#### School board changes plans for THOR **College Avenue School property** LAWN CARE

After accepting bids for the purchase of the former College Avenue Elementary School property, the Russellville City Board of Education voted to pull the land off the market and pursue grant opportunities for the property.

City Russellville Schools Superintendent Heath Grimes said the board voted to withdraw the sale after board members learned of possible Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs (ADECA) grant funding.

"Once we were made aware of the availability of funding, we decided to wait and see how that works and what happens, so the property will not be sold at this time," Grimes said.

The system accepted bids in June for purchase of the land and buildings located between College Avenue and Waterloo Road. Bid specifications called for bidders to submit their plan to demolish the existing building.

Grimes said one possible use for the property would be an additional park for city residents to enjoy.

"We are discussing the possibility of using it as a green space, as an additional park," Grimes said. "We don't have enough green space in our city so this would be an opportunity to do something with the Parks and Recreation Department."

The school system took over operations of the Russellville Parks and Recreation Department three years ago. If the property becomes a park, See 'PROPERTY,' page 8

# Littleville council appointment rescinded until next meeting

A vote to appoint former Littleville Mayor Scotty Howard to the Littleville Town Council did not comply with Alabama law, according to Littleville Mayor Ron Morrow.

At the council's June meeting, Place 3 Councilman Harold Malone announced his immediate resignation from the council due to health reasons, Morrow said.

Morrow said Malone's resignation was not on the agenda and he was not aware of Malone's intention to resign before he made the announcement.

According to Morrow, Malone immediately made a motion to appoint Howard to fill his council

seat.

That motion was seconded by Jack Mitchell and was approved by a 3-2 vote. with Morrow and Councilwoman Jenna Daniel voting no.

After the meeting, Morrow said he began researching the law and then contacted Littleville Town Attorney Nathan Johnson.

Code of Alabama Sec. 11-44G-1 outlines the procedure for a vacancy on a city council in a Class 7 or Class 8 municipality. Based on its having less than 5,999 residents, Littleville is classified as a Class 8 town.

The relevant portion of 11-44G-1 states: A vacancy in the office of city council member in any Class 7 or Class 8 municipality shall be filled by See 'APPOINTMENT,' page 3



the city council at the next regular meeting or any subsequent meeting of the council. The person elected shall hold office for the unexpired term.

Therefore, the council's action to appoint Howard at the same meeting where Malone resigned did not comply with Alabama law. Morrow said Johnson contacted coun-

cil members to explain the procedure.

"It can't be done at the same time. All you have to do is look at the law. The citizens of Littleville who want to express an interest in the vacant council seat should have that right," Morrow said. "Everyone should have a chance. This type of back door politics goes against the best interests of our town."

The next regular meeting of the Littleville Town Council is set for July 22, 2021, at 6 p.m.

Morrow said any citizen who would like to be considered for the vacant council seat should contact the city clerk and have his or her name added to the list. Pest Solutions Pest & Mosquito Control 256-332-4008

In order to be eligible for the appointment, you must be a qualified elector of the municipality and shall present proof of identification to the pollworkers before casting a vote. The identification may be a valid Alabama driver's license or some other form of identification that confirms a permanent address in the city. Code of Alabama 11-44G-1(b).

Howard did not return calls from the Franklin Free Press seeking comment for this article.

# Hypnotherapy: Mind over fatter, or just another temporary weight loss fad?

Her voice is a cocktail of empathy, calmness and tranquility. And that's a good thing, considering I'm totally focused on her words.

As the hypnotic treatment begins, my eyes are closed and I'm traveling in my mind to a wonderful place, all the while tuned into her voice.

tuned into her voice. **Publisher** Anna Carol Porter is Russellville's lone hypnotherapist, and she's working with me on a life plan to lose weight and get my lifestyle modified when it comes to food.

That will be no easy task, though. I've tried it all, having run the gamut from Nutrisystem to low carb to weight loss surgery. All have succeeded temporarily, but the story ends each time with the inevitable regaining.

Some reference it as 'yo-yo' dieting, but more often than not, the yo-yo stays up more than it stays down.

Enter Porter and Holistic Harmony, the name of her business. Hypnotherapy is the newest offering from Holistic Harmony, with a list of services that also include fascia stretch therapy, cranio sacral therapy and Qigong (a martial art practice used for whole body healing).

I'll have more on the fascia stretch therapy (which I'm also doing) later this summer, and I'll chronicle my journey through hypnotherapy with a goal of losing 25 pounds by the end of September.

Before I elaborate on hypnotherapy, it's important to mention what it's not. This is not like a magician show where someone is 'hypnotized' into thinking they are a chicken, dog or cat. I haven't clucked, barked or meowed. Hypnotherapy is about *therapy*. It's literally more than half of the word. The goal of hypnotherapy, as I understand it, is to reduce stress and anxiety through relaxation and visualization. Once that happens, the hypnotherapist uses positive words (some of them mine) to reach various goals. In my case, that goal is weight loss.

Two sessions into my hypnotherapy, I'm still keeping an open mind. I didn't come into this with a cynical tone. Instead, I told Porter I'd chronicle my journey through her treatment in the *Franklin Free Press* as honestly and fairly as I could. And that includes noting my failures as well as any shortcomings of the treatment provided.

When our first session began, it was readily apparent my therapy would be much more than hypnosis. She presented me with extensive information on recommended foods to eat, tips to improve the quality of my sleep, an exercise regimen and more. She even had us both sign a performance agreement, affirming my commitment to change my lifestyle as I work toward my goal weight.

it would be maintained and operated by that department.

Grimes said there were no bids received as of the time the bid process closed, which was more than a week before the original deadline to bid.

"We canceled the bid process and did not have any received at that point. Most of the time in preparing bids, people wait until the final week or so to submit them," Grimes said. "When we talked with our attorney about the possible grant monies, he advised to cancel the bid process."

Officials investigating illegal dumping site in Tharptown

Franklin County Sheriff Shannon Oliver is investigating the origins of an illegal dumping site that recently formed on the side of Highway 48 in Tharptown.

Just south of Tharptown School, the makeshift dump includes discarded furniture, broken auto parts, a cooler and other items piled on the side of the road.

After being contacted by a resident concerned about the growing pile, Oliver said his deputies are investigating who may be responsible for the illegal dumping. Deputies spoke with tenants of a triplex located across the road to see if they knew who may be responsible.

In order to prosecute someone for criminal littering, which is governed by the Code of Alabama Section 13A-7-29, there must be proof that the defendant knowingly discarded litter on public or private property with no right to do so. Oliver said the most difficult part of that language deals with determining who piled the items on the side of the road.

"We're aware of the location where this happened and we are investigating it," Oliver said. "First you have to determine the person responsible. Then we must verify they had no permission to dump the items if they're on private property.

"On the side of the road, though, with no county pickup other than the plastic garbage cans, that's never an appropriate place to leave items," he added.

Oliver said illegal dumps have been a problem for years around Franklin County.

"If someone wants to report an illegal dump, please call us. The concern I have, though, in sending someone out there to pick up the litter is that tells the person who dumped it that it's okay to do that," Oliver said.

Another problem with illegal dumps is that once a pile is started, it tends to grow rapidly.

"It's definitely an eyesore. That's another reason we are working to determine who was responsible," Oliver said.

Dating back to his days as a Golden Tiger, Torey Baird has been crazy about the sport of baseball. That passion for the game is what led the former Russellville standout (in both baseball and football) and 2008 graduate to earn a spot playing college baseball for Snead State Community College and eventually Mississippi College once his high school playing days were over.

And after a few coachings stops including stints at his alma mater as well as a stop at Deshler High School, Baird then took over as the head baseball coach at Holtville High School near Wetumpka, where he led the Bulldogs to two elite eight appearances.

On a hilltop near Cedar Creek, you can often hear shots ringing out in almost a rhythmic pattern. It's not hunters that you hear (at least not this time of year), but it's the 4-H trap shooting team getting in practice rounds at the Cedar Creek Trap shooting range.

Practicing one Saturday a month, the team's practice has paid dividends as the team recently competed in the Alabama 4-H state junior tournament in things like sporting clays, skeet and trap team competitions. And once the dust had settled, the team came away with guite a bit of hardware.

The team has five members ranging from the fifth grade all the way to sophomores and includes students from East Franklin Junior High School, Russellville City Schools, Phil Campbell High School and Colbert Heights High School.

Levi Baker, Nathan Richardson, Lane McGuire, Eli Willis and Davis Lindsey are all members of the team that is sponsored by Franklin County 4-H extension agent Vanessa Roberts.

Roberts, who recently celebrated her first full year at the helm of the program, says that this group has performed extremely well and it may be in part to the amount of passion that this group has for what they do.

"This group dedicates a lot of time to what they

do. They make sure they get out here for practice and they really care about it and I think that makes a big difference in how they've been able to be successful," Roberts said. "At the state shoot they do trap, skeet and sporting clays, which we're not able to practice on skeet and sporting clays but they still went down to the tournament and did a really good job."

The team managed to take the top team spot in the junior trap team competition while placing third overall in the state juniors tournament.

While every sport or hobby has its challenging aspects whether it be crowd noise, end of game pressure or some other factor, the challenges that go into a sport like trap shooting are fairly different.

Baker, who has been a part of the 4-H program for many years, says that the challenges that go into trap shooting are some that cannot be found in a lot of other places.

""In fourth grade, 4-H came in and gave us a pamphlet and told us to pick an activity that we thought we might enjoy and I saw trap shooting and wanted to try it and I've been doing it ever since then," Baker said. "It's challenging. It's a different mindset than all the other sports because you have a gun that's kicking you in the shoulder and you're out in the summer sun while it's beating down on you. One thing that people may not

n't have come at a better time for Baird and his family.

"It means the world to me because my wife and I are expecting twins and with both of us being from northwest Alabama and getting back home around our family is huge for us," Baird said.

Of course after spending a few years in south Alabama so far away from home would naturally bring an itch to return to a familiar area. But it needed to be the right place at the right time for Baird and his family.

Then, the perfect opportunity fell into his lap.

"We had a Zoom interview and then I went and met with coach Mask and everything just felt right to me. I had a few of my mentors throughout my coaching career and kind of just told me about the job," Baird said. "And I then talked it over with my wife and the opportunity just to move back home was huge for us and it just felt like the perfect scenario. There are some great people at Colbert County and they want to win and they have a tradition of winning."

The Colbert County High School baseball program has seen its fair share of success over the years.

Getting the program back to that level of competitiveness is something that Baird will undoubtedly look to do from day one.

"When I had my first meeting with the players we talked about the fact that I'm not here to rebuild. I'm here to build on what they've already done and take the next step," Baird said. "They possess a lot of tradition with their baseball program and I'm just excited to be a part of it."

"Having watched them while I was down in south Alabama and being from Russellville and being a Golden Tiger has been awesome to watch and unbelievable to see."

know about trap shooting is that it's harder than it looks. People think that it's just pointing and shooting but there's more that goes into it," Baker said. "You have to accommodate for the wind, rain and all the other elements when you shoot so there's a lot that goes into it."

Coming home with an astounding six medals from the tournament was Richardson who placed first in the individual skeet, trap overall and sporting clays while also bringing back medals for placing first in the team trap and third place in team overall.

"I just came up here to the range one day and tried it and loved it. So I kept coming back and I really enjoyed it," Richardson said.

For some on the team, joining was as simple as turning a backyard hobby into a competition to feed their competitive side.

"I was out in my yard one day shooting clay pigeons and it was really fun. So I figured I'd try doing it for a competition," Willis said.

And for others, competing and practicing alongside family members was enough to convince them to join in on the fun.

"I first saw my brother competing and thought that it would be fun to try it so I picked it up and

started practicing on it," McGuire said.

Wade Willingham owns the Cedar Creek trap shooting range and allows the 4-H team to have their practices there while also lending a helping hand in teaching and coaching about trap shooting to both team members and first-timers.

"I enjoy the sport and we've finally got someone now in Vanessa that really cares about it and wants to run with this so I'm going to support it any way that I can," Willingham said. "Most of these guys trap shoot here anyways and I've worked with them since they were younger. We would love to have some more kids come out and join the program because it's a really good thing we've got going here and we enjoy working with them on things like this.


