SECAF awards 107th FS Pilot Distinguished Flying Cross

The 25th Secretary of the Air Force, the Honorable Barbara M. Barrett, awarded Maj. Brett DeVries, a pilot with the 107th Fighter Squadron, the Distinguished Flying Cross during a ceremony here today, for extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight.

"The Distinguished Flying Cross is America's oldest military aviation decoration," Barrett said. "Awarded for heroism or extraordinary achievement that is, 'entirely distinctive, involving operations that are not routine,' today, Major DeVries, you will join the ranks of some other American heroes."

The training flight narrowly avoided catastrophe on July 20, 2017, when DeVries successfully landed his A-10 Thunderbolt II with neither a landing gear.
