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#### Dear Editor:

"Reliable Affordable Last Mile Fiber Optic Broadband" for Franklin County Reliable affordable last-mile fiber optic broadband service is a critical utility long needed for rural Franklin County, our children's education, e-health services, work-from-home, e-commerce and our county's economic growth and development.

Letter to the editor...

The COVID-19 pandemic only reinforced the overdue need. Timely funding is an investment in our county's future, equal to our current county utilities and infrastructure. Regrettably, large nation-wide internet providers have not served, or have underserved, rural Franklin County.

Over the years, despite numerous meetings and efforts by our officials and dedicated task force members, nation-wide providers have misled our county. Over the recent year, the Franklin County Water Service Authority (FCWSA) has focused on its statutory responsibility to obtain reliable affordable last-mile fiber optic broadband service for our rural county.

Along with Franklin Electric Cooperative (FEC), FCWSA entered into an arrangement with a neighboring county electric cooperative/ internet provider. This provider has a proven successful track record of providing reliable affordable last-mile fiber optic broadband service to rural county residents in their service areas.

The arrangement, agreed to last August, would have provided every FEC member reliable affordable last-mile fiber optic broadband service in two (2) to three (3) years. The last step required to initiate this effort was federal funding from a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) reverse auction held last fall.

Shocking to rural communities around the country, large nation-wide providers "low-balled" their bids for the federal funding. The tactic forced smaller providers, such as the one FCWSA and FEC secured, out of the auction and unable to secure timely required funding.

More shocking, the "winning" bidders secured insufficient funding to actually provide reliable affordable last-mile fiber optic broadband to Franklin County and other rural communities they bid for.

#### **Colbert County Tourism Bureau invites visitors** to tour historic Sheffield and Tuscumbia

The Colbert County Tourism and Convention Bureau is pleased to invite visitors and residents to take a stroll through the histories of Sheffield and Tuscumbia during a series of walking tours on Saturdays in April.

The free tours begin April 3 and continue on April 10, 17 and 24. Each of the tours will start at 10 a.m. The Tuscumbia tours begin outside Cold Water Bookstore, 101 W. Sixth St. The Sheffield tours begin at the Municipal Building, 600 N. Montgomery Ave. The tours will be led by local historians Jimmy Austin in Sheffield and John McWilliams in Tuscumbia.

Susann Hamlin, president and CEO of Colbert Tourism, said the tours provide an excellent opportunity to learn the histories about some of the oldest buildings and stories about the earliest residents of the towns. In addition, Saturday mornings in the spring are a wonderful time to explore Alabama. "April is one of the most beautiful times of the year to be outdoors as the early spring flowers are blooming and the weather is typically perfect for a morning walk."

Both cities have hosted these annual Walking Tours for over a decade. They are a hit with the locals and visitors alike. The Colbert County

Tourism Office has been sponsoring these tours since their inception when the Alabama Tourism Department initiated these state-wide tours.

Hamlin said Tuscumbia's history predates Alabama becoming a state. Native Americans were living around what is now Spring Park when the first white family, the Dicksons, arrived around 1817. Alabama became a state in 1819.

Sheffield was founded in the 1880s. However, a town known as York Bluff was located at what is now Sheffield before 1820. Among the property owners of York Bluff was Andrew Jackson, who would later become President of the United States, Hamlin said.

Jimmy Austin, who coordinates the Sheffield tours, said the April 3 and 17 walks will concentrate on the historic homes along Montgomery Avenue north of City Hall. The April 10 and 24 tours will focus on businesses along Montgomery Avenue south of City Hall.

The April walking tours are a part of an Alabama Tourism Department initiative and will take place throughout the state.

Hamlin said walking tour participants should wear comfortable shoes and dress appropriately for the weather that day. For more information on the walking tours, please contact the Colbert County Tourism Office at (256) 383-0783.

thing years ago and I'm still here," Suddith said. "Being a church secretary isn't usually on a young person's list of life goals, but I am thankful for the life calling God planned for me."

February 11, 2021, marked Suddith's 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary as First Baptist Church Secretary. April 28, 2021, will mark her final day in that job. This time, she means it.

Her church family will host a reception in her honor the afternoon of Sunday, April 25. The exact time will be announced. The public is invited to the special event.

Suddith and her husband Rick have been members of FBC since they came to Russellville in 1977. Rick, a Franklin County native, was coming home, while Lynn was starting a new chapter of life in a new community.

Suddith will remain an active church member, but said it's time for her to retire and turn over her office duties to Theresa Burns and Angie Tidwell, her new co-workers.

During her three decades at FBC, there have been five different pastors and, when you add up all the associate pastors, children's directors and church staff, it totals more than 20 different folks.

Even Bert Fowler, FBC Associate Pastor of Worship and Senior Adults and the church's longest-tenured pastor, trails Suddith by two years. He describes his friend and co-worker as a 'true ministry assistant.'

"Lynn has a servant's heart. She told us if we have any questions after she leaves to just call her," Fowler said. "She has always considered this a calling, not just a job, and she will not quit what she was called to do just because she won't be here every day.

"I don't think we will realize everything she does until she's gone," he added.

Rick will retire from his teaching position at the Franklin County Career Tech Center in May, so there will be two retirees in the Suddith household.

"I plan to organize my house and travel," Lynn said. "A big trip out West is definitely on our list."

Since she announced her retirement, Suddith has worked with Burns and Tidwell gradually turning over duties to them.

"The first time I handed over the flash drive containing the weekly church bulletin, that was hard. That's something I've done for a long time," Suddith



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Among her many contributions to FBC, Suddith's pulse of what was happening with church members stands out to Fowler.

"She keeps the staff informed and in line, and keeps us out of trouble. Lynn knows what's going on with our church family," Fowler said. "She calls people, checks on Facebook and stays really in tune with members of the church and, in turn, keeps the staff informed very well."

It may take time to get used to it, but Suddith said she's okay with her retirement.

"With Rick retiring at the end of the school year, it was just the right time to do this. We're not going anywhere, though. We'll still be active at the church. You're not going to get rid of me," Suddith said.

Connecticut, New York, Florida and Tennessee before coming to Alabama n 2011.

In addition to celebrating their platinum (70<sup>th</sup>) anniversary, Bob and Alice each turn 91 this month. So there's plenty of reason to celebrate in April.

Growing up in Norwalk, Conn., Bob and Alice knew each other but never dated during high school.

Before Bob left to serve in the United States Navy, one gentlemanly act opened the door to a lifetime of happiness.

(Alice) was waiting with her sister for the bus to go home. They were waiting under a bridge," he recalls. "I drove by and said I would take them home. I took her home, took her sister home and the next day I called and asked for a date.

Not wanting to risk losing Alice to another suitor, Bob called her while on active duty and proposed over the phone. And, of course, she said yes.

Their marriage is truly a partnership. Bob and Alice not only live together and travel together, they worked together at various businesses they've owned, including a mobile home park, furniture stripping business and a household garbage collection business (although Bob was solo when it came to riding in the garbage truck).

Their lifetime together has been filled with happiness, and the love they expressed in 1951 still remains as strong as ever.

Alice's face lights up as she describes the year she and Bob spent traveling in a recreational vehicle across the western United States. Alice kept a journal of where they went and what they did each day. And 26 years later, that journal remains one of her most cherished possessions.

Alaska tops the list of destinations Bob would like to visit. And he laughingly recalls how close he was to seeing America's largest, and coldest, state.

"We were in Washington during our year out west. I wanted to drive north to Alaska, but she said it was 'too far,' even though we lived in Florida at the time and we were already in Washington state," he said.

Their 70 years together have brought Bob and Alice a lifetime of good times, mixed in with one or two hardships. The passing of their 15-year-old son Tommy, who died from complications from a tumor on his brain stem, was particularly difficult.

"I felt if I let myself cry and hurt I would not be able to stop," Alice said. "You ust get through life's difficult times and I had to hold it in because I thought l'd lose it if I didn't."

Bob took Alice to Washington, D.C., for their honeymoon in 1951, in his old two-door Mercury. It would be their first visit to the nation's capital, and Bob was a little lead-footed on the way.

"I picked up speed more than I should have and a cop stopped me. He got out and asked what we were doing," Bob said. "I told him we were on our honeymoon, and he told me to slow down. 'You're on your honeymoon. You don't want to kill her right off the bat," he added.

The Bedells don't travel much these days, but it's not because they can't. Bob still drives and he says their health remains good. It's something else that keeps them from traveling across the country.

"Times have changed so much. It's so different now with people doing crazy things," he said. "The whole country has changed with its moral outlook. It's entirely different from 1950 when we were young."

Sharon knows the blessing she has with her parents, now in their 90s, living near her in good health with sound minds.

"I think their secret is remaining active. These two never stop. They just keep going," Sharon said. "My dad has a workshop and he still builds things with his hands. He still mows the lawn (with some help).

"I really think their not sitting still along with their healthy eating has been so beneficial to them.

"I'm thankful they are close by, especially now. In all my married life, I've never lived close to my family. So it's nice to be able to help them and make sure everything is okay," she added.

70 years together. Their marriage has spanned the administrations of 14 U.S. Presidents, from Harry S. Truman to Joe Biden. Since saying 'I do,' Bob and Alice have seen the advent of Barbie dolls, audio cassettes, handheld calculators, the Sony Walkman, cell phones, DVDs and Beanie Babies.

So what's the greatest event in his lifetime? Bob's answer is the same as it was 71 years ago.

"I always say she was the best thing to ever happen to me and I still say it to this day. She remains that to me always," he said.

He allowed three earned runs on seven hits and two walks, throwing 72 of his 113 pitches for strikes.

Enterprise put two men on with just one out in the top of the first, but catcher Bryant Anthony threw out a runner trying to steal third and Swinney recorded a strikeout to avoid any damage. The Bobcats jumped out to an early lead in the bottom of the inning when Swinney walked and later scored on an RBI single by Ridge Raper. Swinney struck out two batters in the top of the second, and Phil Campbell put together two walks, a fly-out and a passed ball to add a run in the bottom half. Enterprise stranded two runners in the top of the third but broke up the shutout with a run in the top of the fourth. Payton Easterling led off with a double, and courtesy runner Dylan Gilbert eventually scored on Charles Cavanaugh's squeeze bunt to make it 2-1.

Swinney got that run back with an RBI single in the bottom of the fourth and then struck out two batters in a scoreless top of the fifth. GULF SHORES - If you haven't heard by now, the pitching staff for the Russellville Golden Tigers baseball team has been nothing short of spectacular so far this season. That fact was most apparent last week as the Golden Tigers went a perfect 6-0 in the Gulf Shores Classic to take home the tournament championship.

Russellville (24-4) got dominant performances from its pitching staff to the tune of a 1.22 ERA across 40 innings pitched in the tournament with wins against Enterprise, Cottage Hill, Gordonsville, Decatur and Smiths Station.

Five different pitchers made starts for the Golden Tigers in the tournament with three others making an appearance in relief.

For Russellville, the pitching success has been constant for the Golden Tigers all season long as

they currently hold the top spot in the 5A ASWA baseball rankings.

And to hear head coach Chris Heaps put it, while the Golden Tigers have yet to face the toughest part of their schedule, the developments on the mound that he has seen has been encouraging nonetheless.

"Tougher teams and games are coming so we will get to see if they can continue doing what they're doing. But up to this point they've been really really good and I've been extremely proud of how they've developed and matured," Heaps said. "The biggest thing to me is the maturity as strike-throwers. The best pitch in baseball is strike one and Emitt, Gordon and Rowe and the guys coming in behind them have all done a great job of establishing themselves early in the counts."

one factors in the Golden Tigers' 51 strikeouts and only 12 walks across six games), there was another aspect in particular that caught Heaps' eye: defense.

The Golden Tigers defense was nothing short of spectacular in Gulf Shores, committing only two errors the entire tournament.

"We pitched the ball extremely well but our defense was just flat out great the entire week. Our pitchers painted the zone and our guys behind our pitchers did a great job backing those guys on the mound up," Heaps said. "Nick Smith played an incredible third base for us and Eli Gipson made play after play for us at shortstop. Then on the right side of our infield, Cole Barnett had a really great week on both offense and defense and we turned some really nice double plays with Jackson Lindsey on the other end. Jackson is probably the best first baseman I've ever had. When you combine the defensive and offensive aspects that he's capable of, there's no better guy around."

As the Golden Tigers prep for area play this week against West Point to determine who will carry the area crown for the season, some of the top offensive guys for the Golden Tigers are getting hot at the right time in Lindsey, Smith, Reed Hill and others.

And while it's no secret that the heart of the Golden Tiger lineup can wreak havoc on any given night, it's the mindset that his entire team approaches the game night-in and night-out that Heaps prides his squad on.

"Jackson and Nick are probably our top offensive producers but we've got so many solid guys and really good players that can produce at any time. Chemistry is the secret because no one really cares about who gets the credit as long as things get done," Heaps said. "And that's why I love this team so much. We've got some guys who have major roles and some have minor roles but everyone has accepted their roles to this point and are committed to what we're doing here and if we can do that, we can do a lot of great things."
