



Good BBQ, music at Rumors Roadhouse

Jeanette Scott fell in love with the little bar/restaurant/hall in the small Sheboygan County community of Crystal Lake so much so that she has purchased it.

As of Oct. 23, Scott became the owner of what was formerly called Rumors and Rumors Has It and what she and general manager Brad Campbell now call Rumors Roadhouse BBQ.

It is Scott's first time owning her own food and beverage business, and Campbell's first time cooking for other people other than in his home kitchen. The two have known each other since they were teenagers, and over the years Scott—a freelance accountant—has served as the agent for the musically gifted Campbell.

One of the many venues at which Scott booked Campbell to play was this log cabin-looking establishment in Crystal Lake just outside Elkhart Lake and Plymouth.

"I loved it," Scott said. "I loved going there." Campbell has been a regular performer at Rumors for about the last two years.

A Wisconsin native who has a residence in Arizona, Scott said she loves music and over time developed the goal of owning some type of music venue. She said she expected that to happen sometime down the road, but then she heard the owner of Rumors at the time was thinking of selling the business. "I thought it was a good opportunity," Scott said. "It just checked off so much that I wanted."

So in the middle of a pandemic and temporarily without a liquor license, Scott and Campbell opened Rumors Roadhouse BBQ.

Despite those significant startup challenges, the Crystal Lake neighbors of Rumors Roadhouse BBQ and others have been patronizing the establishment in good numbers. In addition to enjoying Campbell's love of cooking and his passion for barbecue, patrons have been sharing their stories of having their wedding receptions in the hall there, or seeing musical acts ranging from Lawrence Welk to Cheap Trick play in the hall. One couple married 60 years ago said they had their reception there.

An interesting parallel between the building and its new owner is that the original building was constructed in 1930 in the middle of the Great Depression, and Scott is now at the helm in the middle of a worldwide pandemic.

"The building itself has quite a history," Scott said, pointing out that there have been about five additions over the years, with some of the more recent ones expanding and updating the kitchen.

If Campbell is not playing music on either the small bar stage or in the large hall, chances are he will be in that kitchen preparing some of his barbecue or other dishes. Diners can start off with one or more of their favorite appetizers, including fried pickles, turkey chili, or flatbread pizza. Entrees include everything from burgers to fall-off-the-bone ribs, pulled pork, and a smothered chicken breast dinner. The Rumors Roadhouse BBQ team said the smoked BBQ brisket has drawn rave reviews already. "I'm proud to say the barbecue he puts out has been greatly received," Scott said. They also offer fish frys on Fridays and taco specials on Tuesdays.

While they are still looking for some part-time and back-up help for Rumors Roadhouse BBQ, Scott and Campbell said they have some "really quality people" who will help the operation run smoothly.



They said they plan to add something new to the menu on a monthly basis and hope by spring to have the menu just where they want it.

On Friday and Saturday nights, Campbell will be playing live music but also may pick up his guitars and play at other times as well. He joins the likes of Roy Orbison, Sunblind Lion, and Head East on the list of musicians who have bounced musical notes off the walls of the building. "There's been a good amount of music history through this building," Scott said.

Campbell has been a musician all his life and formerly managed a music store in Milwaukee. He said there are not too many styles of music he does not play, performing as a solo act or as part of a duo or trio with some fellow musicians. Playing without drum machines, he can still do covers of pop hits, folk music, or some of his own original music.

"If it's got strings on it, I can play it," Campbell said. That includes electric and acoustic guitar and even a six-string ukulele which has been one of his main instruments.

He said playing at Rumors over the last few years was always his favorite gig because of the great customers and how well musicians were treated—an atmosphere they said they plan to maintain.

Scott once worked at a radio station and

helped organize some small concerts. She said she once met Cheap Trick's first road manager from whom she learned that the band played at Crystal Lake when it was first starting.

They and their employees did cleaning and redecorating prior to reopening to give the establishment more of a roadhouse feel. Bathrooms also were repainted. A side room will be made into a gaming room, and a cabin they own next door to Rumors Roadhouse will be made into a bed and breakfast eventually.

Work also continues on getting the hall ready for events. The maximum capacity of the hall is 800 people standing or 350 seated, and it can host everything from weddings/receptions to concerts to business meetings and more.

Rumors Roadhouse BBQ also has a fullservice food license and can do catering on-site or off-site.

Rumors Roadhouse is open seven days per week from 11 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. It is located at N7454 Summit Rd., Plymouth (Crystal Lake).

Asked what they want customers to feel about Rumors Roadhouse BBQ, Scott said, "We want to feel like we belong to the community." She said they come from small communities as well and understand the relationship between the local residents and small businesses. Campbell said they

are hoping to make Rumors Roadhouse BBQ a unique dining experience. They both said they want to foster a family atmosphere, with Campbell adding they want to offer something "between a supper club and a roadhouse and a good old-fashioned speakeasy."

With the sounds of good music and the smell of good barbecue filling the interior of Rumors Roadhouse BBQ, they are well on their way to making that happen.

Road America reflects on year of giving

Since the mid-1950s, Road America has valued working with many nonprofit groups to assist in fundraising efforts.

From the early days, many nonprofit organizations such as the Plymouth Optimists, Elkhart Lake Lions, and St. John the Baptist have been mainstays at concession stands for years while providing mouthwatering food at a tremendous value.

Many people are unaware that every season, Road America works with many philanthropic organizations to raise funds for everything from educational programs to groundbreaking disease research and treatments. Despite the 2020 season being unlike any other, and with the right plans, partners, and resources in place, Road America helped raise more than \$400,000 for various charities and worthy causes during events, club days, track days, participant-based donations, and concession sales.



"Everyone's generosity during these trying and unprecedented times has been tremendous. Hard work is gratifying when you know it's to help raise money for a great cause."

Fireworks show one example

Throughout the 2020 season, charitable initiatives included Road America's Fire Fest 4th of July fireworks show, in partnership with the Plymouth Advancement Association, which raised money for the Sheboygan County Food Bank, Elkhart Lake Fire Department, and Plymouth Fire Department. The July 4th Fire Fest event was created to recognize Sheboygan County residents for their tenacity and spirit during the COVID-19 "Safer at Home" period, which ended in late May of this year. The event, coined as "One Community—One Purpose," originated when it was apparent that July 4th events throughout Wisconsin and Sheboygan County were being canceled as there was not a way to achieve social distancing at venues with limited space, which was not the case at Road America.

The WeatherTech International Challenge Concours d'Elegance events in July raised funds for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Sheboygan County and Fresh Meals On Wheels of Sheboygan County. The Concours d'Elegance events celebrated the best cars appearing both on and off the track at Road America. Car enthusiasts joined in on this endeavor, channeling their passion for cars into raising money through parking fee donations and website donations for worthy charities.

Road America also supported the Midwestern Council of Sports Car Clubs (MC-SCC) Spec Miata enduro "Race to Save the Children" event as part of the IMSA Sportscar weekend. In all, 51 Miatas made the grid for the 60-minute "Race to Save the Children" enduro, and the majority took the checkered flag following a rainy

Education gives LTC student a future

When Pablo Gomez walked across the stage to accept his High School Equivalency Diploma (HSED) in May 2019, he knew his worst days were behind him.

He also knew a promising future as a welder was ahead.

Gomez experienced many bad days in his youth and found himself incarcerated at 17 years old. Knowing a better future was on the horizon for him as long as he kept working hard—even on bad days—is what he said kept him going while taking HSED classes through Lakeshore Technical College in Manitowoc. The only class he missed was the day his son was born.

When incarcerated at the Manitowoc

County Jail, various representatives from the community meet with inmates to help prepare them for their release. Upon walking into one of these visits, Gomez recognized his third grade teacher and immediately felt badly that she would see him there. She recognized him. They talked about the troubles he had experienced since they last saw each other, and it was during this visit she encouraged him to put those days behind him by obtaining his HSED. That encouragement—along with knowing he was about to become a father—were what motivated him to begin taking classes while he was still in jail.

"I was impressed with Pablo's dedication

and determination," said Amy Cops, Adult Basic Education/General Equivalency Development instructor at LTC Manitowoc. "His positive outlook will assure him continued success."

While earning his HSED, Gomez learned that additional education could lead him to an even brighter future. "I didn't have a father growing up, so my grandfather was like my dad. He would always say 'Do what you love' so I talked with Amy about welding, and she called Dave right away," Gomez said.

LTC Welding Program Coordinator/Instructor David Saunders listened to Gomez tell him about his new newborn son and

girlfriend, and how going to school right after earning his HSED would be difficult. Saunders invited the whole family to the LTC welding lab in Cleveland for a visit to learn how LTC could help.

Why it's important to conserve land areas

The benefits of undeveloped land go far beyond spectacular scenery.

Open space supports water filtration and storage, preserves farmland as a way of life to feed local communities; provides habitat and migratory corridors for wildlife; even mitigates air pollution and sequesters carbon. Human health depends upon open spaces for recreation and fresh air.

This open space is at risk right now, as local land values increase and open areas are subdivided and developed.

Conservation is not about Environmental Protection Agency regulations that protect natural resources from our abusive behavior. It is about the acquisition and protection of land for the benefit and enjoyment of all living things, for all generations, forever.

Every discussion about a potential land conservation project requires focus on funding. The key financial concerns are the cost of purchase, development and/or restoration (depending on proposed use), maintenance, and management.

In this era of fiscal conservatism, it is fair to question the extent to which tax dollars should be used to fund the government programs that pay for public lands that must be conserved and managed. Do we really need more parks for hiking, biking, camping, and bird watching? The answer is a loud yes! (Especially in our busy tourist-based economy here at Elkhart Lake!)

So when a local conservation-related nonprofit asks for a contribution or solicits your membership, find a few extra dollars somewhere and donate and/or join. And regardless of whether you are politically inclined, attend public meetings about proposed park and conservation initiatives and become a member/supporter of your local land trust (Glacial Lakes Conservancy). Conserved land and heritage sites benefit and beautify communities and personal lives in so many ways (The New England Daily News, May 23, 2016).

Glacial Lakes Conservancy, a five-county wide local land trust including Sheboy-

gan County, is made up of 300 member donors and has a 12-member Board of Directors (volunteers). Peter Pittner joined the GLC Board this summer. As an environmental engineer and VP of Miller Engineering (Sheboygan), he recognizes the importance of land conservancy. He said, "Outdoor spaces have always been important to me for recreational purposes, but as man's influence on the environment continues to increase, the value of open space becomes even more apparent for a myriad of reasons. From habitat fragmentation to the loss of pollinators and declines in bird and insect populations, the effect of human manipulation on the natural world can easily be seen and felt in our everyday lives. The preservation of lands will not only positively impact our environment, but also our economies and psychological well-being. As terms such as 'nature deficit disorder' become more common, we recognize that our mission not only preserves land, but also increases the quality of life for our communities at large."

Transfers keep growing at LTC

The number of transfer agreements between Lakeshore Technical College and four-year colleges continues growing and benefiting students throughout Lakeshore's district.

"These agreements are more important than ever for students who want to earn a Bachelor's Degree though are concerned about the costs and risks associated with moving away from home during the pandemic," said Lakeshore Vice President of Instruction James Lemerond. "Students can safely obtain a high quality, affordable education close to home and be confident

their courses and programs will seamlessly transfer when they are ready to make that move."

All University of Wisconsin System campuses and 15 private in-state colleges have agreements with Lakeshore. The college also has agreements with public and private four-year colleges across the country for both on-campus and online education. Over 300 program and course transfer options are involved, including general education and program-specific courses ranging from speech and psychology to accounting and chemistry.

Transfer agreements can save students thousands of dollars in tuition, fees, housing, and personal expenses. According to Lemerond, 73 percent of Lakeshore's Associate Degree graduates who continue their

education choose a four-year institution. The college estimates students save \$6,000 in tuition and fees by staying at home and attending Lakeshore their first two years of college rather than attending a four-year college. The savings may be significantly higher when considering housing costs. The University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee estimates its 2020-'21 housing costs for a shared room is between \$4,996 and \$8,271.

Lakeshore has several transfer agreements with UW-Green Bay. The two institutions recently signed a new agreement allowing Lakeshore's Graphic and Web Design Associate Degree Program graduates to seamlessly transfer to UW-GB to complete its Bachelor of Arts Degree in Design Art.

































Graduation at LTC to be virtual, drive-through events

All buildings on Lakeshore's Cleveland campus will be open from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Academic deans will be in their respective


areas to congratulate students, who are welcome to take photos. The bookstore also will be open.



We hope that by giving people this opportunity the winter months might crawl by a little faster."

Only Walking and Snowshoe members may use walk the golf course in the offseason and well-behaved dogs and their owners are welcome. QQO is set over 270 acres of rolling terrain and gives people a lot of different walking routes to try. Once the golf course is snow covered, trails will be marked with a snowmobile so snowshoers know where to go and can find their way back.

Walking & Snowshoe Club members may use the golf course anytime once the golf course closes to golfers, unless the course is unwalkable because of weather (which includes frosty mornings—please call for clarification).

They should not walk or snowshoe on putting surfaces, and may only use snowshoes once the ground is frozen. People are asked to carry a cell phone. Members will be given a card to prove membership and may be asked to present it.

Dog owners must clean up after their pets. Management will be monitoring the grounds and if problems arise dogs no longer will be permitted.

There is a fee schedule for being part of the Walking and Snowshoe Club, with QQO Full Golf members getting a discount. Members (single, couple, or family) get a QQO stocking hat(s), bar and restaurant credit, and vouchers for snow shoe rental. Nonmember daily fees (\$7 per day) also are offered, as is snowshoe rental.

Information on tax collections given

Tax bills were mailed around Dec. 11. Property taxes may be paid at the Village Offices at 40 Pine St. from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays. We will be closed on Dec. 24 and 25 and Dec. 31 and Jan. 1. If the village office is closed, payments can be dropped in the police depository on the side of the building or the new payment dropbox located to the left of the doors at the Pine Street entrance. You can also drop your payment off at National Exchange Bank & Trust in Elkhart Lake. If you have any questions, please call the clerk's office at 876-2122.

The first installment of taxes is due by Jan. 31. If you want to mail in your tax payment, please mail it to P.O. Box 143, Elkhart Lake, WI 53020. Receipts will not be mailed unless a self-addressed stamped envelope is included.


Candidates must circulate nomination papers that can be obtained at the Village Hall. You can sign three trustee petitions and one president petition.

Village portion of tax rate decreased for 2020

The village's portion of the property taxes decreased by \$.02 per \$1,000 from 2019 to 2020. The village continues to do more with less. Over the last 10 years, the village has continued to hold its portion of the property taxes steady. The overall village tax rate (all taxing jurisdictions) is expected to increase by \$0.28 per \$1,000 of assessed value. If you have a house assessed at \$200,000 your tax bill will increase by approximately \$56 dollars, depending on the lottery credit and first dollar credit.

Mailbox placement and snow plowing

The U.S. Postal Service has guidelines to follow when placing your mailbox at your residence. The mailbox needs to be 41 to 45 inches from the road surface to the bottom of the mailbox or the point of mail entry. The mailbox also needs to be six to eight inches back from the curb or



curb line. Above is a drawing with these specifications. If your mailbox is damaged because of snow plowing and it does not meet the U.S. Postal Service guidelines, you will be responsible for any repairs or replacement that is needed.

Winter rules began Nov. 15

Winter parking regulations went into effect Nov. 15. As a reminder, here is the ordinance:

New in 2019! Parking is allowed overnight in the North East Street parking lot overnight until 6 a.m. At that time your vehicle must be moved.

PARKING REGULATIONS All Night Parking Regulated.

6.04(2) (a) No parking of any motor vehicle shall be permitted on either side of any Village street or in the parking lot north of Square Street between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m., and no parking in the lot on North East Street from 6 a.m. until 9 a.m. commencing the 15th day of November and ending on the 1st day of April of every year.

(b) Any vehicle parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be removed from the streets and stored, and such removal and storage shall be at the expense of the owner of said vehicle.

Vehicles violating this ordinance will be ticketed.

Snow Removal

Ordinance 10.03 Removing Snow from Sidewalks: residents must clean snow and ice from sidewalks within 14 hours of any snowfall in a 24-hour period. Also, if you live at a corner intersection, remember you need to clear the sidewalk approaches to the streets.

Snow cannot be blown or plowed onto village streets. Residents must also shovel out any hydrants near their home.

Snow Removal Warning

As in past years, you will not be notified that snow needs to be removed. If you have not shoveled in the prescribed time, the Village will shovel your walk and bill the property owner. Also, the entire width of the sidewalk must be shoveled. A path is not sufficient, and you will be in violation.

Victory park development update

Houses are going up in the Victory Park subdivision. The village has now issued seven building permits in this subdivision. The village is so excited about the progress being made. A few of the houses have walls and roofs and others have poured basement walls. If you are interested in more information on the subdivision you can

Planning Commission & Village Board

The Planning Commission and Village Board have approved some Certified Survey Maps for properties in the village. The board also has approved a zoning change for 474 E. Rhine St. from M-1 to C-1.

The board has filed for and received some Routes to Recovery funding through the State of Wisconsin to help us with our expenses related to COVID-19.

The Planning Commission has recommended to the Village Board a mitigation plan for tearing down and building a new house at 401 S. Lake St. The board and its committees are also beginning to look at the need for a new Public Works facility. This will be a multi-year process, but it is going to start with looking at our needs/wants for the next 50-plus years, as well as touring other facilities.

LTC health care students pass exam at high rate

tion reports the supply of nurses dwindling with many out of work because of having COVID or quarantining because of exposure, students graduating from the nursing-associate degree program at Lakeshore Technical College continue passing the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) exam on their first attempt at high rates.

The college's pass rate for graduates taking the exam in 2020 through November is 97 percent.

The college's pass rate was 100 percent in 2019, and 98 percent in 2018. Both years surpassed the national average pass rates that ranged from 86 percent to 87 percent for the same time periods.

While the Wisconsin Nurses Associa- "We are grateful for the support of our local health care partners who continue providing clinical practice opportunities for our students so they can graduate, pass their exam, and jump into the workforce to fill critical roles in the fight against CO-VID-19," said Lakeshore Associate Dean of Nursing Lori Hertel.

Upon passing the NCLEX exam, graduated nurses from both two-year and fouryear colleges become licensed and are able to identify as registered nurses. LTC nursing students who graduated in 2019 saw a 93 percent job placement in their field with a median salary of \$53,882.

The nursing-associate degree program at LTC has been accredited since 1980 and graduates 30 to 40 students annually.


John Buss was the winner of the December mystery photo contest. He provided the following information on the above
