County leaders urge vigilance, strict compliance with health orders

anta Clara County leaders are urging members of the public to abide by the State and local health orders and exercise extreme caution as the County continues to see surging COVID-19 case counts and record hospitalizations

"As we head into the holiday season, the way to show family, friends and fellow Santa Clara County residents that you care about them is to not hold large gatherings with them that can easily spread the virus," said Cindy Chavez, President of the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors. "We are reaching a tipping point with COVID-19 numbers and we need to change course now."

olly Oak Elementary School custodian, James Herrera is lacksquare missing the Holly Oak Elementary School students.

"The campus feels empty without them," Herrera said, as he cleaned off surfaces and areas at the school where staff members and teachers still come daily to conduct distance learning.

Hererra, who has worked at Holly Oak for seven years, says that one of his favorite things

about his job has been seeing the K-6 grade students, exchanging high fives, and listening to them across the school campus each day.

When the COVID-19 pandemic closed schools in the Evergreen School District in March 2020, and then the schools opened to distance learning in August, Herrera said that the Holly Oak school campus definitely felt different without the students.

"With our students being on distance learning since March, the campus has been empty," Herrera said. "I know how students miss being in school and many of them have been feeling sad about not seeing their friends. I thought hav-

Drive-thru Christmas in the Park is now open

an Jose's beloved holiday tradition, Christmas in the Park, is now open at its new venue.

Instead of a stroll through downtown's Plaza de Cesar Chavez, Christmas in the Park will instead be a drive-through event at History Park on Senter Road. And — like the annual Fantasy of Lights show at Vasona Park — you have to reserve a day and time to visit in advance.

A change in venue for Christmas in the Park, the first time in its 41-year history, was required because a loss of sponsorship revenue due to the pandemic, not to mention the lost vendor and ride income normally taken in during a normal year.

'People are going to expect to see Christmas in the Park from a car, and I think they're going to be blown away," he said. "They're going to be overwhelmed by how much more there is to see," Minsky said.

As a bonus, the regular Christmas in the Park

displays, the historic and replica buildings at History Park also will be decorated, along with the illuminated replica of the San Jose Light Tower.

"There will be light tunnels, giant snowflakes and hundreds of decorated trees, with the whole visit choreographed to music. Santa Claus will be around, too," said Minsky.

Clara Valley Medical Center and private healthcare providers, now number just 68. Yesterday, on November 24, the County recorded its highest individual new case count for a single day with 512 cases reported and saw its highest number of COVID-19 hospitalizations of 197 patients.

"The ability for our hospitals to care for the most critical patients is a critical concern when dealing with COVID-19," said Dr. Marty Fenstersheib, COVID-19 Testing Officer for the County of Santa Clara. "The more we protect ourselves and our families from COVID-19, the less likely we will be filling up hospital beds."

With Thanksgiving week kicking off the holiday shopping season, the County is utilizing additional resources to ensure stores follow the current State purple tier guidelines. Currently, grocery stores must limit capacity to 50% and clothing and retails stores (including malls) must limit capacity to 25%. The Santa Clara County Fire Department, which has a traditional role in enforcing capacity issues for fire codes, will provide much needed support to the Business Compliance Unit's efforts.

"Businesses have a legal, ethical, and moral obligation to protect their employees and the public," said Michael Balliet, Director of Community and Business Engagement for the County of Santa Clara.

and trucks up to 8 ft. high (no buses or limos)— from 5 to 10 p.m., and \$10 during "twilight hour" between 4 and 5 p.m. Reservations are in 15-minute windows, with hundreds of cars able to visit in a single day.

There's no option to visit during the day due to the emphasis on illuminated displays.

Understanding not all families can afford

Santa Clara County moves forward with airport closure, plans to repurpose land

anta Clara County is moving forward
with closing the Reid-Hillview Airport in
East San Jose, county lawmakers decided
Tuesday after hundreds of pleas from the
community to use the land for affordable
housing and other community needs.

The supervisors voted 4-1 to begin preparing for a potential airport closure and begin the planning process for repurposing the land. Next steps would include more community discussion to identify how to develop the land.

Supervisor Mike Wasserman was the lone dissenting vote. The decision Tuesday opens the door for the county to use the 180 acres of airport land for future housing, recreation areas, community centers, office space, retail space and anything else the community might want.

County supervisors took the first step to close the airport two years ago when they voted to stop accepting Federal Aviation Administration grants for Reid-Hillview.

The county's legal commitments, including the acceptance of previous FAA loans, means it cannot close the airport until 2031. Still, the vote Tuesday gets the ball rolling and the supervisors want to get a head start on planning.

The issue was hotly debated in the days leading up to the board's final vote. Advocates for getting rid of the airport complained about noise and lead pollution. They said the site could be used for affordable housing in the East Side and other community needs.

San Jose Councilmembers Sylvia Arenas, Magdalena Carrasco and Maya Esparza gathered in front of the airport a day before the vote to urge county supervisors to shutter it.

"To continue to support the operation of this airport is to knowingly endanger the development, the health, and the potentially long-lasting and permanent damaging impacts that it has on our children," Carrasco said. "The time is now to close and relocate this airport to another existing location."

A majority of residents spoke in favor of using the land for something other than an airport during nearly four hours of public comment Tuesday.

"The time to close Reid-Hillview Airport has come," said Salvador "Chava" Bustamante, executive director of Latinos United for a New America. "This (airport) is not only an environmental justice issue, but also a huge land use mistake. This 180 acres of publicly owned land could be put to better use."

But some people said the airport serves an

important purpose by absorbing small plane traffic that would otherwise clog the Mineta International Airport. The airport is also used for emergency response, including during the destructive SCU Lightning Complex blaze earlier this year.

An EPA study released earlier this year used Reid-Hillview Airport as a model for other, similarly sized general aviation airports across the country to study lead concentrations in the air at and around these sites.

According to the EPA models, Reid-Hillview contributes to lead levels that exceed the limits set by the National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS). "Emissions of lead from aircraft operating on leaded aviation gasoline (avgas) are the largest source of lead released into the atmosphere in the US, accounting for 62% of lead (456 tons) in the 2014 National Emissions Inventory (NEI)," the EPA report states.

Some speakers said they had learned to fly at the 80-year-old airport while other speakers were aviation students at San Jose State University and argued there was value in job training programs hosted at Reid-Hillview.

"Reid-Hillview is a critical reliever airport for San Jose International airport," said Supervisor Mike Wasserman. "Reid-Hillview is a critical asset that, once gone, can never be replaced. San Jose International has no capacity to expand, yet our region's population continues to grow," Supervisor Wasserman said. "Let's identify the problems (with the airport) and work to fix them."

Despite the nod to move forward with redeveloping the land, the county must grapple with a lawsuit over the airport closure.

San Jose attorney Jim McManis filed a lawsuit alleging the county's wasted \$400,000 in taxpayer dollars to study alternative uses for the airport property. It also alleges the county has allowed the airport to deteriorate, creating multiple safety hazards, but those who want to see the airport gone are undeterred.

"I understand that others do not want to lose access to their hobby location and other programs, but think of the people who were there before you arrived, and that are there after you leave," said resident Alex Cardenas. "The airport is in a residential area and has a lot of schools, and people deal with the pollution day after day, not just lead pollution from the fuel but noise pollution as well. So why are these minority communities targeted?"

Supervisors plan to take up the topic again early next year, when another report is due back to supervisors on lead levels around the airport site. The board will likely tackle the issue of mitigating lead dangers at the airport before any further development discussion.

South Bay Latinx community starts push for immigration reform in Biden administration

hile President-elect Joe Biden plans how to meet the challenges facing the nation, San Jose's Latinx community is creating a strategy for immigration reform.

The Si Se Puede Collective will be asking local officials to sign a list of demands, which include a pathway to citizenship for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) recipients, ending raids by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), reuniting families of children being held in cages and COVID-19 relief funding.

Camille Llanes-Fontanilla, executive director of SOMOS Mayfair, said the collective is standing with its immigrant community against what she called racist and unjust policies. With a combined budget of more than \$10 million, the collective serves more than 10,000 people in East San Jose.

"Our moment is now to rise up as one community," Llanes-Fontanilla said at a rally at Mexican Heritage Plaza Nov. 13 in announcing the effort. "We will no longer be the drivers of this economy ... while being demeaned, forced into the shadows, separated from our children, living in fear. Together, we demand policies that recognize people as full human

beings with dignity and self-determination"

According to Priya Murthy, policy and advocacy director of Services, Immigrant Rights & Education Network, there are about 23,000 DACA-eligible individuals and more than 134,000 undocumented immigrants in Santa Clara County. On June 18, the U.S. Supreme Court blocked the Trump administration's attempt to end DACA.

DACA grants temporary protection from deportation and authorization for a work permit for undocumented immigrants who were brought to the United States before age 16.

Maritza Maldonado, executive director of Amigos de Guadalupe, said the collective is counting on Congresswoman Zoe Lofgren and other federal officials to support immigration reform.

"Racist policies, attitudes, behavior and oppressive policies need to stop," said Maldonado. "We will not be silent." Maldonado said immigrants faced a host of challenges during the pandemic.

Undocumented people were unable to return home to bury their parents. Some lost jobs of 25 years after contracting COVID-19.

"The climate of our country makes these kinds of abuses of humanity acceptable to our current president and his followers," Maldonado said.

The Si Se Puede Collective is doing grassroots organizing to gather signatures and build a coalition with other nonprofits.

Shane Patrick Connolly, chair of the Santa Clara County Republican Party, said immigration requires safeguards.

"It's crazy to think a president would let people flood in again after we got it under control by Mexico doing some additional work on their borders and having people apply for asylum," Connolly said. "In a COVID-19 world, it's absolutely insane."

However, Lofgren said she agrees with the collective's goals and that Biden is in favor of immigration reform.

"President-elect Biden has indicated he intends to reunite children with parents and stop separating children from their families, pause ICE raids and protect the DREAMers," Lofgren said.


DREAMers, who get their name from the Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors Act, are undocumented immigrants who entered the United States as minors. The act would bestow DREAMers temporary residency, a work permit and future eligibility for citizenship.

Lofgren said some of the collective's demands would require changing laws, which will be influenced by whether Democrats or Republicans control the Senate.

"Right now, the Republicans control the Senate and Mitch McConnell, the majority leader, has shown no willingness to take up the immigration reform bills we have already sent him," Lofgren told San José Spotlight. "The House sent a bill to allow DREAMers to gain legal residence and citizenship more than a year ago, and he has yet to put it up for a vote."

Connolly disagrees with people who share Lofgren's "all or nothing" approach.

"They want everything they want and no compromise," Connolly said. "She wants amnesty for millions, unlimited family reunification... and those are problematic from the conservative perspective."



First U.S. Study Of COVID-19

Plasma transfusions: 76% of patients improve

ew research from Houston Methodist has concluded that plasma transfusions from recovered COVID-19 patients are a safe and somewhat effective treatment option for people dealing with coronavirus symptoms.

The study, published in The American Journal of Pathology, shows that out of 25 patients given a transfusion, 19 saw their condition improve and 11 were discharged.

This was the first U.S. convalescent plasma transfusion trial, and participating patients saw no negative or adverse side effects after receiving plasma. Some smaller studies conducted on blood plasma transfusions for COVID-19 patients have all come to similar conclusions.

This treatment approach for viral diseases certainly isn't new; blood transfusions were used in the same way during the Spanish Flu outbreak of 1918, and more recently during the 2003 SARS pandemic, the 2009 influenza H1N1 outbreak, and the 2015 Ebola outbreak in Africa.

All of the plasma transfusions given for this trial were done on an emergency basis for patients in critical condition. With that in mind, the study's authors say much more research is needed before the therapeutic effects of convalescent serum therapy can be determined.

The term "Digital Natives" was popularized by education consultant Marc Prensky in his 2001 article entitled Digital Natives, Digital Immigrants. In simple terms, digital native describes a generation of children who are born into a completely digital world. This exposure to technology in the early years is believed to give digital natives a greater familiarity in understanding of technology than people who were born before it was widespread.

But young millennials addiction to all things on the web doesn't necessarily mean they are a digital native. Nor is someone who just so happened to grow up in the Internet age.

So, what exactly makes someone a "digital native"?

Marc Prensky who also popularized the term "Digital Immigrants" said that these are people who grew up in one digital culture and moved into another. Digital natives are people who grew up in one culture. They don't have two cultures to compare. One can observe that the people who grew up in the age of wired computers differ from those who grew up with mobile technology. Hence today's digital natives may not be necessarily tech savvy, but their sense of knowledge of what's going on both digitally and culturally is what sets them up to be natives.

Many schoolteachers are still digital immigrants – people who were exposed to

technology later in life and teach in the way they were taught. Some people suggest that digital natives need to be taught in a fundamentally different way. These people believe digital natives think differently due to their early exposure to technology and have become accustomed to using technology to solve the repetitive tasks that form the basis of traditional learning.

At the end of the day, a digital native is someone who gets it, for all the good and bad that it offers.

Prensky stresses "millennials should have a responsible sense of how empowered they are. Digital natives can do things that older generations could just never do."



It's time for a breakdown (of partitions of numbers)

I everyone! As a recap: this column is a place to learn about various STEM topics that I find exciting, and that I hope will excite you too.

This column will always be written to be fairly accessible, so you don't have to worry about not having background knowledge. However, it does occasionally get more advanced towards the end.



And now it's time for a breakdown... (cue "My Lovin' (You're


Never Gonna Get It") by En Vogue).

In particular, a breakdown of numbers! Today we'll be talking about partitions of numbers. At first glance, they're a fairly simple concept: a **partition** of a positive number n is a way to break it up into a sum of positive integers. For example, the partitions of 5 are 1+1+1+1+1, 2+1+1+1, 2+2+1, 3+1+1, 3+2, 4+1, and 5, for a total of 7 partitions. Note that 5 still counts as a partition of 5. Also, notice the order of the numbers in the sum doesn't matter: 5=2+3 is considered the same as 5=3+2, so we don't count it twice.

It can get a little tiring looking at long sums of numbers, so we can instead represent these partitions with fun graphs! The most common types are **Ferrers diagrams** and **Young diagrams**. To be honest, there's not a huge difference between them, unless you're really passionate about distinguishing dots and boxes.

Some brief history: Ferrers diagrams are named after British mathematician Norman Ferrers. You may also be thinking of the fantastic chocolate delight, Ferrero Rocher...okay maybe not, but I am now. However, these are not related (as far as I know), but funnily enough the diagrams look like lines of these heavenly chocolate balls. Per usual, the best way to demonstrate is with a picture (top of next column):

For n=15, one partition is 6+3+3+2+1, which is ordered from the largest to small-




= 15

est **parts** (the numbers in the sum). Each row is the size of a part in the partition.

(See what I mean about the Rochers?!) Here's another example- these are all the 5 partitions of the number 4 represented as Ferrers diagrams (image taken from Wikipedia):

Now let's quickly touch on Young diagrams, which work the same way as Ferrers diagrams (at least with the conventions we're using). Young diagrams were named after another British mathematician Alfred Young (the Brits are really killing the partition game!), but uses boxes instead of dots. Here's an example: the same 5 partitions of the number 4 represented as Young diagrams this time:



While this difference seems irrelevant, these Young diagrams can be modified into something called Young tableaux (by filling the currently empty boxes with numbers), which are very significant in the study of symmetric polynomials and group representation theory!

Though they aren't the most complicated, these diagrams are handy, and can really simplify some proofs (and also tie into generating functions quite nicely). I would See GEMS, next page

Study suggests common steroid can reduce coronavirus deaths

Scientists at the University of Oxford said last week that an inexpensive and commonly available drug reduced deaths in patients with severe COVID-19.

The drug, a steroid called dexamethasone, would be the first treatment shown to reduce mortality in the sickest patients.

Researches said that had doctors been

using the drug to treat the sickest COVID-19 patients in Britain at the beginning of the pandemic, up to 5,000 deaths could have been prevented.

In severe cases, the virus directly attacks cells lining the patient's airways and lungs due to inflammation. The drug appears to reduce inflammation caused by the immune system, protecting the tissues.

That deal on a game console may be a scam

ith many people shopping for gifts on a budget this holiday season, scammers are taking advantage of the demand for pricey gaming consoles by promoting fake deals on Nintendo Switch, PlayStation 4 PRO, and the new PlayStation 5. Be sure to use caution when buying a console online.

How the Scam Works

You find a popular gaming console for sale online at a reduced price. Hoping to save some money, you research the seller's website and find a few positive reviews. Convinced, you make your purchase via PayPal or another online payment method. You receive an email confirmation with shipping information and a tracking number.

If you receive a package at all from the company, it isn't a gaming console – instead, it is a valueless phone cover or similar small object. Since you technically received a shipment, you will be unable to contest the purchase with the third-party who processed the payment.

Attempts to contact the company are useless. No one answers your phone calls or emails. One consumer who never received any package reported to BBB.org/

Continued from previous page give some examples, but unfortunately this article can only be so long. But look out for a future column that elaborates on this!

Okay, and? Why do we care about partitions? Well, if you must have applications, partitions are used in many, many areas. Of course, they are used in lots of pure math (as mentioned above), like in studying symmetry polynomials. But they're also used in the mathematics of shuffling (which does make some sense as you are breaking apart a fixed number of cards). Perhaps surprisingly, partitions also make an appearance in genetics, like in Ewen's sampling formula, and in statistical mechanics (both classical and quantum)! One major example is the equipartition theorem, which can be thought of as "shuffling energies," which is something you've definitely thought about if you've taken physics. Hence, understanding this partition function is incredibly useful across STEM!

And so it seems we have, in fact, gotten it, a contradiction to En Vogue's anthem! (So we can hold off on a breakdown for now.) In the meantime, I'm going to go make a Ferrers diagram out of Ferrero Rochers now. Until next time!

San Jose launches 'Cash for Trash'

City partners with Mastercard, Valley Water to engage homeless residents in battle against blight

pilot program, "Cash for Trash" under the BeautifySJ initiative has been launched that will battle blight in San Jose by incentivizing homeless residents to pick up trash at encampments in exchange for programmable and reloadable cards from Mastercard.

"All too often, we hear people point at the homeless as 'the problem' as they look at the blight, trash, and encampments in our community. I have spoken with many homeless residents who have expressed a desire to be part of the solution. Through "Cash for Trash," we enlist our homeless neighbors in our battle against blight while paving a pathway for future interactions that will open many of our homeless residents to services and assistance," said Mayor Liccardo. "Thanks to Mastercard and to Valley Water for their collaboration in this innovative venture to clean our creeks, streets, and neighborhoods."

"Cash for Trash" will now take place at 40 locations throughout San Jose. Site locations are determined with input from Valley Water. BeautifySJ crews will distribute Cash for Trash bags at each location, redeemable at \$4 per bag. Participants can



turn in up to five bags for a total of \$20 which will be loaded onto a Mastercard City Key card. These debit cards are program-specific cards that Mastercard has enabled maintenance-free,as part of this partnership. Funds can be used to pay for essential items with minor restrictions on items like alcohol and tobacco.

During the first week of the program at two sites, 27 homeless residents enrolled and collected over two tons of trash. San Jose is the first city in the country to launch a program like Cash for Trash, paying homeless residents per bag of trash to be a part of the solution. This innovative program engages with homeless residents, putting them in contact with city staff with the potential to lead to further opportunities to offer needed resources. The program will also help to tackle the exacerbated blight accumulating on streets and in waterways near encampments.

Funding for Cash for Trash is made possible through an allocation of \$50,000 from the City of San Jose designated for trash clean up. In addition, Valley Water partnered to provide a \$180,000 grant (\$60K per year through the year 2023) to the program.
