Earline Elsie Benner Blahauvietz, Spirit Lake, was born on June 2, 1927, in Primghar, Iowa, to Earl and Elsie Benner.

She grew up on a farm in Primghar and attended elementary and secondary school graduating from Primghar High School in



worked for a year to earn money to go to college. She attended Waldorf College in Forest City, Iowa, for two years and was very active in music (singing and piano) and art classes. Her plan was to teach for two years after college and then return to get her music degree. In 1947, she started dating Donald Hagen from Primghar and her plans changed. She found a teaching position at Calumet High School to be closer to home and was head of the music department there until they married on June 13, 1948. They lived in Primghar and later Hartley. During this time Earline taught piano lessons and had up to 30 students per week. She was also very involved with music directing for the church choirs. Earline and Don had over 25 years of marriage before he passed in January, 1975. During their marriage they built homes, townhouses and apartments which Earline continued to manage as rentals after his death. Having grown up in the depression, Earline learned at an early age to be creatively frugal and to have a very strong work ethic.

Earline became active in BPW and Federated Woman's Club holding offices in both organizations. During her life, she took numerous art classes and worked in a variety of media such as water colors, pencil and oils. Her homes were always filled with her beautiful artwork. Earline worked as Director of Art, Music and Ceramics at Village Northwest Unlimited in Sheldon and later became the Chamber of Commerce Secretary of Hartley. She worked as the Elementary School Principal secretary in Hartley until she was introduced to Wayne Blahauvietz from Harris, Iowa, in 1981. They married December 27 of that year. Earline had always dreamed of having children and with this marriage came the "whole package" as she said: children, grandchildren and later great-grandchildren. They were married for over 38 years before he passed in August 2020. Wayne and Earline lived on the family farm in Harris until 1989 when they moved to their lake home near Crandalls' Beach on Big Spirit. In 2016, they moved to Keelson Harbour in Spirit Lake.

Earline was active in the O-Sirrah Club in Harris, played the piano at the United Methodist Church in Harris and sang in the church choir at Grace Lutheran Church in Spirit Lake. She enjoyed gardening, cooking, attending musical performances, singing, traveling, photography and the Okoboji Summer Theater. She loved living on the lake enjoying the beauty and peacefulness which was often captured in her artwork.

Her family and friends would describe her as a warm, friendly, funny, caring, generous and compassionate person. She was a loving wife and seamlessly fell into her role as step-mom, grandmother and great-grandmother filling a void in the family. 



A Life Well Lived

Our family and this community lost a very special woman on Friday, January 8th when my mother, Mary Lou Adams, passed

away at 12:10 p.m. after a very long battle with Parkinson's Disease. While my mom was in isolation since March in the nursing home due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we were blessed to spend the last 12 days of her life with her at Lakes Regional Healthcare after she was brought there by ambulance on December 28th. My mom was a



Christian, loving, selfless, caring, funny and beautiful woman who always brought a smile to whomever she was visiting with.

We could not have asked for a better mother growing up than Mary Lou Adams, as my mom was the epitome of putting her family and our needs well ahead of her own. We never wanted for anything growing up, and by anything, I mean our parents' time and energy. Our family always came first to them, and whether we needed a ride to Terrace Park in the back of my mom's station wagon, a trip to the Arnolds Park Dairy Queen, or a shoulder to cry on after a tough game, my mom was always there, constantly juggling work and a young family without ever complaining. Our house at 1605 M Avenue in Milford was the hub of all the activity in our neighborhood, with countless friends coming and going, eating meals, staying overnight and playing in our yard. My mom made all of our friends feel like they were a part of our family, and that didn't change when we got to college as she always welcomed home our new college friends and had them over for holidays and gatherings while treating them as a member of our family. You don't always appreciate this as a kid or young adult, but the minute that you become a parent you start to realize all of the sacrifices that your parents made for you while growing up. I am far from a perfect parent but I try my best to model my parenting after my mom and the many lessons that she taught us about always putting your faith and family before yourself and always being there for your kids

My mom continued her love for children and full houses as she moved on to the next stage of her life as the grandmother of six awesome grandchildren. After we moved back from Wyoming my mom rarely missed any of Shaelyn's or Tyler's games or activities, as well as making many trips to Des Moines to see my nieces and nephews play and perform. I can still hear her second guessing my base coaching while sending one of Shae's or Tyler's teammates to score from third base in softball or baseball on a play where perhaps I should have kept them on third; or seeing her proudly sit in church while listening to Shaelyn sing a beautiful song as my mom always wanted a musical child but Heather, Julie and I were far from talented in that area, so she was so happy and proud that her granddaughter could sing. Even when my mom's health started to fail and she was moved into the nursing home, my dad made sure that she still made it to our kids' games and she would sit in the front row in her wheelchair cheering on her Pioneers while letting me know after the girls games what I should have done differently.

While my mom loved watching us and later our kids compete. she always said she preferred herself to live by the motto of Eeyore from Winnie the Pooh, "stay undefeated, don't compete". Even though my mom didn't participate in sports, she competed and won in her life, and she competed like a warrior up until the very end of her life, hanging on for 12 days in the hospital after 10 months of isolation in the nursing home to see and spend time with her family. Even though she wasn't responsive for the last week or so, we believe she competed to stay alive to hear and feel her family around her retelling old family stories that made us laugh so hard we cried. I would say that my mom lived by another popular Eeyore quote, "A little consideration, a little thought for others, makes all the difference" as she always was thinking of others and she knew that making others feel wanted and loved made all the difference in their lives. I strongly believe that our duty in this life is to make this world a better place to live than it was when we entered it; well Mary Lou. you competed and forgive my language here, but you kicked ass with that; we are all better people and this world is such a better place because of the selfless life that you lived. You will be missed and we forever love you, mom!

Each year thousands of people visit the Iowa Great Lakes to enjoy the amenities our area has to offer. Join me each week as

I become a tourist in our backyard to explore a few of the spots that make the Iowa Great Lakes special!

This week was another first for me – fishing! As the ice gets thicker, fish houses pop up across the bays on our lakes. People come from all over to fish the Iowa Great Lakes each winter. It was obvi-



ously something I needed to try! The first step in fishing the Iowa Great Lakes is to have a fishing license. Knowing that license fees in Iowa support local conservation and public access to outdoor opportunities made the purchase even sweeter! Having no experience, or equipment, I decided to hire a guide. Darrin Jones from Big Fin Guide Service assured me I would have fun and catch plenty of fish. We met at a public access ramp and headed out to his fish house. Darrin had everything set up and ready to go. He gave me a few instructions, handed me a pole, and I dropped my line! I was fishing in 12 feet of crystal clear water. For the first five minutes I patiently watched my bait quiver and quietly repeated, "Here fishy, fishy." Nothing happened. I asked, "Do people really enjoy this?" I was assured that yes, people really enjoy this, and I should be patient and keep watching for fish.

Very soon a fish swam up! He took a look at my bait and bit! I set the hook and froze. What next? Darrin enthusiastically encouraged me to reel it in. Slow and steady. I could do it. And you know what? I did it! I caught my first fish! He was just a little guy, but I needed a picture. This was the first fish I had ever caught!

Conservation Reserve Program General Signup Underway

Agricultural producers and private landowners interested in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) can now sign up for the popular program until February 12, 2021. The competitive program, administered by USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provides annual rental payments for land devoted to conservation purposes.

"This signup for the Conservation Reserve Program gives producers and landowners an opportunity to enroll for the first time or continue their participation for another term," Acting FSA State Executive Director, Bob Wegand said. "This program encourages conservation on sensitive lands or low-yielding acres, which provides tremendous benefits for stewardship of our natural resources and wildlife."

Through CRP, farmers and ranchers establish long-term resource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees, to control soil erosion, improve water quality and enhance wildlife habitat on cropland. Farmers and ranchers who participate in CRP help provide numerous benefits to their local region and the nation's environment and economy. CRP general signup is held annually and is competitive; general signup includes increased opportunities for wildlife habitat enrollment through the State Acres For Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE) initiative.

New cropland offered in the program must have been planted for four out of six crop years from 2012 to 2017. Additionally, producers with land already enrolled but expiring on Sept. 30, 2021, can re-enroll this year. The acreage offered by producers and landowners is evaluated competitively; accepted offers will begin Oct. 1, 2021.

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest private-lands $conservation\,programs\,in\,the\,United\,States.\,The\,program\,marked$ its 35-year anniversary in December 2020. Program successes include:

- Preventing more than 9 billion tons of soil from eroding, which is enough soil to fill 600 million dump trucks.
- Reducing nitrogen and phosphorous runoff relative to annually tilled cropland by 95% and 85%, respectively.
- Sequestering an annual average of 49 million tons of greenhouse gases, equal to taking 9 million cars off the road.
- Creating more than 3 million acres of restored wetlands while protecting more than 175,000 stream miles with riparian forest and grass buffers, which is enough to go around the world seven times.
- Benefiting bees and other pollinators and increasing populations of ducks, pheasants, turkey, bobwhite quail, prairie chickens, grasshopper sparrows, and many other

All USDA Service Centers are open for business, including those that restrict in-person visits or require appointments. All Service Center visitors wishing to conduct business with FSA, Natural Resources Conservation Service or any other Service Center agency should call ahead and schedule an appointment. Service Centers that are open for appointments will pre-screen visitors based on health concerns or recent travel, and visitors must adhere to social distancing guidelines. Visitors are also required to wear a face covering during their appointment. Our program delivery staff will continue to work with our producers by phone, email, and using online tools. More information can be found at farmers.gov/coronavirus.

Virtual Healthy Relationship Education Training Offered

additional tools to help couples build healthy relationships during a virtual training in February.

Iowa State University Extension and Outreach is offering Healthy Relationship Education Training on February 11 via Zoom. During the one-day program, professionals will learn how to use relationship education as a strategy to meet the safety, permanency and well-being needs of children.

"We know that children growing up in a home where there is a healthy, stable couple relationship have fewer behavioral and emotional problems and perform better in school," said Malisa Rader, a human sciences specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "That is why healthy couple relationships are so important."

This program uses a research-based curriculum that is being implemented across the country to help professionals encourage the development of healthy couple relationships. Research shows that when parents have more supportive and less conflicted couple and co-parenting relationships, the entire family is better equipped to handle stressors, which helps maintain family cohesion, child safety and permanency, Rader explained.

The all-day class consists of eight modules, which are based on the National Extension Relationship and Marriage Education Model. Rader and Cheryl Clark, also a human sciences specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach, will teach the class. Interactive lessons, discussions and resources will be provided. Professionals who participate will gain an understanding of the important aspects of couple relationship education.

Healthy Relationship Education Training is scheduled for Thursday, February 11, from 8:30am to 4:30pm. There is a \$50 fee for the program, which includes a curriculum manual and tools. Virtual Program Offers Tips for Parenting in a Pandemic

Raising children has its rewards and challenges, but the COVID-19 pandemic has brought with it new challenges for families, says Malisa Rader, a human sciences specialist with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

"ACT Raising Safe Kids" teaches positive parenting skills to parents and caregivers of children from birth to age 8. The program will be offered via Zoom from 10:00 to 11:30am on Tuesdays, February 2 through April 6.

"We are excited to bring this educational offering virtually to families," said Rader, who specializes in family life issues. "It is what ISU Extension and Outreach has done for over 100 years – respond to the needs of Iowans where they are."

In the series of lessons parents and caregivers will gain strategies for:

- Dealing with children's difficult behaviors using developmentally appropriate responses;
- Controlling their own anger;
- Helping children control their anger;
- Teaching children how to resolve conflicts without using violence;
- Using positive discipline methods that fit the children's age;
- Reducing the influence of media violence on children. Participants will receive the ACT Parent Handbook, which

includes sets of fact sheets with information on children's typical problem behaviors and outlines basic child development information. The handbook also includes handouts on anger management, positive discipline, media literacy and p ways to resolve conflict.

The program is based on research that indicates that effective parenting is a critical factor to prevent youth behavior problems, according to Rader. She encourages professionals working with families to share this information with clients.

Cost for the entire series of lessons and resources is \$40 per participant. An educational pre-session for parents, foster parents, grandparents, primary caregivers and others in a parenting role will be held Tuesday, January 26, at 10:00am. Individuals must have registered for the program to attend this session.






Dickinson County SnowHawks Awarded ISSA Snowmobile Club of the Year

















William Alexander Perfect ACT and Acceptance to Stanford

Boots in the Barn is a three-part series for women involved in a dairy or beef operation and/or industry and will be held at the Iowa Lakes Community College Farm in Emmetsburg. The sessions will be held February 10, February 24 and March 10 from 1:00 to 3:00pm.

"We've had great success with [agriculture] programs designed specifically for women," said Jenn Bentley, dairy specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "Women often prefer to learn in small groups and with hands-on opportunities. They like to ask lots of questions of presenters without feeling intimidated... Programs designed for women alone are very effective."

The February 10 session will feature Dr. Caitlyn Messerschmidt, veterinarian at Iowa State University. Dr. Messerschmidt will guide participants using Frosty (a life-size cow model), practicing putting chains on a calf to pull it and learning how to assist a cow in calving. Other topics include immediate calf care and colostrum. This session is sponsored in-part by a Professional Dairy Producers Foundation educational grant.

On February 24, ISU Extension and Outreach beef and dairy specialists and Iowa Lakes Community College instructors will lead participants in how to help calves nurse, selecting colostrum products, mixing milk replacers and how to wean calves from milk and start them on dry feed. Participants will view both maternal and calf housing.

The third session will be held on March 10 and cover health basics and how to determine whether an animal is healthy or unhealthy. Activities include handling medicines and vaccines, giving injections, safety in working cattle and two national programs, Beef Quality Assurance and Farmers Assuring Responsible Management. These sessions will be led by ISU Extension and Outreach and Iowa Lakes Community College staff.

There is a \$15 fee for this program and pre-registration is required. Register online at www.bit.ly/bootsinthebarn by Sat-



Dickinson County Residents In Group 1a Being Vaccinated Against COVID-19

Dickinson County Public Health (DCPH) has been receiving many calls each day from people anxious to receive the COVID-19 vaccine. Lakes Regional Healthcare (LRH) Director of Population and Public Health Katy Burke said this is understandable and that DCPH is providing the vaccine as quickly as it is received. She said they have been giving the vaccine to people in priority groups as dictated by Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) guidelines.

Burke said, "So far we've received a total of 50 vials of the Moderna vaccine from two shipments. We've been able to get 10 to 12 doses out of each vial, and to date we've given 501 doses to people that fall into what is known as group 1a. People in group 1a are defined as hospital staff, dentists, pharmacists, volunteer EMTs, and more," said Burke.

The initial doses DCPH received do not include vaccine for staff and residents in nursing homes and other long-term care and assisted living facilities. Burke said those facilities are receiving the vaccine through the pharmacies they contract with, such as Walgreens, CVS, and Community Pharmacy.

DCPH receives communication from IDPH each week regarding whether or not they will be receiving any vaccine for the upcoming week. Burke said they then schedule COVID vaccine clinics as necessary and contact those in the group that can receive the vaccine via email or

According to Burke, about 900 people in Dickinson County are included in group 1a. She said, however, that it is up to the individuals in the group whether or not to receive the vaccine. In the instance more vaccine is received than is needed to vaccinate a group based on individual decisions, DCPH still needs to wait for authorization from IDPH before they can start vaccinating people in other priority groups. Once the approval is given, DCPH will contact the people in these groups through multiple media channels, including news releases, radio, newspaper, and LRH social media, so they know to come in and get vaccinated.

Burke said within the next week, LRH will be putting a survey on their website at www. lakeshealth.org where people can provide their name, age, email address, phone number, health conditions (if under age 65), and interest in receiving the vaccine or not.

She went on to say, "DCPH is currently waiting on the definition for Iowa's official priority groups 1b and 1c, which will be defined by the Iowa Infectious Disease Advisory Council. Currently, DCPH is referring to the priority groups set by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices, which is a branch of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention."

The groups, in priority order, are as follows:

Group 1a

This group includes: • People that have direct patient contact, are unable to telework, who provide services to

patients or patients' family members, or who handle infectious materials. Residents of long-term care facilities.

Group 1b

This group includes:

- Frontline essential workers such as fire fighters, police officers, corrections officers, food and agricultural workers, United States Postal Service workers, manufacturing workers, grocery store workers, public transit workers, and those who work in the educational sector (teachers, support staff, and daycare workers.)
- People aged 75 years and older because they are at high risk of hospitalization, illness, and death from COVID-19. People aged 75 years and older who are also residents of long-term care facilities should be offered vaccination in Phase 1a.

Group 1c

This group includes:

- People aged 65-74 years because they are at high risk of hospitalization, illness, and death from COVID-19.
- People aged 16—64 years with underlying medical conditions which increase the risk of serious, life-threatening complications from COVID-19.
- Other essential workers, such as people who work in transportation and logistics, food service, housing construction and finance, information technology, communications, energy, law, media, public safety, and public health.



Dickinson County Treasury Updates

Dickinson County Treasurer Kris Rowley says, "Governor Reynolds' Proclamation of Disaster Emergency related to COVID-19 was updated on January 7, 2021. As expected the noncommercial driver's license expiration suspensions came to an end. There is one motor vehicle-related proclamation still in place related to driving for 90 days with temporary tags from a dealer while waiting on titling/plating. There are also federal suspensions still active regarding commercial driver's licenses (CDLs) and commercial learner's permits (CLPs) through February 28, 2021."

- Driver's Licenses that expired beginning January 16, 2020, and during the proclamation are again subject to the printed expiration date on the license, beginning on January 9, 2021. The 60-day grace period for driving on an expired license will resume as normal, applied to the original expiration date of the license. If your driver's license has been expired more than one year, you will have to retest. Contact the Dickinson County Driver's License station to schedule an appointment.
- The Dickinson County Driver's License Station is open by appointment only – call for an appointment at 712-336-6277 or renew online if eligible at https://iowadot. gov/mvd/driverslicense/service-selector. Some driver's licenses can be extended for 6 months for driving purposes online with the Department of Transportation.
- Through February 28,2021, commercial driver's licenses (CDLs) and commercial learner's permits (CLPs) that expired on or after March 1, 2020, are considered valid until February 28, 2021, for driving anywhere in the U.S., in accordance with relief provided by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration. Beginning March 1, 2021, all CDLs/CLPs will be subject to their printed expiration date when driving out-of-state and while driving in Iowa, the 60-day grace period will resume as normal, applied to the original expiration date of the
- license unless these are extended. Motor vehicles purchased from a dealer between September 1,2020 and February 6,2021, and using dealer-issued temporary tags until the vehicle can be titled and plated at the county treasurer's office can be operated on the highways of this state without registration plates for up to 90 days after the date of delivery of the vehicle to the purchaser from a dealer. Normally this must be completed by 45 days. The requirement to submit title application work to the county treasurer within 30 days remains in effect. If late, a late title penalty of \$10.00 is charged at the county treasurer's office.
- REAL ID driver's license enforcement was extended by federal law until October 1, 2021.

Rowley says, "We are open to the public, but because of social distancing health needs the number of people in the Tax/Motor Vehicle office and in the Driver's License Station are limited. Facemasks are required for entry. We are asking people to pay taxes and motor vehicle renewals through our online website, mail, dropbox or by phone, so we can save the in-office visits for our transactions that require face-to-face visits."

There are links to the Iowa Tax and Tags website, www.IowaTaxAndTags.org, for making property tax and motor vehicle renewal payments. There are also links on the county website in the treasurer tab for motor vehicle forms and to the Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT). The IDOT offers many driver's license services online if eligible at https://iowadot. gov/mvd/driverslicense/service-selector.

If you have questions, call the treasurer's office at 712-336-1205 or email the treasurer at krowley@dickinsoncountyiowa. gov. Driver's license appointments can be made by calling 712-336-6277. The tax, motor vehicle and driver's license office are open from 8:00am and 4:30pm but are closed through January 31, 2021, between 1:00 and 2:00pm.

Making Music Wearing Masks: COVID-19 Won't Stop The Music At Iowa Lakes Community College

Music professors at Iowa Lakes virus particles may be-Community College have spent hours finding a way for Iowa Lakes students to continue making music safely during the coronavirus pandemic.

"Our students love to perform and are very adaptable. They know that without the masks, we wouldn't be able to make music. We all love music too much to allow that to happen," shared Carol Ayres, Iowa Lakes Music Professor.

Every music student wears a mask, but these masks are not one size fits all. Each protective equipment piece caters specifically to the instrument utilized, whether it is a trombone, a flute, one's voice, or any other device.

Iowa Lakes vocal students wear specialized masks designed by Broadway singers. These specialized masks feature three layers of fabric and a filter to reduce respiratory droplet emissions while still allowing space around the mouth to sing comfortably.

the face is covered when playing and not playing to reduce respiratory droplets and contain three layers of fabric with a hole sewn into it, like a buttonhole, to allow the mouthpieces to fit through them. Even the instruments themselves have

masks called bell covers. Bell covers help prevent droplets from coming out the other end of musical instruments. Since human breath powers musical instruments, tiny come airborne, making bell covers as essential as face masks.

"We are doing everything we can to ensure our students get to continue making music. With protocols on the best ways to safely make music changing frequently, Brett Fuelberth and Carol Ayres, Music Professors at Iowa Lakes, attend countless Zoom meetings and webinars to stay current with the recommended guidelines.

Many professional music organizations including the College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA), National Federation of High School State Associations (NFHS), American Bandmasters' Association (ABA), and National Band Association (NBA), and the National Association for Music Education (NAFME), developed studies

to help determine the best way to mitigate potential virus spread through practicing and performing music. The studies measure aerosols transmission and choose the best ways to minimize aerosols produced and distributed while singing, breathing, and playing

instruments. "We realize music Iowa Lakes, practices his trumpet fully is an integral part of who our music students are - enhancing the good times and helping

them through hard times. Research has provided us with valuable information needed to provide a safe environment for our students to continue their musical endeavors," explained Ayres.

In the upcoming months, the Iowa Lakes Music Department hopes to offer many musical performances. The Iowa Lakes music department will be hosting the annual Jazz Band Contest in person on February 3 and 4, 2021, with all participants following safety protocols.

Priority Groups Established by State for COVID-19 Vaccinations

The biggest question of 2021 so far, vaccinated, we encourage them to contact at least the one addressed to those in the healthcare world, has been: "When can I get vaccinated against COVID-19?"

The answer varies from state to state. In Iowa, as of today, if you work in healthcare or are a resident of a long-term care facility, you are eligible to schedule and receive a vaccine. Those in the next priority groups are identified; however, a time frame has not been announced by the state for the next round of vaccination opportunities.

"In our state, the Iowa Department of Public Health is following the CDC priority recommendations with the goal of consistently offering the vaccine to priority groups at the same time across each of the 99 counties," explained Colette Rossiter, Clay County Public Health coordinator. "Currently in the state, by order of the Iowa Department of Public Health's Vaccine Shortage Order, only people in Phase 1a are eligible to be vaccinated. This includes healthcare personnel and residents of long-term care centers."

Rossiter said Clay County initially received 600 doses just prior to Christmas of Moderna vaccine to administer to healthcare workers. This week another 200 doses were delivered; again, directed for immunization of healthcare personnel.

"We are close to having immunized everyone in the healthcare personnel category who has opted to receive the vaccine at this time," Rossiter said. "If an eligible healthcare worker has not scheduled an immunization time and would like to be

our public health office to schedule soon."

She added, "We're anxious to begin offering immunization to the next priority tier, enabling more local citizens to be protected against COVID-19; however, we must wait until the state directs us to do so and sufficient vaccine supply is provided. It's essential that health departments in all 99 counties are consistent in who is offered vaccination opportunities."

The next priority group identified by the CDC based on recommendations from the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices represents a large number of people. Rossiter said that on a state level, there may be further definition of who is eligible to be vaccinated and potential priority tiers identified within the priority group.

Current CDC recommendations for Phase 1b and 1c are listed below:

- Phase 1b Priority Group • Frontline essential workers such as fire fighters, police officers, corrections officers, food and agricultural workers, United States Postal Service workers, manufacturing workers, grocery store cational sector (teachers, support
- staff, and daycare workers.) • People aged 75 years and older because they are at high risk of hospitalization, illness, and death from COVID-19. People aged 75 years and older who are also resi-

dents of long-term care facilities should be offered vaccination in Phase 1a.

Phase 1c Priority Group

- People aged 65—74 years because they are at high risk of hospitalization, illness, and death from COVID-19. People aged 65-74 years who are also residents of long-term care facilities should be offered vaccination in Phase 1a.
- People aged 16-64 years with underlying medical conditions which increase the risk of serious, life-threatening complications from COVID-19.

• Other essential workers, such as

people who work in transporta-

tion and logistics, food service,

housing construction and finance, information technology, communications, energy, law, media, public safety, and public health. As vaccine availability increases, vaccination recommendations will expand

to include more groups and will become more widely available, with many pharmacies also offering immunizations. Clay County Public Health, with assis-

workers, public transit workers, tance from Spencer Hospital, is planning and those who work in the edu-community immunization clinics as larger population groups become eligible to be vaccinated. The clinics will be widely communicated to the public. Individuals will be scheduled vaccinations time to ensure an orderly process and to promote social distancing.
