It's been 10 years since the Avon football team appeared in the state championship game.

That 2011 team narrowly missed a perfect regular season, losing in Week 10 to Lake Catholic, before making a run through the Division II playoffs on their way to the school's first title berth. In the state title game, they fell just short.

In the 10 years since that 42-28 loss to Trotwood Madison, the Eagles have made the state semifinals four times and the regional finals twice.

They've run into roadblocks from their own conference - Midview and Avon Lake. And ones from elsewhere - Massillon and Hoban – and have yet to make that return trip to the final round of the D-II playoffs.

Every season brings new challenges for a high school football team. Not every season brings a new conference with new opponents to learn.

For Elyria, that'll be the case as it makes the move from the Greater Cleveland Conference – where they won five games in five years – to the Southwestern Conference. It's a move that makes sense not only competitively and geographically.

Gone are the days of the nearly hour-long drives to face conference foes like Medina and Mentor. The Pioneers now play in a conference where they are to compete on a regular basis.

Elyria will play teams in its county regularly for the first time in a long time. The Pioneers will have the chance to rekindle old rivalries and form new ones in the Southwestern Conference, which has players excited.

"The excitement level is way up there," senior receiver Andrew Palos said. "It's a good change for us. It feels like a fresh start. we're really confident about where we are heading into this year. We feel like we're almost a different team."

Palos caught 17 passes for 319 yards in Elyria's runfirst offense in 2020 after a 14-catch campaign as a sophomore. He's one of a handful of returning starters on an offense that has to replace a lot of production.

Brookside's Grobolsek brings versatility

Kenny Grobolsek is a throwback to the days when high school athletes played three sports, going from one season to the next.

In the year 2021, that makes Grobolsek a rarity in the era of sports specialization, where many young athletes picks the sport they want to focus on and dedicate themselves to it from age 12 until they hang it up.

see him in the gym working on ballhandling and free-throw shooting in the summer, because he's more likely on the baseball field or a football field.

In the fall, you won't find him playing a doubleheader on a Sunday with his traveling baseball team buddies, but instead recovering from that Friday night's football game in which he probably played every down from scrimmage.

He plays football, basketball, and baseball. He loves football, baseball comes second and he plays basketball to keep in shape.

"I play three sports to stay active," said Grobolsek, who has a 3.5-grade point average and math is his favorite subject. "Baseball is my second love. Without football, I would play baseball and I play basketball to stay active in the winter cause I just don't want to sit and do nothing,'

He played well enough as a junior to earn Division IV Northeast District second-team honors as an athlete on offense. He stands 6-foot and weighs 210 pounds.

He's been playing varsity football at Brookside since he was a freshman. As the quarterback on offense and a ball-hawking safety on defense, he will be the face of the franchise for the 2021 Cardinals, who will be heavy on seniors, but low on total numbers.

Grobolsek is the first player whom Brookside coach Scott O'Donnell mentions when he discusses his 2021 squad.

"He's our best player and we want him to get the most touches he can. He's an athlete. He's really a running back playing quarterback because that's what we have," said O'Donnell. "Last year was a learning curve. We've sek said.

got to put him in good situations."

A dual-threat quarterback who can run it or throw it, he's put up impressive passing and rushing totals the past two years. In the pandemic shortened 2020 season, he threw for 534 yards and ran for 674 and scored nine times for a team that went 2-8.

"I expect a big run this year. We've got a lot of seniors. A lot of kids are ready to get after it. Our numbers might not be super high, but we've got heart," said Grobolsek.

They also have a quarterback-re-But not Grobolsek. He is a young ceiver duo in Grobolsek and junior man for all seasons. You likely won't receiver Jake Montgomery with the chemistry that comes with years of playing pitch and catch. The two are best of friends and have grown up playing football, baseball, and basketball together. In their earlier years, it was Montgomery at quarterback and Grobolsek the running back.

That's changed.

Last year, Montgomery caught 34 passes and was Grobolsek's favorite target. The two have been playing football together since flag football, which is third and fourth grade in Sheffield.

Montgomery has game-time speed, meaning he plays faster than he looks. In a recent 7-on-7, the two lit up defenses from a myriad of high schools.

"We went down to Norwalk and played like nine other teams. Jake probably had 330 yards receiving on just one route, a post. You could tell they've been playing for a decade because Jake knows where to go. It's nice to see them develop," said Brookside defensive coordinator Max Wilson.

The two should also make plays on defense. The two safeties will lead a defense that is built off a nickel package and allows Groblolsek and Montogomery to freelance.

Playing on a team with so few players means that those that do play will get ample reps. But playing four quarters both ways of a high school football game is an exhausting experience.

"It would be nice to have a lot of numbers like a lot of teams have. But I've heard a lot of teams are low on numbers. But I wouldn't say it's disheartening. All of us are brothers. We all are there for each other," Grobol-

Matt Wilhelm Award preseason watch list

The Matt Wilhelm Award goes to The Morning Journal's football player of the year.

A watch list for the top players in the area will be published each week leading up to the presentation of the award.

This list is fluid and can change week to week. The opening list is a guideline for some of the area's top returners and a benchmark to start the season.

This list is in alphabetical order:

• RB Tommy Bebie, Sr., Rocky River: Committed to play for Wake Forest in 2022, Bebie is a do-it-all player for the Pirates. On offense, ran the ball 136 times for 834 yards and seven scores and caught 11 passes for 173 yards and two scores. On defense had 55 tackles at linebacker.

• **RB Gavin Ehrhardt, Jr., Avon:** Ehrhardt takes over the starting running back role from Devon Hunter this season. The junior has the combination of speed and physicality to thrive in the Eagles' offense.

• RB Lance Glover, Sr., Elyria: Spent 2020 backing up first-team Morning Journal all-star running back Jaheim Atkinson, while also playing well. Glover ran the ball 43 times for 377 yards and three scores, good enough for an 8.8 average.

• ATH Kenny Grobolsek, Sr., Brookside: Listed as an athlete for a reason. Grobolsek has played all over the Brookside offense over the past two years and excelled everywhere he's played. In 2020 ran for 763 yards and 10 scores, threw for 573 yards and a pair of touchdowns and caught six passes for 39 yards. Also returned 18 kicks for 314 yards.

RB Jason Krukowski, Jr., Avon Lake: One half of

a talented young Shoremen backfield, Krukowski is the leading returning rusher for Avon Lake in 2021. As a sophomore had 177 yards on the ground playing behind a pair of talented backs in Gage Duesler and Mason Wheeler.

• RB Gideon Lampron, Sr., Keystone: The 2020 winner of the Wilhelm Award, Lampron ran for 1,608 yards scoring 19 times in eight games. As a junior, he averaged more than 200 yards per game for a Wildcats team that won its second consecutive Lorain County League title.

• WR Owen Menge, Sr., Columbia: Playing with a pair of quarterbacks in 2020 had an outstanding season. Menge caught 30 balls for 576 yards and five scores for a seven-win Raiders team.

• RB Will Ostrowski, Jr., Westlake: One of the area's top rushers in 2020 for a surprising Westlake team. Ran for 955 yards and nine scores in nine games. Added 200 yards and a score through the air.

• WR Ryne Shackelford, Jr., Keystone: One of three All-Ohio level players for Keystone. Shackelford is a legitimate Division I football recruit with lightning-fast speed. In 2020 has 728 yards on 34 catches, scoring on nine of those grabs. Also added two scores on the ground and two more on kick returns.

• QB Braedon Spies, Sr., Rocky River: The latest in a long line of talented passers from Rocky River. Spies threw for 1,690 yards and 18 scores in 2020. Added 436 yards and 10 scores on the ground.

• QB Ethan Surdock, Sr., Midview: One of just two starting quarterbacks to return in the SWC this year. Surdock has the tools to be one of the conference's best, throwing a good ball with anticipation. In 2020 had 1,276 yards and 10 touchdowns through the air. Ran for 288 yards and five more scores.

• QB Ben Rini, Sr., Vermilion: The Sailors' main source of offense in 2020, Rini did it all. Threw for 1,132 yards and seven touchdowns with 468 yards and seven scores on the ground.

• **RB Torre Weatherspoon, Sr., Amherst:** An impressive back with speed and vision. In 2020 ran for 549 yards and four scores.

Crop Comments: A familiar face leads off the first Crop of the 2021 football season in The Morning Journal's coverage area. Avon is looking to make their fifth straight trip to a state semifinal this season and have a solid chance at doing that. The Eagles are again a deep team with experience across the board, even from its younger players. ... Keystone jumps over Avon Lake to take the second spot, and for good reason. The 'Cats return three All-Ohio level players at three important positions on offense. The 2020 Matt Wilhelm Award winner Gideon Lampron returns at running back with signal-caller Konner Rodick next to him in the backfield. Receiver Ryne Shackelford brings blazing speed to the outside edges of the Keystone offense, too. ... Coach Matt Kostelnik's group at Avon Lake is noticeably younger, led by a new tandem in the backfield. The defense will be key as will the veteran leadership of a pair of three-year starters up front on the offensive line. ... It's difficult to count out Olmsted Falls, which

made an early exit from the 2020 playoffs due to a clear-cut case of underseeding. The Bulldogs will have to replace some key parts of their offense from a season ago, but Coach Tom DeLuca's triple-option attack should allow for that to be a little easier. ... Firelands won a pair of playoff games a year ago and looked pretty good doing it. The Falcons are absent some of the game-breaking speed they had at receiver in 2020, but guarterback Kyle Ransom should be able to lead his new group of weapons to another strong season in the Lorain County League. ... Led by an always strong offense, Rocky River returns to The Morning Journal's coverage area in 2021. The Pirates have a do-it-all back in Tommy Bebie, who is fresh off making a commitment to Wake Forest this offseason. ... Elyria took its lumps but now they'll face more even competition in their first year as members of the Southwestern Conference. ... Elyria Catholic's 2020 season, much like their public school rivals from the same city, was a bit of a let-down. The Panthers struggled in their opening game against Elyria before ripping off three straight wins. But that momentum was squashed with a loss to Valley Forge, followed by a last-minute cancellation of their opening-round playoff game due to COVID issues. Columbia picked up a playoff win over conference rival Black River in 2020 and closed out their regular season with two wins after a second-round playoff exit. The Raiders have to find production to replace workhorse running back Joe Governale, but Coach Jason Ward's team should make a lot of noise in the LC8. ... Amherst enters the season as a bit of a wild card in the SWC. The Comets have a new head coach and have to replace some key players that graduated over the offseason.



Tyler Bockwich, a junior, will likely start at guarterback. He'll feed the ball to talented sophomore running back Ethan Lorenzana, who saw varsity action as a freshman and can also play quarterback, according to Collier. "He's kind of dual-threat guy. He's a talented kid. He'll be one of our better runners." The Clippers' receiving corps is a talented one, led by two seniors: Isaac Nicoloff, Terrance Cavin. The offensive line will be anchored by senior Jay Green. The defense returns three starters, but including a pair of returning starters in the back four in Cavin and sophomore Keith Colvin. "We're a young team and I know they'll be some growing pains, but these kids are working really hard and I'm proud of how far we've come throughout the summer," Collier said. "I expect us to get better every single week."

Player to watch

Jay Green is going to anchor the lines for the Clippers and must play well for Clearview to have a chance at being competitive.

Underclassman to watch: Lorenzana is a twitchy athlete following in a long line of playmakers to wear a Clearview uniform. If the offensive line can open any holes, he has the ability to pop a big play.




