Auburn unveils downtown revitalization plan

During a workshop of the Auburn City Council, Auburn's Economic Development team unveiled the city's proposed 5-year Downtown Revitalization Plan.

Auburn's Strategic Plan, completed in 2019, established four "transformational actions" needed to revitalize the city's downtown area. The revitalization plan recommends strategies, identifies items that the city has already begun working on, and defines action steps to be taken to reach the goals outlined in the strategic plan.

"Revitalizing our downtown will be a team effort," said Jay Brenchick, Auburn's director of economic development. "We need every city department as well as our plan can be found at www.goauburn.me.

city council, residents, visitors and local businesses involved. After all, without a great downtown, all other economic development activities will be challenged."

The plan, which is presented in an interactive "storymap" format, features four proposed transformational actions as well as solutions for how to implement them. The actions include: a walkable downtown; redevelopment of the Great Falls area; the establishment of a downtown management district and coordinator; and identifying Auburn's downtown as the focal point for arts and entertainment in the area.

UMaine winter care of livestock workshops start Dec. 7

University of Maine Cooperative Extension will offer four in-person workshops about winter care of livestock from 12:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. every other Tuesday starting Dec. 7 at the UMaine Regional Learning Center, 75 Clearwater Drive, Falmouth. Remaining classes are Dec. 21, Jan. 4 and Jan. 18.

The series begins with winter care of small ruminants, including best practices for meeting water, feed and shelter needs for sheep and goats. Other workshops will cover winter care of poultry, swine and beef cattle. Colt Knight, UMaine Extension assistant professor and statewide livestock specialist, will lead each workshop

The \$15 fee for Dec. 7 includes a light lunch; remaining dates are on a \$0-\$10 sliding scale fee. Registration is required by Dec. 1. Register on the program webpage. Enrollment is limited to 20 seats per session. Face coverings and no evidence of COVID-19 symptoms are required, regardless of vaccination status. Nominations and applications for the 2022 "school" of Brookie Award winners are now being accepted through February 14, 2022. Mainers are encouraged to apply or nominate eligible young leaders who live in Maine and are between the ages of 15 and 30 at www.brookieawards. org.

The Brookie Awards are organized by NRCM Rising, the young member arm of Maine's leading environmental group, the Natural Resources Council of Maine (NRCM). The first "school" of six

Brookie Award winners, a geographically diverse group including students, artists, and scientists, was announced in 2020.

"As a Brookie Award winner, I was able to connect to a variety of other youth environmental leaders, participate in retreats and professional development, and connect with multiple organizations," said 2020 Brookie Award winner Gabby Hillyer. "More than the building of that network, the Brookie Award remains one of the most important benchmarks in my career, as a signal that I am moving forward as a leader in my field."

Brookie Award winners will receive a \$2,000 cash prize, professional storytelling training, a professional video about their work, and the opportunity to attend a nature-based retreat with their fellow young environmental changemakers where they will participate in skill-building sessions and engage with other environ-

mental and political leaders in Maine.

NRCM Rising will celebrate and honor the Brookie Award winners at a major gala event in Spring 2022 that will feature short, inspirational speeches from each awardee. Videos will also be produced to feature the unique perspective and voice of each winner.

"Young activists should apply for a Brookie Award as a chance to showcase the important work they've done in the state and gain access to resources that will improve their communication skills and ability to lead more effectively," said 2020 Brookie Award winner Riley Stevenson. Maine CDC puts health inspection violations online

The Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention (Maine CDC) announced today that health

inspection results are now available online through a new web portal.

The portal is avail-

able on the Health Inspection Program (HIP) website at www.maine.gov/ dhhs/mecdc/environmental-health/el/index.htm.

This portal allows the public to view inspection violations within the past three years for establishments licensed and inspected by HIP. These establishments include restaurants, take-out food vendors, mobile food vendors, lodging, B&Bs, campgrounds, youth camps, public pools/spas, and body artists such as tattooists, body piercers, micropigmentationists, and electrologists.

When violations are detected, HIP pursues an educational approach first

and seeks voluntary compliance from licensed establishments.

Inspections are conducted unannounced by state and municipal health inspectors. Inspections are a "snapshot" of the day and time of the inspection. An inspection conducted on any given day may not represent the overall, long-term compliance of an establishment. Establishments are provided the opportunity to correct any observed violations while the inspector is on site.


A failed inspection

results from more than three critical or more than 10 non-critical violations. Critical violations must be corrected within 10 days and non-critical violations are generally required to be corrected within 30 days. The timeframe in which a follow-up inspection occurs after each failed inspection depends on the nature of the violations that caused the failure. Repeat violations or failure to correct violations as outlined may lead to enforcement including fines and penalties.

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"The Ghosts of Walter Crockett" Memoir released November 16

YARMOUTH, ME. In the 1960s and 1970s, Ed Crockett and his siblings were raised in poverty on Munjoy Hill. The children of a homeless, alcoholic father who lived on the streets for nearly twenty years and who was once known as "the biggest drunk in Portland."

In his new memoir, Portland-native Crockett—a state representative and president of Capt'n Eli's Soda—recounts his struggle to break the cy-

cle of alcoholism, come to grips with the embarrassing specter of his father, and overcome the shaky confidence brought on by a childhood of food stamps and welfare coats, to eventually find success on the same streets where his father once spent his days passed out and begging for money. It's a rough upbringing, but amidst the turmoil Crockett also finds role models, the importance of neighborhood roots, the joys of wiffle

ball, and the unconditional love of family.

The Ghosts of Walter Crockett, officially slated for release on November 16 from Maine-based Islandport Press, is at times harrowing and heartbreaking, but ultimately is a tale of love and redemption that takes readers to a side of twentieth century Portland that has always existed in the shadows of lighthouses, lobsters, and sunsets, but is rarely explored in print.

"Ed Crockett writes

with love, honesty, emotion, and sometimes heartbreak in this unflinching look at his family and his personal struggle to break from poverty, escape the downward pull of his surroundings, and come to grips with the mental anguish caused by his father," said Dean L. Lunt, editor-in-chief of Islandport Press. "Ed also shines a light on the very real, working-class Portland that existed on the peninsula before million-dollar condos, fancy hotels, and hip restaurants."

Ed Crockett grew up on Kellogg Street in a two-family home with his mother, grandparents, and seven siblings. He graduated from Portland High School, earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Maine, and an MBA from Boston College. During his career, he has worked for some of Maine's most iconic brands—including Oakhurst Dairy, Hannaford Brothers, and Lepage Bak-

eries. Crockett and his wife, Martha, raised three children in Portland and still live there. This is his first book.

Senator Black and his wife Susan have been married for 50 years. Together they share four children, 10 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren.

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
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28,000+ Students to receive free books

AUGUSTA - In recognition of October as Financial Planning Month and to strengthen financial capability in Maine, the Finance Authority of Maine (FAME) has once again partnered with the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) to offer Invest in ME Reads, a program to support family financial education by empowering families to engage in conversations about future goals, saving money, and the value of choice.

Unlike many financial education programs that focus on high school students, Invest in ME Reads engages children early in elementary school to help them begin to learn

about money and financial decision making. FAME launched the program in 2020 to serve all Maine second graders and this year has expanded it to provide free resources to all public second and third grade students.



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
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LA Block Party had record-setting fundraising for Make-A-Wish

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MaineHealth's capacity challenges to continue in the months ahead

Leaders from across MaineHealth, northern New England's largest integrated health care network, said that they expect capacity challenges for the region's health care industry to persist in the months ahead and asked for understanding from patients and support from the community and policy makers.

Andrew Mueller, MD, chief executive of MaineHealth, said much of the challenge can be traced to a workforce shortage that has been building for some time, and he talked at length about the need to train more clinical professionals. He also said other factors are making it harder for health care providers to keep up with demand at this time.

"We're still battling, just a really hot pandemic. We're seeing the largest numbers of hospitalized patients since the pandemic began, right now," said Mueller.

In addition, Mueller said, many patients who understandably delayed care are now arriving MaineHealth hospitals much sicker, putting greater demand on the organization's care team. Mueller also noted that the ongoing labor shortage is not just impacting MaineHealth, but health care organizations across the region. That in turn is making it hard to transition patients out of the hospital to skilled nursing facilities and to behavioral health facilities.

Mueller said that, while departures from the health care workforce over the state of Maine requirement to be vaccinated against COVID-19 will

have some impact in the lar challenge with patients short-term, the real challenge is with overall long term trends in the labor market. Mueller presented data that showed that infections and quarantines related to COVID-19 have been a significant challenge for the health care system and that vaccination was the right way to keep care team members, patients and communities safe.

"It's very clear to us that the vaccine mandate really helps to protect and preserve our work force.," said Mueller, who added that having the full care team at MaineHealth vaccinated is not only consistent with what is best for patients and the community, but supports the organization's vision of 'Working together so our communities are the healthiest in America.'

During the Tuesday virtual press conference. Joel Botler, MD, chief medical officer of Maine Medical Center, shared that the state's largest hospital is seeing unprecedented demand. This is resulting in ongoing evaluation of, and rescheduling of some, non-emergent procedures at the hospital. Also, the MMC Emergency Department has been on frequent "diversion" in recent weeks, meaning that only life-threatening and other critical cases are taken in and others are directed elsewhere for care.

Cindy Wade, R.N., president of LincolnHealth in Damariscotta and Boothbay Harbor, said her rural hospital network is straining under the increased demand and the shortage of workers. She said in her hospital there is a particuwho need care in a nursing home but can't find a space due to the labor shortage impacting skilled nursing services.

Wade also urged people with non-life-threatening concerns to use LincolnHealth's urgent care center in Boothbay Harbor rather than the hospital Emergency Department in Damariscotta. She said that even if someone has to drive a bit to get to Boothbay Harbor, they are likely to get care and be home sooner than if they sought similar care in the Emergency Department.

The health system leaders asked patients and communities to do their part in mitigating the capacity challenges for pro-

Mueller urged people to get vaccinated against COVID-19, noting that the sickest COVID patients are those who are not vaccinat-

The leaders also stressed the importance of seeking out the best venue for care. Across the health system hours have been extended for walk-in care, urgent care and at doctor's offices to help take the pressure off Emergency Departments.

MaineHealth is taking a number of steps in response to the capacity issues, including:

Forming a work group specifically targeting capacity. The work group uses a "capacity dashboard" that enables them to see on a daily basis where beds are available across the health system and where patients can be appropriately transferred to receive the best possible

Reducing non-emergent procedures, evaluating them day-to-day depending on capacity.

Expansion by the MaineHealth Medical Group of outpatient access, including extending primary care, walk-in, urgent care and telehealth hours to help reduce the strain on Emergency Departments.

Placing an emphasis on supply chain efforts to ensure the health system has the right equipment to keep everyone safe.

Creating incentives to add staff, including a \$61 million market adjustment to pay across the system in August and still higher increases for some of the most difficult positions to fill, making sure that wages are competitive. The system also significantly increased the employee referral bonus

Continued investment in training programs for critical positions, working both internally and with community partners to promote these opportunities. Longer term, the health system will be investing nearly \$5 million next year in partnership with community colleges and institutions of higher learning to build a workforce pipeline into the fu-

The leaders also touched on other steps that can be taken to help alleviate the capacity challenges.

Mark Fourre, MD, president of Pen Bay Medical Center and Waldo County General Hospital in Rockland and Belfast, noted there were three important priorities for the community and policy makers that would help

improve the situation. One of those is reimbursements and programing for behavioral health, which is being felt today in the form of patients who are having a mental health crisis filling emergency department beds over many days. "That is a long standing problem made worse today," said Fourre.

Fourre also noted that investment in local EMS companies and other patient transport services as well as reimbursements for long-term care services at nursing homes have also lagged, and the failure to invest in those services is making the current situation much worse.

Additionally, Mueller said the investments in supporting training and education for health care workers announced by Maine Gov. Janet Mills on Monday were positive steps forward, and he said hoped that the initiative will be followed by a permanent investment in expanding the state's capacity for training nurses and other health care pro-

Mueller also had one additional ask of the community on behalf of the entire MaineHealth care team, which is to continue to appreciate and respect the difficult job health care workers are doing.

"One of the other things that we need you to do is just be patient, and recognize we are all working hard to ensure we get everyone cared for in a timely manner. I can't say it enough; we have the most amazing care team," said Mueller. "We have true heroes on the front

Red Cross asks to test smoke alarms when turning back clocks

As Mainers turn their clocks back for the end of daylight-savings time, the American Red Cross asks everyone to also test their smoke alarms.

Home fires are the nation's most frequent disaster and tragically take seven lives every day in this country.

"It's critical to take action now to be as safe as possible as the threat of home fires increases with the holidays and cooler weather." said Aaron McIntire, Regional Disaster Officer, Red Cross of

Northern New England. "So far this year, Red Cross volunteers have responded to 191 home fires in Maine, assisting 760 individuals. The good news is that you can take a few simple steps this weekend to help protect your loved

During a fire, early warning from a working smoke alarm plus a fire escape plan that has been practiced regularly can save lives. As we turn back our clocks when daylight saving time ends, it's the perfect time to test your smoke alarms and replace the batteries if needed.

In addition to testing your smoke alarms, follow these steps get your home ready. Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including inside and outside bedrooms and sleeping areas. Replace smoke alarms that are 10 years or older. Components such as sensors can become less sensitive over time. Follow your alarm's manufacturer instructions.

Practice your two-minute home fire escape plan. Make sure everyone in your household can get out in less than two minutes. That's the amount of time you may have to escape a burning home before it's too late. Include at least two ways to get out of every room and select a meeting spot at a safe distance away from your home, such as your neighbor's home or landmark like a specific tree in your front yard, where everyone can meet. The Red Cross

Home Fire Campaign with community partners has saved at least 1,048 lives since October 2014 by educating families about fire safety, helping them create escape plans and installing more than 2.2 million free smoke alarms in high-risk homes across the country.





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
