of the nipple. A discharge from the nipple is another common warning sign of breast cancer.

Physical changes in the breast can vary, but Susan G. Komen® advises women who notice these changes to bring them to the attention of their physicians immediately:

- Lump, hard knot or thickening inside of the breast or underarm area
- · Change in the size or shape of the breast
- · Swelling, warmth, redness or darkening of the
- · Dimpling or puckering of the skin

Women with breast cancer also may notice physical changes in their nipples, including:

- · Itchy, scaly sore or rash on the nipple
- · Pulling in of the nipple or other parts of the breast

It's important that women recognize that physical changes in their breasts are not necessarily indicative of breast cancer. In fact, the American Breast Cancer Foundation notes that not all lumps in the breast cause cancer and that many such lumps are benign. Fibroadenomas and intraductal papillomas are examples of benign lumps, though it's important to note that even benign conditions such as these may put women at greater risk of developing breast cancer.

Susan G. Komen® notes that breast tissue naturally has a lumpy texture. If lumpiness can be felt throughout the breast and it feels like your other breast, then it's likely that this is just the normal texture of your breasts. However, women concerned by a lump or lumpy texture are urged to discuss those concerns with their physicians immediately.

Discharge from the nipple is another potential sign of breast cancer, but Susan G. Komen® notes that such discharge is rarely a sign of cancer. Discharges that occur without squeezing the nipple, occur in only one breast or are bloody or clear are potentially indicative of more serious conditions, including breast cancer.

Breast cancer is a formidable foe. But women who arm themselves with knowledge of the disease, including its early warning signs, are in better position to overcome it.

The 5th annual Farm to Table(aux) fundraising event benefitting the Boys & Girls Clubs of Kern County (BGCKC) is going virtual on Friday, October 9 at 6:30 p.m. and will feature America's illustrator Norman Rockwell.

Farm to Table(aux) has been a premier experience since its inception in 2016, known for its fresh local foods, artworks created by kids that attend the Clubs, silent auction, raffle items, and an exciting live auction. A free registration option is available to anyone from September 30 through October 9 at www.event.gives/farmtotableauxbako.

Although a virtual format requires some logistical maneuvering, Zane Smith, executive director of BGCKC, says all the unique elements will remain intact, including culinary options from Lisa Borda Petit Catering available to the sponsors and VIP ticket holders. Smith, along with his wife, Amy, friends, and event artists will be having a DIY viewing party at the Bakersfield Museum of Art, while maintaining safe and social distancing guidelines.

"Virtual fundraising is so different, but I am confident that our team can do this. We have had 4  $\frac{1}{2}$  months of training and had tickets to other virtual events to see what was working and what wasn't working," Smith says. "I love to see the generous spirit that comes into play in support of our kids."

The night will consist of a live streaming feed showing the artistry behind the event, with some video-taped segments featuring Club members. At a production studio, actors and artists will be acting out four different tableaux vivants representing Norman Rockwell's famous cover illustrations from The Saturday Evening Post magazine. Also, participants will be able to bid on trips, virtual cooking classes, Kidz Art, and incredible silent auction items through the online event website.

Farm to Table(aux) comes alive Friday, October 9 at 6:30 p.m. Register between Sept. 30-Oct. 9 at event.gives/farmtotableauxbako

The Club members from the Kidz Art program have been working really hard to have their personal art ready for the event. The 35 pieces for sale are influenced by Norman Rockwell's Americana style and the 1940s/50s era include landscapes, cows, farmhouses, pigs, and a pastel horse signature painting entitled "Happy Horse," by 15-year-old Lordes.

During the night, taped segments will include two musical numbers by Club members from the performing group, Music Fusion. They will perform "For Good," from the Broadway musical Wicked, and "Celebration," from Kool and The Gang.

Smith enjoys seeing the Club members put in so much time and effort for this event. "I feel amazed that a 15-year-old can do this and be inspired to create this art and then donate back to their own program," he says.

Smith says seeing the art come to life is one of his favorite parts of the event. The four tableaux vivants of Norman Rockwell's cover illustrations









from The Saturday Evening Post magazine include his Triple Self-portrait, 1960; Rosie the Riveter, 1943; The Runaway, 1958; and Girl at the Mirror, 1954. Each living painting is done by individual local artists and styled by Cat Web.

As featured on KCFM's cover this month, Rosie the Riveter, played by actress Charlotte Smith, who also happens to be Zane Smith's daughter, is in perfect character showing American pride and ingenuity. She will be donning this persona again during the event to present the live painting by Belinda Rickett.

Charlotte felt strong posing as Rosie and was so happy with how it turned out. "It was amazing," she says. "I felt strong in posing like that and representing her, especially right now when women's independence is such a huge thing. And with the Boys & Girls Club, I loved representing her as a role model because that is so important to the kids."


The Runaway will feature a perfectly detailed soda fountain complete with actors playing

the police officer and little boy. This painting features art by Jesus Fidel. The live production of Girl at the Mirror will showcase a little girl with art by Taya Marroquin.

Another live painting is one of the most famous self-portraits in American art, Triple Self-Portrait, and features a Norman Rockwell look-a-like actor with a painting by Marj Dow. This cover was the first time the artist put his likeness on the magazine's cover in a capacity other than just as a cameo.

Benefitting the BGCKC, this event helps cover costs for 92 percent of the 8,000 Club members that participate in programs daily. With 63 Clubs and school sites in Arvin, Bakersfield, Frazier Park, Lake Isabella, Lamont, Shafter, and Wasco, the Club provides services and programs to benefit the growth and success of the country's future leaders.

### 11 Ways to Connect with Community this Autumn

Host a virtual potluck: Leverage relationships with your friends or neighbors and hold a dish exchange. Share a favorite recipe by leaving it on the doorstep at a designated time, ring the bell and let another family enjoy a new dish. Go home and see what's on your stoop. If wine is more your style, leave a surprise bottle for a friend who shares the affinity.

Improvise for Halloween: Trick or treating may not happen this year but you could host your own candy scavenger hunt with social distancing in mind.

Tune in for a virtual concert or worship service: Many universities, theaters, and even churches are offering shared experiences via Zoom. A concert can help you enjoy something new, and church may be even more spiritual and personal from within the privacy of your own

### Hello Mama!

How are you doing during these crazy Covid days? When I'm asked that question, I tend to respond, "Just living my best pandemic life." Honestly, what else can you say? So far 2020 has thrown us into a constant roller coaster of challenges. We are constantly being fed negative headlines on the news, social media, even in conversations between friends and family. You've heard the saying, "You are what you eat." Well, I believe that also applies to what we consume for our mind: what we read, share, and speak. I recently came across a post on Facebook that stopped my scroll and touched my heart:

"I learned a long time ago to not see the world through the printed headlines, I see the world through the people that surround me. I see the world with the realization that we love big. Therefore, I just choose to write my own headlines. "Husband loves wife today." "Family drops everything to come to Grandma's bedside." He patted my hand. "Old man makes new friend."

Wow, that really says so much. It seems easier to focus on the fear, the negative narrative, and the crisis headlines. But what if we focus on the headlines that really matter?

So, what's my headline, you ask?

### "Happy Mama Spends Quality Time with Her Family."

### PUMPKIN CARVING TRICKS

- Start with a fresh pumpkin. Look for pumpkins that have a thick, green stem. These usually are fresh and haven't been handled much. A thick stem also may indicate fleshier pumpkin walls that can be carved more easily. Avoid pumpkins that are soft or full of blemishes, or those that have dried, shriveled stems.
- Cut a hole in the back. Rather than impeding the structural integrity of the pumpkin by cutting off the top and the stem for interior access, cut a hole in the back of the pumpkin. This will still make it easy to reach inside and clean out the pumpkin.
- Scoop out the pulp and seeds. Be sure to thoroughly clean the inside of the pumpkin. Leaving the pulpy, stringy matter and seeds inside can cause the pumpkin to rot that much faster and produce a foul odor. Scoopers, spoons and even hand shovels can help.
- **Keep it cool**. Heat can adversely affect carved pumpkins, so work in a cool area and store the pumpkin in a cold garage or refrigerator if you need a few extra days before displaying it. Also, carving experts suggest using an electric light inside rather than a candle; by

using a candle, you're essentially cooking the pumpkin from the inside.

Work in your lap.

When carving faces or intricate designs, looking down onto the pumpkin provides more control.

- Don't cut all the way through. Many pumpkin designers end up shaving or scraping off the outer rind of the pumpkin, but leave a delicate orange film underneath. Light can still shine through, but the design will not collapse on itself as easily if you were to cut straight through the pumpkin wall. Experiment with different tools to achieve the desired look.
- Maintain the freshness. Rubbing exposed areas of the pumpkin flesh with petroleum jelly may help keep the pumpkin moist. Some designs will last for a few days. However, since pumpkins are highly perishable, it's wise to wait to carve until a day or two before putting a pumpkin on display.

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


