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# It's Murphy's Law Out There So You Better Be Prepared

### Our Day Of Pleasure Quickly Took A Turn For The Worse As *Swallow The Leader* Slowly Began To Capsize.

It's like a car wreck. You never think it can happen to you until in an instant, your world can come unravelled. Well, I am talking about capsizing at sea, something most boaters will never experience. But if you do, it will change your thought process on boat safety and/or fishing offshore forever.

Thus was the case in May 2002, when I convinced my son Andy and his fellow Eau Gallie High School classmate James Roemer (Rome-Dog as I called him then and now) to take advantage of senior skip day and go offshore fishing.

Everything seemed normal as we ran to about 120 feet out of Sebastian. The weather was outstanding, the boat was running great and the fishing forecast was extremely positive.

And positive it was as we ran up on a large weedline by 7:45 am. As quick as we got our lines out, the dolphin started to attack. After landing a 15-pound dolphin, I suggested we run out for bigger game. The guys agreed, but decided they'd take an early nap for the next 30 minutes to the stream or beyond.

The boat was instantly up on plane, 32 MPH (very flat day) and we were off to the Gulf Stream! After 20 minutes I looked down at my feet and noticed water on the deck. I thought maybe I took some water in the back transom. I throttled down and went to neutral for a quick inspection and to wake up the crew at the front of the boat. Oh, might help now to describe the vessel. We were on our 27' Pro-Line CC with twin 200 Mercurys. We called it *Swallow The Leader*.

As I walked up the port side to wake the seniors, I stopped and opened up the head. I knew in an instant it wasn't good. The head was floating with all the other gear stored in the compartment. We had water in the entire hull and it was rising quickly above the deck.

"Guys, get your asses up. We are sinking," I shouted. Not the words you want to hear on senior skip day or any time really. It was a scramble. James was a high school linebacker so I gave him a 5 gallon bucket at the aft and told him to start bailing. I grabbed a fillet knife, cut the top of the largest fender, handed it to Andy and instructed him to bail as well.

I tried to run the water out the back by putting the boat in gear but both engines then stalled because they were leaning back in the water as the bow started to rise. I looked over the side and the boat was not bailing water as the bulge pumps were not working. Turned out, Pro-Line had an issue with bilge pumps shorting out. My job then became simple. Get help to the boat. But as all the commotion broke out I was baffled as to how we took on so much water so quickly? How could we run 32 MPH on plane with all that water in the hull? A real mystery even to this day.

Say hello to Murphy's Law (if it can happen it eventually will) and it did. On a beautiful May morning with two teenagers onboard. No raft, no EPERB, just a VHF radio with a 7-10 mile range.

I clicked on the red DISTRESS button on the VHF and called for the Coast Guard on Channel 16. The boys were now shin-deep in water. I got through to the Coast Guard at Cape Canaveral and they quickly dispatched a rescue vessel. We could hear them hailing all boats in the area to render assistance. Problem was, the only boat in the area had its radio turned off.

As 45 minutes to an hour went by, Andy and James became the heroes keeping the boat afloat, bailing as much water as was entering. However, now they were kneedeep in water in the rear of the boat.

So let me clarify, the seas were calm, there was plenty of daylight, it was now around 11 am. It wasn't like we were strapped to the side of a capsized boat in 13-foot waves for hours or days. However, the first time experience was enough to get all of our attention.

We certainly didn't want to capsize and go in the water, especially since I had the boys start chucking everything overboard that didn't float except for fishing tackle and the dolphin we caught earlier. They threw all our bait and chum in the water which yes, of course, attracted sharks.

Murphy's Law got even more Murphy's Law when the Coast Guard couldn't find us and sent a Navy aircraft to locate us. The Coast Guard patched me through directly to the Navy pilot - not something you get to do often. I coached the plane in our direction and it buzzed us and then proceeded to a fishing boat several miles away, the

one that did not have its radio on. This boat got equally buzzed by the Navy plane, realized what was happening and tuned in for instructions. The local fishing boat reached us in 10 minutes. The boys jumped off and swam 10 yards to their boat. I asked them to pull up to my boat because "I don't want to get wet today!" I yelled jokingly.

They obliged, and I handed them all our rods and reels and then of course our one dolphin. It was only 3-4 minutes before our boat capsized as the boys and I were safe on theirs. Ten minutes later, the Coast Guard reached us and we boarded for a smooth ride back to Port Canaveral.

We thanked the rescue crew from the center console and rewarded them with our only dolphin catch. Great guys from Melbourne. Forgot their boat name and their names, but never-the-less, we've always appreciated the rescue.

After an hour-plus ride with the Coast Guard, we arrived at Port Canaveral and every news media outlet from Orlando was waiting as if we were stranded at sea for days. It was comical. The birth of fake news.

A savage vessel towed our capsized boat all the way back to Port Canaveral. Of course, the pressure from being upside down and towing that far blew out all the gauges and hatches on the boat.

I went back to the port the next day and they were trying to upright the boat. The salvage crew said it was a leaking live baitwell gasket that caused the boat to fill up. To this day I don't believe that theory. Too much water too quickly was our problem. Didn't see a crack in the hull, but I do remember slamming hard out the inlet that morning and a spreader light breaking from the impact.

And YES, the plug was in!

My insurance company totaled the boat. However a local marina purchased the boat, pickled the engines and fixed all the other damage. The boat was then sold to an individual from Orlando. He had some Murphy's Law of his own as the boat was stolen two months after he purchased it. To say this boat was unlucky was an understatement.

Well, we dodged a big bullet, our egos were bruised, but we were safe. That's all that matters. What I took away from the experience is that you don't have to hit anything out there or have a major malfunction in order to capsize. Sometimes it just happens. So be prepared and always have the necessary equipment on board to survive your ordeal. Hopefully it won't happen to you.

Unless, of course, it's Murphy's Law.

### What Do You Like To Collect?

Retired Lt. Col. and licensed Coast Guard Captain, Ken Verderame of Indialantic, grips one of his many trophy size tuna. This one was caught on the Royal Polaris out of San Diego on an 18-day trip for yellowfin & wahoo. The tuna took about 45 minutes to get to the boat.

The Royal Polaris is 115' long with a 35' beam and the deck is a good 6' above the water. According to Vanderame, the deckhands used 10' cane gaffs to get the fish in the boat. For tuna that are 100+ pounds, they open one of the railings to haul the fish in. The number of gaffs required usually tells how big. This was a '2 gaffer' so likely a 200 pounder which came in on the scale at 204 lbs.

"Some guys collect bowling trophies... I collect tuna patches. I ran out of room for the 100-lb club patches so every patch on my jacket actually represents two 100-pounders," explains Verderame.

Every year, Verderame heads to San Diego to meet with other tuna enthusiasts. To get invited, you have to have caught at least one 100-lb yellowfin during the previous sea-

### Classic Old Photos Help Us Remember The Good Ol' Days Of Fishing Florida's Coast

(Local resident Laurie Lintereur recently shared this experience of her father's classic weekend fishing excursion.)


Gordon Newman is now 92-years old, but remembers the days almost 60 years ago when you could actually catch, fillet and eat gigantic iewfish.

Newman experienced the fishing weekend of his life in New Smyrna Beach just outside Ponce Inlet when he and fellow anglers, Larry Lamee and Emil Janda caught over 1,000 pounds of jewfish on a Saturday and Sunday.

It began with Lamee landing a 160-pounder on Saturday after a 45-minute fight. He rushed home to show his friends and neighbors and within an hour was back on the water with Janda and Newman. The result, an even bigger jewfish at 187-pounds.

They were back at it again Sunday and the three of them caught four more giants between 180 and 200 pounds. The above photo appeared in the local paper and the three became instant celebrities.

According to reports it took ten people to help fillet, freeze and or smoke them. Residents said it had been 25 years since jewfish this large had been caught in New Smyrna Beach.



Now, harvest and possession have been prohibited in both state and federal waters off Florida since 1990. Fish must be immediately returned to the water free, alive and unharmed. Photographs can be taken, but only during the active act of release. Large goliath groupers should be left in the water during release.








The base price for this BruFish board is \$1,399 and can easily be outfitted as shown, for just under a hundred dollars.

Now a fourth-generation is still yielding nice catches! Here, Andy's daughter Ava (Robert Pittman's great grandchild) caught her first fish several years ago.







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








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# Featured Species of the Month:

The red drum, also known as redfish, channel bass, puppy drum, spottail bass, or simply red, is a game fish found in the Atlantic Ocean from Massachusetts to Florida and in the Gulf of Mexico from Florida to northern Mexico. It is the only species in the genus Sciaenops.

The red drum is related to the black drum (Pogonias cromis), and the two species are often found near to each other; they can interbreed and form a robust hybrid, and younger fish are often indistinguishable

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




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# Jayden Drinkwater Knows How to Find Them!



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
