Conference adjustment

We have a new Catholic conference in our back vard, with the remnants of the old North Coast League creating a new and smaller "Crown Conference."

The Crown Conference brings Lake Catholic, NDCL, VASJ, Walsh Jesuit and Padua together for a five-team league after spending years and/or decades together in the NCL.

Brush has left the Western Reserve Conference, giving the WRC seven teams as of now, although feelers have been put out to expand to eight or more teams.

A lot of rumors are circulating in that realm.

Kirtland and Harvey have swapped places in the CVC, with the Hornets headed to the bigger-school CVC Chagrin and Harvey going to the smaller-school CVC Valley.

Six schools in the News-Herald area will feature new head coaches this season - Jeff Rotsky at VASJ, Tim Glodowski at Fairport, Rick Lytle at Euclid, Van Monroe at Beachwood, John Scott at Chagrin Falls and Bob Gecewich at Perry

Turf wars

Wickliffe has installed a brand new artificial turf. and Mayfield had its turf field refurbished this past offseason. Both will be ready to go for opening home games.

Unfortunately, the same can't be said at Chardon, where the new turf installation was botched, delayed and restarted. The new turf is being

stretched as we speak and will be ready in a handful of weeks, though Chardon will play one home game at Riverside and two at West Geauga until the project is done.

Expanded playoffs

The OHSAA expanded the postseason so that 16 teams per region qualify. The extra round is why you're reading this introduction to the season a week earlier than you usually do.

New leaders

The News-Herald area graduated a phenomenal senior class a year ago, including many of the area leaders.

Five of the top passers from last year graduated. The leading QB passingwise back this year is West Geauga's Danny Stewart who threw for more than 1,300 yards last year as a junior.

The top 11 rushers and top 14 of 15 in The News-Herald area are all gone. The top returning rusher Jalen Minter — is not only at a new school (he went from Beachwood to VASJ), but also a new fulltime position (RB-QB to full-time QB).

Two of the top three receivers in The News-Herald area DO return - Kenston's J.P. Germano and West Geauga's Torry Stazzone. Each had more than 30 catches last year.

With all the new stuff that's going on this year, the biggest new addition is the return of fans. Student sections will be back this year, which was a major void year ago.

To be fair, while 2020 was a headache in so many ways and gladly in the rearview mirror, it was a season like no other in one positive regard. Never before in The News-Herald area were two state champions (Division III Chardon and Division V Kirtland), a state runner-up (Lake Catholic) and state final four team (Mentor) all in the same season.

So in that respect, there was a bright silver lining in what was otherwise a season that was memorable for so many wrong rea-

So as this weekend approaches, take time to be thankful that we got through last year and that this year has at least a semblance of normalcy again. Enjoy.

We all deserve it.

As usual, the Hilltoppers will rely on a physical running game. This is the 41st year of the Wing-T being brought to Chardon by legendary coach Bob Doyle, with new frills added along the way.

But pretty much the entire ensemble is gone from a vear ago.

"All of it," said Hewitt when asked how much of last year's offensive productivity graduated.

He's excited about the quarterback competition between senior Zoran Vujaklija and junior Alex Henry. The running back stable is packed with guys itching to make a name for themselves — Daniel Pettyjohn, Ryan Petersen, Rocco Perico, Brody Dotson, Trey Liebhardt, A.J. Bruce.

Aaron Berry raised his hand in the back of a meeting room at Euclid High School and had a question for his new coach.

Jeff Rotsky had just been named the head coach of the Euclid football team and was meeting with his prospective players for the first time.

Berry rose to his feet and put his new coach to task.

"Are you for real?" Berry asked his new coach pointblank.

"All you say, this sounds great. But are you what you say you are? Are you doing to do what you say you're going to do?"

Rotsky, 55, has heard it before.

He's been coaching for nearly three decades now - taking his family-oriented GFGF (God-Family-Grades-Football) blueprint the challenge of building to stops across the Greater Cleveland.

"This is who the new VASJ is," Rotsky said. "We're going to play for 48 minutes like our lives depended on it, then we'll leave it to God who wins or loses."

But in the end, he said the wins, the programbuilding and what happens on the gridiron aren't really what's most important to him.

"How do I want to be remembered?" he said, pondering the question asked of him. "I hope kids say that, besides Mom and Dad, I was the most loval person they could have asked for in their life and that I always had their back. It's not about football. It's about the relationships."

Preseason Tony Fisher Award watch list

The Tony Fisher Award goes to The News-Herald player of the year in football. It is named after the former Ohio Mr. Football recipient, a graduate of Euclid, who went on to star at Notre Dame and play in the NFL.

The Fisher Award watch list can and will change on a weekly basis. The preseason list, in alphabetical order:

Ryan Baer, North, Sr.: The 6-foot-7, 320-pound University of Pittsburgh commit is a road-grader of a blocker on offense, and will also play defense this year.

Derell Bedingfield, Benedictine, Sr.: The 6-foot-2, 190-pound linebacker has committed to Toledo. He's a lightning-fast playmaker who can force turnovers and leave his mark with big hits.

Rick Coleman Jr., Harvey, **Sr.:** He threw for 479 yards and ran for 472 yards last year. Having the ball in his hands every play is a good place to start for the Red Raiders this year.

Marvin Conkle, Benedictine, Sr.: As a junior, he had 32 catches for 528 yards. It's safe to say the Bengals are going to do everything they can to get the ball in the hands of this electric playmaker.

Jaxon French, Lake Catholic, Sr.: The first-year quarterback for the Cougars can whip it around the field, that's for sure. But he also has running ability, and is the linchpin to Lake's offense

this year.

Nikko Georgiou, Kenston, Jr.: He only got in a handful of games last year as a starting sophomore quarterback, but with the skill set around him in the Bombers' lineup, he should put up big numbers in a high-scoring offense.

Alex Henry, Chardon:

Whoever is the quarterback for the vaunted Chardon rushing attack always puts up highlight reel numbers — see Drew Fetchik (2020) and the Benenati brothers before him. Henry is going to have a big year whether he's at quarterback or at running back.

Claishon Ivory, Euclid, Sr.: He had 25 catches for 395 yards last year and will be a major focal point for the Panthers this season.

Ryan Miller, Kenston, Sr.: A matchup nightmare as a 6-foot-7 tight end who can flex out at receiver, Miller should be one of the primary targets for Kenston QB Nikko Georgiou, who is also on this

Jalen Minter, VASJ, Sr.: He was a third-team All-Ohioan last year at Beachwood, with more than 1,500 yards of offense passing and rushing.

Mason Rus, Kirtland, Sr.: Rus was a wrecking ball as a linebacker last year, and will be again this year. But keep an eye on him as a running back this year, too. He's primed to have an All-Ohio type of year as a two-way starter.

Ira Sampson, South, Sr.: College coaches are clamoring for this 5-foot-11,

205-pounder either/or at running back and linebacker. The marquee player for the Rebels should be a big playmaker on both sides of the ball this year.

Tyrone Singleton, South, Jr.: What a luxury South has, with Singleton, Ira Sampson and Jaydon Searcy. Singleton had a breakout year last year and has entrenched himself as a major threat this year.

Jacob Snow, Mentor, Jr.: He made his first varsity start last year in a Division I state semifinal. Now that he's got his feet wet, look for a highly productive year both passing and rushing.

Gage Sullivan, Kirtland, Sr.: A very versatile player, the 6-foot-4, 200-pound Sullivan is a game-breaker as a receiver and one of the best defensive backs in the area. Oh, he's also an All-Ohio punter.

Danny Stewart, West **Geauga, Sr.:** He had a breakout season last year for the Wolverines. He has most of his skill set returning this year, too, so don't be surprised if he puts up eye-popping numbers.

Curtis Thomas. North. Jr.: This speedy back looks to be getting a lot of touches in the Rangers' new offense this year, both running the ball and catching out of the backfield.

Brenan Vernon, Men-

tor, Jr.: The big, 6-foot-5, 250-pound defensive end is one of the premier defensive players in the nation in the class of 2023. Look for him to have a huge year.

If the new staff gets the new system going, Perry won't miss a beat from the Matt Rosati days. ... West Geauga is very much in the picture. with Danny Stewart back at quarterback and high-level returners on both sides of the ball. Also, keep an eye on the Lakeside program that has really blossomed under young coach Buzz Edwards. The Dragons will not be a pushover at all this year.

What to look for: Wickliffe ran the table in league play last year and never gave up more than 14 points to any of the teams in the league. But the graduation of a huge and talented senior class

puts these Blue Devils in the "darkhorse" category, while a different Blue Devils team - Independence takes over the role of league favorite. ... Independence has outstanding skill returning, including QB Michael Tommer and WR Kyle Zygmunt. Replacing All-Ohio LB Adam Miklovic won't be easy, but this should be a team that can pile up the points. ... To be sure, Cuyahoga Heights is going to be a tough 'out' for Independence, Wickliffe and everyone else in the league. First off, Coach Al Martin and his 25 years experience are major X-factors in the Redskins' favor. Additionally QB Luke Torgerson, RB Ryan Krajewski and two-way lineman Jacob Fovozzo anchor a team itching to prove that last year's 3-6 record was a blip on the radar screen and not a sign of things to come longterm.

Don't forget about: Berkshire

Darkhorse: Cardinal

What to look for: Division III Harvey drops down from the bigger-school CVC Chagrin to the smaller-school CVC Valley and instantly becomes the team to beat. 

High school football playoff region projections

NOTE: The 16-team playoff expansion for all regions in 2021 has necessitated a structure change in these annual projections. In years past, 12 projections were made when eight teams qualified per region. To increase the degree of difficulty and not, essentially, project who will lose less in the back half of regions, projections are being scaled back to eight.

DIVISION I. REGION 1

(teams are listed in alphabetical order; area teams in CAPS; 2020 records are listed)

Contenders: Brunswick (6-3), Canton McKinley (5-3), EUCLID (5-3), Medina (6-4), MENTOR (9-2), St. Edward (6-2), St. Ignatius (3-4), Stow-Munroe Falls (5-2)

What to look for: Division I alignment presents an unfortunate reality in regard to disparity with this move to 16 playoff qualifiers. Region 1 has 17 teams total, so only one team will not make it. Basically with this structure, if a team goes 1-9 in this region, it will likely seal a playoff berth. Beyond that unusual facet, the top half of the region should be dominated by the usual suspects.

Area-wise, while Mentor did graduate quite a bit from its Division I state final four squad last fall, there is enough returning to be hopeful of the Cardinals contending for the top eight

It feels like this could be a progression year for South, with Ira Sampson and a predominantly young group from a year ago back in the fold. Some questions will need to be answered on the line and defensively, but there's enough there on paper to believe the Rebels can be in the mix for the upper half of the regional playoff qualifiers.

It will be interesting to keep an eye on 2020 senior-heavy area teams such as Benedictine, Mayfield, North and Riverside. The Beavers are intriguing, coming off a 6-2

Chardon will need to get new players in key positions acclimated but should have enough to be a tone-setter once again, coming off its 2020 state title run. That will prove invaluable with the extra weeks of practice and tutelage that came with it for those returning. Whatever may be lacking on paper, Coach Mitch Hewitt

will assuredly mold and get the most out of the Hilltoppers like usual.

Kenston is interesting. Amid the pandemic last fall, there was such an extent of stopand-start to the Bombers' campaign that it was challenging to get a read on them. But Coach Jeff Grubich will probably have one of this area's most exciting offenses, led by QB Nikko Georgiou and a bevy of receiving weapons, along with an active defense. It doesn't seem out of line to think

Kenston could be poised for a bounceback season.

West Geauga could be a top-eight candidate and wind up one of The News-Herald coverage area's more complete teams, with All-Ohioans Luca Gasbarrino and Danny Stewart, among others, returning.

It's hard to believe Steubenville will regress after an uncharacteristic 5-3 season a year ago. Two standout non-area players in this region will be Canfield quarterback Broc Lowry, a first-team All-Ohioan last fall as the Cardinals went 9-1, and Hubbard running back Timothy Caffey (1,170 rushing yards, 12 TDs).

If you want a deep sleeper, it might be Tallmadge with QB Ty Hurst (2,201 passing yards, 20 TDs), his top three receivers and leading tackler Nick Cuva back. The Blue Devils absolutely need to tighten up on defense but could be exciting enough to be better than their 4-5 season in 2020.

An argument could be made the Pirates are further along in that regard, with Brayden and Javin Richards along with Jadynn Anderson returning among more under first-year coach Bob Gecewich. Even with program great Jaylen Anderson off to West Virginia, it wouldn't be a surprise to see Perry among the class of the CVC Chagrin again and deep in the mix in turn for a topeight berth.

Lake's state final run was inspiring in 2020, powered by a seasoned and determined group of seniors. Jaxon French takes over at QB for a Cougars squad not lacking in opportunity for younger players in a transition year. If last year's run proved anything, though, projecting against Lake is a mistake.

On paper, it appears the class of this region is going to be Ursuline, paced by quarterback Brady Shannon and a dangerous offense. The Fighting Irish will assuredly be on a mission after having what they hoped would be a deep playoff run a year ago derailed in the loss to the Cougars by missing several standout players due to COVID protocols.

The ultimate X-factor in this region will likely be Glenville. With the Senate League taking last year off due to the pandemic, there's no telling what the Tarblood-

So we'll just leave it at this: The Hornets will be loaded up once again for a run deep into November toward

December and should be the prohibitive favorite in this region.

After a program-defining 2020 campaign in which it went 6-2 and won a pair of playoff games, another News-Herald coverage area squad in Beachwood is a bit of a mystery at the moment for this exercise. The Bison have a new coach in Van Monroe and had some outgoing transfers, so they can't really be gauged properly on paper vs. last fall as a result. If it wasn't for the roster turnover, Beachwood would factor in as a topeight contender here.

In Year 2 under Carl Pelini, chances are good Cardinal Mooney will have an uptick in fortune. The Cardinals have several starters back on both sides of the ball, including the electric Zy'ere Rogers in the backfield. After a 2-6 season a year ago, tempering expectation a bit is fine. But Mooney should

contend for the top eight nonetheless.

It seems like a pair of 5-4 squads from 2020, Bellaire and Harrison Central, could have enough back to take a step forward — perhaps not all the way to the top four, but enough to get into that Nos. 5-8 level.

After the Blue Devils' historic 8-1 campaign in 2020, simply because they graduated so many key components to that squad. That, in turn, makes it an extremely young squad this fall. That doesn't mean there will be a major downturn, of course. But it does mean there are probably going to be some growing pains as Coach Marce Porcello nurtures a young group along. Cardinal could very well

be improved from its 2-8 record last season. Having some size back on the line helps. But as far as improving all the way into the top eight, the Huskies will need to prove they're capable of such an upswing.

Among the rest of the region are the usual calling cards. Berlin Center Western Reserve is always tough and physical. Mogadore is one of the most well-regarded programs on the gridiron year-to-year.

There's not much more room to build after the laudable 11-1 state final run last year by New Middletown Springfield. But they'll certainly try, led by prolific quarterback Beau Brungard, the Division VI co-offensive player of the year in Ohio last fall. He accounted for nearly 3,000 yards passing and rushing, along with 42 touchdowns. So hopes should be high there once again.

As far as contenders in this region, the pattern is likely to play out the same way it always does. Region 25 will be top-heavy in the top two or three, a cadre of teams hovering around .500 will comprise much of the rest and opportunity is wide open for a playoff berth. Because of how much the bottom half of this region usually struggles, it would not be a total shock to see a 2-8 team at least contend for Week 11.

Greater Cleveland-wise, Independence was young last year and should be poised for a nice campaign after going 6-2 in 2020. Warren JFK has some good size back in the trenches, especially for Division VII, and is optimistic after its 9-3 state final charge in 2020.

Underclassman to watch: Mac Mulhan is a 5-9, 200-pound junior. He's a hardnosed

kind of kid who can play fullback and linebacker. Pound for pound he's the strongest player on the roster.

Outlook

Aspiration is high in Chester Township, as it should be with the quality back in the fold after a 6-2 campaign. The running game has to step up with the graduation of Trae Zimmerman, but the offense should be exciting with Stewart at the controls and Stazzone (31 receptions, 490 yards, nine TDs in 2020 regular season) leading the receiving charge. The Wolverines should also boast one of this area's best offensive lines, anchored by skilled bookend tackles in Gasbarrino and Sadler. The disruptive duo of Myers (seven sacks, 10 TFLs) and Sadler (10 TFLs) pace a defense that could be solid, and DiLalla is a special teams difference-maker.

Player to watch

Danny Stewart, a 5-foot-7, 175-pound senior, was an All-Ohio QB last fall, throwing for 1,208 regular-season yards and 13 TDs and also running for 320 yards and four scores. Stewart is a heady leader and winner whose understanding of the offense **DEFENSE** and his personnel should help his squad thrive further.

Underclassman to watch: Stewart, Stazzone and Sadler were effusive in what junior ATH-SS Travis Velba (5-10, 180) could bring to the table, with a Taysom Hill style of Swiss army knife appeal.

Bottom line

IF: ... the running game finds its way and new defensive starters excel; THEN ... this could be one of this area's more complete teams, a CVC and playoff contender potentially 8-2 or better.

Outlook

After a five-year run in which Wickliffe went 38-15 and made four playoff appearances, the Blue Devils will basically be starting over in 2021. Just one starter returns, senior G/LB Thomas Wenz. But along with all the new faces in the starting lineup, Wickliffe will have a brand new field turf playing surface for the first time in program history, which will be ready to go when East Tech visits on Aug. 27. Coach Marce Porcello, in his 11th season leading his alma mater, is excited both about the new field and the potential of his backfield, which is talented and deep, although inexperienced. Due to the youth of the sophomore-heavy team, the Wickliffe coaching staff is stressing patience and keeping the playbook simple. The Blue Devils are hoping to rely on speed in the Wing-T offense (and a quicker home playing surface), and may look to open up the passing game a little more with a newcomer at QB in 6'1. 175-lb. junior Shawn Derganc, a standout pitcher on the baseball team.

Player to watch

Junior Vince Gargiulo, a 5-foot-9, 170-pound running back and linebacker. is a key returnee for Wickliffe who missed most of his sophomore season with a back injury. Porcello said Gargiulo would have gotten plenty of playing time last season if not for the injury, even among a talented senior class that led the way to an 8-1 season and made a run to a Division VI regional semifinal. Gargiulo is expected to be a leader for the Blue Devils this season on both sides of the ball.

Underclassman to watch: Sophomore Bobby Plumb (5-foot-9, 155) is a hard-

nosed player that caught the attention of Wickliffe coaches last season, enough that he was a regular on special teams as a freshman on a senior-laden playoff squad. Described by Porcello as a "very competitive young man who plays very hard," Plumb will be part of a talented Wickliffe offensive backfield, as well as a key member of the secondary on defense.

Bottom line

IF: The Blue Devils gain confidence with a few early season wins; **THEN:** They will grow into a team that can continue the success of its playoff-bound predecessors.
