



Switchgear accelerates into next turn of life

The founders of SwitchGear Brewing Co.—which opened in May 2017 located inside the historic Feed Mill in Elkhart Lake—have announced the sale of the brewery to three Sheboygan County family entrepreneurs.

Current owners and founders Nick Kullmann, Ryan Feldmann and Mark Grasse have established the popular craft brewery that features beers such as The Pontoon Pounder, Resorter Red Ale, Lead Foot Scotch Ale, Fat Cheeks Nut Brown and Corner 5 Smash Pale Ale.

Full-time jobs, a retirement and family obligations have slowed the ability for them to fully realize the business potential including canning and expanding wholesale distribution. Kullmann added, "On the road of life, we may not be able to race to the finish line, but we had a lot fun along the way, a testament to the village and its residents, for which we are very humbled and thankful."

New owners Dustin Dutter, Cheyenne (Dutter) Kirst and Kyle Kirst share the belief that SwitchGear is about so much more than just brewing beer. Dutter added, "We are poised to share the passion the



guys have created and chase something we collectively enjoy." Kirst said, "We have smalltown family roots, and we look forward to becoming part of the Elkhart Lake community."

The transition began in mid-March as both groups listened, learned and leaned into the next turn together. Founders Kullmann, Feldmann and Grasse have agreed to stay on for up to a six-month transition. After that they plan on embracing the road less traveled, not certain where the road will lead, but certain it's going to be fun every mile of the way.

LTC again designated Military Friendly School


plications for veterans who are dislocated workers, National Guard Tuition Grant Applications, and VetEd Reimbursement

CHAMBER SPOTLIGHT **Elkhart Lake Public Library**

Our March Chamber Member Spotlight is the Elkhart Lake Public Library.

Elkhart Lake Public Library is part of the Monarch Library System which is made up of the public libraries in Sheboygan, Ozaukee, Washington and Dodge counties and Lakeland University. We receive five day a week delivery between libraries and can get materials the library may not own from any of the other libraries. Our materials are available through the Monarch Catalog (www.monarchcatalog.org). Other resources are available through our website at www.elkhartlakepubliclibrary.org.

Betty McCartney was hired as the library director in 2011. The library has been around, in one form or another, since 1906! The library is governed by an eight-person Board of Trustees which is appointed by the Village of Elkhart Lake and Sheboygan County.

The library went through a renovation in 2018 with new furnishing, flooring, and paint. We added a vestibule to our park-side entrance. ElkhartCares donated a beautiful window seat as part of the renovation.

We added additional access to our Wi-Fi and it is now available inside the library and outside in the park 24/7. We have three internet stations. We offer faxing and scanning services and color and black and white copying.

Our virtual coffee hour chat meets on Wednesday mornings and Book Club once a month. We offer Story Time Togo kits (a collection of books, games and crafts) which allow caregivers to hold a Story Time at home. We offer Take & Make craft projects, too. We added Discovery kits to our collection this year. We have kits where you can learn to play the ukulele, learn to perform magic tricks, play pickleball, learn to knit and much more.

We are looking forward to our 2021 Summer Reading Program, "Tails and Tales." Patrons will be able to log the time they read online and earn badges and prizes. We are planning on offering inperson programs this summer.

We offer several digital services. Kanopy is a streaming movie service and Hoopla is a digital service that has ebooks, eaudiobooks, comics, movies and TV shows. Libby (Overdrive) has 3,000 magazines (always available) along with ebooks and e-audibooks.

In 2020 we went fine-free by eliminating daily overdue fines on materials checked out at Elkhart Lake Public Library. Yes, we still charge if items are lost or damaged.

The Friends of the Elkhart Lake Library is a group of enthusiastic volunteers that supports many of our programs with their fundraising.



School update

Planning under way for next school year

A message from Dr. Ann Buechel Haack, administrator of the Elkhart Lake School District...

While this year has presented its "challenges," we are on the "homestretch." March 26 brings the end to the third quarter. In recognition and with huge appreciation for everyone's efforts, our staff, our families, and our community, we were able to provide a quality educational experience on-site for our students. To prepare for the remainder of the 2020-'21 school year and the start of the 2021-'22 school year, we've already been busy analyzing varying scenarios and situations to begin making plans that will continue to meet our students', our families' and our district's needs.

Below is a brief summary of the planning currently under way:

Planning for the return of virtual students to on-site instruction

As we believe on-site instruction best meets the overall needs of our students, academically and socially, the principals are reaching out to our "virtual" families to encourage their students to return to school on-site for the fourth quarter. Many of our virtual students have already begun returning, and the staff is happy to have them back in their classes. We understand this may not be possible for all students due to medical conditions for the student and/or with their family or for other reasons, so we will continue to work with these families to provide the best learning experience we can for all our students.

Planning Easter meals/gift cards to district families

Due to the continuing support we have been receiving from our school families and from our community members, we are planning to provide an Easter meal and additional groceries, supplies, and/or gift cards to our families in need of assistance. For Christmas, meals were provided to almost 40 families. If you would like to assist us in this effort, your support would be very much appreciated by the district, and especially by our families. Financial donations can be sent to ELGSD, P.O. Box 326, Elkhart Lake, WI 53020.

We are currently reaching out to those families to assess the current need; how-

Planning for spring events

Although COVID numbers are improving and more members of the community are becoming eligible for the vaccine, we are remaining very cautious with our planning of spring events—balancing the holding of certain events (rather in-person or virtually, or even at all) against the risks of doing so.

Our goal during this entire period has been to find a way to offer opportunities to students and families if possible to do so safely by adhering to guidelines that mitigate the risk for all involved. We will continue to take this approach going forward. At this time, our plans are to hold events such as graduation and eighth grade recognition following the same protocols as last summer. More information will be provided as events become closer. As we all know, things keep changing!

Planning for summer school

We are currently planning for summer school to be held on-site for five weeks starting June 14. It will follow a format similar to years prior to 2020 with two sessions being offered to elementary and middle school students (each session approximately 12 days) and individual schedules being established for high school students; however, class sizes will be limited to allow for social distancing. We will continue to practice safety protocols that have been in place during the school year to provide as safe an environment as possible. Our goal will be to provide experiences that provide both enrichment activities and also the opportunity to address any academic gaps before school begins in the fall. More information will be shared after spring break.

Planning for 2021-'22 school year

High School students have already submitted their course selections for

next school year and initial scheduling is under way. Our plan is for all students to be back in-person, on-site for the 2021-'22 school year. We know this is the hope of our staff, and from many conversations, also of most of our parents and students! However, we will continue to monitor the situation through the summer in case alternate plans do need to be developed.

Planning for 2021 summer facility projects

The board approved two major projects at the High School to begin as soon as school ends in June. The 1968 flooring in the upper level classrooms of the high school will removed, abated and new tile installed to match the flooring that has been updated in the rest of the building over the past few years. Also, a complete renovation of the science wing has been planned. The entire area has been reconfigured so the form of the layout will better meet the function for science learning of today. The two classrooms will be relocated at the ends of the science wing, with a large shared lab and storage area located between the two classrooms. This area will be able to be monitored by teachers as they are instructing classes so independent student laboratory work can be completed simultaneously with classroom instruction. Also, the entire lab area will be designed and equipped to be handicapped accessible. This project is being funded by a combination of general district budget funds and referendum monies.

To summarize, although this planning has kept us very busy, the only two areas that we know will happen for sure is our family Easter meal/assistance program and the summer renovation project. As for the others, we'll continue to move forward, but with all plans this past year, we know they are fluid and subject to change. We'll be flexible and adjust as needed, just as we've done since March 2020. As became our "mantra" this past year...stay tuned!

As always, please reach out to me and/ or our building principals if you have any questions or ideas/thoughts to share. Our "doors" are always open!

Sheboatin' on Elkhart Lake

Special pontoon gets ready for its 2nd season

Elkhart Lake has an amenity normally only found in large cities, thanks to Justin Vannieuwenhoven and his party on a pontoon boat known as Sheboatin'.

The second season of Sheboatin' on Elkhart Lake is about to begin, and Vannieuwenhoven said he is expecting a busy year. He is basing that on the combination of people getting their first taste of Sheboatin' last year and the positive direction in which the COVID-19 pandemic and vaccinations are moving.

"It was an interesting year to say the least," Vannieuwenhoven said of 2020. It was his third year of running Shebikin' in Sheboygan, a concept similar to Sheboatin' in which a group of people tour the community while pedaling as a group.

Despite the pandemic, Sheboatin' had a successful first season on Elkhart Lake. Five tours of 100 minutes each can be fit into a day, and Vannieuwenhoven said there were days last year which were booked full (four tours were offered per day last year). Tours continued until the second week of October.

No food or alcohol are served by Sheboatin' but participants are welcome to bring their own coolers on board. No glass containers or hard liquor are allowed, but people can bring cans of beer, soda, and whatever snacks or food they wish.

Vannieuwenhoven said last year's experience showed a diverse group of people enjoy taking a Sheboatin' tour, with as many children as adults on the tours. "I enjoy the tours with the kids," he said.

Sheboatin' makes the experience fun for all ages, offering a variety of games during the tour. Vannieuwenhoven describes Sheboatin' as a combination of a county fair and a boat ride, adding, "If people come on a tour and leave thinking it was just a pontoon ride, then I've completely failed."

This year's boat tours will include five different arcade games built into the bar area which runs down the center of the boat, including the popular "chase the light" type of game often found in arcades.

Pontoon boats used in larger cities for these types of activities are generally 35 feet long and can host 15 to 25 people, Vannieuwenhoven said, but the boat he used on Elkhart Lake last year was 25 feet long and could host 10 people, with five sets of pedals on each side of the bar area. He said he is working on a new boat for this season on the lake.

Boat tours start at the lake deck at The Osthoff Resort, and once on the lake the boat stays to the Turtle Bay side.

Bookings are already being taken for the upcoming season of Sheboatin' and can be done at www.sheboatin.com. The cost is \$380 for the boat load of 10 people, the same cost as the 15-person Shebikin'. Several months before the first Sheboatin' tour of this summer, Vannieuwenhoven said he already has bookings. "I'm excited for it," he said. "I think it will be good."

Many of those passengers are likely to be repeat customers, a trend Vannieuwenhoven said he has seen with both Sheboatin' and Shebikin'. "That's what we see a lot of," he said. "There's nothing like this and it's fun every time."

If inclement weather is forecast on the day of a scheduled boat tour, Vannieuwenhoven said they will try to go out earlier or

later or reschedule to another day.

Swimming off the pontoon boat is an option as well as it will pull into a bay where the water is only knee to waist deep.

Sheboatin' has already garnered good

publicity for itself and Elkhart Lake, including being featured on the Wisconsinbased show Project Pitch It. Vannieuwenhoven said he also is working with a production company on possibly producing a game show using the boat as its setting and hand-picked passengers as contestants.

Vannieuwenhoven said, "At the end of the day, my goal is to bring more fun to







Keep Kettle Moraine in the Kettle Moraine

My father purchased the roughly 40 acres of the old Elkhart Lake Sand & Gravel operation at CTH JJ and Golf Course roads in 1963.

It was a denuded site characterized by large sandy pits, scalped sandy uplands, about eight acres of wet lowlands and a very narrow veneer of the remnant original forest vegetation—sugar maple, hickory, red oak, ironwood, hornbeam and basswood—along Golf Course Road. Beneath these there still existed, somehow, relics of the understory wildflowers, i.e., trillium, hepatica, lion's foot, and a few others. Two large cottonwoods stood out in the far northeast corner.

When I became custodian of the land in 2003, I was overwhelmed by the dominance of European and Asiatic invader plants. In the vacuum left from the exterminated Kettle Moraine vegetation there abounded Asiatic honeysuckle and alien buckthorns; European grasses and alien spruce and pines had choked out most of the once abundant sand coreopsis on the uplands as well as plum thickets in the hollows. Partially shaded areas were controlled by alien dame's rocket, garlic mustard and wild parsnip; reed canary grass was killing the American sedges.

Furthermore, an aggressive mowing campaign by the local DPW had eradicated the wetland flowers deep in from the roadsides and introduced even more destructive non-American invaders into these areas.

Since then my work on this land has been to save the native vegetation that has not yet succumbed to the above onslaught while also bringing every variety of likely lost plant "back home." And something miraculous is happening: The bird life has become more abundant and varied, depending as it does on a healthy and abundant insect presence, which in turn relies exclusively on our native plants. A subtlety of texture and tints is, though still nebulous, sketching a portrait (for those with "time-lapse" vision) of what once was, and, with Time's help, might be again.

Yet, as I drive past homes in the area, it puzzles me why I see no Kettle Moraine plantings in those yards. I ask myself, "Why do people want to live here if they so scrupulously keep at bay (Is it a case of NIMBY?) the vanishing landscape that they claim to love." This landscape is deeply wounded and vanishing; would that the expressions of love for it might be matched by deeds.

Group keeps advancing Plymouth

Formed in 1994, the Plymouth Advancement Association continues to work to enhance the quality of life for residents of the greater Plymouth area—even during a pandemic.

Last summer, volunteers of the association were looking for ways to raise the spirits of people in the middle of the pandemic while also raising funds for some local organizations.

Jacqueline Jarvis, vice president of the association, said they came up with the idea of holding Fire Fest 2020—a fireworks show which could be held safely on the expansive grounds of Road America.

Jarvis said the event was pulled together in just five weeks and sold out largely with word-of-mouth advertising. "It was a great success," she said, adding that people "were just so happy" to be able to attend an outdoors event during a year when virtually everything else had been cancelled.

Fire Fest 2020 raised \$74,500 for the fire departments in Plymouth and Elkhart Lake as well as the Sheboygan County Food Bank.

Jarvis said Fire Fest was a one-time event held during an unusual year, but the Plymouth Advancement Association has two more big plans for 2021 which are nearing fruition.

The first of those plans is the construction of gateway arches on both ends of Plymouth's downtown honoring the community as the "Cheese Capital of the World."

The arch on the east side of downtown will be located on Eastern Avenue before the Mill Street intersection. That steel and aluminum arch is being fabricated and could be finished sometime in May or early June, Jarvis said. It will be painted black with the words "cheese" and "capital" in letters which will match the Cream City brick bases on each side of the street.

On the west end of downtown, the existing railroad trestle over Mill Street near the intersection of STH 67 will be painted black. The same "Cheese Capital of the World" emblem will be installed on the bridge, which is currently faded green and was last painted about 30 years ago.


The Plymouth Advancement Association is spearheading the fundraising for these improvements to the Plymouth community. A total of \$160,000 will need to be raised. The City of Plymouth has committed \$40,000 to the project while the association has committed \$50,000, with the rest needing to be raised. Public fundraising will be starting soon, including a CharityGoFundMe page.

Jarvis said a dedication ceremony is being planned with organizations such as the Plymouth Arts Center and the Plymouth Historical Society planning corresponding events to add to the celebration.


The second big event for this year coordinated by the Plymouth Advancement Association is Walldogs Murals Part 2.

In 2011 the community gained much attention for the Walldogs mural project which painted numerous murals on the sides of downtown businesses. The group is coming back this Aug. 25 to 29 to paint four new murals as well as doing maintenance painting on some of the existing murals. Some of the painting will be done under lights at night, helping to make it a community celebration similar to 2011.

Jarvis said there have been some early discussions about holding some type of additional community event this fall as

the community and the world hopefully celebrate a greater return to normalcy after the pandemic.

The big events in 2021 will add to the long legacy of the Plymouth Advancement Association, a record which includes installing decorative street signs in downtown Plymouth, lining downtown Mill Street with trees, and support of the downtown Plymouth revitalization master plan.

The Plymouth Advancement Association, Incorporated is a charitable not-forprofit 501(c)(3) organization. Jarvis said there is no official list of "members," nor is there any dues. Everything is done on a volunteer basis, and anyone can volunteer. There are no regular meetings.

Lee Gentine, who has been part of the Plymouth Advancement Association since

its first year, is the association's president, presiding over a Board of Directors.

Spring election set for April 6

The ballot is set for the April 6, 2021 election.

If you need to have an absentee ballot, please make sure you fill out the form and provide photo ID to our office, or go to https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/ and request an absentee ballot. If you request a ballot online, it will be mailed shortly. As of the writing of this article the Clerk's office is open for absentee voting, but please watch our website for changes. We ask that if you are high risk or not feeling well please vote absentee to avoid coming to the polls.

If you need to register to vote you can do it in person at the village offices between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Mondays through Fridays (subject to change depending on COVID-19). You can only register in person at this time and then you can register at the polling place on election day.

She has served on the Library Board, Public Works, Municipal Planning and Zoning, and the school liaison to the Village Board. Arbor Day

The village is looking at organizing a socially distanced Arbor Day celebration on April 30. The date and time is to be determined. Please watch the village website for more information.

Hydrant flushing schedule

Hydrant flushing will be done April 12 and 13, July 12 and 13, and Oct. 11 and 12. Please watch for this activity in your area and refrain from water usage at that time.

Some hydrants are flushed every second Monday of the month, but this could vary depending on weather conditions and the Public Works task list. Thank you for your patience!

Sewer rate increase effective Jan. 1, 2021

Sewer rates increased to \$7.10 per 100 cubic feet of water consumed effective Jan. 1, 2021. The rate increase is due to a rate increase from Northern Moraine Utility Commission (our sewer treatment facility). Please contact the administrator/clerk-treasurer's office if you have any questions related to water or sewer billing.

Clerk's hours changes in March to May

The Clerk's office will have slightly different hours in the months of March, April, and May, due to staffing. The weeks of March 22 and 29 the hours will be 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. The office will be closed on April 2 for Good Friday. If you need to absentee vote on April 2, you will need to make an appointment. The week of April 5 the office will be open Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m., and the office will be closed on April 9. From April 12 through May 21 the hours will be 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. The hours on Tuesdays and Fridays will be from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m. There may be periodic days the office will be closed during March, April, May or June. Please check our website www. elkhartlakewi.gov for information as we will update it if the schedule changes.

Dog licenses

Please stop in at the Village Hall to license your dog by March 31. You need to provide a proof of rabies vaccination and pay the fee (\$7 per spayed or neutered dog and \$14 per dog if not spayed or neutered). A late charge will be assessed to all dogs not licensed by March 31.

News on water: Cross connection inspections

The village will be putting more emphasis on inspecting homes and businesses for cross connections in the water system. The DNR requires that all homes and businesses are inspected for cross-connection. We hired a company named L-R Meter to conduct the cross connection on commercial, industrial, and public buildings.

Cross-connection is an actual or potential connection between the safe drinking water supply and a source of contamination of pollution. State plumbing codes require approved backflow prevention methods to be installed at every point of potable water connection and use. Cross-connections must be properly protected or eliminated.

How does contamination occur? When you turn on your faucet, you expect the water to be as safe as when it left the treatment plant or well; however, certain hydraulic conditions left unprotected within your plumbing system may allow hazardous substances to contaminate your own drinking water or the public water supply. Water normally flows in one direction; however, under certain conditions, water can actually flow backwards. This is known as backflow. Backsiphonage or backpressure may cause the water to flow backwards. Backsiphonage may occur due to a loss of pressure in the municipal water system during a fire fighting emergency, a water main break, or system repair. This creates a siphon in your plumbing system which can draw water out of a sink or bucket and back into your water or the public water system. Backpressure may be created when a source of pressure (such as a boiler) creates a pressure greater than the pressure supplied from the public water system. This may cause contaminated water to be pushed into your plumbing system through an unprotected crossconnection.

In most cases where can cross connection issues occur? In the bathroom with handheld shower fixtures and toilet tanks and in the kitchen.

How can you protect your drinking water?

Do these things:

- Keep the ends of hoses clear of all possible contaminants.
- Make sure dishwashers are installed with a proper "air gap" device.
- Verify and install a simple hose bibb vacuum breaker on all threaded faucets around your home.
- Make sure water treatment devices such as water softeners have the proper "air gap," which is a minimum of one inch above any drain.

Do not do these things:

- Submerge hoses in buckets, pools, tubs, sinks or ponds.
- Use spray attachments without a backflow prevention device.
- Connect waste pipes from water softeners or other treatment systems directly to the sewer or submerged drain pipe. Always be sure there is a one inch "air gap" separation.


