Organic Mushroom Farm program promotes healthier eating


new program has been implemented as part of a new national effort to teach students the origin of food and promote healthier eating.



Almaden Country School introduces 'Relax' class for middle school students

magine walking into a classroom, hearing calming music float through the air and being able to choose between meditating, journaling or drawing for 10 minutes.

This was the scene in Mrs. Chung's "Relax" elective for middle school students at Almaden Country School last trimester.

The students met four times week, spending two days on academic work and the other days doing yoga or tai chi.

Mrs. Chung got the idea for the class when she was chatting with some students and a one of them jokingly suggested a class where students could nap. The innovative teacher thought, 'why not?' and Relax came into being.

"I'm a big fan of the saying, 'Give the man a fish and he eats for a day; teach the man to fish and eats for a lifetime,'" said Mrs. Chung. "I wanted to create a class that would help teach students ways to relieve stress."

According to a Stress in America survey by the American Psychological Association, more than a quarter (27%) of teens felt "extreme stress" in the past school year. The report is chock-full of statistics about how the lives of teens are affected by stress in nearly every aspect of their life.

So Mrs. Chung decided to do something about it.

The curriculum included learning about what stress does to the body, helping students develop healthy strategies for managing stress and getting exposed to yoga, tai chi, deep breathing and meditation.

A highlight of the class was an introduction to Zentangle, an easy-to-learn, relaxing, and fun way to create beautiful images by drawing structured patterns. It has also been referred to as "meditative art," which is why Mrs. Chung was excited to have Dr. Colleen Wilcox give a three-day workshop to the children.

"I think there was probably more tangle than zen on some days," laughed Dr. Wilcox. "But in all seriousness, teenage stress is a very real problem and as a former educator I understand the importance of giving students tools to help them manage their stressful lives."

This was the first time the class was offered

but it has received rave reviews from students, parents and administrators alike. It fits perfectly with the school's focus on the whole child and their mission of discovering the gifts in every student.

"Relaxing, deep breathing, learning Zentangle, making playdough, going to the park. Who wouldn't want to be in this class?" wrote one 7th grade student in a reflective paper. "This class has helped me so much. From learning about what causes stress and how to fix it, to letting loose and having fun!"

Almaden Country School is a nonsectarian south San Jose independent school that offers programs for students from 4 years of age through 8th grade. This highly regarded school, which has nearly 400 students, believes that each child has unique capabilities and talents. In its 34th year of discovering the gifts in every child, ACS offers a Character & Competence program for developing strong, ethical leaders; small class sizes; a broad and challenging curriculum; and passionate teachers who share a genuine love of children.

Underprivileged kids taught computer programming at non-profit Kidz Kode

idz Kode teaches underprivileged kids computer programming as a way to give back to the community.

Kidz Kode, the brain-child of three High School Juniors attending Harker School, Varun Baldwa, Parth Padurkar, and Kedar Gupta, was founded to help children think like programmers, allowing them to solve a multitude of problems efficiently.

The non-profit organization is a free program for children ages 9-14 to help master basic logic skills and build strong foundations in computer programming.

The curriculum is designed in a way such that children can start at a comfortable place and learn the material at their own pace.

The Kidz Kode team has been teaching Java language programming at a number of libraries to kids who cannot afford computer instruction. They spend countless hours helping children and in the process discovered what it means to give back to the community and also influence upcoming high schooler at their own school to get involved and scale a beneficial cause.

The Kidz Kode program is now available at four libraries. "San Jose libraries have been extremely dedicated to Kidz Kode, providing us with all the resources we need to run the program, said Baldwa. "Kidz Kode would not be where it is now without their generosity."

"We were inspired to start the program after taking computer science classes at school, wishing to have started coding earlier in our lives" said Gupta. "We thought that Kidz Kode would be the best way to expose children to programming before high school."

"The kids absolutely love receiving their graduation certificates at the end of the course, since they realize how far they've come since the beginning of the course," said Gupta.

Kidz Kode is not only looking for students but also high school volunteers with programming experience in Java. "We're looking forward to expanding our curriculum and preparing to make the program more approachable for underprivileged children, said Padurkar."




