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3 Tips to Prepare for Medicare Open Enrollment

1) Review the Medicare & You Handbook

A helpful resource provided by Medicare.gov is the Medicare & You Handbook that offers current information for Medicare options and details.

2) Think About Your Medicare Needs

Now is the opportunity to think about your Medicare coverage needs for the year ahead. Consider changes in costs and benefits.

3) Preview Health and Prescription Drug Plans

Did you know?

Health screenings are a vital component of preventative health care. Specific screenings for older adults can help them stay healthy. Healthline and WebMD recommend older adults schedule these routine tests. The frequency of the screenings may depend on individuals' health histories, so each test should be discussed with a physician during adults' annual checkups.

- Blood pressure check
- Blood test to check cholesterol and triglyceride levels
- Colorectal cancer exam starting at age 50
- Weight screening to check for gains or losses
- Prostate cancer screening for men age 70 and older
- Breast exam and mammogram for women, starting at age 40
- Pap smear and HPV tests at the recommended intervals advised by a doctor
- Hearing test
- Osteoporosis test
- Shingles and pneumococcal vaccines
- Eye exam
- Periodontal exam once per year

Medicaid Denials: Appealing Unfavorable Decisions

The Medicaid application process is difficult and time consuming. The highly complex rules can trip up even the most careful of applicants. So, what happens if Medicaid denies your application?

Medicaid eligibility decisions are first made at the county level as each

Department of Job and Family Services is responsible for determining Medicaid eligibility for those who reside in their county. You, the applicant must provide all the necessary verifications to the county so they can determine eligibility. If the county finds that certain eligibility criteria are not met, or that you have not

Evaluating seniors' biggest expenses

New parents may not be able to visualize that one day their largest expenditures won't be centralized around providing necessities for their children. Adults go though many years of paying for diapers, toys, clothing, food, and education for their children. Yet, when the children have flown the coop, spending patterns change, and even more changes await come retirement

According to a 2020 survey from the financial services firm Edward

Jones, 68 percent of workers soon to retire said they had no idea how much they should be setting aside for expenses, particularly health care and long-term care. Professionals approaching retirement would be wise to analyze the Consumer Price Index - Elderly (CPI-E). It is a good reference to estimate which future expenses will cost the most after retirement. The Bureau of Labor Statistics looks at consumer spending and uses various data to determine the rate of inflation in key areas that apply to


timely provided the needed information, they will deny the case. At that point, you can appeal the decision. If benefits are going to stop, they will continue until your appeal is resolved if you appeal within 10 business days.

The first level of appeal is called a State Hearing, and a hearing officer will conduct an informal proceeding. The county will have to show why the application was denied. You then have an opportunity to make your case, with the hearing officer asking questions as well. Once the evidence is presented a written decision is issued a few days later. The hearing officer may uphold the denial, or they may overrule the denial and return the case to the county with instructions. Rarely, the hearing officer will overrule the county and order the case to be approved. Often cases are incorrectly denied because a verification is overlooked, or information is

entered incorrectly. These issues are straightforward to fix and can usually be done by you.

If your appeal is denied at the State Hearing level, you may appeal the hearing decision to the Department of Medicaid as an administrative appeal, and you must provide a detailed written legal argument as to why the county and state hearing officer are incorrect, generally done by an attorney. If this appeal is denied, you can appeal to the Court of Common Pleas, and from there all the way to the Ohio Supreme Court.

Most Medicaid appeals stop at the State Hearing level. Administrative appeals are rare and appealing beyond to the court is even rarer. Even so, you should always consult with a Medicaid attorney if your application is denied, so they can help handle your appeal or can explain why you were denied and help correct whatever is preventing you from being eligible.

Making Alzheimer's Just a Memory

An in-depth look at Alzheimer's and work to find a cure

(Family Features) Although the COVID-19 pandemic turned the world upside down, the rapid development of multiple vaccines has spurred hope that treatments - or even potential cures - may be found for other devastating conditions. One such candidate is Alzheimer's Disease.

Understanding Alzheimer's

The Alzheimer's Association defines the disease as a type of dementia that affects memory, thinking and behavior. While some degree of memory loss is common with age, Alzheimer's symptoms are significant enough to affect a person's daily life and typically only grow worse over time.

Early signs of Alzheimer's include trouble remembering new information, solving problems or completing familiar tasks. As the disease progresses, disorientation, confusion, significant memory loss and changes in mood or behavior may become apparent. Physical symptoms may include difficulty speaking, swallowing or walking.

Impact of Alzheimer's

Among people aged 65 and older, 1 in 9 (11.3%) has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease, meaning more than 6 million Americans live with it. Worldwide, the World Health Organization estimates there are nearly 50 million people living with dementia, and Alzheimer's likely accounts for 60-70% of those. By 2050, this number

could rise as high as 13 million. Less commonly noted are the numbers of early-onset (under 65 years old) Alzheimer's patients within those figures. Up to 9% of global Alzheimer's cases are believed to be early onset, according to the World Health Organization.

According to a Harvard School of Public Health survey, Alzheimer's is second only to cancer among America's most feared diseases. However, data from the Alzheimer's Association shows Alzheimer's is the sixth-leading cause of death in the United States, a rate higher than breast cancer and prostate cancer combined.

Beyond the personal impact for those battling the disease and their loved ones, Alzheimer's Disease also takes a significant economic toll. The Alzheimer's Association predicts that in 2021, Alzheimer's and other dementias will cost the nation \$355 billion. By 2050, these costs could exceed \$1 trillion if no permanent treatment or cure for Alzheimer's is found. At the same time, more than 11 million Americans provide unpaid care for people with Alzheimer's and other dementias, an estimated 15.3 billion hours of care, valued at nearly \$257 billion.

Treatment Options

While there hasn't been enough significant progress in discovering a treatment or cure in the more than 100 years since Alzheimer's was first



identified in 1906, early diagnosis and treatment may improve the quality of life for patients. The disease affects each patient differently, so therapies vary widely depending on how far it has progressed and which symptoms are most prevalent. Some therapeutic approaches can address symptoms like sleep disruption and behavior while medication may be beneficial for treating other symptoms.

Founded in 2016 by Milton "Todd" Ault III, Alzamend Neuro, a preclinical-stage biopharmaceutical company, has been actively seeking a cure for Alzheimer's and concentrates on researching and funding novel products for the treatment of neurodegenerative diseases and psychiatric disorders. With two products currently in devel-

opment, the company aims to bring these potential therapies to market at a reasonable cost as quickly as possible.

Ault's stepfather is currently battling Alzheimer's, his mother-in-law died from the disease and he has three other family members suffering through it.

"Even though work has been done to find a cure for Alzheimer's, to me it hasn't been a full-court press," said Ault, whose many personal encounters with Alzheimer's have further fueled his passion to find a cure. "While there are no profound treatments today for Alzheimer's disease, we believe we can change that."

Some basic changes in the approach to disease research could accelerate progress for diseases like Alzheimer's, said Milton "Todd" Ault III. founder of Alzamend Neuro.

Ault believes recent advancements in vaccines and medical technology, combined with these five approaches, can help advance the search for a cure for Alzheimer's disease and other dementias.

Encourage public-private partnerships

The collaboration of government agencies and private industries was integral to the COVID-19 vaccine development. The cross-industry partnerships enabled a vaccine to get to market in less than one year despite detractors. Ault believes this model can be replicated for

other diseases and conditions.

Diversify the search

Because of its complexity, a cure for Alzheimer's will require expertise from a broad range of organizations including health and defense, biopharmaceutical firms, academic experts and those involved in Operation Warp Speed, the federal effort that supported multiple COVID-19 vaccine candidates simultaneously to expedite development.

Share standards and data

Focusing on a shared goal is vital to succeeding. This means looking for ways to share standards and collaborate with colleagues and competitors regardless of proprietary data, patents and other limitations.

Become the catalyst for a cure

When political will and government funding are insufficient or unable to drive change, the private sector can inspire action.

"The progress we are making is a result of the private investment dollars we secured and the way we have applied strategy and tenacity that comes from a successful business record," Ault said.

Learning from past successes

Aside from the result, there is a great deal to learn from the successful development of past drugs and vaccines. Social awareness and cultural demand are potential ways to stimulate faster production and approvals between public and private entities.

older adults starting at age 62.

Individuals may be surprised to learn about where they'll be spending the bulk of their money when they get older. Here's a look at some key categories.

- Housing: According to data from the Employee Benefit Research Institute, in 2017, the most recent year for which data is available, housing accounted for roughly 49 percent of all spending for seniors. Focus should be centered on lowering those costs when a fixed income is imminent. The possibilities include paying off a mortgage; downsizing a home to have a lower rent or mortgage payment; refinancing a home to a fixed-rate loan so that costs are predictable; and taking on a tenant to offset costs.
- Food: The cost of food will not change dramatically, but it can eat into your budget. Even though food costs may decline when there's only two mouths to feed, food and beverage spending may go up due to more leisure time and dining out. Utilize senior discounts by shopping on days when stores offer percentages off purchases. Save money on restaurant spending by eating

out at lunch instead of dinner, splitting plates or skipping appetizers.

• **Healthcare:** Experts warn that while many expenses decline in retirement. health care spending increases. According to Fidelity, the average 65-year-old couple retiring in 2020 in the United States needed roughly \$295,000 just to cover their retirement health care expenses. Those with family histories of severe illnesses or those with preexisting conditions will need even more. It's also important to realize that roughly half of the population will need long-term care at some point, offers The Motley Fool, and that requires advanced budgeting as well. Many people find that Medicare supplement plans can bridge the gap in expenses that government-run plans will not cover. Saving through a health savings account (HSA) when employed also can create extra cash on hand for retirement expenses.

Understanding which retirement expenses will be high can help people plan better for the future.

NATIONAL PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK DAY OCTOBER 23

The Mental Health, Addiction and Recovery Services Board of Lorain County is supporting National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on October 23 across Lorain County. In April 2021, Lorain County Drug Take Back events resulted in the collection of 3,883.7 pounds of prescription drugs. From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., volunteers will provide free locking medication safes and other drug safety resources across the county at several locations. At locations without volunteers, visitors can drop off medications with law enforcement officers or other personnel for disposal. All are encouraged to clean out their medicine cabinets of potentially harmful drugs by safely disposing of them at this free, confidential annual event. The effort is led nationally by the Drug Enforcement Administration.

BIKING THE TRAILS OF LORAIN COUNTY METRO PARKS

Bikes are a great way to explore the parks and get some exercise. North Coast Inland Trail is our longest bike trail at 13 miles and extends from Elvria to Oberlin to Kipton.



North Coast Inland Trail Elvria to Kipton I 13 miles

The North Coast Inland Trail (NCIT) is a 12 foot wide, primarily asphalt paved trail, built over the abandoned Toledo, Norwalk and Cleveland Railroad and runs for 65 miles from Elyria to Toledo with some sections still being built The Lorain County Metro Parks' portion runs from Elyria to Kipton, passing through Oberlin along the way. The northernmost end of the NCIT is the Gateway Trailhead, which is also the southernmost end of the Black River Bikeway.

Black River Bikeway

Elyria to Lorain | 11+ miles

The Black River Bikeway is an 11-mile trail that connects multiple reservations to each other beginning on the southern end in Elyria and ending on the northern end in Lorain. This trail offers multiple access points and trailheads and connects the North Coast Inland Trail, Cascade Park and Black River Reservation. While the majority of the trail runs through Lorain County Metro Parks' reservations, there are sections of the trail that travel through the city of Elyria on public sidewalks and roadways.

Black River Reservation Elyria to Lorain | 6+ miles

The paved bike trail at Black River Reservation's southern end begins at the High Meadows picnic area and travels north through the the Bur Oak and Day's Dam picnic areas and comes to its northernmost point at Colorado Ave. (St. Rt. 611) in Lorain. The trail travels along the scenic Black River and over 2 large bridges that allow for bikers to look down on the river from the treetops. There are numerous scenic lookout points including a 0.5-mile offshoot trail that leads to a waterfall near the Day's Dam picnic area.

Beaver Creek Trail Amherst | 1 3 miles

The Beaver Creek Trail is a paved trail that connects Hollstein Reservation to Amherst Beaver Creek Reservation. This short hike and bikeway is primarily located within the two Metro Parks Reservations, however there is a 1-mile section that is a dedicated, paved trail that travels adjacent to public streets.

Carlisle Reservation LaGrange 1 9+ miles

Carlisle Reservation's bike trail can be accessed by any one of the three park entrances (Duck Pond Picnic Area, Visitor Center, or Equestrian Center). The winding trail includes sections of paved asphalt, crushed stone and dirt with the majority of the trail being crushed stone. There are many twists and turns along this trail so make sure to bring your map!

Grafton | 4+ miles (Mountain biking trail: 1+ miles)

Indian Hollow Reservation features two different biking paths. One at the Sheldon Woods section of the park, which has over 1 mile worth of dedicated mountain bicycling trails, as well as a portion of the trail that follows a railroad bed that once held the tracks that served the sandstone quarry that once thrived here. Scenic views of the Black River, sandstone outcrops and quarrying debris, and wildlife are plentiful along this trail also. The other path is located at Royal Oaks, the former golf course turned hiking, biking and fitness trail. This 1.9-mile crushed limestone path travels through beautifully scenic fields and features 3 catch-and-release ponds.

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
