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
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Wright named Phil Campbell Elementary principal

After 11 years of teaching kindergarten in Russellville City Schools, Channing Wright has built an impressive wardrobe of black and gold clothing.

Fortunately for her, Wright's new job won't require a change in colors.

Wright, the daughter of David and Tracy Ward, was hired last month as principal at Phil Campbell Elementary School. This is Wright's first administrative position, and to say she's excited would be an understatement.

"There were so many great things about this job—the faculty, the staff and the community support the school receives," Wright said. "It con-

firmed all the great things I'd heard about Phil Campbell Elementary School and elementary education is where my experience is."

Wright started her teaching career at West Elementary School in 2011. She taught kindergarten until her resignation last month to take the PCES job. Wright earned her Instructional Leadership Certification from the University of North Alabama in 2016, after receiving her bachelors degree in Elementary Education with P-3 certification and Masters in Elementary Education and Instructional Leaderships also from UNA

Franklin County Superintendent of Education Greg Hamilton said he saw many of the same qualities in

Kiel, Republican Caucus, backs UNA SGA president

After he apologized for a social media post that offended members of the LGBTQ community, Jake Statom, the Student Government Association president at the University of North Alabama, is receiving support for his position from several local legislators, including Rep. Jamie Kiel of Russellville.

Statom posted an Instagram story last month, which was Pride month, that included a t-shirt with a rainbow (a common symbol of LGBTQ support) with the caption, "Born this way? You must be born again."

Almost immediately, there were calls for Statom, an engineering major from Tuscumbia, to resign

amid accusations that he was homophobic.

Statom issued an apology and stated after "seeing the story from a different perspective," that he fell short of adequately representing all UNA students, including those in the LGBTQ community.

SGA members planned impeachments proceedings in the event Statom did not resign, which he had not done as of this week.

Enter the Alabama House Republican Caucus, which released a statement announcing a resolution in support of Statom and his right to "promote traditional morals and values on his personal social media platforms."

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
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

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ogized to anyone who was offended by his comments, that apology has "done little to quell the continuing attacks."

"My Republican colleagues and I recognize the courage it takes for college leaders to promote biblical principles and traditional values on campuses that are increasingly embracing the Cancel Culture and its 'woke' demands," Kiel said.

"Because our founding fathers considered the freedoms of speech and religion so important, they made them the First Amendment of the Bill of Rights, and Jake Statom was simply exercising the liberties that are guaranteed to him," Kiel added.

Working with others members of the local legislative delegation, including Reps. Lynn Greer (R-Rogersville), Phillip Pettus (R-Killen) and Andrew Sorrell (R-Muscle Shoals), Kiel sponsored a resolution in support of Statom and House Republican Caucus members from across the state voted its approval.

Sen. Larry Stutts (R-Tuscumbia) also has shown strong support for Statom and the resolution.

"Whether someone agrees with or opposes the stand that Jake Statom has taken, his constitutional right to speak freely and promote his religious beliefs must not be abridged with threats of impeachment and baseless attacks on his character," Stutts said.

The resolution states the Caucus' members' "strong opposition" to any effort to impeach, remove or apply political pressure intended to force Jake Statom from the presidency of the University of North Alabama Student Government Association.

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
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

Investigators continue to seek information surrounding the death of Russellville resident Casie Winborn, 29.

On July 2, 2018, her partially-clad body was found in the old Russellville Landfill, where Russellville Utilities now dumps

Her body appeared to have been in that location for at least a couple days before it was found.

Once discovered, Winborn's body was sent to the Alabama Department of Forensic Sciences for autopsy, and numerous toxicology tests were conducted. The report indicates there were no obvious signs of injury on her body, and the medical examiner's cause of death was listed as "non-determined".

Russellville Police Department Investigator Jake Tompkins has worked the case since that time, and after three years, is still encour-

aging people to come forward with any and all information they might have. A lot of questions remain unanswered. Your information could be beneficial, no matter how insignificant it may appear.

Cold Case' files: Cassie Winborn Northwest-Shoals offering tuition break for fall semester

Northwest-Shoals Community College (NW-SCC) is using Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) funding to provide a tuition break for students who register for the fall semester of at least 50 percent off tuition.

The College has received approximately \$6 million in CARES money to be disseminated for students. To date, the College has given out almost \$3 million. The amount of CARES funds students receive this fall will depend on how many hours they have taken at NW-SCC.

NW-SCC President Dr. Glenda Colagross said the CARES money will be given to students after they complete their CARES application once they register for fall semester classes. "Our students have had a hard time the past year, and we believe we have developed a plan to help them regardless of what stage they are at with their education," said Colagross. "All students that have applied for CARES will receive at least half tuition. We will look at each individual case. Some may receive even more if they've been at the college throughout the pandemic.'

High School Dual enrolled students (limit to two classes) and NW-SCC students that are within 15 hours of graduating will receive full tuition free if they have applied for CARES.

Registration is now underway at https://www.nwscc.edu/2021-summerfallregistration. To be eligible for the financial help, students must first register for classes and then apply through their individual Moodle student portal. They will receive an email and/or text message from the college explaining the process.

NW-SCC fall semester classes begin August 19th.

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

Wright that he saw in her predecessor, Jennifer Warhurst.

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Commission refinances, consolidates jail bonds

The Franklin County Commission approved a refinancing of the two bonds that provided funding for the construction of the Franklin County Jail in what Probate Judge Barry Moore called a cost-saving measure.

The two bonds, with a remaining balance of approximately \$7 million, were consolidated into one bond financed by three local banks, Valley State Bank, CB&S Bank and First Metro Bank. The interest rate on the new

consolidated bond is 1.99 percent fixed, as compared to 4.33 and 3.22 percent on the old bonds.

The county's monthly payment will decrease from \$56,140 to \$47,000 with the refinancing.

'This was an opportunity to save the taxpayers money by taking advantage of lower interest rates," Moore said.

The commission approved the measure at its June 21 meeting. Other agenda items approved that day include:

-authorizing EMA Director Mary Hallman-Glass and Moore to execute documents related to a \$400.000

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grant for storm shelters. There will be a public hearing on the proposed location of the storm shelters on July 12 before the regular meeting. If approved the grant would allow for the purchase of four to six storm shelters. Communities receiving the shelters would be responsible for paying the utilities and maintenance but not the cost of the shelters.

-termination of Corbyt Crane from the Solid Waste Department.

-declared two Sterling garbage trucks as surplus property to be disposed of.

-rescinded the hiring of Charles Adcox as a corrections officer/dispatcher in the Franklin County Sheriff's Office and authorized advertising for two corrections officer/dispatcher positions.

-hiring Isaiah Oliver as a corrections officer/dispatcher.

—set a public hearing for July 19 to receive input on the proposed vacating of Hollow Drive. The commission also authorized County Engineer David Palmer and Moore to sign agreements to relieve the commission of maintenance of a bridge on Hollow Drive.

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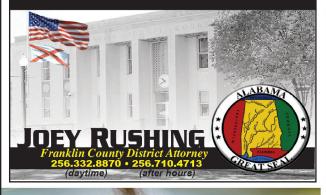

"Calhoun has a good campus and it's not too far from where I live. I just felt like this was the best place for me to continue my education."

A member of the cross country team at Belgreen, Luna will now have to turn her focus from competing at the high school level towards training to run at the collegiate level.

And part of that aforementioned training regiment will become more intense as her training continues into the upcoming fall in preparation for the start of her college athletic career.

"Before I got a scholarship offer, I would run every once in a while. But since then, I've been running everyday for a little over a month and every time I run it gets easier. I drink lots of water and that's what I stick with," Luna



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In both of her junior and senior years, Luna managed to qualify for the state tournament and also managed to notch a personal record time of 23:34 for her career. In addition to qualifying for the state tournament, Luna also managed to place in the top-10 in multiple races she competed in.

Of course, cross country is a sport that isn't exactly *for* everyone. With its long courses, sometimes unpredictable conditions and just a need for overall stamina, it can be difficult to participate in and sometimes take interest in.

But for Luna, the sport is something that brings out the best in her and allows her to compete alongside people she cares about.

"I've been running cross country for four years and I enjoy the outdoors. So running outside and finding different places to run works perfectly for me," Luna said.

"Cross country can be hard at times but it's fun running when you have friends to run with and always striving to beat your personal best time."

Auburn Tigers

The Bulldogs had a great defense in 2020 and it figures to be good for another season. The real question marks remain around the offense. However, if there's one person who knows how to put together an offense, it's Mike Leach... let's just see if he can do it in the SEC.

Ole Miss Rebels

An overwhelming offense and the mind of Lane Kiffin should be enough to scare any team with title hopes in their eyes. And that offensive threat should give Rebels fans a lot of hope in pulling off an upset or two over the course of the season.

But the defense is going to be the Achilles heel for the Rebels. If there's a team that will lead the SEC in offense, you'd be hard-pressed to find a better bet than Ole Miss. But if you're looking for defense, you might want to keep looking.

But with the likes of the Crimson Tide, Aggies, the two Tigers and even the Rebels and Bulldogs fighting it out, there just isn't enough to grab onto for the Razorbacks.

But they are on the right track with Sam Pittman at the helm... it just might take another year or three.
