Alamitos Vineyards brings wine back to Almaden Valley

he only San Jose winery with an onsite vineyard has opened its gates and offers a chance to sample wines while enjoying the gorgeous surroundings.

The new winery is located on Alamitos Road just past New Almaden. The majestic property backs up to New Almaden Quicksilver County Park.

Proprietors Shaun Coleman and Chris Maune, tech entrepreneurs, purchased their 9 -acre property in 2014 and started planting Sauvignon Blanc, Syrah and Touriga Nacional just one year later.

The winery is currently tasting three wines for \$15 and six for \$25, pouring

from a bar built of reclaimed wood from a 150-year-old barn in Gilroy.

"It has been a long six years since we planted our vines, and an even longer period of time it seems for us to be able to share our hard work and passion with others," Shaun said. "We are truly excited to finally open and provide a unique experience and great wine."

Both Shaun and Chris have farming and/or winemaking in their genes.

Chris' grandfather and father are and were Iowa soybean and wheat farmers. "When I told my dad we were planting a vineyard and were going to be farmers, he said 'I can write a book right now about what you already don't know about farming!"

Shaun's grandfather made Sauvignon Blanc for the wineries he worked for in Livermore; working for Cresta Blanca, Concannon and Wente. "We still have some old bottles of Cresta Blanca. It turns out he also made Sauvignon Blanc for Almaden Winery, which used to operate on Blossom Hill Road," Shaun said.

Chris said that each wine produced at Alamitos Vineyards sports a label derived from an original painting of one See VINEYARDS, page 21

San Jose Unified School District cuts bus service at numerous schools

The San Jose Unified School District, the largest district in the city, decided to cut bus service to more than a dozen elementary campuses as well as Willow Glen Middle School and Willow Glen High School to accommodate a new state law on school start times, officials said.

San José Spotlight estimated 17 elementary schools will lose bus services under this change. The schools previously offered bus services but are excluded from this year's list. There are 41 total schools in the district.

To register, please visit the website lhi.care/covidtesting. Walk-ups are also welcome, although appointments are preferred. Please be aware there are a limited number of slots available. Valley Water will be providing free shower timers or watersaving flappers to all testing participants to promote saving water at home as we enter this extreme drought. If you are interested in other resources to help you save water inside and outside your home, we encourage you to check out our Conservation Tips.

Arya Affordable Housing Development breaks ground in San José's SoFA district

Project will add 87 new units and bring transit improvements to area

ayor Sam Liccardo was joined last week by Councilmember Raul Peralez, Satellite Affordable Housing Associates (SAHA), and San José city staff to announce the groundbreaking of *Arya*, an affordable housing development that will add 87 rental units in SoFA district. *Arya* is the product of an exciting partnership between the City, SAHA, and other regional agencies.

The project's units will be available to households earning between 30% and 60% AMI in San José, and all income eligible households are encouraged to apply when SAHA begins the application process in Summer, 2022. The development will provide affordable housing on City-owned land, serve as a model for addressing climate change through emissionreduction strategies, and add transit and pedestrian improvements to serve the surrounding area.

"We are seeing an acceleration of affordable housing developments with new and innovative approaches. It's heartening to see the traction we are making, despite the pandemic, in building not just affordable housing, but great communities," said San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo. "I am extremely grateful to SAHA, their financiers and city staff



for their efforts to alleviate our housing crisis and provide livable, affordable units."

The City provided the land formerly a city parking lot — for the project's location, along with more than \$15 million for the construction. SAHA also utilized State funds, secured in partnership with the city and VTA, through an AHSC grant, among the first projects in San Jose to do so. AHSC supports developments that work to reduce GHG emissions, and will fund the



purchase of two electric VTA busses for routes near *Arya*.

San José also will use grant funds to construct pedestrian safety improvements, including protected bike lanes to increase connectivity to resources, work and leisure activities. Improvements to the area also include lighting, urban greening, and pedestrian and bicyclist wayfinding signage. SAHA will also purchase VTA passes and bikeshare memberships for all households living at *Arya* for up to three ________ vears.

> The proposed development will be an 8-story building with 19 studios, 54 one-bedrooms, 14 two-bedrooms and a manager's unit. Amenities include a common space, resident artist studios and classroom, management office, car and bike parking spaces, community room with a kitchen, multipurpose room, laundry facility, and outdoor courtyard.

CDPH launches new campaign to combat teen vaping

Teens that vape are more likely to test positive for COVID-19; 'Tell Your Story'campaign builds awareness in teens trying to quit The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) launched a new advertising campaign called "Tell Your Story," in response to the latest high school vaping data from its 2019-20 California Student Tobacco Survey.

California has made progress in combating the youth vaping epidemic, but with kids going back to in-person learning, it is crucial we continue making progress.

The survey, which includes data from September 2019 to March 2020, revealed that California's high school vaping rate is at its lowest in four years (8.2%) while the number of California teens trying to quit vaping more than doubled since 2018. During the same time, numerous youth and young adults were hospitalized due to the e-cigarette, or vaping product use-associated lung injury (EVALI) outbreak, sending a warning to young people across the state. California was the first state in the nation to respond to the deadly EVALI outbreak with a large-scale public awareness advertising campaign to protect young people, launched by Governor Gavin Newsom's Executive Order on September 16, 2019

As California was responding to the EVALI epidemic, the COVID-19 pandemic created another public health crisis that attacks the lungs, reinforcing lung health as a top priority. Smoking and vaping harms the lungs, putting Californians who vape at greater risk from COVID-19. Research has shown teens who have tried vaping are five times more likely to test positive for COVID-19.

"By addressing the dangers of vaping as part of our preparation for schools reopening, California is taking an even more proactive approach in protecting youth health," said Dr. Tomás J. Aragón, CDPH Director and State Public Health Officer. "Returning to in-person learning could mean a spike in teen vaping use at exactly the wrong time. It's critical young people know the facts about the dangers of vaping and have the support and resources they need to avoid use or quit."

The "Tell Your Story" campaign features real stories from young people and highlights their journey to quit vaping. The campaign educates youth and young adults about the harmful health effects of vapes and connects them with evidenced-based resources to quit, especially as they're exposed to increased social pressure in school environments.

"Seeing the impact vaping had on my health and my family, after I got out of the hospital, I knew I had to focus on living a healthier lifestyle, and that started with quitting vaping," said Blake Gray, a 20-year-old content creator and "Tell Your Story" campaign ambassador from Los Angeles. Gray underwent emergency surgery in 2019 when he was diagnosed with pneumomediastinum, caused by a vaping injury that burned a hole in his esophagus. "I'd tried quitting before, and it was easy to fall back into old habits. But with the support of friends and family, I



was able to get into the best shape of my life and found myself in a much better place mentally as well without needing to vape."

Recognizing the negative impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on mental health, the new campaign uses empathy and understanding for the difficult journey young people face when they quit vaping, rather than emphasizing the negative health impacts of using tobacco.

The "Tell Your Story" campaign promotes the "I Can Quit" text message program, an evidenced-based quit vaping effort that helps support the quitting process and emphasizes how to develop and successfully practice coping strategies. The program is centered on a desired quit date and then adjusts the content and timing of the texts, so they are relevant to the users' phase of quitting. The text program covers topics including motivation, planning, goal setting, seeking support, selftalk, withdrawal management, recovering from slips and much more.

The annual student tobacco survey conducted by CDPH, in partnership with University of California, San Diego, assessed the use of and attitudes toward tobacco products among middle and high school students along with social and environmental exposure to various tobacco products and advertisements. Additional key findings from the report include:

• Overall tobacco use (9.7%) among high school students was mainly driven by the rate of vape use (8.2%). Vape products were the most used tobacco product among students across gender, race/ethnicity, and grade.

• In 2020, 11.6% of LGBTQ+ identifying high school students in California vaped, compared to the overall California high school vaping rate of 8.2%.

 \bullet High school students who rated their mental health as poor had higher current tobacco use prevalence (16.1%) compared to those who rated their mental health as good to excellent (7.9%).

• The vast majority of teens who vape use flavored vapes (96.2%).

California orders all teachers and school staff to get vaccinated or be tested

Union leaders announce support of new rules

he California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has issued a new public health order requiring all school staff to either show proof of full vaccination or be tested at least once per week.

"To give parents confidence that their children are safe as schools return to full, in-person learning, we are urging all school staff to get vaccinated. Vaccinations are how we will end this pandemic," Gov. Gavin Newsom said at a press conference. "As a father, I look forward to the start of the school year and seeing all California kids back in the classroom."

The new policy for school staff, which took effect last Thursday, mandates that schools must be in full compliance by Oct. 15. Free testing resources are available to K- 12 schools through the CA K-12 schools testing program. "There's no substitute for in-person instruction, and California will continue to lead the nation in keeping students and staff safe while ensuring fully open classrooms," said Dr. Tomás J. Aragón, CDPH Director and State Public Health Officer. "Today's order will help the state's continued efforts to increase vaccinations, similar to the orders encouraging state and health care workers and businesses to get vaccinated."

Despite California leading the nation in vaccinations, with more than 46 million doses administered and over 77 percent of those eligible having received at least one dose, the state is seeing increasing numbers of people who refused to get the vaccine being admitted to the ICU and dying. This increase is heavily due to the Delta variant, health officials said.

In recent weeks, California has led the nation in implementing measures to slow the spread of COVID-19, including:

• Vaccine verification for state workers. Requires all state workers to either show proof of full vaccination or be tested at least once per week, and encourages local governments and other employers to adopt a similar protocol. Following California's announcement, some of the largest California businesses and local governments followed suit, as did the federal government.

• Vaccinations for health care workers. Requires workers in health care settings to be fully vaccinated or receive their second dose by September 30, 2021.

• Universal masking in K-12 settings. Aligned with guidance from the CDC and American Academy of Pediatrics, California was the first state to implement universal masking in school settings to keep students and staff safe while optimizing fully in-person instruction.

• Medi-Cal vaccination incentives. \$350 million in incentive payments to help close the vaccination gap between Medi-Cal beneficiaries and Californians as a whole, significantly stepping up outreach in underserved communities. • Statewide mask recommendation. In response to the

spike in COVID-19 hospitalizations and new CDC guidance calling for masking, the state recommended mask use for indoor public settings regardless of vaccination status.

Union leaders announced their support of the new rules. "Educators want to be in classrooms with their students,

and the best way to make sure that happens is for everyone who is medically eligible to be vaccinated, with robust testing and multi-tiered safety measures," said California Teachers Association President E. Toby Boyd.

Silicon Valley pet project awarded grant to care for rescued senior dogs

Silicon Valley Pet Project (SVPP) has been awarded a grant by the Grey Muzzle Organization to care for its rescued senior dogs. The grant funds will be used for the medical and foster care of this vulnerable pet community.

SVPP rescues dogs and cats of all ages from the San Jose Animal Care Center and the Tri-City Animal Shelter. Senior dogs, found as strays or surrendered to the shel-



ter, initially can need the most support — medical care and more time in foster care to find the right forever family. SVPP rescued more than 300 pets in 2020 — including 83 dogs and 20 senior dogs. The organization has already rescued more than 20 senior dogs this year.

"We think senior dogs make wonderful companion pets," said SVPP CEO Melissa Lisbon. "They are grateful, sweet and low-key and don't have the same training challenges as younger pups. They are happy with a cuddle, some love and time, and a warm bed."

SVPP is one of 77 animal welfare groups chosen from 266 applicants to receive a grant to help local senior dogs. The winning groups received a total of more than \$616,000 in grants to help save or improve the lives of at-risk old dogs in their communities.

Over the past 13 years, the national nonprofit Grey Muzzle Organization has provided more than \$3.1 million in grants to support its vision of "a world where no old dog dies alone and afraid."

"Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we're delighted to help deserving organizations like Silicon Valley Pet Project make a difference in the lives of dogs and people in their communities," Grey Muzzle's Executive Director Lisa Lunghofer said. "Many senior dogs are enjoying their golden years in loving homes thanks to the wonderful work of SVPP."

'Smart Growth San Jose' proposal will build homes without traffic, displacement issues

By Matt Mahan Special to the Times N Wednesday, August 4th, community leaders from across the city joined me at a press conference to promote Smart Growth San Jose, my alternative to "Opportunity Housing"

native to "Opportunity Housing," a proposal which would legalize four-plexes in all single-family neighborhoods.

Unlike the four-plex plan, Smart Growth San Jose will build the homes we need without unnecessarily worsening traffic congestion, accelerating climate change and encouraging displacement of low-income residents.

The four-plex plan will come before the Council in October, and will be one of the most important decisions we make for years to come. It is critical that you learn about the decision we face and make your voice heard before the Council takes up this issue.

I want to be clear that we have a regional housing supply crisis and we do need to build more housing. In fact, San Jose's General Plan assumes the construction of another 120,000 housing units between now and 2040, primarily downtown and in "urban villages" near significant transit infrastructure. To truly address our housing crisis, we will also need all other Bay Area cities to execute equally ambitious plans. But so far, City Hall has



failed to execute the General Plan. We have maintained and even created new barriers to homebuilding in San Jose, including incredibly slow and unpredictable permitting processes, overzealous regulations and fees, and outright restrictions on building housing in many of our planned urban villages. In fact, of the 68 urban villages the City identified 10 years ago, it has only approved high-level plans for 13 of them.

I've written a detailed blog post explaining what the City must do to facilitate homebuilding where we want it, and laying out why I think the fourplex plan will cause more harm than good. I hope you'll take a few minutes to read it at bit.ly/smartgrowthsjblog.

At the end of the day, a one-size-fits-all up-zoning of an expansive, sprawling city like San Jose that already has least offective transit in the

some of the worst traffic and least effective transit in the country, is a flawed approach. For every additional person it houses, it will put another car on the road, more time on our collective commutes and more pollution in our air. It will incentivize redevelopment and gentrification of lower income neighborhoods without yielding the level of housing production we need. Ultimately, it will distract our Planning Department from executing on a sustainable, transitoriented strategy that can work at scale and improve our collective quality of life. We need real solutions that both work and bring people together.

The four-plex plan fails on both fronts, but there is a better pro-housing path forward. The new path will make room



for future generations, offers choice to people of different walks of life and at different moments in their lives, and allows a greater number of us to gradually transition from cardependence to more walkable and bike friendly urban neighborhoods. This is a positive vision of San Jose's future. One that is scalable, sustainable and can offer something for everyone. This is the future we should be fighting for.

Helping victims of the earthquake in Haiti

The recent 7.2 earthquake has devastated Haiti resulting in over 1,000 deaths and a multitude of injuries. As relief efforts rush to the scene to help, generous donors also want to help by supporting various charities that are raising funds for assistance.

BBB Wise Giving Alliance offers the following tips for donors to consider along with a list of BBB Accredited Charities that have announced Haiti related activities on their websites.

We certainly encourage generosity to help the victims in Haiti but caution donors to avoid questionable appeals by keeping the following tips in mind:

• Does the disaster relief charity meet BBB Charity Standards? You can verify a charity's trustworthiness by viewing an evaluative report completed by BBB Wise Giving Alliance. See the list provided below of charities that are soliciting for relief assistance for Haiti and that also meet the BBB Standards for Charity Accountability.

• Is the charity experienced in providing disaster relief? Experienced disaster relief charities are the best bet to help deliver aid quickly and effectively. New entrants may have difficulty in following through even if they have good intentions.

• Does the appeal make exaggerated financial claims? (Such as "100% will be spent on relief.") Charities have fundraising and administrative expenses. Any charity claiming otherwise is potentially misleading the donating public. Even a credit card donation will have a processing fee.

• Can the charity get to the impacted area? Not all disaster relief organizations will be positioned to provide relief quickly. See if the charity already has a presence in Haiti.

• Should you send clothing and food? Local drives to collect clothing and food to send overseas are not practical. Disaster relief organizations are better equipped to obtain what is needed, distribute it and avoid duplication of effort.

The following is a list of BBB Accredited Charities (i.e., organizations that meet the 20 BBB Standards for Charity Accountability) raising funds for disaster relief in Haiti. This list will be updated as additional efforts come to the BBB's attention. The first link shows the BBB Wise Giving Alliance Report on the charity. The second is a link to the page on the charity's website that describes its Haiti Earthquake activities or fundraising.

TECH JARGON OF THE WEEK Delivery Drones

Ave you ever stumbled into a conversation where everyone is speaking around this "techie" word – and even after you've broken in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words:

Delivery Drones: "Transforming the way goods are transported"

Imagine ordering a pizza or takeout dinner, and instead of it arriving in under an hour via scooter or sedan, they arrive in under 15 minutes, from the sky? How long until that happens?

For many of us, the idea of a swarm of drones buzzing overhead, delivering everything from clothes to groceries still seems like a pie in the sky. However, the consumer market is growing by the day. After all, it only takes the touch of a button to order an item, why shouldn't delivery be equally instantaneous?

Project Wing by Google

Google has been working on Project Wing, which is an autonomous delivery drone service aiming to increase access to goods, reduce traffic congestion in cities, and help ease the CO2 emissions attributable to the transportation of goods. Wing is also developing an unmanned traffic management platform that will allow unmanned aircraft to navigate around other drones, manned aircraft, and other obstacles like trees, building and power lines.

The Wing has a light energy-efficient design that enables the drones to fly up to 120 km/hr, driven by an all-electric power system with zero carbon emissions. Also, it is designed to fly up to 400 ft above the ground and can safely *See JARGON*, page 13

4 tips to prepare a pet-friendly fire safety plan

(Family Features) After more than a year of nearly constant companionship, many pet parents are preparing to leave their pets at home while they transition back to the office. With more time away from home, it's important for families to be prepared in the event of a fire.

As COVID-19 restrictions are lifted, a vast majority of pet owners (91%) said they will leave pets home alone more often, according to a survey commissioned by Kidde and conducted online by The Harris Poll. Of those, more than 1 in 3 (35%) said they are nervous about doing so.

Include pets in fire escape plans: Pets should always be included in a family's evacuation plan. Stay aware of their typical hiding spots or locations where they often nap in case you must evacuate quickly. When you are not home, keep pets in areas near entrances where firefighters can easily find them.

Train pets to appropriately respond to alarms. In the event of an emergency, ensure your pets are familiar with the sound of smoke alarms. According to celebrity pet trainer Sara Carson, you should pair the sound with a command that instructs your pets to proceed "outside" or whichever term you use to identify the best way for them to exit the home. As you practice the routine, reward your pets for positive responses.

deliver packages to a location the size of a doorstep. Additionally, machine learning algorithms can help the drone find a safe and convenient location for delivery amongst obstacles like trees etc.

Amazon tests delivery drones

Amazon has also been actively working on an ambitious program aiming to use delivery drones to deliver your Amazon order within 30 minutes or less. Amazon's on-going testing includes several different drone models and types, so the final look and design continues to evolve over time. Automated collision avoidance technology will allow the drones to avoid crashing into objects or animals while in flight. Current testing is restricted to daytime operations when visibility is good, and winds are low. Future testing for delivery in icy, rainy, and snowy conditions may result in different drone designs for different types of weather

conditions

On demand drone delivery currently blocked by restrictions However there have been some blockers in

making this a reality. Current Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) rules restrict commercial use of drones and Amazon is seeking an exemption from those rules so the company can conduct additional research and development of their delivery drones' concept. The shopping giant wants the ability to safely innovate and to do, in their words "what thousands of hobbyists and manufacturers of model aircraft do every day."

With the clear advantages of on-demand drone deliveries, don't be surprised if that pizza arrives via the friendly skies far sooner than you might expect.

G son of the late Sardar Atma Singh Mann and Sardarni Malkit Kaur Mann, a longterm pillar in our community, passed away on August 6th, 2021.

Known lovingly as Sodhi or Coach, Dave leaves a tremendous void in our community, as well as in the hearts of his family and friends.

Dave is survived by his cherished wife -Binder Kaur Mann, his sons - Gary and Ricky, niece and nephew- Erica and Richard, daughter in laws – Deepi and Lisa, grandchildren – Bianca, Sahaani, Ajuni and Ezra, mother - Malkit Kaur Mann, brothers - Mohinder Singh Mann and Jatinder Singh Mann, along with an extended and close knit family; all of whom have lost a bright light.

Dave was a loving husband; present father; loyal son; a steadfast brother; great uncle; and a giant in the lives of so many whether on a tennis court, coaching youth sports or generously volunteering his time to the community.

Continued from page 1 those in elementary schools—VTA public transit passes to get to class.

The district finalized the changes last week, Transportation Manager Corrin Reynolds told San José Spotlight. With classes starting this week, families had less than two weeks to figure out how they were going to get their kids to school. "It's been a challenging task," Reynolds said. "We had to scrap everything we had and started from scratch."

Parents or guardians of young students will get VTA passes to accompany their children on public transportation, and students in special education will not be impacted, district officials said.

SJUSD is gearing up to welcome approximately 30,000 students back to school, but it's unclear how many will be affected by the changes to bus service. "We don't quite know yet," Reynolds said. "But it will affect some."

In June, the San Jose Unified Board of Education approved a \$950,000 contract with bus service company First Student. It's unclear how much the district will spend on VTA passes, as applications for services are still coming in. But officials said SJUSD is in "good financial health" with students learning from home last year.

In addition to juggling a mask mandate and other safety measures, SJUSD plans to adjust bell schedules across all campuses this school year—a change mandated by state law that pushes back the start time at middle and high schools to 8 a.m. and 8:30 a.m., respectively. District schools previously started earlier than the state mandate.

"We are no longer able to use (our old sys-

tem)," Deputy Superintendent Stephen McMahon told the school board in May. "Right now we can tell schools, 'I need you to start at 7:40, and I need you to start at 7:20,' so the bus can get to both places in one morning. We won't be able to do that next year." Prior to the pandemic, the district bussed about 2,000 students to school each year, the majority being middle and high schoolers, Reynolds said.

In developing a new bus system, the district is prioritizing students in special education whose transportation must be made available to them under federal law, Reynolds added. Most bus routes to middle and high schools are also kept intact, but the district chose to cut routes with low ridership, such as Willow Glen High School, to accommodate the new bell schedule. The district had one or two students using bus services to Willow Glen High prior to the pandemic, Reynolds said. "You'd have some buses with only three to five students," Reynolds said.

Parents and families learned about the changes to bus service on July 26 from a district email asking for applications for transportation services.

The email, obtained by San José Spotlight, lists only 11 schools with bus service, which raised alarm for some parents at Hacienda Environmental Science Magnet School that was left off the list. "We were very worried," said Chris Myers, whose daughter attends the school downtown. "We were looking into moving so we could be close to the school." The district told Myers the email list was incorrect. Still, many elementary schools are left off the list of bus service.

"If it is elementary students in low-income areas, it will be a concern," Crystal Calhoun, a grandmother to three students in the district *See BUS SERVICE, page 21*

FreeFlight: Selfdiscovery program for middle and high school-aged kids

f you've been watching the Olympics these last couple of weeks, you may have become familiar with the term 'twisties' which simply defined represents a moment when an athletes' body and mind lose connection.

By admitting that she had the 'twisties.' Simone Biles, celebrated gymnast, has highlighted how youth sport competition impacts mental health. Watching the few moments unfold on TV, I couldn't help but see the powerful moment for what it was. Here, was a young adult, with confidence, asking for help when she needed it, in the most pressure packed situation you can imagine.

What can we as parents of middle and high schoolers do to encourage this kind of selfreliance? What can a parent do so that they can launch their child safely into adulthood with confidence? Continued from page 18 told San José Spotlight.

Calhoun is part of a coalition of parents, students and residents who fought to boot police officers off SJUSD campuses. She said she and many members of the group didn't know about the bus changes until San José Spotlight told them.

Not all SJUSD schools had bus service at their campuses before the service change. The district started cutting bus routes and providing VTA passes to students at schools with low ridership, such as San Jose High School, more than a decade ago, Reynolds said. The district also gave out roughly 50 passes to students and families when some kids came back to classes at the end of last school year, according to Director of Student Operational Services Jill Case.

The district has received more than 600 applications for bus services as of this week and is anticipating a few hundred more as the school year approaches, Reynolds said. "We're trying our best to accommodate and serve our students," he said.
