Tutu time again for Dempsey Challenge rider

LEWISTON – It was tutu time again for Dennis Richardson of Turner as he rode for the seventh time in the Dempsey Challenge.

He's been riding his bike in the annual Challenge since Patrick Dempsey, a childhood friend, challenged him to stop smoking in 2014.

Richardson participated last year wearing a pink tutu to signify the fight

against breast cancer, and a purple tutu to represent the fight against pancreatic can-

This year, he wore just the pink tutu, with a pink tiara perched atop his bicycle helmet, and added pink pom-poms on his shoes, another gift from a friend and supporting fundraiser in New Jersey.

Despite his claims to "hate wearing the tutu," Richardson rides with a smile as he acknowledges the waves and smiles of passers-by, and the honks of drivers

Dempsey helped start the Patrick Dempsey Center at Central Maine Medical Center, Lewiston, in response to his mother's bouts with cancer. The first Dempsey Challenge took place in 2009. Dempsey's mother died in March, 2014.

The Dempsey Center "has always been a positive spin on such a negative family situation, with cancer," Richardson said. "You know, they help everybody in the family, they heal them . . . not just the patient."

Dempsey and Richardson grew up as best friends in Turner. "from the time we were little kids, like four years old. And then I worked for his father in the family business, with Patrick," Richardson said. "So we've always been very close."

"In 2014, he challenged me to quit smoking," Richardson said. "It was a challenge to quit smoking, get healthy, (and) ride with him in the Dempsey Challenge." Richardson started training in March of that year, riding some 2,000 practice miles and dropping 44 pounds. He finished his 50-mile ride in the Challenge in 3 hours and 16 minutes, and raised a combined \$7500 with his 8-person team that year

Dempsey has returned to Lewiston-Auburn every fall for the annual Dempsey Challenge. The Dempsey Center said his presence is felt throughout the weekend as he participates in one of the cycle rides, along with his friends and family, greets the crowds and personally thanks top fundraisers for their amazing efforts.

In 2016, Patrick took on an advisory role, and in 2018 he became a Dempsey Center board member so he can continue to help support those impacted by cancer, according to the Dempsey Center.

The Dempsey Challenge went virtual in 2020 with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, and returned as an in-person event this year, along with the first Global Dempsey Challenge.

Presented by Amgen Oncology, the

Dempsey Challenge is the primary fundraising event for the Dempsey Center. Poland Spring is a Centurion sponsor of the event, with Central Maine Healthcare, Specialized, IDEXX, 107.5 Frank FM, Zwift, and 99.9 The Wolf as Champion

Registration for the Dempsey Challenge 2021 opened in April and offered a local in-person event in Lewiston - with an emphasis on implementing industry-leading COVID-19 safety protocols - and a global option, allowing participants to complete the Challenge, wherever they are in the world.

Richardson and his wife, Lori, reached their 2020 fundraising goal with a final donation from Twin City Times/Gorham Weekly publisher Laurie Steele, and this year he presented Steele with a pink tutu of her own, challenging her to ride with him next year as part of a group of "pink tutu riders".

Steele said she hasn't ridden a bicycle since childhood, as she accepted the challenge.

The pandemic dampened the fundraising abilities for Richardson this year, so he set an original goal of just \$10,000 See Dempsey, page 8

Educator seeks election to Lewiston school board

LEWISTON - Paul Beauparlant, an area classroom teacher for six decades, is a candidate for the Ward 7 representative position to the Lewiston School Board.

He has been serving as the Ward 7 committeeman since January of this year, when he was appointed by Mayor Mark Cayer to fill a vacancy. He was confirmed by the City Council in a unanimous

Beauparlant, recently retired from teaching at Edward Little High School in Auburn, feels his classroom experiences and over 20 years as a department chair will benefit him on his committee work. "I feel this provides me with an excellent background on educational and personnel issues. Sometimes great ideas that are theoretically sound don't work in practice. I know my 43 years in teaching has helped me to form a strong skill-set for committee work", he wrote in his announce-

Beauparlant asserts the Committee's immediate focus should be in supporting the children of Lewiston in getting the best education possible. Beauparlant feels "the impetus needs to continue to be 'Kids First'. Attention must be given to those who were deprived, overlooked or neglected due to the struggles of COVID in the schools". He believes "This election should not be focused on a single is-

sue; instead, it must be on how to make the second largest school district the best that it can be for all of its citizens. Education and educators must be supported by the school administration and the citizens of Lewiston".

Beauparlant and his wife, Marilyn, have been residents of Lewiston and Ward 7 for over forty years. They have two adult sons who went through the Lewiston Public Schools have transitioned successful careers. Long active in community affairs, Beauparlant has served as President of the Farwell School PTO as well as president/ member of the Lewiston football, basketball, soccer and swimming booster clubs. He has coached youth sports teams for elementary intramurals, the YMCA, LAYSA (soccer), FLY football and the South Lewiston Little League. As a registered and certified basketball (IAABO) and softball (Federation, USA) official for over four decades, Beauparlant "... has learned that diffusing conflicts on the court and the diamond can be applied to real life settings as

Beauparlant said he will strive to respond to concerns of the Lewiston citizenry, regardless of where they reside or their position on issues. "If someone takes the time to contact me, I feel an obligation to reply to them in a timely manner."

He is running against Heather Benson.

Claxton earns perfect voting score

AUGUSTA - Sen. Ned Claxton (D-Androscoggin) earned a perfect score from Democracy Maine's 2021 Legislative Scorecard for his voting record to clean up state government, get money out of politics and safeguard democracy.

Sen. Claxton was one of 15 members of the Maine Senate to earn a perfect score.

'Throughout my time in the Senate, I have prioritized legislation to ensure we have accessible and secure elections throughout our state for generations to come," said Sen. Claxton. "In Maine, with our town clerks working hard to ensure accurate vote counts, we have one of the highest voter turnout rates in the nation, and we ought to build on that. I will continue working to-

ward growing the number of voters who participate in our elections, reducing the influence outside money has in our campaigns, and protecting the fundamental right every American citizen has to the ballot box. At the end of the day, the more folks who participate in our elections, the better off we all are."

This session, Sen. Claxton supported legislation that was sponsored by Sen. Louie Luchini. D-Ellsworth, to ban corporate contributions to political candidates running for state office.

Sen. Claxton also supported legislation to fully implement rankedchoice voting, to open up Maine's primary system to unenrolled voters, to include racial impact statements as part of the legislative process, and other measures protecting the rights of Maine people to

Democracy Maine is a collaboration between three nonpartisan organizations - the League of Women Voters of Maine, Maine Citizens for Clean Elections and Maine Students Vote - that work together to lead Maine in advocating for voter rights, campaign finance reform, modern and secure elections, government ethics, and voter education and engagement.

The coalition scored nine initiatives considered by the 130th Maine Legislature.

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
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Transitus Services Set for Belfast and Lewiston

Congress must enact



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istration is required for those participating through Zoom.



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Summer visitor wins food pantry challenge

WELLS - A recipe challenge sponsored by Catholic Charities Maine's Parish Social Ministry program provided an opportunity for Mainers to put their recipes and cooking knowledge to the test while helping local parish food ministries.

The theme for the 2021 St. Hildegard Food Pantry Recipe Challenge was "Food Box +1," meaning that entrants could only use the basic contents of a food pantry food box for a family of four in their recipes: cereal, crackers, powdered milk, canned soup, dried fruit, nuts, chickpeas, beans, instant potatoes, bread, canned vegetables, canned fruit, pork, chicken, beef, whole milk, butter, yogurt, sour cream, in-season fresh vegetables (corn, tomatoes, broccoli, squash,

green peppers), and basic fruits.

The recipes could be for any main or side dish, and participants were allowed to add one additional food to the recipe that is not in the box but is usually available at a local food pantry.

"The winner is from St. Mary Church of Holy Spirit Parish in Wells," said Bill Wood of Parish Social Ministry. "The name of the entry was 'Church Chicken' and was submitted by summer visitor Robert Peppin. A check for \$1,000 will go out to that parish to support their community food pantry."

Second place went to parishioner Beverly Gallant of Holy Savior Parish in Rumford for her "Chili Macaroni" recipe. A check for \$500 will go to the new food pantry at the parish.

"In the past four

years, the St. Hildegard's Food Pantry Recipe Challenge has collected close to 175 appetizing, easy-to-make, and nutritious recipes that come from foods found right at your local community food pantry," said Wood. "This year's recipes were once again challenging to judge, but all are simple to prepare, good for you, and tasty, too!"

for this year's Challenge. He surpassed that goal and was over \$14,000 in his fundraising efforts just days before riding in the Challenge on Sunday.

After raising about \$1.2M each year the past couple of years, the Dempsey Challenge set a lofty goal of \$1.5 Million for this year. "We learned so much over the course of the last year," Deneka Deletetsky, Event Manager, said. Participants from 45 different countries took part in the 2020 Dempsey Challenge, "So, we really, really are a new, refreshed Dempsey Challenge!" she

"For the first time there's no barrier to participate. People can choose to participate however they feel comfortable – whether they want to be with us here, locally, in our local Challenge right here in Lewiston/Auburn, or if they want to be a global participant. 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

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
