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
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


Best Part of The Day

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


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Frequent anglers Joe Reese and Tyler Gaetzi slam another sailfish.


This large sail almost fills the boat side-to-side! The fish was quickly released after being photographed by another crew member.

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

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
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Walker's Cay is a 100-acre island 90+ miles east of Ft. Pierce and is under new ownership. (Photo courtesy of walkerscay.com)

RENOWNED SPORT FISHING RESORT WALKER'S CAY IS ON ITS WAY BACK!

What ever happened To Walker's Cay?

Since hurricanes Frances and Jeanne in 2004 demolished the remaining buildings of Walker's Cay, this world-renowned fishing resort has been closed and has waited for someone to scoon it up and bring it back to life.

Lots of government politics were involved until 2018 when Carl Allen, a Texas businessman and childhood visitor and frequent guest of Walker's Cay purchased the tiny 100-acre island and began to bring Walker's Cay back to its glory days.

The worldwide outbreak of COVID-19 has put a temporary delay on construction, but according to the new website WalkersCay.com, things will pick up soon where they left off.

That's great news for not only anglers on Florida's east coast, but worldwide. It's just 90-plus miles east of Ft Pierce. By boat, it's just

hours in small seas and minutes by air. (Walker's Cay has it's own airstrip for small aircraft.)

Walker's Cay has a long and storied history dating back to the 1600-1700's. Thomas Walker, a born Bahamian but Englishman by birthright, was living in New Providence, Bahamas, serving as a stand-in governor for the Vice-Admiralty Court when pirates first arrived. When he organized men to fight the pirates, the pirates swore to burn his home to the ground. Walker fled to an island 170 miles northwest. That island today is still known as Walker's Cay.

Of course, years passed until Palm Beach businessman Buzz Shonnard leased the island in 1935 and built an airstrip, marina and small hotel. Shonnard promoted the resort as a sport fishing destination. According to Walker's Cay current website, Robert Abplanalp took over the resort in 1968 and marketed it as more than just a marlin hot spot. Abplanalp passed away in 2003 leaving his legacy for anglers worldwide. Even sparking its own television show that many will remember as "The Walker's Cay Chronicles!"

Florida's east coast will perk up when Walker's Cay finally reopens. So many memories of great fishing with family and friends. And of course, if you've made the trip, you know exactly where Rosie's Bar is on a smaller island around the corner. Classic beer conversations and fresh conch with friends and locals about the catch of the day.

Hey Walker's Cay...We can't wait to see you again!





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

"We just love the beach and took Abram surfing and fishing at a very early age and he got hooked on both," Mandy said. "When he's not fishing, he's surfing for sure."


Tarzan credits his mom and dad for helping him get started as well as is Uncle "Fly" Navarro.

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


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

Featured Species of the Month



SPECKLED TROUT

Cynoscion nebulosus, the spotted seatrout, also known as speckled trout, is a common estuarine fish found in the southern United States along coasts of Gulf of Mexico and the coastal Atlantic Ocean from Maryland to Florida.

While most of these fish are caught on shallow, grassy flats, spotted seatrout reside in virtually any inshore waters, from the surf of outside islands to far up coastal rivers, where they often come for shelter during cold weather.



Contrary to its name, the spotted seatrout is not a member of the trout family (Salmonidae), but of the drum family (Sciaenidae).

It is popular for commercial and especially recreational fishing in coastal waters of the southeastern United States. Adults reach 19-32 inches in length and 3-15 pounds in weight.



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RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Maple Soy Glazed Salmon

Marinate salmon filets in soy sauce, minced garlic, freshly squeezed orange juice, and maple syrup for 30 minutes.

Sprinkle with freshly cracked pepper and cayenne. Bake for 6-7 minutes at 375.

Drizzle with maple syrup. Broil on low for one or two minutes.

Accompaniment

Poach cauliflower florets in chicken broth for 5 minutes. Add cranberries, orange zest, chopped parsley, chopped pistachios, and a dash of cayenne. Simmer for a couple minutes.

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
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
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




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
