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Palmer 'humbled' by District One support received in council race

When David Palmer heard who his opponents would be in this year's race for Russellville City Council District One, Palmer knew he'd be in for a close one.

With former candidate Terry Bolton and political newcomer Aaron Harbin also on the ballot, Palmer was correct.

After Palmer and Harbin advanced to the October 6th runoff, the two-term councilman survived a close race and defeated Harbin by a 319-295 vote margin. Palmer won the Russellville High School box Tuesday 283-281, and his absentee vote margin over Harbin was 36-14.

Russellville Electric Board warns customers of telephone scam

The Russellville Electric Board is sending out warnings to its customers about a telephone scam regarding utility bills.

Charlie Canida, REB General Manager, said several customers have contacted his office questioning phone calls they received from someone claiming to be a representative with the Russellville Electric Board.

The caller informs the person their utility bill is past due and either their payment was denied, or never received. The next step is the caller demands immediate payment and

threatens to terminate service if the customer does not take care of the payment.

"We have not, and do not, make telephone calls for solicitation of payment of utility bills," Canida said. "This is a scam and anyone who receives such a call claiming to be associated with the Russellville Electric Board needs to know we would never make such a call."

The scammer attempts to have the victim pay for their past due bill with a credit card or bank account, or through the purchase of a money card they will send to the scammer.


If any REB customer receives a call from someone telling them their

power bill is past due and their service will be disconnected, hang up and contact local law enforcement to report the call.

The policy of the Russellville Electric Board is to never request any confidential, personal financial information from its customers. You should only provide this information if you visit REB directly to make a payment.

"We certainly want our customers to know about scams in our service area," Canida said. "You should always be safe and know not to give anyone who contacts you credit card or bank information over the phone.

"You can always contact our office at 256-332-3850 to report such a call," he added.

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Penalty-free tag renewal extended through October 15th

The frustration was evident in Janet Stokes' voice.

As the Belgreen resident stood in line Wednesday morning waiting to enter the Franklin County Courthouse and renew her daughter's vehicle registration, she was not only frustrated about the long line, but also the

fact that if the tag wasn't renewed Wednesday, the final day of the month, there would be a penalty added.

Although it still took a couple hours to get through the line, Stokes and Franklin County residents received some good news Wednesday as Revenue

Commissioner Veronica Stancil received approval from State of Alabama Auditors to waive the penalty for September tag renewals through October 15, 2020.

Long lines began to form outside the court-house after the Revenue Commissioner's Office motor vehicle registration computer system crashed on August 27th.

The computer system

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has a backup in place and employees in the tag office received confirmation that day the backup was working properly, but after the crash it could not be accessed.

"The system told us each day we had good backups so we relied on that in the event of any problems," Stancil said. "After the crash, the data recovery company was not able to retrieve it. Our vendor is writing a program to get that information back from the state but we're not sure when that will be complete."

The system crash meant tag office employees have no access to any vehicle records, owner information, proof of insurance and the courtesy reminder cards that are sent out one month in advance were not sent out to residents whose tags were due for renewal in October.

And some September renewals, like Stokes' daughter, didn't receive cards either.

"People didn't get notice the bills were due and they are still making them pay a penalty," Stokes said. "I don't think we should have to pay a penalty because their system had problems.

"They put it off months and months and waived late fees because of COVID-19, but not for this. That means people have no choice but to wait in long lines with no social distancing for hours and hours."

The concerns of Stokes and others were heard by Stancil, who spent much of Wednesday working to get permission to waive those penalties.

Residents whose tags are due for renewal in October are those whose last names begin with U,V,W,X,Y and Z.

When the computer system is working properly, a tag renewal takes less than three minutes, Stancil said. Tag office employees are now having to input everything from scratch, and must review applicants' drivers licenses, proof of insurance and previous year's motor vehicle registration in order to process the renewal. That can take up to 10 minutes or more, and as the end of the month neared, lines grew longer.

The line for motor vehicle registration and renewals forms to the right side of the courthouse when looking at the building from North Jackson Avenue. Residents with business in the Franklin County Probate and Circuit Clerk's

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

Franklin County Probate Judge Barry Moore said the motor vehicle computer system crashed and it was not the result of any hacking or cyber

"No information was compromised in any way. It's just the server that went down. It's an unfortunate thing and an inconvenience for the public, but we're working through it as quickly as possible," Moore said.

Residents whose tags are due in October still must come in to renew them by October 31, even if they do not receive the renewal notices in the mail, Stancil said. She is working to see if penalties for October may also be waived subject to the approval of state auditors.

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Woodruff ready to move District Two forward after runoff win

It may take a village to raise a child, but it takes a district to win a city council election, and Darren Woodruff found that out en route to winning his bid for Russellville City Council District Two in the October 6th runoff.

Woodruff, who faced three-term incumbent councilman William Nale, credted the people of District Two for embracing his message of change. Woodruff defeated Nale 238-193 votes in what was called a runoff election, but actually was a repeat of the August 25th election between the same two men. The first election ended in a tie. Alabama law provides in the event of a tie in a municipal election, the same candidates run again.

Nale garnered the most votes at the polling place, 154-152, but Woodruff's advantage in absentee votes, 86-39, provided his winning edge.

"I want to thank the people of District Two for their support in this campaign," Woodruff said. "Alone, it's difficult for one person to create change. Together though, we can do amazing things.

"Regardless of where you stood in this campaign, today marks a new beginning. I look forward to representing all the citizens of District Two in the next four years," he added.

Woodruff will take office at the first meeting of the Russellville City Council

For Nale, Tuesday's loss marked the end of his long tenure serving the City of Russellville. Nale began his 32-year law enforcement career in 1972 with the Russellville Police Department. His first term on the council began in

Nale said he's proud of the city's progress and growth during this tenure. "We've seen lots of paving projects completed, and an unprecedented amount the last eight years," Nale said. "We've seen continued growth in

our businesses. Just look at the four-lane. We're still seeing that growth and I think that will continue."

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

Belgreen takes home first-ever Franklin County volleyball tournament title

THARPTOWN - While college football was taking over most of the attention last Saturday, there was history being made inside the Tharptown gymnasium.

As a long day of volleyball came to a close, the Belgreen Bulldogs were hoisting the first-ever Franklin County volleyball championship trophy after defeating first-year program Red Bay and then long-time rival Tharptown in the championship game.

After beating Red Bay 25-10 and 25-16, Belgreen clinched the title by sweeping Tharptown in two straight sets 25-15 and 25-22.

For head coach Susie Tverberg, who has been a staple of coaching in Franklin County for many years, the fact that a volleyball tournament could finally take place within the county has been a dream in the making for quite some time.

"I remember when Tharptown got the first team in the county and my daughter was a part of that first team. It was fun and we were hoping that more schools would jump on board and now we had us and Red Bay so it's been a growing process and a learning process at the same time," Tverberg said. "I'm glad that these girls get to go through this because the softball county tournament is fun and the basketball county tournament is fun and now we get to have fun in the volleyball county tournament as well."

One of the major reasons that the Bulldogs have been so dominant this season has been due to the play of senior hitter Emma Dempsey, combined with a wide depth of players that Tverberg is able to cycle in and out in any given scenario.

HATTON - If you're a fan of football, boy is this the week for you.

You have not one, but two matchups between schools ranked at number two and number three-at two different levels of competition.

On Saturday you have Alabama taking on Georgia and while that game will have more eyes on it, there's one local game that just might match the energy and intensity of any college football game that will be played this weekend.

Red Bay and Mars Hill, who are currently ranked number three and number two according to the Alabama Sports Writers Association, will square off this Friday night in what has long been deemed as one of the premier high school matchups of 2020.

As the Tigers and Panthers meet up on Friday night, the playoff implications are massive.

For Red Bay, the outcome could determine whether the Tigers play for the region title next

week and secure the number one seed going into the playoffs or if the Tigers drop all the way to the third seed in their region(depending on the outcome of their matchup with Colbert County next Friday)

However, you don't have to explain the implications of this Friday night's game to Red Bay head coach Michael Jackson twice.

"It's a huge game. It's probably like the region championship game for them because we've got Colbert County the following week that could factor into the mix. The number two and number three teams going up against one another is huge. Especially when you're playing against a team that's won as many games as Mars Hill has," Jackson said.

But before Jackson and the Tigers could turn their focus towards Mars Hill, they had to take care of region-rival Hatton to secure the stakes for the matchup this Friday night.

As the offense was slow to find its footing against a sound Hatton defense, things finally got rolling

late in the second quarter courtesy of the ground game for the Tigers. The slow start didn't cause much concern for Jackson and his staff.

"Hatton always plays us really well and the things that we're doing right now takes some time to wear down the other team. In the first quarter both teams are fresh and when you're playing a team like Hatton that had some bigger guys and it took us a little while to get going there and then we made a couple of big plays and it really snowballed from there and got us going," Jackson said.

Two of those aforementioned big plays came courtesy of senior standout Jalen Vinson who connected with receiver Mason Holt twice, once for 74 yards and once for 55 yards which both resulted in touchdowns for the Tigers.

Establishing that rugged-style of run game while controlling the pace of the game is going to be key for Red Bay this Friday night as they'll go head-to-head with a Panther defense that is allowing just 16 points per game.

"The number one thing for us, is to take care of the ball. When you're playing games like this you have to minimize your mistakes and you can't give teams like Mars Hill advantageous situations because they're too good as capitalizing on mistakes," Jackson said. "So we've got to control the tempo of the game and limit our mistakes. These are two very good defensive teams and we rely on that defense so we've got to make sure not to put those guys in a bad spot."

On the flip side for Red Bay, who boasts a defense allowing just nine points per game this season, this will undoubtedly be the toughest matchup for a Tigers defense that will go up against a Mars Hill offensive line that boasts

multiple college-ready linemen.

Much like the philosophy when it comes to his offense, Jackson stresses the importance of limiting mistakes and remaining self-disciplined through four quarters on the defensive side of the ball.

"The key is for us to be disciplined. They (Mars Hill) execute their things very well so you've got to be disciplined and do your job. They've got a lot of talent up front and some good skill guys and with that kind of talent, you've got to take care of your responsibilities, minimize your mistakes on defense because this is the best offensive we've played since Fyffe last season," Jackson said.


Dempsey, who is approaching the 1,000th kill mark for her volleyball career, ed the Lady Bulldogs with 32 kills and six aces in the tournament.

Having a player like Dempsey, combined with the amount of depth that the Bulldogs possess is one reason that the Belgreen was holding the trophy at the end of the day Saturday.

"It's big having a player like Emma. It's really hard to play her hits and she does a really good job. But we also have players like Makayla Lane who is another one of our hitters and sees the floor as well as anyone that we've played. We also have Kelsey Lane who has been fantastic for us. Emma is a really good player but without these girls to help out and take some of the pressure off of her is huge," Tverberg said.

For Dempsey, winning the first-ever county title is something she says means even more with it being her senior season. "It feels good because to win it all is one thing but to win the very first one and to do it in my senior season is really special. It's like this is my first county tournament and my last one at the same time so it's really special," said.

Belgreen will now turn their attention towards the area tournament which begins Tuesday. The Bulldogs will be the number one seed in the class 1A. area 14 tournament.


