he League of Women Voters, Fremont, Newark, and Union City is sponsoring an online presentation featuring a fascinating research project by Claire Zhu, a senior at Evergreen Valley High School, on Monday, Nov. 22 from 7:00 p.m. -8:30 p.m.

Zhu became enthralled with the idea of what would happen if more young people voted. With her will be Julie Dunkle, league member, who will discuss her groundbreaking work in student-led voter registration drives.

The 2020 Presidential election demonstrated that youth voters are beginning to emerge as a powerful force in American politics. Historically young voters have participated significantly less than other age groups in US elections. However, according to the highly respected and non-partisan group, the Center for Information and Re-



# Santa Clara County remains in a drought emergency despite recent rains

More water conservation is needed to protect water supplies

Santa Clara County remains in an extreme and exceptional drought.

Valley Water reservoirs are at historic lows with total capacity at 11%. State reservoirs are also at historic lows, putting delivery of imported water at risk.

Santa Clara County Valley Water is working to increase our supply of recycled and purified water, giving us a local supply of drought resilient water.

Despite recent rains, a drought emergency remains in Santa Clara County. In June 2021, Valley Water's Board of Directors declared a water shortage emergency and called on all residents, businesses and farms to reduce water use by 15%.

Valley Water is here to aid in water conservation efforts by offering rebates and devices that help homes, yards, and businesses become drought resilient.

Half of the water used in the typical Santa Clara County home is used outdoors. Valley Water's Landscape Rebate Program is designed for residents and businesses to convert high-water use landscape, such as lawns and pools, to low-water-use landscape and retrofit existing irrigation equipment with high-efficiency irrigation equipment. More than two-thirds of participants noticed a decrease in their water bills after transforming their yards. Valley Water's Landscape Rebate Program offers up to \$3,000 in assistance for residential sites and \$50,000 for commercial and institutional sites.



n 1789, President Washington called for a National Day of Thanksgiving, in 1863 President Lincoln affirmed this tradition, and in 1941 Thanksgiving became an official American holiday.



Today, we continue the celebration of the first Thanksgiving from 1621 between the English Pilgrims settlers and the Wampanoag Natives. Families and friends join together every year to celebrate and give thanks for the blessings they have received.

As we come together for Thanksgiving this year, possibly surrounded by loved ones we haven't seen since the start of the pandemic, we have much to be grateful for and to reflect on in this season of gratitude and giving.

We can gather with our family and loved ones this year because our community has taken the pandemic seriously and gotten vaccinated. Now, as we see more of our youngest members of the community become vaccinated against the deadly COVID-19 virus, we must recognize all of the work of our healthcare professionals and essential frontline workers who have selflessly put themselves and their families in harm's way to protect us and keep us healthy. These supportive housing sites will help house some of our unhoused families with small children, veterans, and individuals who lost their homes due to the COVID 19 pandemic. I extend my thanks to the County, City, community-based organizations, and other stakeholders who made these projects a reality so that these families can

look forward to stable and safe living environment to get back on their feet this holiday season.

Coming out of a global pandemic, it is more important than ever to make sure that all of our residents have access to quality and affordable healthcare. I am proud to be joining my colleague, Supervisor Joe Simitian, local community health clinics, and Community Health Partnership to expand the Primary Care Access Program (PCAP). PCAP will close gaps for our neighbors who are ineligible for financial assistance through Medi-Cal or Covered California but do not make enough money to cover a medical bill if their elderly parent got sick or if their child got hurt. This expansion of PCAP will help make sure that all of our residents are able to access the medical care that they need in order to maintain our community's health and wellness.

At the October 5th meeting, my colleagues unanimously approved my referral to create a Sustainability Commission. Climate change is an existential threat to all our livelihoods and futures. That is why it is critical that we start finding solutions to climate change now. I am very proud that our Sustainability Commission designates at least two seats for young people. The younger generations are going to directly be affected by the effects of climate change, so it is vital that we ensure that their voices are at the table.

These are just a few of the many important issues that my colleagues and I on the Board of Supervisors have accomplished in the most recent weeks. Please remember to wear a mask, socially distance when out in public and get your booster shot when eligible so that we can keep all of our family members and loved ones healthy this Thanksgiving.

In closing, I would personally like to wish all of you and your families a happy and restful Thanksgiving from me and my wife, Sally, and our three daughters, Aubrianna, Hillary, and Stella.


If it helps, make a written list of all things



High School. He first joined the San Jose Youth Symphony in 4th grade and is currently in his fourth season with the Philharmonic Orchestra.




The San Jose Youth Symphony

however no one shared her interest in the topic. She then began looking at the consistently low youth turnout in presidential elections and to wonder how the political landscape of our country would be different if more young people voted. So she decided to independently design and implement a research project to answer the question, "How does Youth Turnout impact Presidential Elections?"

Her findings show, indeed, youth turnout can significantly impact Presidential Elections, especially in battleground states. Her research is quite impressive, detailing the factors that influence youth voting behavior, and then goes on to offer five concrete actions to improve youth turnout.

While conducting her research she also volunteered with the League of Women Voters Fremont Newark Union City (LWVFNUC) Youth Voter Movement.

This program, developed and coordinated by league member, Julie Dunkle has been highly successful in registering over 7000 high school students to vote. Ms. Dunkle fosters youth leadership in establishing voter registration events and it serves as a model for communities far and wide. Dunkle states, "Working with youth to register the next generation of voters gives me great hope in the preservation of our democracy".

When asked what was the most important lesson learned from her research project Zhu replied, "I learned how crucial it is for youth to be active and connected, especially in matters where they can make a big difference. By proactively reaching out to experts and civic groups, I not only became more knowledgeable about youth voting but also the importance of taking action and advocating for something you value." Zhu is now applying to colleges for next year with the intent of studying political science with an emphasis on data analysis.

Some believe strongly that after the 2020 Presidential Election, with an attempt to overturn election results, there is a belief in the importance of maximizing voter turnout. Some believe, improving youth voter registration and voting is an important mechanism for assuring a strong democracy.





# San Jose destiny coach films his eBook in space ahead of Russian movie crew's arrival

new eBook is launched into outer space, a first in publishing history.


San Jose native Michael-John Toste sent his first new autobiography into space, which was filmed on board the ISS during its 3-million-mile mission.

His revolutionary book, "The Prophetic Matrix: Unlock the Secret Code to Your Destiny" fulfilled its own destiny while traveling in the International Space Station's Destiny Module.

Last month, a Russian film crew made headlines by beating Tom Cruise in the race to shoot the first movie in space. Then William Shatner of Star Trek fame recently became a passenger on board Blue Origin's New Shepherd starship. From Earth to the Heavens: An Interstellar Book Release, hosted by Immanuel College principal Kevin Richardson, featured time-stamped footage of the book filmed and recorded in the Destiny Module that was projected on a large screen for a group of collegiate space enthusiasts. The students in attendance received an honorary certificate documenting the historic ceremony and a commemorative The Prophetic Matrix: Making Space History in 2021 medallion to mark the occasion.



# **State Superintendent of Public Instruction issues apology**

California Department of Education admits mismanagement of \$187M

tate Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond (inset) said he was wrong for delaying the release of tens of millions of dollars in federal Covid aid to California private schools serving low-income families and apologized to the leaders of the schools.

Promising in a recent webinar to quickly remove the bottlenecks, Thurmond

said, "We regret any heartburn or difficulties that you have experienced." He asked for "some grace" as the department fixed the problems he acknowledged it had created.

The breaking point for frustrated school leaders occurred late last month. Administrators from the Education Department had told schools they would be reimbursed for items purchased through Oct. 31.

The California Department of Education admitted to mismanaging \$187 million for 547 private schools

that had applied and were approved for the first round of Emergency Assistance for Non-Public Schools. Congress approved that funding last De-

cember and included a second round of \$181 million for California private schools from the American Rescue Plan.

Schools that spent money expecting reimbursement faced a cash crunch and were worried about making payroll.

Schools assuming there would be counseling and mental health services for the reopening of school were told by state officials not to expect them until early Feb-

ruary, after a months-long needs-assessment process that would begin in November.

The department had urged patience, claiming that overseeing services for private schools was a new function for states. It's usually done by school districts within whose boundaries the schools are located. Unlike some other states, California has procurement laws that limited the department's ability to hire vendors to handle reimbursements and provide services quickly.

# East San Jose community farm receives 25-year extension

esidents relying on fresh food from an
East San Jose community farm won't
have to worry about produce anytime
soon thanks to a 25-year extension from the
city.

The San Jose City Council unanimously approved a 25-year contract Tuesday with Veggielution, a local nonprofit that runs an urban garden at Emma Prusch Farm Park.

Veggielution started in 2007 as part of a nationwide movement to grow healthy and fresh food for marginalized communities in urban spaces. In 2008, the nonprofit opened a space that now occupies six acres at Emma Prusch Farm Park.

"When the pandemic first broke out and we got the initial orders to shelter in place, it became a daunting task for residents who live on the east side of San Jose," said Councilmember Magdalena Carrasco, whose district includes the community farm. "These were families that really depended on their local parks. Veggielution sits squarely in one of those communities... Veggielution was among the first to really meet the challenges we were facing."

Veggielution offers environmental programs that help residents learn about agriculture, grow their business skills and cook new foods—all in the park. The nonprofit,

along with the city's parks department, holds summer youth camps and afterschool programs.

"It's a wonderful thing to see, and we'd love to see it in more parks throughout our city, but this is a pretty amazing start," Mayor Sam Liccardo said. "I'm a little disappointed we don't see more of those... I'm hopeful we can find ways to engage more broadly in these agreements because there are many partners who want to engage with us."

As part of the agreement, Veggielution will continue to teach youth farming, hold health and wellness classes, volunteer programs and cooking classes, among other activities.

"As we reflect on the past few years in the context of the pandemic, a racial reckoning and climate-related disasters, we recognize your partnership and your approval of this item today as an important statement of social, environmental and economic justice," said Cayce Hill, executive director of Veggielution.

# Veggielution brings farms, food and family to East San Jose

Eighteen Veggielution workers farm the land, and every first Saturday of the month the garden hosts one of its signature programs such as yoga, planting in the fields, art classes and eating freshly-picked produce from the Veggielution Cocina kitchen.

"Veggielution is an extraordinary example

of utilizing open public space," said resident Mary Helen Doherty. "I'm confident (the city) will continue to support (Veggielution's) use of public land. Twenty-five more years of Veggielution is a continued blessing for our community."

During the pandemic, Veggielution shifted part of its operations to food distribution, handing out up to 5,000 boxes of food weekly, according to a city memo.

According to a city memo, the Veggielution-run farm takes up six acres of a 47-acre city park along Highways 680 and 101. The park's namesake, Emma Prusch, donated the land to the city in 1962.


"I think Emma Prusch should be very proud to see this agreement move forward," Councilmember Maya Esparza said, reflecting on the programming and weekly events Veggielution provides. "When COVID hit, Veggielution stood up in a huge way."

Volunteers maintain hundreds of fruit trees, a native flower garden and a Germanthemed kitchen garden at Emma Prusch Farm Park. Employees from the city parks department maintain and operate other programs at the site, including providing farm tours and hay wagon rides to elementary students.

Veggielution is also part of the Si Se Puede Collective, a four-organization coalition that provides services to underprivileged residents in East San Jose.

"Every Saturday I saw children's faces light up as they went through our worm bin," said Maricella Fuentes, spokesperson for Veggielution and the Si Se Puede Collective. "It's on days like this that you see how important open space is for children and their families."



# Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors to address problem of homelessness with approval of Project Homekey sites

he Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved new Project Homekey sites to help end homelessness and build more affordable and interim housing for our unhoused neighbors.

Supervisors approved the purchase of properties in Santa Clara and Mountain View that will increase housing options to address the County's homelessness crisis. These projects brought out a strong response from the community, both supportive and opposed.

"It is integral to hear from the community on every action

we take, but it is also vital that our community has been presented with accurate information. We thank the community for sharing their thoughts and learned that there is inaccurate information being circulated. Continued community engagement will be critical for the success of these projects," said Supervisor Otto Lee. "The future residents of these Project Homekey units will not be transient homeless, drug users, or criminals as stated in misleading flyers and on social media.'

These projects will require all residents to go through a thorough vetting process. Only the permanent supportive housing projects will require background checks. Future residents will be families with young children, veterans, and others will be working people who lost their homes due to the pandemic.

The costs of these projects include the construction and renovation of these sites as well as the cost of supportive, wraparound services that will help stabilize our unhoused neighbors. These wrap-around services will include support for job placement, medical and behavior health counseling, and more. Residents will be required to pay rent, subsidized based on their income level.

# **Santa Clara County administers first kid COVID vaccines**

fter months of anticipation from lawmakers and parents, Santa Clara County
on Wednesday gave its first COVID-19
shots to some of its youngest residents.

Hand-in-hand with their parents, a few hundred kids flocked to clinics across the South Bay to get the first jabs of the kid-size COVID-19 vaccine. The line for the clinic at Emmanuel Baptist Church in East San Jose has been nonstop since the clinic opened at 8:45 a.m, workers at the site said.

Nate Huynh, 9, and his sister Kate, 7, were among more than 250 kids with an appointment at the church. Mother Tiana Huynh said the family has been waiting anxiously to get their kids vaccinated.

"They have been waiting for this all year," Huynh told San José Spotlight. "We haven't let them do playdates or anything like that. With the vaccines, we'll be much more comfortable letting them do things like normal time again."

Federal health officials gave final approval for Pfizer's kid-size COVID-19 shot earlier this week, opening the way to vaccination for children as young as 5. In Santa Clara County, that's roughly 167,000 kids who are now eligible to get the two-dose pediatric shot, which is one-third the adult dosage.

Nate, sporting a green shirt with characters from the Super Mario Bros. video game, helped his mom comfort his little sister while the family waited in line.

"Every time I get a shot, I cry," Kate said, donning a Queen Elsa shirt and pink Hello Kitty shoes.

Sitting on her mom's lap, Kate took a shot in her left arm. Her brother hovered next to her.

"It's ok to be scared," Huynh told her daughter. Both siblings picked out their bandaids and stickers. They will come back at the end of the month to finish their doses.

The Pfizer kids vaccine is about 90% effective, according to the company.

Getting young kids vaccinated is a crucial step to end the pandemic, health experts say. Santa Clara County has spent weeks preparing for the newly-eligible population in anticipation of the authorization.

"We definitely have seen infections in this age group... and they are disruptive both to the children's education as well as their parents lives," said Dr. Jennifer Tong, associate chief medical officer at Santa Clara Valley Medical Center.

Vaccinating young kids will also help curb the transmission rate and keep others in the community safer, Tong added.

The county is slated to receive 55,000 pediatric shots this week. Officials say they anticipate a high demand for the kid-size vaccines, but are confident in the county's capacity to vaccinate as many children as possible in the upcoming weeks. Families have already booked up the majority of this week's appointments, according to officials.

Aria Shukla, 6, was also nervous for her shot. Sporting her Wonder Woman headpiece, Aria was crying and screaming as it came time to get inoculated.

"We've been wanting to do this because I have elderly parents," father Prakash Shukla told San José Spotlight. "I just wanted all the kids, everybody, to be vaccinated."

Aria proudly showed off her inoculated arm while she waited at the facility.

"I missed sleepovers," she said.

The kid-size vaccines come at a time where infections and hospitalizations caused by the Delta variant are dropping sharply. Santa Clara County is seeing a seven-day rolling average of 148 cases—less than half the average of 364 cases in late August.

As of this week, 85.3% of Santa Clara County residents ages 12 and up—more than 1.46 million people—are fully vaccinated. When children under 12 are included, the overall completion rate for vaccinations drops to 73.3%.

The county will start bringing mobile vaccine clinics to 80 school sites this week, officials said.

"Starting tomorrow, (the teams) will be vis-

iting multiple schools at our highest risk communities where parents may not be able to take time off work, but have consented for their children to get vaccinated," Tong said.

# **Evolution of the Carnatic Violin**

By Veena Krishnan Special to the Times

Violin, the four-stringed instrument whose melodies enchant many, has made its mark in Carnatic music, too.

The Carnatic violin style has evolved over the years to produce its own uniqueness and popularity. It has contributed so much to the Carnatic field. As you may know, the violin is an instrument that originates from European classical music tradi-

tions. Over the years this instrument made its way into the Carnatic world and

still holds strong today. The violin's versatility, size, and tone (which almost mimics the human voice) made it a perfect fit for Carnatic music. Carnatic violin can be performed as a solo, duet, and so on, or as accompaniment.

The violin first made its way into Southern India about 200 years ago when the British ruled

India. Through the help of mainly three individuals, the violin was adapted and popularized to the Carnatic field. A minister from the Tanjavur Maratha court, Varahappa Iyer, visited a British governor's house, where he first saw Western instruments. He became fascinated by the violin and started becoming proficient in the instrument when it was gifted to him by the governor. He eventually started playing well enough to accompany Carnatic singers.

Baluswami Dikshitar and Vadivelu were great contributors, too. Baluswami Dikshitar was the brother of the Carnatic composer, Muttuswami Dikshitar. Shortly after hearing a performance, he learned the Western violin for three years. After that, he developed the instru-

ment to fit to the Carnatic style. Vadivelu, the youngest of the Thanjavur quartet, was encouraged by Maharaja Swati Tirunal to learn the violin. Vadivelu eventually learned the violin and his perform-

ances helped ignite an initial spark in this new instrument. And so, the Carnatic violin began with these three pioneers.

Now, the Carnatic violin had evolved into a unique style of its own. Carnatic violinists sit on the ground and place the scroll of the violin on their right foot and the top under their neck. They have a unique playing technique, too. Carnatic violinists closely imitate the human voice by gliding their fingers on the fingerboard in a spe-

cific way to produce different gamakas (the vocal twists and nuances). The Car-

natic violin is tuned differently, too.

There have been many great Carnatic violinists, and I will be naming just a few from the 20th century. Vidwan Lalgudi Jayaraman, Prof. T N Krishnan, and Sri. M.

S. Gopalakrishnan were some of the many great violinists of that time. A present-day legend is Sri. V V Sundaram, and he has contributed a lot to the field. Even now, the violin dominates Carnatic concerts and is one of the first choices for accompaniment. Carnatic violin solos are another treat to hear, too. It's nice to learn about the history of this instrument and know about all the people who have contributed to its growth.

The Carnatic violin has an interesting history and has surely made a huge impact in the field of Carnatic music.







# Survey: Nearly 60% of Americans unlikely to travel for Thanksgiving or Christmas

hile rising vaccination rates against COVID-19 have increased travelers' comfort levels, most Americans are still opting to stay home this holiday season, according to a new national survey commissioned by the American Hotel & Lodging Association (AHLA) conducted by Morning Consult.

The survey found nearly 30% of Americans are likely to travel for Thanksgiving and 33% are likely to travel for Christmas—an increase from 21% and 24%, respectively, compared to 2020. Those who do plan to travel over the holidays expect to drive, but rising gas prices may dampen those plans.

The survey of 2,200 adults was conducted October 30 – November 1, 2021, by Morning Consult on behalf of AHLA. Key findings include the following:

- Just one in three Americans plans to travel for Christmas (33% likely to travel, 59% unlikely), and even fewer plan to travel for Thanksgiving (29% likely, 61% unlikely)
  - 68% of Thanksgiving travelers

plan to stay with family or friends, while 22% plan to stay in a hotel

- 66% of Christmas travelers plan to stay with family or friends, while 23% plan to stay in a hotel
- 52% of Americans say they plan to take fewer trips and 53% plan to take shorter trips due to rising gas prices
- Leisure travelers are making several adjustments to their travel plans based on the current state of the pandemic, including only traveling within driving distance (58%), taking fewer trips (48%), and taking shorter trips (46%)
- Among parents with children under the age of 12, 41% say the availability of vaccines for kids ages 5-11 will make them more likely to travel
- 68% of Thanksgiving travelers and 64% of Christmas travelers plan to drive, compared to 11% and 14%, respectively, who plan to fly

"While vaccines have helped travelers feel more comfortable, rising gas prices and continued concerns about the pandemic are making many Americans hesitant to travel during the holidays. Despite a slight expected uptick in holiday travel this year, hotels will continue to face economic fallout from the pandemic, underscoring the need for targeted federal relief, such as the Save Hotel Jobs Act, to support the industry and its workforce until travel fully returns," said American Hotel & Lodging Association President and CEO Chip Rogers.


