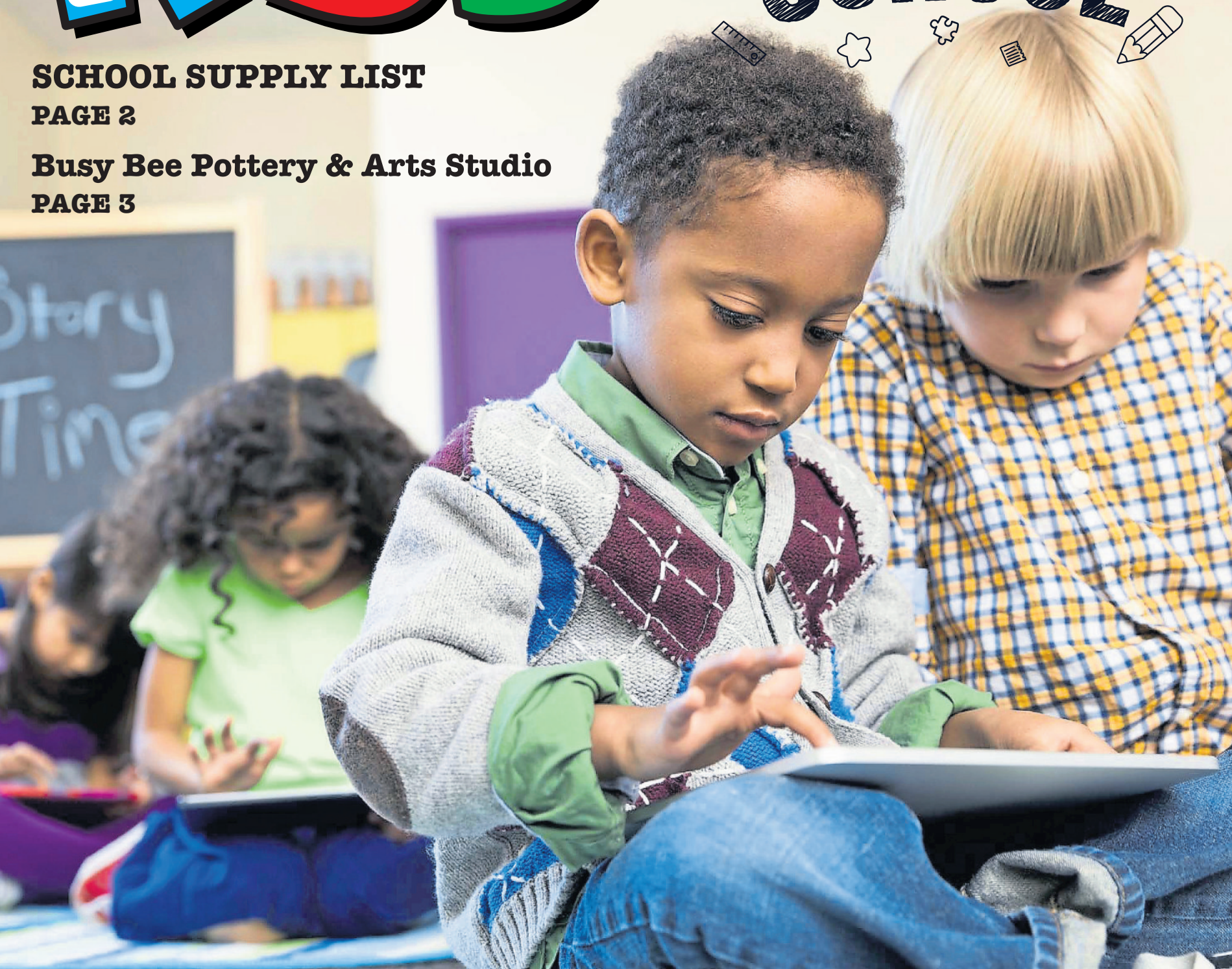

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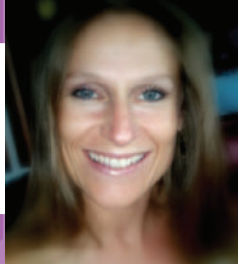

An App That Should Be On Your School Supply List

It's hard to believe we're gearing up for school already! This summer has really zoomed by (*see what I did there!*)! Here we are a year and a half later; after a pandemic challenged the whole world in ways most living generations never imagined...we're finally getting back to 'normal'.

In some areas (ours included) some schools are allowing remote learning as an option, but I don't think the school supplies list will be much different. That list does go on and on, doesn't it? Remember when we were kids? It's still a lot of the same things we'd buy but not always use. We might be adding extra Clorox wipes and hand sanitizer. While the back-to-school shopping list hasn't changed much since we were young, *times have*. We may not be required to provide such protection as masks, since the vaccination efforts seemed to ease many minds against spreading Covid, but we still need some level of safeguard for our kids that might not be so obvious.

Raising kids over the past two decades has made me come to realize that there are other things out there that can harm them. It has also made me painfully aware that our back-to-school supply list is missing something. We are equipping our kids with all we think is 'required' (by the school), then additionally we send them with warnings (from our concerns) about drugs, alcohol, sex, vaping, bullies, and reasons why *not* to flunk out of school...but that's not enough.

Teens are always going to be curious and experimental. Some more than others. Some will be taught 'the right thing', then test the waters or walk the line. Some will get the 'warnings', but not heed them. Some will receive the 'talks' and the 'this is bad for you' speech but will not care whatsoever. I have three kids (almost all grown) and they weren't



immune. They were educated on everything from bullying to sexual predators. But they are human...and my efforts didn't stop all three from finding themselves in a potentially dangerous spot at least once. (Having that computer in a common room so you can see what they're doing? That rule was useless, once they got iPads, laptops, phones... GAME OVER.)

I know we want to trust our kids and we also enjoy the peace and quiet the devices provide us when in the hands of our children. But the reality is we can't afford to wait until our children are experiencing symptoms of depression, dealing with bullying, or using violence in communication with others, or maybe even involved in sexual activity online or via sexting because then we are too late. (Visit my blog for a popular post on sexting).

Our young people have their whole bright future ahead of them; however, they are often just one click away from heading down the path of doom (or they might already be). This is real in this day and age. And I'm not afraid to talk about it. Frankly, I'm realizing now that we can't afford not to.

If you have already shopped for your student's school supplies, you might want to get one more thing. And if you haven't gone shopping yet, I would add something else to the list. Life 360

and being able to reach your child wherever they are by a quick text, is not enough. You need to seriously consider getting an online activity monitoring app. Students are being exposed to things on the internet that are no benefit to their growth and maturity. (Now you know why your kids say those school distributed Chromebooks are so lame...they block everything harmful and then some.)

Inappropriate online activity is invading our students at astronomical rates. And just like drugs, alcohol, vaping, smoking, uneducated/unprotected sex, an online habit can start quickly and spiral into a major addiction leaving your kid (and their welfare) in the dust. This isn't about creating a museum quality masterpiece, this is "fun"art, not "fine"art." says owner Beth Brinton. "I tell people to come in, relax and enjoy the process. You don't have to have artistic ability. Just the desire to have fun and explore."

The studio, celebrating its 6th anniversary this year caters to children and adults and offers open studio times as well as instructor-led programs. During open studio time, choose your project/medium of choice and a staff member will assist with

the supplies and best practices needed to create something unique and memorable.

School-age children can choose among art classes and camps held during evenings, weekends, and school vacations. Children's activities occur in the studio or offsite at schools, daycares, or other locations. Among the keepsake projects offered are clay projects or pottery involving handprints, fingerprints, and footprints.

The 2021 Summer Art Camp program kicked off in June, registration is still open for the remaining weeks of summer. Parents can register children for different themed weeklong camps. "We work with various mediums to create projects based on that week's theme," Brinton explains. Campers create with clay, pottery, glass, mosaics, canvas and more.

Busy Bees isn't just for the kids. The studio has multiple creative options for the entire family and adults. Family workshops allow parents and kids to collaborate on projects, such as painting a canvas, sculpting a clay object, or painting a ceramic piece. It's a great alternative to screen time and get the family together for an activity and conversation, a great way to create family memories.

Grown-ups need their creative time too, away from the kids, work, or school. For those occasions, Busy Bees Pottery & Arts Studio hosts Adult Workshops, Ladies' Nights Out, bachelorette parties, baby showers and other events. A party room is available for rent. Guests 21 and over are permitted to bring and enjoy adult beverages (BYOB).

Guests may create projects using a variety of every-changing mediums and techniques. Among them are mosaics, canvas painting, glass fusing, clay hand building, wine glass painting and candle making. The studio offers more than 200 different pottery pieces to paint, from kids' figurines to coffee mugs and serving bowls. Artistically challenged individuals needn't be scared away. "We have stencils, stamps, stickers, silk screens and all kinds of different tricks and tools they can use to enhance their design," Brinton says.

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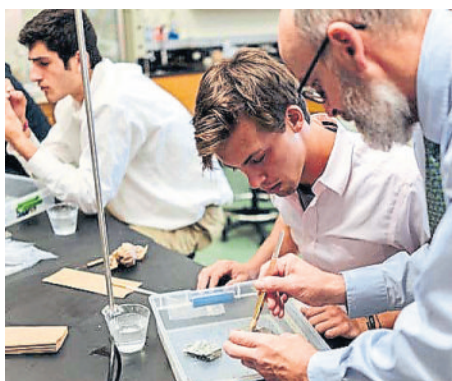

Combatting more than just summer learning loss

Lazy summer days are great for lounging around the pool. Though such afternoons are synonymous with summer, failure to flex cognitive muscles along with physical ones may lead to struggles when children return to classrooms.

Summer learning loss, also dubbed "summer slide," is a term used in reference to the loss of academic skills and knowledge during summer vacations. However, in addition to the potential for lost skills from being away from school during summer breaks, students also may be affected by deficits that developed due to virtual learning. This summer may be one best spent catching up on studies.

Researchers have been looking at summer slide since at least 1996, when one of the first comprehensive studies on the phenomenon was published. That study

indicated children lose significant knowledge in reading and math over summer break. More recently, a 2020 NWEA® MAP Growth assessment found children in third to fifth grades lose, on average, 20 percent of their school-year gains in reading and 27 percent in math during summer break. NWEA is a research-based, not-for-profit organization that creates assessment solutions that premeasure growth and proficiency.

While summer learning loss has been widely recognized for years, a new issue has developed due to the global pandemic. A shift to hybrid or all virtual learning for significant portions of the last two school years could have long-term consequences for students. A recent study from the Fairfax County Public Schools Office

of Research and Strategic Improvement in Virginia found that middle and high school students have had less academic success as a result of online learning. The percentage of students with two or more failing marks increased by 83 percent in the first quarter of the 2020-21 school year. Certain demographics of students struggled even more, including students with disabilities, Hispanic students and English learner students, according to the report. When separating middle school students from high school students, the former had higher incidences of two or more failing grades, a 300 percent increase versus 50 percent increase among high school students.

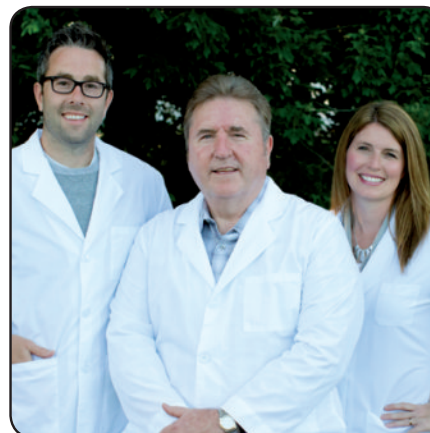
There are physical consequences to consider as well. A recent study from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that included 1,290 parents whose children were engaged in online instruction found that students receiving virtual instruction were more likely than those who received in-person instruction to report decreased physical activity, fewer opportunities to socialize with friends



and worsened mental or emotional health overall.

Parents who are concerned about their children's educational opportunities over the last year-plus may want to emphasize more smart play this summer. Encourage children to read more, even if it's books of their own choosing, which they are more likely to complete than books selected for them. Families also may want to work with tutors to bring their children back up to level in math and reading proficiency so students are ready for the new school year when it begins in August and September.
