## The Big One That Got Away

I've been fishing offshore for over 20 years and had never encountered a marlin. Every once in a while, I'd hear on the radio that someone hooked one and think, "Yeah right."

Well, last year while fishing offshore out of Sebastian, I had a go with a blue marlin.

After running around in the morning looking for fishy water, we put lines in on a pencilthin weedline running east and west in about 425 feet of water. The first hit was an undersized mahi that tangled some lines and created more havoc than it was worth. After getting the lines untangled and redeployed, I noticed birds diving behind us. They were about 200 yards off the weedline so we u-turned and headed to intercept them.

I had a great feeling and remember telling the crew, "Bring your A-game!"

Just before entering the strike zone (before we got real close to the birds), the shotgun

rod bends in half and starts screaming like we've never heard before. Immediately, I'm thinking it's a big wahoo. As I turn around and grab the rod, I see a huge splash. So now I'm thinking - big dolphin. Then, in what seemed like slow motion, a bill comes out of the water so I call out, "Sailfish!" Nope.

As it's massive head clears the water, we all get a look at it. Then my dad says, "That's a marlin!" And a big one too - likely in the 400-450lb range.

At this point, the fish realized it was hooked and made another big run. Not to say it would be impossible, but we hooked him on a TLD 25 and it would take some luck to land this fish. Ideally we would clear all the lines and get to the bow to chase him down. But before we could even begin that process, he jumped and broke the line, then proceeded to jump another seven times trying to shake the pink/white llander from his mouth. I continued to reel like crazy hoping the fish had just put a lot of slack in the line but he was gone. It was an awesome experience

that left us thinking, "Did that really just happen?" The whole fight lasted no more than 30 seconds, but it was an awesome experience! We worked the area for a while but the birds flew off and we didn't catch anything else there.

If you fish long enough, you're bound to have stories like this. It could be that you're under-geared like in my case. It could be bad line, bent hooks, pulled hooks, broken knots, tangles, structure break offs - the list goes on. Sometimes you don't even get to see the fish but you know it's BIG! It's the painful part of fishing and it's one of the many reasons that keeps us coming back.

It only took a few days after that trip for me to purchase a bigger rod/reel combo for the shotgun. Not that a marlin always hits that rod in the spread, but if it did, at least we'd have a better chance. In all the times we've been out since, I'm still looking for that marlin.




Since they started dating, the two have been fishing from the surf and kayaks in the canals. This time it was the surf and Donna was in for a fight.







Whats up guys? Tarzan here. There has been a lot a fish around inshore, offshore, and on the beach! I have had a lot of luck using a white fishbites paddle tail with a red 1/80z jig head for snook. Livebait, like mullet or shrimp have been working well too! The snook have been on the flats, around the docks and hugged up to the mangroves.

The trout have been in the deeper water around 5 to 10 feet and some on the flats. I've been fishing canals for trout lately and it's paid off.


The offshore fishing has been great too! I've caught lots of mahi trolling in 250 to 300 feet of water. Make sure you find a weedline and you'll be on them. Naked ballyhoos have been the key bait for me.

Last but not least, we have the beach! There have been a ton of whiting and some pompano. The pomps are definitely running north to get in the colder water. There are also mackerel and lady fish! The sharks are pushing them into the trough. Make sure you reel your fish in fast before the sharks get to it. If you want to catch sharks, now is the time to go! Be on the lookout for glass minnows! 

## Lagoon Earns Failing Health Score of 58 (F+)

The Marine Resources Council of East Florida will be presenting on this lagoon health update, Thurs., May 20. The presentation will be an in-person event and also streamed online. For more information and to RSVP, please visit SaveTheIRL.org.

#### Cleaning up the lagoon means confronting stormwater pollution.

Stormwater is the primary contributor of pollution to the lagoon. After rain hits the ground, it is channeled down the street like a river carrying with it all of the litter, animal waste, oil and grease, tire and brake residue, fertilizers, and pesticides that it encounters. This toxic sludge of polluted water is delivered through the storm drain directly to the closest body of water, where it accumulates as muck, concentrates toxins, fuels algae blooms, poisons animals, and kills seagrass. The lagoon will never be healthy as long as polluted stormwater is being dumped into it with every rainfall. A better way to handle rain is to let it soak into the ground, as nature intended.

MRC is advocating for local implementation of a proven stormwater management solution that has been used in other parts of Florida - Low Impact Development (LID). Low Impact Development is a comprehensive site planning and engineering strategy that uses the existing landscape and vegetation to manage stormwater naturally. LID techniques have been implemented for decades and contributed to Tampa Bay's recovery. Florida counties like Pinellas, Alachua, and Escambia have implemented Low Impact Development by modifying their stormwater rules, land development regulations, and landscape ordinances. We are calling on every county and city in the lagoon watershed to do the same.

MRC will be coordinating a special assembly on Low Impact Development to unite the lagoon communities in this goal. We will need your help to make it happen. For more information on LID, please visit SaveTheIRL.org.

The cobia (Rachycentron canadum) is a species of carangiform marine fish, the only representative of the genus Rachycentron and the family Rachycentridae. Other common names include black kingfish, black salmon, ling, lemonfish, crabeater, prodigal son and black bonito.

The cobia is normally solitary except for annual spawning aggregations, and it sometimes congregates at reefs, wrecks, harbours, buoys, and other structural oases. It is pelagic, but it may enter estuaries and mangroves in search of prey.

It is found in warm-temperate to tropical waters of the West and East Atlantic Ocean, throughout the Caribbean, and in the Indian Ocean off the coast of India, Australia, and off the Pacific coast of Japan.

The cobia feeds primarily on crabs, squid, and fish. It follows larger animals such as sharks, turtles, and manta rays to scavenge. It is a very curious fish, showing little fear of boats.

The cobia is a pelagic spawner, releasing many tiny, buoyant eggs into the water, where they become part of the plankton. The eggs float freely with the currents until hatching. The larvae are also planktonic, being more or less helpless during their first week until the eyes and mouths develop. The male matures at two years and the female at three years. Both sexes lead moderately long lives of 15 years or more. Breeding activity takes place diurnally from April to September in large offshore congregations, where the female is capable of spawning up to 30 times during the season.

The cobia makes seasonal migrations. It winters in the Gulf of Mexico, then moves north as far as Massachusetts for the summer, passing Florida around March.
