AUBURN - Amazing food from a celebrity chef is not just on television.

Everyone has heard of the Food Network, where chefs from around the country demonstrate their skills.

And Auburn can now boast of having its very own celebrity chef – Sayvepen Sengsavang, "Chef Sav", from the Mu Noi Brunch restaurant on the north end of Center Street in Auburn.

Newsmakers, Names & Faces \$15.7M in unclaimed property

AUGUSTA – Sen. Ned Claxton, D-Auburn, announced the addition of more than \$15.7 million to Maine's Unclaimed Property Fund, and Mainers are being urged to check whether any of that money belongs to them.

"Nowadays, everyone could use a little extra cash," said Sen. Claxton. "If you haven't checked the unclaimed property list lately, I would encourage you to take a look. It's easy to do, and you might be surprised at what you find!'


"Unclaimed property" is money owed to Maine people by third parties, such as former employers, banks or utility companies. Organizations are required to give unclaimed property to the State Treasurer after a specified period of time, after which the owner of the unclaimed property can retrieve it from the state.

Unclaimed property could be from a forgotten bank account, an overpaid bill or uncollected wages. This money could be unclaimed as a result of a change in name, addresses or bank account. Year after year, people are surprised to find they might have money waiting for them at the Treasurer's Office. Particularly during these uncertain times, Mainers are strongly encouraged to take a look and see if they are on the list.

People can search the Treasurer's Unclaimed Property list by going to https://maineunclaimedproperty.gov/. Those who find their name, or the name of a current or past business on the list, can claim the property immediately online, for free. Anyone with questions can call the Treasurer's office toll free in Maine at 888-283-2808 or locally at (207) 624-7470.

The Office of the Treasurer receives new properties throughout the year. The state Treasury is currently holding more than \$275 million of Mainers' unclaimed property.

More than 7,600 employers approved for PPP loans

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Susan Collins (R-Maine), a co-author of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP), announced recently that 7,633 Maine small employers have been approved for a total of \$552,966,380 in

forgivable PPP loans since the PPP reopened last month.

Senator Collins helped to secure \$284.5 billion for PPP in the December COVID-19 relief law

Financial institutions across Maine and the country are currently accepting

and processing PPP applications for eligible small businesses seeking a forgivable loan for the first time and for those hardest hit small businesses who may receive a second forgivable loan.

"The continued demand for forgivable PPP loans demonstrates why it was so important that we reopened this program for the hardest hit small businesses," said Senator Collins. "Since January, a total of 7,633 Maine employers have been approved for nearly \$553 million in forgivable loans, including more than 1,500 small businesses that were approved for nearly \$100 million just last week. The PPP is making it possible for small business owners to keep their doors open, continue paying their employees, and make modifications to keep their employees and customers safe. I encourage eligible

small employers to contact their financial institution to apply."

Small businesses that employ 300 or fewer people and that experienced a 25 percent or greater gross revenue loss between comparable periods in 2019 and 2020 due to COVID-19 are eligible to apply for a second forgivable PPP loan. In addition, forgivable overhead expenses are expanded to include supplier costs and investments in facility modifications and personal protective equipment needed to operate safely. In recognition of the severe impact that COVID-19 mitigation measures have had on the hospitality sector, in particular, the formula used to calculate the maximum forgivable loan amounts for second draw loans is enhanced for restaurants and hotels to equal 3.5x average monthly payroll. Further, small business owners that did not receive a PPP loan in the first round are also eligible to apply.

In 2020, more than 28,000 Maine small businesses and self-employed individuals received nearly \$2.3 billion in forgivable PPP loans, helping to support more than 250,000 jobs throughout the state.

The work of the Legislature continues to ramp up. In committees, we're slowly but surely getting used to managing virtual meetings. While the pandemic has presented us with myriad challenges, I'm happy that it's forced us to innovate in a way that allows more people to participate in the legislative process, as people can now offer testimony at public hearings right from the comfort of their own homes.

Committees working our way through proposed bills, with some already being lined up for consideration before the full Senate and House.

On Tuesday, Governor Mills delivered her annual State of the Budget address. Read on to learn more about what she discussed. In normal years, lawmakers would all gather together in the House Chamber to listen to the governor's address. This year, like with so many things, we switched to a virtual format to allow everyone to listen in while staying

On Thursday, my colleagues and I in the Senate gathered to vote on a slew of official confirmations to a variety of state commissions and boards. We met in the House Chamber of the State House, which allowed us to keep a safe distance from each other while still meeting in person to vote, as Maine's Constitution re-

COVID-19 vaccine update

The past 11 months have been extremely tough for Mainers all across the cinations available, Mainers are anxious to get their shot and get on with their lives. It's why I'm thrilled that the Maine CDC released a timeline for when Mainers of all ages will be eligible for the COVID-19 vaccine. The planned schedule, which is subject to change depending on fluctuations in vaccine supply, is:

- March 3: Eligibility expands to residents age 60 and older
- April: Eligibility expands to age 50 and older
- May: Eligibility expands to age 40 and older
- June: Eligibility expands to age 30 and older
- July and beyond: Ages 29 and under, including children pending authorization of a vaccine for

State of the Budget

On Tuesday evening, Governor Mills delivered her annual State of the Budget address. In her speech, the governor applauded Maine businesses for their continued perseverance and ingenuity in dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic. The key to revitalizing our economy includes long-term investments in both emerging industries and heritage industries that have a track record of keeping Mainers working and communities going for generations. A big part of that investment is centered around a bond proposal, which includes:

Expanding Broadband: \$30 million to expand broadband across Maine, building on the Governor's successful efforts last year to secure \$15 million in new funding for broadband;

Developing Maine's Workforce: \$25 million for equipment for Maine Career and Technical Education programs and a partnership with Maine's Community College System to train skilled workers to fill jobs in high-growth indus-

Supporting Innovation in Heritage Industries: \$50 million for Maine farmers, foresters, and fishermen to increase local processing infrastructure, improve access to markets, and invest in innovation to modernize and add value to products grown, caught,




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USDA invests in Four Maine Organizations

WASHINGTON. DC - The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) last week announced it is investing \$42.3 million to help rural residents gain access to health care and educational opportunities nationwide.

In Maine, four educational organizations will receive a total of \$3.578.754. Rural areas are seeing higher infection and death rates related to COVID-19 due to several factors, including a much higher percentage of underlying conditions, difficulty accessing medical care, and lack of health insurance. The \$42.3 million in awards includes \$24 million provided through the CARES Act. In total. these investments will benefit 5 million rural residents.

"The coronavirus pandemic is a national emergency that requires an

historic federal response. These investments by the Biden Administration will help millions of people living in rural places access health care and education opportunities that could change and save lives," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "USDA is helping rural America build back better using technology as a cornerstone to create more equitable communities. With health care and education increasingly moving to online platforms, the time is now to make historic investments in rural America to improve quality of life for decades to come."

USDA Rural Development Acting State Director Tommy R. Higgins said, "Now more than ever, our schools and healthcare facilities are relying on distance learning and telemedicine technology to assist students and patients in rural areas. This \$3.57 million investment in Maine

is critical to ensuring students can engage in home learning in rural areas and connect to a quality education. In addition, this funding will expand access to telehealth services for rural patients, helping them to receive the vital healthcare they need."

Sanford School Department, in Sanford, will receive a Grant in the amount of \$945,637 to expand the Sanford School Department's middle school aquaponics program into a district-wide Technology, Science, Engineering and Math (STEM) education program. It will enable Kittery students and others to access STEM-related career training from the Sanford CTE center. The project will provide a more flexible approach to teacher professional development. It also to keep the schools open in hybrid learning during the remainder of the pandemic.

Aucocisco School, in Cape Elizabeth, will receive a Grant in the amount of \$708,487 to purchase teleconferencing equipment to connect 16 schools, including public schools and special-purpose private schools, in seven counties in rural Maine. The schools will use the equipment to access professional development and Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) activities. It also will provide more reliable communication for students at home due to the pandemic.

Maine School of Science & Math, in Limestone, will receive a Grant in the amount of \$924,630 to purchase video-telecommunications hardware, software and integrated-classroom presentation equipment to support distance learning among 21 schools in Aroostook County. The project will help to expand curricula in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM); foreign language and other subjects by providing access to educational opportunities across the school districts and dual enrollment to University of Maine Presque Isle. Funds also will be used to purchase personal devices, remote access points and web conferencing licenses to help students participate in classroom activities from home. Teachers will have remote access to professional development, coaching and mentoring

opportunities. University of Maine System, in Orono, will receive a Grant in the amount of \$1,000,000 to install interactive video-teleconferencing equipment at 42 locations across 11 Maine counties. The project will expand educational opportunities for students at remote rural centers and campuses, and help medical clinics expand access to telehealth services for rural patients.

A recent report by the Rural Policy Research Institute's Center for Rural Health Policy Analysis found infection and death rates in rural America due to COVID-19 are 13.4 percent higher than in urban areas. A recent report from USDA's Economic Research Service, USDA ERS - Rural Residents Appear to be More Vulnerable to Serious Infection or Death From Coronavirus COVID-19, underscored the challenges facing rural Americans amidst the COVID-19 pandemic with even greater detail. Due to a confluence of factors, including higher percentages of underlying conditions, lack of health insurance, and lower access to medical facilities/care than urban counterparts, ERS analysts found rural Americans are suffering more severe illness or death due to COVID-19.

honors military and first responders who "continue to make the supreme sacrifice of life and limb for our country," according to its website at tunnel2tow-

Over the years, Limbaugh helped raise some \$5 million in donations to the foundation. In one of his broadcasts, he called the foundation, "one of the most uplifiting things that I've been involved in."

BOSTON - If you are planning on a much-needed getaway in the United States by air and taking your emotional support animal, double check the changes recently issued by the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT).

The changes were deemed necessary for air traveler safety, after numerous concerns were cited by several individuals regarding service animals in limited aircraft space.


The Boston Better Business Bureau provided some specifics on the new rules for service animals when flying:

The definition of a service animal is a dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of a person with a disability.

An emotional support animal is no longer considered to be a service animal. They can be considered as pets. Note: psychiatric service animals are treated the same as other service animals.

The changes allow airlines to require forms developed by DOT attesting to a service animal's health, behavior, and training. If taking a long flight, the owner must attest that the service animal either would not need to relieve itself or can relieve itself in a sanitary manner.





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MDOT plan for state projects

From Sen. Claxton

AUGUSTA – Sen. Ned Claxton (D-Auburn) recently shared the details of Maine's three-year transportation infrastructure work plan, and what it means for the residents of Maine's state senate District 20.

The plan is released annually with an outline of the Maine Department of Transportation's strategy for road, bridge and other transportation upgrades and maintenance projects.

"Despite the extraordinary challenges we continue to face, the folks at Maine DOT have tirelessly worked to improve and strengthen Maine's infrastructure. I want to thank them for all their efforts," said Sen. Claxton. "I'm glad to see that this important work will continue in our community in the coming year."

According to the MDOT, the work plan approximately \$2.71 billion worth of construction and maintenance, which includes 2,180 work items. The three-year plan estimates MDOT will invest in 100 miles of highway construction and rehabilitation; 893 miles of pavement preservation; 2,175 miles of light capital paving for roads and highways; 222 safety and spot improvements; and 166 bridge projects.

The planned capital and maintenance work for the communities in Senate District 20 in 2021 include:

Bridge Work:

In Auburn, culvert replacement on Riverside Drive on Route 136, located 0.62 of a mile east of Penley Corner Road.

Drainage Maintenance:

In Poland, drainage improvements on McGuire Hill Road located 0.18 of a mile north of Pond Lane.

Highway Paving:

In Auburn, surface and base maintenance on Gracelawn Road, beginning at Joline Drive and extending southwest 0.84 of a mile to Mount Auburn Avenue.

In Auburn, light capital paving on Riverside Drive, beginning 0.60 of a mile north of Stackpole Road and extending north 4.13 miles.

In Auburn, light capital paving on Youngs Corner Road, beginning at Lost Valley Road and extending southeast 1.34 miles.

In Auburn, mill and fill on Washington Street South and Washington Street North. Route 202: Beginning 0.20 of a mile south of High Street and

extending south 2.15 miles. Route 202 South: Beginning 0.18 of a mile south of High Street and extending south 2.54 miles. Includes crossovers and ramps.

In Mechanic Falls, light capital paving on West Minot Road, beginning at Route 121 and extending north 0.94 of a mile

In Mechanic Falls, light capital paving on West Minot Road, beginning 0.02 of a mile south of the town line and extending north 3.64 miles.

In Minot, light capital paving on Woodman Hill Road beginning at Route 11 and extending north 6.3 miles to Route 124.

In New Gloucester, light capital paving on Intervale Road beginning 0.01 of a mile north of Woodman Road in New Gloucester and extending northwest 3.13 miles to Route 4

In Poland, light capital paving on Aggregate Road beginning at Route 26 and extending north 0.66 of a mile to Flynt Drive.

Highway Safety and Spot Improvements:

In Auburn, intersection reconstruction at Mill Street and South Main Street, beginning 0.01 of a mile north of Mill Street and extending southeast 0.13 of a mile to Broad Street, and continuing on Broad Street for 0.06 of a

mile.

In Auburn, intersection reconstruction Located at the intersection of Route 4, Fair Street, Martin Street, Public Boat Launch, and Turner Street.

Auburn Airport Improvements:

Safety and infrastructure improvements that may include design, permitting, and construction of east ramp rehabilitation.

Safety and infrastructure improvements that may include land acquisition in the Runway Protection Zone.

Transit:

Federal Transit Authority (FTA) ADA operating assistance for CityLink bus.

Western Maine Transportation Systems operating assistance and equipment purchase for new route.

In Auburn, renovation of maintenance and administration facility located at 76 Merrow Road. Includes an additional drive-through maintenance bay, a wash bay, and increased parking and security measures.



USDA funding for energy efficient projects

USDA Rural Development is now accepting applications for the Rural Energy for America Program Renewable Energy Systems & Energy Efficiency Improvements. The deadline for applications is Wednesday, March 31.

Eligible applicants include agricultural producers and rural small for profit businesses in communities with populations of less than 50,000 people. Applicants may apply for funding to purchase and install renewable energy systems such as solar, wind, geothermal, renewable biomass, hydro-power, hydrogen or anaerobic digesters. Energy efficiency improvements may include improvements such as: HVAC, lighting, refrigeration, computerized controls or variable frequency drives, irrigation systems and grain dryers. Guaranteed loan funding is also available in conjunction with grant funding.
