Last week a condensed version of the Maine Law Enforcement Torch Run has kicked off at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard to Kittery. Eight runners ran in formation up route one, singing in cadence the entire way to South Portland and then to Brunswick.

Collins introduces bill to block IRS Snooping Proposal

Washington, D.C. - U.S. Senator Susan Collins joined a group of her colleagues in introducing the Prohibiting IRS Financial Surveillance Act, legislation that would prevent the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) from implementing Democrats' plan to give the agency access to Americans' bank transaction information.

"Allowing the IRS to monitor hardworking Americans' bank accounts is not only an invasion of privacy, but also a vast overreach by the federal government," said Senator Collins. "This intrusive measure would grant the IRS access to essentially every American's financial information. Our legislation would block the Administration from implementing this terrible proposal."

One of the proposals included in the partisan reconciliation bill currently

under consideration would require financial institutions to report to the IRS every withdrawal and deposit if the total of all transactions for the year is more than \$10,000. Under this reporting regime, a family whose monthly transactions total just \$834 would still be reported to the IRS. The Joint Committee on Taxation has analyzed the proposal and found that it is likely to impact taxpayers in every income bracket.

The Prohibiting IRS Financial Surveillance Act would bar the IRS from instituting any new requirements that would force financial institutions to report on the account activity of Americans. It would allow individuals and small businesses to make normal financial transactions without fear of increased and unnecessary scrutiny from the federal government.

Alex Allain Named Little East Conference Player of the Week

GORHAM, Maine. Senior captain Alex Allain (Carmel, Maine/Hermon) of the University of Southern Maine Huskies' women's soccer team has been named the Little East Conference co-Offensive Player of the Week. Allain is earning the accolade after helping the Huskies to a 2-0 week, including a 4-0 shut out victory over Little East Conference opponent Keene State College on the road. In a critical Little East Conference win, Allain scored her third and fourth goals of the season, including the game-winner, as USM defeated Keene State for just the third time in the 26-game history between the two schools. Allain has been part of the Huskies' roster that has two of the three wins over the Owls, dishing out a pair of assists in the 2018 win.

Allain broke through for the game-winning goal in the 16th minute of the game, and then doubled the Huskies advantage at 2-0 two min-

utes later to give USM a comfortable lead before halftime. With the two goals, the Huskies' midfielder now has four goals and four assists for the

with this idea by allowing non-traditional materials like natural and human made objects into my paintings. Aiming to transcend the materials, I walk over them to flatten them, staple and glue them on the surface. During a collaborative series, I invited other women in my community in a tracåing project out in my backyard. We took turns tracing each other on large sheets of Arches paper while lying in resting poses. Their participation served as an act of resistance, and a symbol of becoming. For me, the images once hung on a wall became a representation of a life-force growing from the ground up. I see collaboration as a means to interrupt my own gaze on the work and widen my visual vocabulary. On many occasions, my young child has participated in the paintings. Born in 1976 to

French Canadian parents, Renée has lived throughout New England most of her life. She studied at the Cleveland Institute of Art and graduated from the Maine College of Art in 1999. She received her MFA in visual art from the Vermont College of Fine Arts in 2021 when she was nominated for fellowships from the Dedalus Foundation and the College Art Association. Renée has received grants, awards, and residencies from institutions including the Maine College of Art, the Vermont Arts Council, the Robert Rauschenberg Foundation, the Cooper Union, the Kate Millett Art Colony for women, and the Vermont Studio Center.

The LA Arts gallery at 221 Lisbon Street in Lewiston will exhibit paintings by Renée Bouchard from November 5 through December 17. The exhibition title Allegory of Prudence, is a reference to the painting of the same name by the Venetian Renaissance painter, Titian, in which the Latin inscription ex praete/rito / praesens prvden/ter agit / ni fvtvrv/ actione de/tvrpet, written above the figures in the painting, can be translated as, "from the past / the present acts prudently / lest it spoil future action." Bouchard says of her

paintings: I work in spurts on several paintings simultaneously in a journalistic manner, documenting clusters of daily life. Language, media, music, and studio detritus intertwine with memory and the present act of painting. I paint using colors without prejudice. The experience of color is one of a constant state of coming and going. I investigate the transitions between complementary colors and view them as opportunities to change the habit of language knowing one color can't exist without the other.

As a single moth-

er who received her MFA during the pandemic while homeschooling her young child, a renewed focus to a public discourse about the relationship and responsibilities of caregiving made it more relevant than ever. I am constantly exploring human security and aim towards a gesture of repair. Since my son was in the womb, I began intersecting mothering with my home studio practice. In the studio, I am envisioning the possibilities of a common world.

I find it interesting that painting is considered a "high art." I am constantly playing

VIP offers car care tips



Fall is officially here in Maine–and before we know it, falling leaves will soon become falling snow. As Mainers prep for another winter season ahead, there's more that needs to be done besides breaking out the shovels and ice salt.

October was Fall Car Care month, which means now is the perfect time for Mainers to give their cars some special attention before the harsh winter weather sets in. To help make this seasonal transition a little easier. VIP Tires & Services is fully stocked with winter ures, and even put together a car care winter checklist outlining what exact steps Maine car owners should be taking so they can stay safe on the roads this winter. VIP's 10 tips for safe winter driving are as follows.

Check your fluids. Your vehicle is a finely tuned machine, much like the human body, that needs fluids to run. You should check all fluids, including your oil, power steering fluid, brake, and transmission fluid. It's not a bad idea to check your windshield washer fluid to keep your windshield clear and your antifreeze/coolant to keep your engine from freezing up.

Hoses and belts. These are vital to keeping your vehicle running smoothly. Summer heat can do a number on belts. Be sure that they won't fail you when you need them most by checking for leaks and tightening them, or inspecting belts for signs of excessive wear, cracks, brittleness, fraying, or looseness. Check your battery.

Excessive heat from the summer can sap your car battery's charge, and you won't know until it's too cold to do anything about it. If your battery isn't charging and discharging correctly, replace it. Make sure your connections are clean, tight, and free from corrosion.

Brake system. In the cold and snowy months to come, you'll be relying on your brakes in a variety of driving conditions. Be confident that they are up to the task. You should have them inspected before heading into the icy months of winter, but you should also have the brake linings, rotors, and drums inspected at each oil change.

Exhaust system. If your vehicle has an exhaust leak, it could be potentially dangerous to drive as exhaust contains carbon monoxide. Have your exhaust system inspected for rust, holes, leaks, or other damage. Signs you may have an exhaust problem include unusual noises, poor fuel mileage, strange fumes or smells, a vibrating gas pedal, and rumbling when idle.

Check the HVAC. It might not seem necessary to have a working AC when the temperature is below zero, but the HVAC system cools, heats, cleans, ventilates, and dehumidifies the interior of your vehicle. Not only is it essential for the comfort of you and your passengers, but it's critical for defrosting and keeping your windows clear of ice, fog, and snow. Steering and suspension. The back roads of Maine can be harsh on your suspension and steering systems. Get them checked annually including shock absorbers, struts and chassis parts like ball joints, tie rod ends, and other related components.

Check the tires. Before the first snow is the time to check your tires to be sure they're ready for harsh winter driving conditions. Your tires should have adequate tread for traction. If you need new tires, VIP guarantees the lowest price every day. Be sure to check your tire pressure regularly. Tire pressure drops 1-2 pounds for every 10 degrees in temperature.
