Enrollment Up at NW-SCC

MUSCLE SHOALS --Northwest-Shoals Community College has enrolled 3,443 credit students for the fall 2021 semester, a 2.4% increase from the fall 2020 figure of 3,361.

The totals come just after NWSCC announced a two-year \$30 million plan to add and upgrade facilities on both campuses.

The largest increase in student enrollment came from students taking dual enrollment courses at area high schools or on one of the college's campuses. From fall 2020 to fall 2021, NW-SCC saw a 20% increase in dual students.

The 3,443 student headcount is an unofficial student census following the registration of all dual enrollment high school students and does not include students who may be auditing a class or enrolled in non-credit workforce training courses. Fall semester enrollment numbers are not official until verified by the Alabama Community College System (ACCS) at the end of the semester.

Drug Take-Back Day

MONTGOMERY -Physicians with the Medical Association of the State of Alabama,

and Pharmacists with the Alabama Pharmacy Association are encouraging citizens to remove expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs from their homes and safely dispose of them during National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on

Saturday, October 23. During National Prescription Drug Take Back Day, the public can safely dispose of prescription medications at collection sites throughout the state.

The closest collection sites to NW Alabama are Muscle Shoals Police Department, Lawrence County, TN Jail, WLX Parking Lot, Russellville Police Department, WalMart-Russellville, Tishomingo County, MS Sheriff's Office.

The event comes shortly after a new report from the American Medical Association found that Alabama physicians have reduced the number of opioid prescriptions by 38% since 2011, with the number of opioid prescriptions in Alabama dropping for seven consecutive years.

The privacy of those who bring in prescription drugs as part of National Take Back Day will be protected. Under federal regulations, collection sites cannot require those returning prescription medications to share personal information, such as name or prescription information. To find other or





remembered, and regarded regarded several across platforms, including print news, Facebook, YouTube, outdoor advertising, broadcast, and radio.

The study revealed that advertising carried by news publishers outperformed ads distributed on the social media platforms, most notably on Facebook and YouTube. The study concluded that print ads are significantly more memorable than short YouTube videos and just as impactful as 15-second video ads on YouTube. Despite the billions in advertising business Facebook does in a year, the effectiveness of those Facebook ads is questionable based upon the group's analysis.

"Irrespective of the Facebook ad type, ads in newspapers outperform Facebook by up to 4x, ThinkNewsBrands found.

Although the study was specific to consumer trends in Australia, the study's findings come at time when Facebook's American North user base no longer appears fully enchanted with the platform.

Geoff Desreumaux, CEO and editor-in-chief of We are Social Media, an independent publisher of digital marketing news and analysis wrote in early

2021, "Facebook has a problem... a growing concern for its future," he said. "...There are serious signs of user fatigue in some of its core markets....

Advertisers have begun to express their concerns and frustrations with Facebook publicly. Big-brand

advertisers like Coca-Cola, Unilever, Verizon, and others stepped from Facebook away advertising in 2020 because of the platform's inept attempts to quell so-called hate speech and disinformation. That only appears to be continuing in 2021 with the growing revelations of partisanship.

Meanwhile, print advertising, especially in newspapers, continues to be accessible. According to the Australian study, simply more effective than digital ads on social media platforms. "Social media is simply" no alternative to news," the ThinkNewsBrands authors concluded. "News has strong reach, superior trust, memorability, and business impact."





LET'S TWEAK THAT IDEA A LITTLE

Dear Dave,

I am on Baby Step 2, and I started a YouTube channel earlier this year that led to a new opportunity to make additional income. I try on and review clothing, and I'm paid \$30 for each clip that's anywhere from 30 seconds to two minutes long. Right now, I have about 1,000 viewers. This requires me to buy items from several brands. I usually return the items when I'm through filming, but I'm currently funding this with a credit card I only use for this project. I only pay the minimum each month until I get the refund, so at any given time there can be up to \$4,000 on the card in rotation. I make about \$86,000 at my normal job, so is this an okay way to fund my project and chalk it up as *a business expense?* Amber

Dear Amber,

You're taking a risk here, from a business perspective, by playing around with \$4,000 in debt to make \$30 a pop. That's inordinate. And you shouldn't be paying for the clothes in the first place. These brands should be *giving* you clothes to review that you keep—for the marketing exposure, but I'm not sure you've got enough eyeballs on you yet to justify them giving you the clothes for free.

Basically, it sounds like you're trying to put yourself in a position to be an influencer. And the way influencers get paid is by monetizing eyeballs. Obviously, YouTube and other platforms will pay you if you can get the eyeballs. But 1,000



viewers really aren't a lot these days. You're getting there, though, and I'm glad you're working at it and trying to make things happen.

You make good money, Amber. I want you to set aside \$2,000 or \$3,000 for this business, maybe out of the business income, and prime the pump one time. By that, I mean open a separate checking account that's for your clothing exchange process only. Here's the thing, let's say you bought \$1,000 worth of stuff from one of these companies, and they suddenly decide they're not taking it back. You just ate that \$1,000. And guess what else? *Now*, you *really* have credit card debt.

There are three things you can always be sure of in business. One, it's going to cost twice as much as you think it will. Two, it's going to take twice as long as you think it will. And three, *you* are not the exception to these things. While we're at it, add this to the list of stuff you can always be sure of—you'll never find *me* advising or endorsing credit card debt! —Dave

Free Settlement Tips For Accident Victims

Let's begin at the end. How much money do you get to keep? Make certain that you know and confirm that amount. If you settle for \$5,000.00 but your hospital bill is \$4,900.00 then you only keep \$100.00. Understand what is your compensation for your injury.

You will need: 1. The accident report; 2. Medical bills;

3. Proof of who paid the bills, i.e., Blue Cross, Medicare, Tricare, or that they have not been paid.

4. Proof of lost wages.

You will also need some patience. Do not take the first offer. Think about it overnight. Different insurance companies make different kinds of offers. Some are fairer than others but not a single one will make their best offer first. If you have more treatment than just an ER visit, a good personal injury attorney can do all the work and make you money.

We get a large number of cases from people who refuse to sign medical authorizations issued by the insurance company. If we take the case, we review the medical records for accuracy before we send them to the person evaluating the claim.

With property damage claims the value of the car is what it is. It doesn't matter what you paid for the vehicle or how much you owe. One of the things that we hear often is that the replacement value is not adequate and now a person has a car payment that they didn't have before. Please note that if you had to replace the engine or transmission and you have those receipts it could add value to the vehicle.

If your vehicle is a total loss, make sure you have the title to the vehicle. If you still owe for the vehicle make sure you have the lien holder's information as well as the amount of the payoff.





Medicare Advantage Plans, Medicare Advantage Plans. Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) extends from October 15th through December 7th. This is the time of year you can sign up for or make any changes to your Medicare Advantage Plan (MA) or Prescription Drug Plan (PDP). Over the next few weeks we are going to look at MA and PDP plans and what to look for when choosing these plans. Medicare Advantage Plans, or Part C Medicare, are offered through private insurance companies that Medicare approves. If you join a Medicare Advantage Plan you still have Medicare but will receive your Medicare Part A and

approves. If you join a Medicare Advantage Plan you still have Medicare but will receive your Medicare Part A and Medicare Part B coverage through the private insurance company offering the MA plan you join. Medicare Advantage Plans are not Medicare supplements.

Here are a couple of rules to remember if considering a Medicare Advantage Plan. To be eligible to join a Medicare Advantage Plan you must be enrolled in Part A and Part B Medicare. You must also live in the service area of the plan. For example, if you live in Lauderdale or Colbert counties you are only eligible for plans that are offered in your county. Just because a plan is offered in Huntsville or Birmingham does not mean it's available in Lauderdale or Colbert counties. Also, you do not have to be 65 to join an Advantage Plan. If you have been on Social Security disability for 24 months and have Medicare you can join a plan.

Over the next few weeks we will begin to look at the six things to consider when choosing a Medicare Advantage Plan. Those six things are premium, copays, coinsurance, deductibles, provider networks and the drug formulary of the plan. We will also discuss the difference between your plan options such as a HMO and a PPO. In the meantime if you have any questions about Medicare Advantage Plans you can contact our office.





How to Find a Better Medicare **Prescription Drug Plan**

Dear Savvy Senior,

Is it important to compare Medicare Part D prescription drug plans every year? My pharmacist highly recommends it, but it's such a hassle sorting through all those different plans. Is there an easier way to shop and compare Medicare drug plans?

Lazy Beneficiary

Dear Beneficiary,

Because Medicare's prescription drug plans can change their costs and benefits from year-to-year, comparing Part D plans every year during the open enrollment season (which is Oct. 15 - Dec. 7) is always a smart idea.

Even if you're happy with your current coverage, there may be other plans out there that you're not aware of that offer better coverage at a lower cost. You never know until you look. Here are some tips to help you shop and compare Medicare drug plans.

Medicare Online

If you have internet access and are comfortable using a computer, you can easily shop for and compare all Medicare drug plans in your area and enroll in a new plan online if you choose, and it only takes a few minutes.

Just go to Medicare's Plan Finder Tool at Medicare. gov/find-a-plan, and choose the type of coverage you're looking for, enter your ZIP code, financial assistance (if you receive any), select the drugs you take and their dosages, and choose the pharmacies you use. The plan finder does the math to identify the plan in your area that covers your drugs at the lowest cost.

This tool also provides a five-star rating system that evaluates each plan based on past customer service records and suggests generics or older brand name drugs that can reduce your costs.

When you're comparing drug plans, look at the estimated drug costs plus premium costs that shows how much you can expect to pay over a year in total out-ofpocket costs.

Also, be sure the plan you're considering covers all of the drugs you take with no restrictions. Most drug plans today place the drugs they cover into price tiers. A drug placed in a higher tier may require you to get prior authorization or try another medication first before you can use it.

Any changes to coverage you make will take effect Jan. 1, 2022. If you take no action during open enrollment, your current coverage will continue next year.

Need Some Help?

If you need some help choosing a new plan, you can call Medicare at 800-633-4227 and they can help you out over the phone. Or contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP), which provides free Medicare counseling. They also conduct seminars during the open enrollment period at various locations throughout each state. To find a local SHIP counselor see ShiptaCenter.org or call 877-839-2675.

Financial Assistance

If you're lower-income and are having a hard time paying your medication costs, you may be eligible for Medicare's "Extra Help" program. This is a federal low-income subsidy that helps pay Part D premiums, deductibles and copayments.

To be eligible, your income must be under \$19,320 or \$26,130 for married couples living together, and your assets (not counting your home, personal possessions, vehicles, life insurance policies or burial expenses) must be below \$14,790 or \$29,520 for married couples. In the recent Guest Op-Ed for the Courier Journal, Alabama Attorney General, Steve Marshall, gingerly criticizes Alabama's Bureau of Pardon and Paroles for releasing an unnamed man from state prison allegedly who killed Police Sergeant Nick Risner on October 1, 2021. A quick google search led to identifying the man as Brian Martin. AG Marshal focuses heavily on the fact that Mr. Martin was released on good behavior after serving only three years, five months, and two days of his ten-year sentence. The Alabama Department of Corrections (ADOC) has since come out stating that "The ADOC does not make arbitrary decisions about releasing inmates. Brian Martin's sentence was computed in compliance with state law."

While AG Marshall qualifies that MI. Martin "racked up a lengthy rap sheet," the ADOC described these infractions as minor and notes these infractions resulted in revoking six months of good time from Mr. Martin. AG Marshall suggests that removing

such laws could have prevented the death of Sgt. Risner.

However, he neglects the fact that Mr. Martin had no alleged criminal offenses in the five years since his early release until now. As a Master of Social Work student, I am continually alarmed by the rhetoric and facts chosen when discussing matters of prison policies. Such conversations should be conducted so carefully and with presented. all facts This would align with ADOC's mission of "providing public safety through the safe and through confinement, secure rehabilitation, and successful re-entry of offenders," and to achieve greater societal well-being.

million dollars.

This information allows us to make rough estimates of the land area and cost of other systems. For example, the TVA Colbert fossil plant stands on 1,345 acres and at its peak produced 1,204 megawatts of electrical potential. In order to match this output, a solar farm similar to the Colbert farm would require 9,547 acres at a cost of 1.2 billion dollars.

The current United States electrical capacity is about 1,120,000 megawatts. A Colbert-like solar energy system would require 13,900 square miles of land surface at a cost of 1.1 trillion dollars.

The above estimates apply only to the construction of the basic solar plant. The big problem with solar energy is that it is not constant. The sun does not shine at night and its energy varies considerably with seasonal changes (longer and shorter days, clouds, etc.). Hence, backup systems are required to maintain suitable wattage.

The Colbert solar farm only exists because it is highly subsidized by the Government (TVA) who buys it's power, supplies it's network, and insures a suitable wattage output.





Ideas on How to Prevent Pipes From Freezing

Insurance Insights

Even a tiny crack in a pipe can spew hundreds of gallons of water causing flooding, damage to your furnace and serious structural damage. It also presents an immediate potential for mold.

The three central causes of frozen pipes are quick drops

in temperature,
poor insulation and
thermostats set too
low. You can prepare
your home during the
warmer months.
Insulate pipes.



Pipe insulation in your home's crawl spaces and attic helps. Exposed pipes are most susceptible to freezing.

- Use heat tape or heat cables. Heat tape or thermostatically controlled heat cables can be used to wrap pipes. Closely follow all manufacturer's installation and operation instructions.
- **Seal leaks.** Locate and thoroughly seal leaks that allow cold air inside.
- Secure outdoor hoses, valves and faucets. Before winter hits, disconnect garden hoses and, if possible, use an indoor valve to shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets.
- Let water drip. A trickle of hot and cold water might be all it takes to keep your pipes from freezing.
- Adjust the thermostat. Keeping your thermostat set at the same temperature during both day and night also reduces the risk of frozen pipes.
- **Open cabinet doors.** This allows heat to get to uninsulated pipes under sinks and appliances near exterior walls.

Pipes do not always burst when frozen. There are a few things to keep in mind:

- **Call a plumber if needed.** If you turn on your faucets and nothing comes out, leave the faucets turned on and call a plumber.
- Avoid use of appliances near water. Do not use electrical appliances in areas of standing water. You could be electrocuted.
- Avoid applying flames to thaw pipes. Never try to thaw a pipe with a torch or other open flame because it could cause a fire hazard.
- Use a hair dryer as a possible heat source (with caution). You may be able to thaw a frozen pipe using a hair dryer. Start by warming the pipe as close to the faucet as possible, working toward the coldest section of pipe.
- Shut off the water supply. If your water pipes have already burst, turn off the water at the main shutoff valve in the house. Be sure to leave the water faucets turned on.
