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# **Former Littleville mayor** appointed to fill council seat vacancy

At its August 26 meeting, the Littleville Town Council voted by a split ballot to appoint former mayor Scotty Howard to the council seat vacated in June by Harold Malone.

Council member Bobby Childers made the motion and it was seconded by Jack Mitchell. Childers. Mitchell and council member Chase White voted in favor and Littleville Mayor Ron Morrow and council member Jenna Daniel voted no. The measure passed by a 3-2 margin.

Morrow defeated Howard in his 2020 bid for reelection as Littleville Mayor.

When Malone resigned at the council's June meeting, he immediately made a motion to appoint Howard to fill his council seat. The measure carried by the same 3-2 margin.

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But Morrow, after consultation with city attorney Nathan Johnson, told the council that Alabama law requires any Class 8 municipality to fill a council vacancy at its next regular meeting or any subsequent meeting of the council. Since Howard's appointment came at the same meeting, that action was in violation of Alabama law. Johnson advised the council of the law, which applies to Littleville since its population is less than 5,999 residents, thus classifying it as a Class 8 municipality.

Three Littleville residents contacted the city clerk to convey their interest in the vacant council position. They included Howard, Eddie Wilson and Phillip Pace. See 'LITTLEVILLE,' page 5

### Franklin County Schools on virtual instruction through September 6

Since the first day of classes on August 10, Franklin County Schools have seen a steady increase of positive COVID-19 cases each day.

When the number of students, faculty and staff with positive cases reached 119 on Thursday, Franklin County Schools Superintendent of Education Greg Hamilton made a decision he didn't want to make.

Franklin County Schools began virtual instruction on Monday, August 30 and instruction will remain virtual through Monday, September 6.

Tuesday, September 7, Hamilton said.

Franklin County Schools began one day earlier than Russellville City Schools, which saw its board unanimously implement a mask policy that amended the RCS dress code to require face masks be worn until further notice.

The Franklin County Board of Education did not vote on a mask mandate and at the board's most recent meeting did not include any consideration of requiring masks to be worn.

But Hamilton said he's looking ahead, and would not speculate as See 'VIRTUAL,' page 3

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
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

to whether a mask mandate would have prevented the need to go to virtual instruction.

"I'm not second guessing any policy or decision. We're just dealing with the facts and the fact is our positive cases have spiked since the day we started school. They're up to 119 as of Thursday (August 26)," Hamilton said.

"We've never had over 17 positives at any school since the onset of this pandemic. And that counts students and employees," he added.

Extracurricular activities will continue during the period of virtual learning and Hamilton said there would be no restrictions placed on the number of fans who may attend athletic events. Teams may continue to practice and play with no restrictions.

Hamilton said he hopes the 10-day break from in-person instruction will reverse the trend of positive cases on the rise each day.

"We're hoping a short pause will break this up. We'll reevaluate as a school system after students return on September 7," Hamilton said.

Hamilton said he did not begin virtual learning on Friday, August 27 because he wanted to provide teachers an opportunity to prepare for remote instruction.

Since classes began August 10, custodial staffs at each school have cleaned daily with the Total 360 Electrostatic sprayer as well as disinfectants to help mitigation efforts. Those cleanings will continue once school resumes.

Any mask mandate would have to be approved by the Franklin County Board of Education, which is not scheduled to meet again prior to September 7.

Hamilton sent a letter Thursday to all parents and students notifying them of his decision, and outlining the procedure for Child Nutrition Program meal distribution during the virtual learning period.

For students who are regular car riders, meal pick up will be from 9 a.m.-12 p.m., on Wednesday, September 1.

For students who are regular bus riders, meals will be delivered by bus on Wednesday, September 1, from 9 a.m.-12 p.m.

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# FCCDC approves school, non-profit grants

The Franklin County Community Development Commission met August 27<sup>th</sup> and approved a number of grants to local schools and non-profit agencies.

The commission, which includes Brad Bolton, Jeremy Campbell, Chris Wallace and Red Bay Mayor Charlene Fancher, meets quarterly to review grant applications. The next meeting of the commission will be October 29, 2021, at 8:30 a.m., at the Red Bay City Hall.

Any grant request for that meeting must be received by a member of the commission on or before April 16<sup>th</sup> at noon.

With the most recent grants, more than \$2.266 million has been returned to Franklin County since the inception of the funding. The funds come from in lieu of tax payments from the Tennessee Valley Authority.

The Franklin County Legislative delegation, Sen. Larry Stutts, Rep. Jamie Kiel and Rep. Proncey Robertson, each make an appointment to the commission to represent them.

Grants awarded at the August 27<sup>th</sup> meeting include:

-\$5,000 transfer to Future Economic Development Fund.

-\$2,500 to Red Bay Junior High football for purchase of helmets and shoulder pads.

# **Russellville council approves** liquor license for Doe's Eat Place

At a special called meeting held Monday at noon, the Russellville City Council approved the issuance of a license for the sale of restaurant retail liquor, beer and wine to the corporate owner of Doe's Eat Place.

Councilman Dexter Hamilton made the motion that was seconded by Darren Woodruff.

The vote was 4-0 in favor. Two council members, David Palmer and Jamie Harris, were absent from the meeting.

Doe's Eat Place will reopen in September under new ownership. The restaurant will be operated by the same company that recently opened 306 Barbecue on Highway 43 in Russellville.

Representatives from Doe's who attended Monday's meeting said they are projecting an opening date during the first two weeks of September.

The city's resolution approving the alcohol license will now be sent to the Alabama Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for its final review. The ABC must also permit the license before it takes effect.

The previous owners of Doe's Eat Place, located at 114 North Jackson Avenue, also operated with a retail liquor license at the location.

Woodruff said he excited to see the restaurant open and hopes to see it as a spring board for downtown revitalization.

"I welcome Doe's to Russellville and I'm looking forward to your opening in our city. We know it will be done right and we can't wait," Woodruff said.

In other news, Russellville Mayor David Grissom updated the council on the status of a grant application for funds through the Federal Transportation Alternative (TAP) Program.

Grissom received word Monday that a grant of \$559,870 was approved for sidewalk improvements on East Limestone and Montgomery Streets and North Jackson Avenue.

This will be the next step in rehabilitating and renovating the city's Downtown Historic District.

# My take on this... remembering my friend, Wayne Payne

On April 11th of this year, I lost a very special friend to COVID. I had good intentions to write a tribute to him in April butit has taken a lot longer than I thought it would to be able to write it.

My heart has finally healed enough that I can write without tears falling. It's been a long and

tough four and a half months but nothing I feel can compare to my friends that have lost their daddy and his granddaughter that has lost the most important man in her life.

My buddy, Wayne Payne, had been dealing with pulmonary fibrosis for years and had to use his oxygen all the time.

Then he was diagnosed with COVID. It wasn't good but his determination became stronger and his will to overcome was his important task at hand.

He got well enough to go to rehab to help build up some strength. I talked to him and he was doing a little better, but his voice was becoming weaker and that bothered me but we weren't about to lose hope.

I've always been told, "as long as there is life, there is hope."

He spent his 85th birthday in rehab.

Just three days after his birthday and a total of 177 days in the hospital and rehab combined, my friend's battle was over.

It's hard losing a special friend, so I immediately turned to some memories.

The first time I ever met him was like I'd known him for years. He had one of those outgoing personalities where he never met strangers. A stranger was just a friend he had yet to meet. Meeting my friend was one of the finest moments in my life.

At Thursday's meeting, a citizen addressed the council saying there were several residents in attendance who wanted to speak to the council about the vacancy, but no public discussion was held before the vote was taken.

In order to be eligible for the appointment, a person must be a qualified elector of the municipality and shall present proof of identification..., including a valid Alabama driver's license or some other form of identification that confirms a permanent address in the city. 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### Franklin Electric alley traffic converts to one-way with opening of new drive-thru window

With last month's opening of Franklin Electric Cooperative's new building in downtown Russellville, came some changes in the way motorists must access the drive-thru payment window.

The former Franklin Electric building had the drive-thru payment window located on the north side, accessible from Franklin Street.

The new building was constructed with the drive-thru payment window located on the east side, facing the public alley that runs behind it. As a result, the alley was changed from two-way traffic to one way, with access only from Lawrence Street.

After hearing requests from adjacent property owners, Russellville City Councilman Jamie Harris, Russellville Police Chief Chris Hargett and Russellville Street Department Manager Shannon Wilson decided the one way access traveling north (off Lawrence) was the safest measure to avoid potential collisions between motorists leaving the drive-thru and those turning in the north end of the alley.

Franklin Electric also had a concrete curb installed that runs alongside the drive-thru window route, designed to help prevent potential accidents as cars exit the payment window.

It may sound confusing, but it's really not. Just keep this simple rule in mind. If you need to use the FEC drive-thru payment window, you must turn into the alley from Lawrence Street. You'll exit onto Franklin Street.

Signage was posted in early July in advance of Franklin Electric's reopening. One way signs and a sign directing motorists to FEC's drive-thru window are located on the south end of the alley. Do not enter signs were installed on the alley's north end.

Hargett said his department will monitor the public roadway to make sure motorists are following the new signage.

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# Zoning commission recommends variance for future Dollar General location

The Russellville Zoning and Planning Commission's recommendation to approve a zoning variance means the proposed construction of a Dollar General store on Waterloo Road takes a giant step forward.

The variance was requested by Gene Aycock, a Muscle Shoals developer who builds Dollar General stores in northwest Alabama. The request was for a rezoning classification from R3 residential to B1 neighborhood business.

Aycock reached an agreement with the congregation of North Russellville Baptist Church to purchase approximately one acre of land on the northern edge of the church property.

Thursday's meeting was for the purpose of receiving public opposition and/or support regarding the proposed variance.

Aycock's plans call for the Broadway Group (the developer and designer) to construct a 10,640 square foot building facing Waterloo Road. Aycock said the Dollar General "Plan C Plus" model includes the sale of fruits and vegetables, and the store will be 'a little bigger than most.' The store will feature LED lighting and a very modernistic style, Aycock said.

"It's the biggest one we can get over there," Aycock said. "It's not a Dollar General Market store, but it's the next step below that."

The commission voted 5-1 in favor of recommending approval of the variance to the Russellville City Council. The council will have to approve it at a later meeting in order for the variance to take effect.

The lone opposition came from Zoning and Planning Commission member Terry Bolton, who expressed concern about the impact the store would have on existing businesses including Northside Market and Yogi's Citgo.

"We've already got two Dollar Generals in Russellville and I'm not seeing how this will help the tax base in Russellville," Bolton said. "Northside has been locally owned since it was built. There are traffic issues if this project goes through. We've got buses coming over that hill.

"We will not have Northside Grocery. It will shut down and this will hurt Yogi's too," Bolton added.

Several members of North Russellville Baptist attended the meeting. A church spokesman said the vote of the congregation was unanimous in support of selling the land.

One issue that arose Thursday was the possibility of Dollar General officials wanting to sell beer and wine at the new Waterloo Road location.

Aycock said there were no plans for alcohol to be sold at the new location due to its proximity to the church.

"You can't sell it next to a church and they don't really want to carry it anyway," Aycock said.

Additionally, there is a clause in the sales agreement for the property that Dollar General officials will not seek to sell alcohol at this location.

Several years ago, the new owner of Northside Grocery petitioned the city council for an off-premises beer and wine license. The council denied the request, in large part due to opposition from North Russellville church mem-

"As the councilman for District Two, I fully support this project. Based on what the agreement is regarding sale of alcohol, I will oppose any future efforts toward allowing the sale of beer or wine at this location, though," Woodruff said.



problems," Hargett said. Russellville Mayor David Grissom said a Dollar General located on Waterloo Road would be a big benefit to the city.

"They're one of the top tax contributors in the city and based on this proposed location, I fell like it would do nothing but help our city sales tax base," Grissom said.

Commission member Milford Brown said he supported the variance after learning of the unanimous support the proposal had among the church membership.


The plans for the proposed Dollar General on Waterloo Road call for a 10,640 square foot building to be constructed facing Waterloo Road.

"The members of North Russellville Baptist know what's best for their property, so I'm satisfied if they're in support of it," Brown said.

Several church members said if there was ever a petition to sell beer and/or wine at the store, they would strongly oppose any such consideration.

Once the project begins, church members will use the lower parking lot on the south side of the property for parking during church services.

Aycock said he expected store hours to be similar to other Dollar Generals. He mentioned 8 a.m-10 p.m., most days, but possibly a later opening time on Sunday.

And despite not being able to be there in person, Ritter could sense the intensity of the game as well as the amount of adversity that his squad was forced to overcome on such short notice.

"It was kind of like one of those prized fights. We knew that we were going to struggle early because our quarterback was out. I could have been standing on the sidelines and it wouldn't have mattered," Ritter said. "The gameplan that we went into the week with on Monday wasn't the gameplan that we used on Friday night. Coach Voss and the other offensive coaches did a phenomenal job making adjustments and doing some things that weren't in the original gameplan but they did a great job with that."

Without Gabe Amick, who was also out for the game against Deshler, Conner Warhurst was forced to step back into the pocket and take on quarterbacking duties.

For Warhurst, quarterbacking isn't all that new of a task. After all, just one season ago, he was splitting time with Amick under center before making the switch to running back and primarily defense.

Making adjustments

"I thought our kids did a great job adjusting. Conner came into a very tough situation and made some great plays and got the ball to the right people in the right situations when he needed to," Ritter said. "And across the board our guys did a great job and we just kind of hung in there and made some plays."

Down 14-16 right before the half, freshman kicker Emmanuel Martinez knocked a 34-yard kick through the uprights to give the Golden Tigers the lead, and possibly a little motivation.

That was just the beginning of the special teams impact on the night for Russellville.

Two blocked punts, including one that was blocked by Emmitt Green and returned for a touchdown by Malachi Duncan, set the tone for the game as the Golden Tigers were able to capitalize on some Deshler mistakes, which ended up being the difference-maker in the game.

"Manny is a guy that we knew we had to have out there. He's actually a

"To hit that field goal right before the half was a huge mental boost for our coaches and kids. (Nathan) Brockway has done a phenomenal job as a first-year punter for us despite being kind

of an unconventional guy at that position."

Adding onto an already impressive special teams resume for Russellville, Taylor Crumpton returned a kickoff 65 yards for a touchdown to once again give the Golden Tigers the lead.

Entering the third quarter down by six, the Golden Tigers needed to get something going on offense.

With a different quarterback at the helm in Warhurst, things got going quickly down the stretch.

T.J. King scored not one, but two touchdowns in the final quarter (to give him three on the



day), while Arrieon "Boots" McCulloch punched one into the endzone to put the game away with a little over four minutes left in the game.

In a game that saw eight different lead changes and 82 combined points, the game lived up to the hype.

And as the Golden Tigers came off the field with a 2-0 record and a win

All-time, the Golden Bears lead the series with a record of 13-10. However, the Tigers have won the previous four meetings dating back to 2011, with their most recent win against Lexington coming in 2020 by a 40-13 final.

The Golden Bears in 2021 currently sit at 1-1 on the season with a loss to Lauderdale County by a 6-0 final and a win over Tanner, 53-20.

Red Bay on the other hand comes into the week three matchup sitting at 0-1 after a season-opening loss to the Hamilton Aggies by a 40-24 final.

Phil Elkmont

If you're Kevin Barnwell and the Phil Campbell Bobcats, you have to feel pretty good about the way you're kicking off your region schedule.

The Bobcats will travel to Elkmont to take on a Red Devil team that sits at 0-2 on the year while being outscored 81-20 across just two games.

Phil Campbell sits at 1606040 .500 with a record of 1-1 after an opening win over

Phillips and then falling to Lamar County 7-0. Despite being at .500, the Bobcats have a plus-20 point differential on the season.

This is one of the shorter all-time matchups in Franklin County as last year was the first meeting between the two schools with Phil Campbell taking the opening bout by a whopping 62-22 final.

Tharptown vs. Colbert County

Three weeks into the season Tharptown is the only team in 2A region 8 with a winning record at 2-0. It might be a small sample size, having only actually played one game, but the Wildcats are looking to extend that winning record but they'll have their hands full with a loaded Colbert County squad as they also kick off region play for the 2021 season.

Colbert County owns the all-time series at 3-0 dating back to 2018. However the most notable numbers in the series are the scoring summaries.

In three matchups, the Wildcats have yet to score at all while the Indians have racked up 176 points in those three contests.

Last year's meeting resulted in a 53-0 victory for Colbert County.



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


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### T.J. King Junior, Wide Receiver Russellville

### Positional Preview: Quarterback:

A year ago, Gabe Amick and Conner Warhurst split time under center for the Golden Tigers.

And while that still may hold true for some instances this season, Amick figures to be QB1 for a majority of the snaps this season.

Last season during the regular season, Amick passed for 628 yards to go along with six touch-downs and two interceptions.

With so many playmaking options at skill positions for Russellville, Amick will certainly see more opportunities to throw the ball downfield.

And having two more-than-capable quarterbacks is a luxury, especially for a Russellville squad with so many playmakers at their disposal provides Russellville with a plethora of options on the offensive side of the ball.

"Gabe is the better thrower and Conner is the better runner. Amick is a winner and he started the last seven games for us last year and he brings a definite threat with his arm," Ritter said.

### **Running Backs:**

To no one's surprise, a recognizable duo will return in the backfield for another season with the Golden Tigers this year.

Arrieon "Boots" McCulloch and the aforementioned Conner Warhurst will shoulder a majority of

Warhurst last season was forced from the quarterback role to the running back role after an injury to McCulloch early last season. By the end of the year, Warhurst had rushed for 637 yards on 90 carries and 15 touchdowns in his junior campaign.

Despite missing a handful of games in 2020, McCulloch still managed to put up a hearty season with 525 yards on 80 carries and eight touchdowns.

Despite losing Caleb Mathews, who was a 5A region 8 co-MVP in 2020, the depth and talent at running back for Russellville still figures to be the best in 5A region 8.

Add talented sophomore Malachi Duncan into the mix and the Golden Tigers possess one of the deepest and most talented backfields around.

And while McCulloch will be the go-to back to allow for Warhurst to get what will be much-needed rest as he will start in the secondary for the Golden Tigers, each back that the Golden Tigers trot out will be more than capable of leaving their mark on the offense.

Of course, cycling through those guys will require some work in order to ensure that they get a certain amount of carries each.

And if the Golden Tigers can execute that gameplan, it just might pay dividends down the road.

"In our mind, there's a certain amount of touches that we want those guys to get each game. And so that way by the end of the year hopefully those guys will be fresh and we can make a deep playoff run," Ritter said.

### Wide Receivers/Tight End:

With the development of the passing game becoming a larger part of the offense for the Golden Tigers, opportunities for playmakers in the receiving aspect of the offense will become plentiful.

And much like at the running back position, the Golden Tigers certainly don't lack talent when it comes to receivers.

T.J. King showed last year why he's a legitimate downfield threat with a combination of great speed, agility and playmaking ability. In 2020, King hauled in 35 passes for 600 yards and five touch-downs.

So King will be the go-to target for Amick when looking at throwing the ball downfield.

Bralynn Vincent, Nick McSpadden and Taylor Crumpton will also be key targets in the passing game as well.

Tillman Baker will slot in as the tight end on most sets for the Golden Tigers.

One of the more underrated weapons lies at the H-back spot for Russellville.

After an injury forced Nathan Brockway to miss a majority of the season in 2020, the 6'2, 225 lb. Senior will look to re-establish himself and become a prime target when he gets into space for Russellville.

### **Offensive Line:**

When you lose a 4-star offensive lineman like Edgar Amaya, as well as other key players on the o-line, there's bound to be some shake-ups.

While it might take a game or two for the restructured offensive line to find its footing, the talent is certainly there to have success.

Brodi Hank Carter made the switch from defense to offense and will slot in on the offensive line.

Dallan Montgomery, a transfer from Lawrence County, will provide some size and experience as he figures to play as one of the tackles.

Tate Barnes takes over as center while Tal

Hamilton, Andrew McReynolds and Conner Byars are all competing for time and rotating in and out on the line.

### Defensive Line:

The Golden Tigers will have to replace Angel Moreno who totaled 15 tackles for a loss to go along with three sacks while forcing two turnovers last season. But there is a plethora of depth for the Golden Tigers to dip into to shore up the defensive line.

Jerrin Jackson figures to line up at one of the defensive end slots while Matthew James will take on the role of noseguard.

Junior Baltazar (a junior) and Eric Hernandez (a sophomore) will also play vital roles along the dline along with some of the guys from the offensive line which will enable the Russellville coaching staff to utilize up to six or seven different guys in order to provide some of that much-needed depth. Linebackers:

Outside of losing Brooks Scott, who was a 5A region 8 all-region first team selection, the linebacking core returns some key experience for the Golden Tigers.

Malachi Duncan has shown flashes of brilliance as he continues his development at the linebacker position while Gavin Slay, who has loads of experience for the Golden Tigers, will line up on the other side.

The inside linebackers will be a mixture of Martin Tomas, Devin Green and Carson Hyde.

### Secondary:

This is the area in which the Golden Tigers lost the most talent from a year ago.

Ashaad Williams, Caden Watts and Grayson Eady have all departed the program.

But that's not to say there still isn't an immense amount of talent in the current secondary either.

All told, the Golden Tigers plan on having at least four upperclassmen make up a majority of the secondary this season.

Emitt Green, a senior who will start at one of the safety's, leads a veteran group of defensive backs as Conner Warhurst ( also a senior) will line up alongside him at a safety spot as Ritter and his staff prefer to use Warhurst more on defense to tighten up the ship on that side of the football.

Taylor Crumpton (a junior) and Grayson Thorpe (a senior) will slot in as the primary cornerbacks. Special Teams:

The Golden Tigers will rely on some youth and unconventional players when it comes to special teams.

Freshman Emmanuel Martinez will handle a majority of the kicking duties and played a key role in the Golden Tigers 45-37 victory over Deshler as he nailed a field goal just before the half to give the Golden Tigers a 17-16 lead.

Nathan Brockway will man the punting game for the Golden Tigers this season. And while Brockway might not have the typical punters build

### Positional Preview: Quarterback:

When you lose a player like Jalen Vinson at a position so critical as quarterback, the next man up will have some big shoes to fill.

And that is partially why the Tigers are cycling through a couple of different players in order to find out who will be the best fit for a new offense as head coach Heath Childers enters his first season as the head coach for Red Bay.

Gage Edgmon comes in as a sophomore and figures to see most of the snaps under center at the start of the season for the Tigers while Elijah Luster (a senior) will also see critical minutes as the signal caller for the Tigers.

"Both Gage and Elijah have been working extremely hard and they both have really good skill sets and so we're really just kind of waiting on one of those guys to separate themselves from one another," Childers said.

### **Running Backs:**

One of the key returning members for the Red Bay offense is senior running back Aiden Quinn who in 2020 accounted for 163 carries while almost going for 1,000 yards on the year (947) and six touchdowns.

Quinn will undoubtedly be the top-tier guy in the backfield for the Tigers with plenty of new faces looking to get some reps as well.

Nathan Elrod (a senior) and Keaton Lanphear (a junior) will both get routine carries out of the back-field for the Tigers as newcomers to the position.

Kyler Watson will be the primary tight end target for Red Bay this season.

### Offensive Line:

The offensive line in years past has been a real strong point for the Tigers in their ability to establish a healthy running game.

But for this season, like most positions for the Tigers this season, there is a lack of experience. But there is enough talent there to enable the offense to establish itself.

guard. Will West and Jack West (both juniors) will line up at center and right guard, respectively. And Andrew Massey will round out the offensive line by manning the right tackle post.

### Defensive Line:

Much like their offensive line counterparts, the defensive line was depleted by graduations as well for the Tigers.

However, the size on the defensive line does hold enough potential for the Tigers to at least have a formidable defensive line.

Senior Levi Blanton, who stands at 6'4, 240 lbs., returns as one of the lone members on the defensive line with experience while Jaxon Vinson (a freshman) and Kaiden Blansett (a sophomore) figure to factor into the mix up front on defense as well for Childers and the Tigers.

### Linebackers:

Blake Nix (a junior) will be the top man with the linebacking group while Kyler Watson will also be counted on to be a key part of the interior positions with the linebackers as well.

Nathan Elrod will be tasked with being on the outside linebackers, along with other defensive positions depending on the play call, spot along with a couple of other players still in the mix.

### Secondary:

At every position in the secondary, outside of Senior Elijah Luster who will line up as the free safety, the Tigers will be starting sophomores across the board.

Nathan Elrod will factor in as a safety from time-to-time and Holdon Inmon (a sophomore) and Cody Carnes (a sophomore) will both be in the cornerback mix for Red Bay for not only this season, but for seasons to come.

This will be a much different Red Bay team than fans are typically accustomed to as there is a flurry of young and inexperienced talent. But with that experience means that there will undoubtedly be a bright future within the Red Bay program, even if it means retooling for a year or so.

Despite the inexperience issue, the Tigers aren't the only team in 2A region 8 that will be retooling.

Mars Hill also lost a ton of talent just like Red Bay, and the rest of the region will be upcoming still. So the Tigers still figure to be in contention for a playoff spot in 2A region 8.



### Quarterback:

The Wildcats will primarily rely on Hunter Reynolds Higgins under center but depending on the package that the Wildcats are running, multiple guys could see time at quarterback.

Blake Daily will also take snaps at quarterback to enable the Wildcats to utilize Reynolds' speed on the perimeter.

### Running Back/Fullback:

One of the veteran leaders on the offensive side of the ball for the Wildcats, Blake Daily figures to get a majority of the carries as the fullback for Lacey and the Wildcats.

Daily, a senior, rushed for 214 yards in Tharptown's jamboree victory over Shoals Christian.

Dawson Higgins slots in as the top running back for Tharptown and Aiden Villalobos will also get a considerable amount of carries.

### Wide Receivers/Tight End

The Wildcats do have experience in the receiving game as Nicholas Chaney will return as a three-year starter as a receiver.

Josh Riley slots in as the go-to tight end for the Wildcats and can also line up in the split formation when needed for Tharptown.

### **Offensive Line**

One of the larger offensive linemen in Franklin County, the Wildcat offensive line is anchored down by 6'5 Tyler Amos who will cover Reynolds' blindside at left tackle.

Carron Sears will line up next to Amos at left guard while Noah Capelton slots in at center.

On the right side of the offensive line, Gabe Compton will take over at right guard for Austin Sutton who was involved in an accident earlier in the season and is thankfully okay but will be forced to miss the season.

Bryson Poss will man the right tackle post to round out the rest of the oline.

### **Defensive Line**

Stopping the run has been an issue I'm previous years for the Wildcats. This year, however, the Wildcats have size and experience on their side to try and shore up that part of their game.

Tyler Amos will lead the charge up front on defense for the Wildcats as one of the defensive ends with Dylan Dolley lining up on the other defensive end spot.

Jacob Pointer and Christian Vazquez will man the defensive tackle posts as part of a formidable and experienced defensive line.

### Linebackers:

Blake Daily, Luis Valdez, and Gabe Compton will round out the starting linebacking core for the defense with a few others mixing in and out. Secondary:

Higgins will see plenty of action this season as he will be relied on to lead the secondary for the Wildcats as the go-to safety.

Josh Riley, Adrian Banderas and Joel Perez will slot in as the corners for the Wildcats secondary.

### **Special Teams:**

An underrated aspect of Tharptown's game that might surprise some fans (and potentially win some games for the Wildcats) is the kicking game. Ismael Perez, who until this year had been a soccer player only, will man all kicking duties for the

Wildcats. While there are certainly

some mechanical things

that Perez will have to

work through, the talent is certainly there. The senior kicker can knock in kicks from 45-plus yards, with a good 10-15 yards to spare.

Dawson Higgins will be the main returner on kickoffs and punts while Aiden Villalobos will contribute as well.

### Quarterback:

Conner Davidson figured to be the quarterback at the top of the depth chart for head coach Luke Childers in 2021. But an ankle injury to Davidson has forced the Red Devils to re-evaluate their offensive plans.

Wyatt Kennedy, a senior who has primarily seen time at wide receiver, will now step into the role as the primary quarterback leading the offense for the Red Devils.

### **Running Backs:**

A majority of the skill positions for the Red Devils are led by juniors, which bodes well for the present and future of the program.

Nate Stidham, a senior, will be the fullback leading the offensive charge while fellow senior Hunter Griffith will be the primary tailback and will get most of the carries for the Vina offense.

Kevin Corrado will play multiple positions for this Vina team and will be counted on to be a key part of the backfield while Malachi Fletcher will also factor in.

### Wide Receivers:

There will be a lot of mixing and matching for the Red Devils when it comes to the receiving corps. This group, much like those in the backfield for Vina, are also on the younger side with multiple freshmen factoring into the Red Devils' passing gameplan on Friday night.

Bailey Scott (a sophomore), Grayson Ridge (a sophomore), Christian Purser (freshman) and Kyle Lawler (a freshman) will all see time lining up as receivers.

In addition to the primary receiving corps, those in the backfield such as Griffith, Corrado and Fletcher could all be called upon to become weapons in the passing game.

Seth Fowler can also line up as a tight end when needed for the Red Devils.

### Offensive Line:

The offensive line is where a majority of the experience for the Red Devils comes into play.

With four seniors and one junior on the offensive line, Childers and his staff are hopeful that the experience will lead to more efficient drives and will allow the offense to develop a bit more than in 2020.
