# Wahl streams culture into companies


Throughout her career, Wahl also has witnessed the power of mentors. While at Dev Technology, she created a successful, powerful, and impactful mentorship






















































# LTC gets training grants

Lakeshore Technical College has received two competitive grants totaling \$750,000 to support training for students and community members involved in carrying out emergency response activities.

Lakeshore received the funds through its membership in the Midwest Consortium for Hazardous Waste Worker Training.

"We are pleased to receive this funding in support of the critical safety training we provide to students in our emergency response programs and emergency responders currently working in our community," said Lakeshore President Dr. Paul Carlsen.

A five-year award of \$740,000 will be distributed through annual \$148,000 payments to Lakeshore. The funding will support curriculum development, technical and administrative support, and delivery of hazardous waste worker training programs, as well as purchases including air monitoring and confined space rescue equipment. In addition, a training equipment storage trailer—which allows Lakeshore to deliver courses off campus to local businesses and organizations—will be replaced.

A \$10,000 grant will fund development and delivery of training related to CO-VID-19. Those who will receive training include students in LTC's criminal justice, fire, and emergency medical services programs, as well as emergency response team members in the LTC district. Funding also will go toward purchasing personal protective equipment (PPE), cleaning supplies, and other materials required for training.

The Midwest Consortium for Hazardous Waste Worker Training has been receiving funding through the National Institutes of Health since 1992. Others in the 13-member consortium include the University of Illinois, University of Cincinnati, and Emergency Response Solutions International.

Each year more than 10,000 people enroll in courses at Lakeshore Technical College. They rely on LTC for job preparation, to earn a degree, upgrade a specialized skill, train as an apprentice, or seek a high school equivalency.

LTC is a nationally recognized technical college. The college was ranked the #2 two-year college in the nation for adult learners by Washington Monthly, #20 in the nation for two-year college educational outcomes by Wallet Hub.com, a top-150 two-year college for the fifth consecutive time by the Aspen Institute, and a top 10 Bellwether Award finalist for two consecutive years.

Approximately 800 students graduate from LTC each year, and LTC's associate degree graduates earn a median salary of \$42,000 per year.





# Administrator gives COVID update

Dear ELGS Community,

Nov. 2 marked the end of the first quarter for the ELG School District, during which we were able to maintain in-person instruction for our students the entire time.

Every day staff and students rise to the challenge as all work hard to balance keeping students and staff safe with providing the best possible educational experience paired with an outlet to meet emotional and social needs. We believe being able to learn on-site is the absolute best plan for the majority of our students, and we continue to work hard to achieve that in a safe way.

As been reported in the news, especially during this current month, the number of positive COVID-19 cases has risen dramatically in the state. This is also reflective of Sheboygan County. While we have had positive cases at each of our building levels since the beginning of the school year, we have been fortunate to be able to keep the number of identified close contacts to a small number, and at times, to none at all. Credit must be given to our staff, the building administration and to our students. They all want very much to remain on-site, so they are following the protocols and procedures put in place to make this happen. Because we have a smaller school population, we have the ability to social distance in most of the school settings. This ability to social distance has really helped to minimize the number of students and staff who need to be quarantined as a result of being identified as a close contact to an eventu-

al positive case at school. However, this is not possible in all situations. We are doing all we can to provide a COVIDsafe environment, but realistically cannot guarantee it to be COVID-free.

Beginning with our first case, each incident involving a positive case of a student and/or staff member has been analyzed to identify further practices that could possibly be implemented to mitigate the spread of the virus within our school and also to minimize the number of students/staff who are exposed to, and identified, as close contacts (within a six-foot distance of a person who tested positive for more than 15 minutes in a 24-hour period during the school day). Taking each case as a "learning" experience has helped us improve on the practices we had already put in place. We knew going into this year there was going to be a "learning curve" as much of the information we know about the virus changes as more is learned and shared. As such, we need to remain flexible in our approach at school.

However, keeping our students and staff safe while at school accounts for only a small part of the total hours of their day. What we are finding is the majority of our positive cases and the identification of close contacts that need to be quarantined are NOT happening due to exposure at school, but from contacts outside the school day—from family contacts and/or those from friends, relatives, social events, etc. If we want to continue to have our staff teach and students learn on-site, as a community we need to do all we can to help

# Letter emphasizes safety steps

Education leaders throughout Sheboygan County recently joined in sending a letter to area families urging cooperation in trying to curb the spread of COVID-19.

Portions of the letter said, "COV-ID-19 has uprooted lives and regular routines. It has made life more difficult practically, financially and emotionally for many, if not all families....

"Since the beginning of the school year, the Sheboygan County community at large has seen a 365 percent increase in COVID-19 cases and is now experiencing an average of 105 new active cases a day over the past two weeks with a case rate of 1,461.8 per 100,000 residents. As of Oct. 20, our local hospital systems reported approximately 80 percent capacity of hospital bed use and 83 percent of our ICU beds were in use....

"We implore our communities to diligently and vigilantly follow health and safety guidelines. Social distancing, avoiding large group gatherings, face coverings and frequent hand washing are key components for maintaining instruction inside of our schools.... We all need to do our part."

stop the spread of this disease. To us at school, this is not political—it is practical and it is necessary. We need everyone to practice those things that have been encouraged to help slow the spread washing hands; limiting social gatherings and practicing social distancing; staying home when sick; wearing masks/ facial coverings; and for our parents, keeping school updated on health situations involving students who are showing symptoms, are quarantined, and/or tested positive.

While we may not be able to affect the rates in the state, by working together, we can help affect the rates for those who make up the ELG School District community.

Together, our choices can help make a huge impact on our students. ELGS

is not alone in this plea for cooperation from the larger community. Please find included in this edition a letter for your review written in cooperation with the Sheboygan County Division of Public Health and endorsed by Sheboygan County educational leaders representing public and private schools and institutions of higher education.

Working together, we can make a positive difference. We want to continue to keep our schools and Child Care open for our staff and teachers—and also our area business/community partners! Your cooperation, support, and any/all efforts to do so would be so very much appreci-







# Lakeland breaks ground on residence hall project

Lakeland University broke ground Oct. record incoming classes on LU's main 15 on the largest single investment in the main campus in the institution's 158-year history.

In April, Lakeland learned it received a \$35.4 million fixed-rate low interest loan from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development division. Lakeland will use \$26 million to construct two new residence halls to serve freshman and sophomores, a water tower and related infrastructure. The remaining \$9.4 million will be used to refinance the university's existing long-term debt.

Lakeland is the only college/university to receive a USDA loan this year. USDA officials noted that a primary reason Lakeland secured the loan was its innovative Cooperative Education program, which offers students in all academic programs the ability to work full- and part-time jobs at partner companies and organizations while also providing students with a way to reduce or eliminate post-graduation tuition debt.

Co-Op has been a primary driver for

campus the last three falls.

The two new, identical residence halls will be located on the area south of the Younger Family Campus Center on the sites currently occupied by decades-old Grosshuesch and Muehlmeier Halls, both of which will be demolished in 2021.

Lakeland estimates that both of the new halls will be open for the fall of 2022. The two new halls will provide Lakeland with 400 beds, compared to 291 beds available in the halls they will replace— A.M. Krueger, Muehlmeier, Grosshuesch, Friedli and Hofer (the Suites). The Suites also will be demolished. The future of A.M. Krueger is to be determined.

USDA Wisconsin Rural Development State Director Frank Frassetto said, "This investment will help Lakeland set the bar for higher education by providing stateof-the-art student education facilities that will support a robust pipeline of talent for local businesses and communities to enhance economic prosperity and quality of life in rural east central Wisconsin."

## Winter rules began Nov. 15

Winter parking regulations went into effect Nov. 15. As a reminder, here is the ordinance:

New in 2019! Parking is allowed in the North East Street parking lot overnight until 6 a.m.; at that time your vehicle must be moved.

### PARKING REGULATIONS

All Night Parking Regulated.

6.04(2) (a) No parking of any motor vehicle shall be permitted on either side of any Village street or in the parking lot north of Square Street between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m., and no parking in the lot on North East Street from 6 a.m. until 9 a.m. commencing the fifteenth (15th) day of November and ending on the first (1st) day of April of every year.

(b) Any vehicle parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be removed from the streets and stored, and such removal and storage shall be at the expense of the owner of said vehicle.

Vehicles violating this ordinance will be ticketed.

Snow Removal

Ordinance 10.03 Removing Snow from Sidewalks: residents must clean snow and ice from sidewalks within 14 hours of any snowfall in a 24-hour period.

Snow cannot be blown or plowed onto Village Streets. Residents must also shovel out any hydrants near their home.

Snow Removal Warning

As in past years, you will not be notified that snow needs to be removed. If you have not shoveled in the prescribed time, the Village will shovel your walk and bill the property owner. Also, the entire width of the sidewalk must be shoveled. A path is not sufficient, and you will be in violation.






