

More Frosting Please!

Plymouth business provides sweet treats to many

More Frosting Please!

Not only is that the creative name of a business in Plymouth, but it also could be a request heard inside the walls of the sweet shoppe located at 125 E. Mill St.

Shelly Jones is fine with people asking for specific things because she makes everything herself in an off-site, commercial kitchen. "We pretty much do everything," Jones said. "We're not just a cupcake shop."

Peanut squares, cookies, and frosting shots—yes, little shot cups of frosting—are available at More Frosting Please! along with cakes for all occasions and, yes, cupcakes too.

More Frosting Please! reopened its storefront on Feb. 11 after its traditional January closure. It also closed in August after a summer which Jones said "wasn't great" because of the pandemic. She continued to take cake orders and reopened on Saturdays during the Christmas season.

But Jones is used to working through trying times. Her business got its start around the time she was dealing with stage three breast cancer and her husband had lost his job.

Encouraged to open business

Jones was working in the bakery department of a grocery store and also making cakes for family and friends on the side. They would rave about the taste and quality of her creations and encouraged her to open her own business. "Everybody appreciates the homemade taste and flavor," she said.

"I ended up renting a location elsewhere in Plymouth for four or five years," Jones added. Her business took off. She said she went from making 12 to 16 cupcakes per week to 500 per week. Her business grew so much that she began to run out of room.

When the storefront at 125 E. Mill St. became available, the landlord approached Jones knowing she could use more space. About two years ago she moved her business there, and in the first year her volume tripled.

Then COVID-19 hit.

For a while they tried staying afloat doing deliveries but the volume simply was not there. Also not helping matters was the fact that many weddings were postponed or scaled back during 2020, and weddings are another significant part of the business at More Frosting Please! as she does between 25 and 50 weddings in a normal year. "Weddings take priority over everything," Jones said. "It's pretty cool to be part of something that special." She said the largest wedding she has done served approximately 580 people, but even that is only about half as big as the largest event she has done. That was for a Main Street Matters event in Sheboygan in which she prepared a six-foot long, 18-inch tall cake which fed around 1,100 people.

Storefront opens again

More Frosting Please! reopened on Feb. 11, just in time for her busiest holiday of the year—Valentine's Day. Christmas is traditionally her second busiest time, followed by graduations. Not knowing what to expect this Valentine's Day with the pandemic still going, Jones encouraged people to pre-order as much as possible.

In addition to sweet treats, More Frosting Please! also offers keto-friendly, gluten-free, and nut-free products for those customers with those needs. Jones said she often advertises healthy specials on her Facebook page.

More Frosting Please! offers a huge variety of sizes and flavors. Cupcakes come in three sizes—mini for a child, standard for an adult, and jumbo which serves one or two adults.

Multiple cake choices

Cakes can be done as round cakes or sheet cakes, both in a variety of sizes. Cake flavors range from the common yellow and chocolate to more unusual offerings such as chocolate mint, red velvet, lemon poppy seed, confetti, strawberry, and many others.

Jones said she does not do fondant but does offer either buttercream, whipped icing, or cream cheese to top off her cakes.

Fillings offer a great addition to any ordinary cake, she said. The fruit not only enhances the flavors, but also pleases a wider variety of guests. Cakes filled with additional icings or fudge can add another blast of flavor as well. Fillings include cherry, raspberry, strawberry, Bavarian creme, fudge, pineapple, lemon chiffon, orange dreamsicle, peanut butter, "and most anything else you can dream up," Jones says on her website.

And there is more to More Frosting Please! than sweet treats. Jones also offers a variety of classes as fun options for people of all ages, including basic decorating skills and "cupcake wars" in which kids get to decorate their own cupcakes.

In addition, Jones also hand picks 5 to 10 vendors from the area to display and sell their unique wares inside her shop.

Despite being a small business with only one part-time employee and occasional help from family and friends, More Frosting Please! is also an active corporate citizen in the community. She has donated baked goods to local assisted living facilities, and does a Secret Santa activity as well.

Jones also takes part in Icing Smiles,

a program in which bakers deliver free cakes to children with critical illnesses. She said she first took part in Icing Smiles about 10 years ago for a family with a sick girl, and she got to know the family well. Since that time she has delivered free

cakes to other families from Oakfield to Two Rivers. "Being part of that is the best feeling in the world," she said.

More Frosting Please! is now open Fridays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Stone Dagger Pizza delivers to Elkhart

Stone Dagger Pizza is located in Kiel but it is getting very familiar with Elkhart Lake

Owners Nate and Denise Paulish opened Stone Dagger Pizza last September and it instantly became a very popular destination for local diners—even in the middle of an unprecedented pandemic. The pandemic forced Stone Dagger to put an even stronger emphasis on delivery and takeout. Its delivery radius extends 8 to 10 miles from Kiel. That includes all of Elkhart Lake down to CTH J, and also includes delivery to the front gates of Road America and to The Osthoff and other resorts in the village. The race season was largely done by the time Stone Dagger opened last fall, but Nate said they will be advertising at the track this year.

Nate is no stranger to Elkhart Lake either. The New Holstein High School graduate has been cooking for more than 27 years, including at The Osthoff and Lake Street Cafe in Elkhart Lake along with Idlewile Inn in St. Cloud and Blue Harbor in Sheboygan.

Nate and Denise also opened the very popular Fork & Dagger Ale Haus in Kiel in 2017.

Owning his own place

Nate was already working in area restaurant kitchens as a high school student and has added to his cooking abilities at each stop he has made. Asked when he first thought about owning his own restaurant, he said, "It was pretty early on but I think it took 8 to 10 years. Either you love what you're doing or you don't."

Stone Dagger customers will say it is pretty clear that Nate and Denise love what they are doing.

Denise is largely in charge of Stone Dagger while Nate heads up Fork & Dagger, although he also spends time at the pizza restaurant on Wednesdays when Fork & Dagger is closed.

Owning one restaurant is enough to keep a couple busy, but Nate said they started thinking about opening a nice pizzeria because they wanted to better serve the demographic of families with children. When they saw that the building at 707 Park Ave. was available, they moved ahead with their plans.

Modern remodel done

Extensive remodeling had to be done to the former optometrist's office, and the family moved forward with that even during the pandemic. "We did have our reservations but we thought, 'We're into it already, things are ordered, let's push on, let's push forward.' I like to push forward. We could have given up if we wanted to," Nate said.

Jason Knuth of XPC LLC in Kiel was the general contractor on the project. Between Knuth and the Paulish family, they came up with a very modern design which includes two large overhead doors which can be opened in good weather and connect the interior of the restaurant to an outdoor patio on which people can dine. Air screens next to the doors keeps insects from coming into the restaurant. The outside patio is even shaped like a pizza cutter.

Because of the pandemic and not opening until September, Stone Dagger Pizza has yet to experience what their "normal" customer traffic might be but excitement

about the new restaurant had the place packed at the start. Nate and Denise said they readily admit to being a little overwhelmed at times in those early days, and they admit some diners might not have had the best experience because of the huge crowds and long waits. They encourage those people to come back and give them another try now that things have settled down.

Another reason to come back to Stone Dagger Pizza is that the menu will be changing and expanding. Nate and Denise said by early March they will be adding to their selection of wraps, salads, and sandwiches.

That is in addition to the primary fare at Stone Dagger—pizza. Diners can choose from a variety of specialty pizzas or build their own, and they also can choose from a variety of crust types including the healthy options of broccoli cheese or cauliflower.

General Tso's the favorite

Asked what their most popular menu item has been so far, Denise did not hesitate to say it is the General Tso's Chicken pizza. The Raider Pizza (sausage and pepperoni) also has been a hit.

"We try to offer different things," Nate said. "We don't want to do the same as everyone else is doing." He added that his travels around the country and his experiences at different restaurants have all contributed to his restaurant menus. "Half of it is just playing around," he added.

Also now helping to create in the restaurants is Ivan, the 13-year-old son of Denise and Nate who said he enjoys cooking and working at his parents' establishments. He joins about 40 full- and part-time employees between the two restaurants, and Nate said they are always looking to add more.

Stone Dagger Pizza also offers a comprehensive selection of wines and has eight craft beers on tap which pair up well with pizza.

While plenty of people are dining in at Stone Dagger, takeout and delivery also continues to be very popular as the pandemic continues. People can check out Stone Dagger's menu at www.stonedaggerpizza.com and order at 920-286-6232. Stone Dagger is open every day from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. except Tuesdays when it is

Siebkens makes historic register

It is now official—Siebkens Resort in Elkhart Lake is historic.

After a two-year effort led by Jennifer Lehrke of Legacy Architecture, Siebkens owners Wendy and Rob Orth learned recently that the National Parks Service has added Siebkens to the National Register of Historic Places. The resort buildings at 284 S. Lake St., 285 Victorian Village Dr., and 6 Elm St. were officially added to the registry on Dec. 17.

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the nation's historic places worthy of preservation. Authorized by the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the National Park Service's National Register of Historic Places is part of a national program to coordinate and support public and private efforts to identify, evaluate, and protect America's historic and archeological resources.

William Schwartz established the Belleview Hotel on his property in a house constructed near the lakeshore in 1882. The Opera House/Tavern Building and Lake Cottage were added to the site during the 1880s. In 1916 the property was purchased by Herman and Laura Siebken. Additoinal buildings and hotel lodging were added during the 1910s and 1920s, including the Elm Park Hotel.

In June 1918—boasting reservations from New York, Illinois, and Alaska—they offered swimming lessons at the Siebkens pier and picture shows in the Elm Park Theater. It also became a tradition that groups of German singers spending the weekends would serenade the guests. Over the years their arrival was eagerly anticipated. The tradition of singing groups would continue for over 70 years.

Herman's daughter, Olive or "Ollie," returned to the resort to help after Laura (Herman's widow) died in 1941 and in 1946 she became the sole owner. Her love of antiques turned the entire hotel into a large antique store. Guests of Siebkens Resort still enjoy her fine taste in antique furnishings today. She ran the resort until 1977 when her daughter, Pam, and husband Douglas Lueck purchased the resort and continued its German heritage. Ollie's granddaughters, Laurie and Lisa, later operated the hotel and continued the legacy.

Siebkens' listing on the National Register of Historic Places marks the beginning of a five-year plan to restore the resort's four original buildings—Belleview Hotel (containing the Siebkens Lobby and Main Dining Room), Opera House and Stop-Inn Tavern building, Elm Park Hotel, and Lake Cottage. Work began this past fall

with replacement of the Elm Park Hotel roof guided by architect Adam Voltz of The Kubala Washatko Architects and general contractor Andy Chappa of AChappa Construction.

Initial efforts will focus on structural work such as foundation repairs, a new roof on the Belleview Hotel, and redesigning the Elm Park Hotel entrance to accommodate the pool area built in the early 2000s. Later stages of the project will focus on interior details including restoration of the Elm Park Hotel rooms, Siebkens Lobby, Dining Rooms, and Stop-Inn Tavern.

A project about which the Orths said they are particularly excited is returning the Opera House to its original purpose as a space for events and entertainment. In the late 1950s, Ollie Siebken Moeller converted the Opera House into an antique shop inspired by her passion for antiques and to supplement the resort's income during the off-season. The renovated Opera House will serve as a unique venue for performances and celebrations including wedding ceremonies.







Parking is allowed overnight in the North East Street parking lot overnight until 6 a.m. At that time your vehicle must be moved.

PARKING REGULATIONS All Night Parking Regulated.

6.04(2) (a) No parking of any motor vehicle shall be permitted on either side of any Village street or in the parking lot north of Square Street between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m., and no parking in the lot on North East Street from 6 a.m. until 9 a.m. commencing the fifteenth (15th) day of November and ending on the first (1st) day of April of every year.

(b) Any vehicle parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be removed from the streets and stored, and such removal and storage shall be at the expense of the owner of said vehicle.

Vehicles violating this ordinance will be ticketed.

Snow Removal

Ordinance 10.03 Removing Snow from Sidewalks: residents must clean snow and ice from sidewalks within 14 hours of any snowfall in a 24-hour period. Also, if you live at a corner intersection, remember you need to clear the sidewalk approaches to the streets

Snow cannot be blown or plowed onto village streets. Residents must also shovel out any hydrants near their home.

Snow removal warning

As in past years, you will not be notified that snow needs to be removed. If you have not shoveled in the prescribed time, the village will shovel your walk and bill the property owner. Also, the entire width of the sidewalk must be shoveled. A path is not sufficient, and you will be in violation.

Auto pay your water bill




