Lewiston Police Chief David St. Pierre and Lewiston Fire Chief Mark Caron were sworn into office at the November 16th City Council meeting. Many police and fire employees, friends, and family members were on hand to support the new public safety chiefs, and City Administrator Heather Hunter shared sentiments about the two appointments, "Both personnel selected for the chiefs positions have successfully risen through the public safety ranks, have strong ties and fondness for the community of Lewiston, and have shared great strategic visions for their respective departments. They possess great experience and vast respect within their departments that will allow them to pursue many initiatives as well as confidently face emergencies placed before them."

David St. Pierre has been a member of the Lewiston Police Department for over 29 years; having served as a sworn officer since August of 1992. He has served in many capacities from patrol officer, special agent with the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency, detective, sergeant,

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Newsmakers, Names & Faces Collins Urges President Biden to Protect Afghan Women and Girls

U.S. Senator Susan Collins (R-Maine) joined all 24 female Senators in a bipartisan letter to President Joe Biden calling on him to protect the rights of Afghan women and girls following the U.S. military withdrawal from Afghanistan

In a letter to the President, Senator Collins and her colleagues wrote, "In the wake of the U.S. military withdrawal from Afghanistan, we write to urge your Administration to develop an interagency plan to preserve the political, economic, social, and basic human rights of Afghan women and girls."

"Last year an estimated 3.5 million girls were in school, with 100,000 women enrolled in public and private universities. Women also began to succeed in business and government . . . However, lacking a legitimate Afghan government and military forces to protect them, women and girls are now suffering the predations of a Taliban regime with a track record of brutalizing, isolating, and denying them life and liberty," the Senators continued.

"You have committed to press the Taliban to uphold the rights of women and girls, and you have stated that America will maintain an enduring partnership with the people of Afghanistan resisting Taliban rule. We will advise, support, and enable those efforts through legislation and engagement with your Administration. Afghan women and girls need our action now," the Senators concluded.

Lewiston Dog Licensing for 2022 Now Available

Any Lewiston resident who owns a dog may now license their pet for the 2022 calendar vear. Dog licenses are due January 1st of each year. All dogs that are six months old or older within Lewiston must be licensed per state law. A pet owner can receive a license for their dog at the Lewiston City Clerk's Office located at City Hall. In order to license a dog, the owner must show proof that the dog has a current, State of Maine rabies certificate which is proof that the dog has been immunized against rabies. If an animal is spayed or neutered, the

owner should bring proof from the veterinarian of this as well. All dog licenses expire on December 31st of each year. Dog license fees are \$11 for a male or female dog and \$6 for a spayed or neutered animal. Dog licenses renewed after January 31st are subject to the mandatory \$25 late fine.

Residents unable to make it into City Hall can website for information use the outside red drop regarding dog licensing box for all City Hall services. This is located by the Park Street entrance and accessible 24 hours a day.

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Mental Health Summit at the Augusta Civic Center on Nov. 30

How has the pandemic impacted mental health and mental health services in Maine? What dire problems and gaps in community services has it revealed and exacerbated? How can we meet skyrocketing demand for services, while acute problems such as staffing shortages make delivering those services so challenging? These and related critical issues will be spotlighted at "Mental Health Summit: Reimagining Mental Health Services in Maine," a one-day conference for providers, consumers, advocates, and legislators to be held on Tuesday, November 30th, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Augusta Civic Center, 76 Community Drive.

The summit is being sponsored by Alliance for Addiction and Mental Health Services, Maine; Behavioral Health Community Collaborative; Consumer Council System of Maine; NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) Maine; and Pathways of Maine. The special keynote speaker via Zoom will be Chuck Ingoglia, President/ CEO of the National Council for Mental Wellbeing, who is available for pre-Summit media interviews by calling (207)-512-0532.

"Mental Health Summit: Reimagining Mental

Health Services in Maine" is being held at a time when the global pandemic has rocked the nation's mental health and health services. According to a recent Morning Consult poll released by the National Council for Mental Wellbeing, 78 percent of mental health and substance-use treatment organizations report increased demand for services over the past three months, continuing a relentless surge that began more than a year ago. The same poll also revealed workforce shortages have made it extremely difficult for mental health and substance-use treatment organizations to keep up with demand. Fully 97 percent of them report it has been "difficult to recruit employees"; 83 percent report increased demand for mental health treatment; 78 percent report increased demand for crisis services; 76 percent report increased demand for social support services; 69 percent report increased demand for substance-use treatment.

"The pandemic has exacerbated our nation's mental health and substance-use crisis. It also has made it more difficult for treatment organizations to provide clients the care they need and deserve," said Chuck Ingoglia, President/CEO of the National Council for Mental Wellbeing. "This crisis demands that we find solutions that allow clients to get the treatment they need and provide organizations the resources they require to attract and retain staff in a competitive marketplace."

Discrepancy in Health Care Worker Vaccination Data




Chart displaying the data Nick Murray speaks on in his statement pertaining to vaccinations of health care workers.

Maine Policy has been tracking the state's health care worker vaccination data since it became available in May. Maine Policy Institute analyst, Nick Murray, released a statement after the release of the Health Care Worker COVID-19 Vaccination report for the month of October. In his statement, he asserts the following:

The Maine DHHS and CDC's own data disputes claims it made today in its press release related to the total number of health care workers whose vaccination status has been reported since the agency began collecting these data in May. The release issued

today claims the total staff reported by health care facilities fell by only 516 (1%) between May and October. The agency's own data available on its public dashboard show there are 16,046 fewer workers at these facilities than in May.

According to the agency's data, since July, the last month before Governor Mills announced the mandate for health care workers, the overall workforce reported at facilities impacted by the rule has declined by 19.65%. Since May, there are 1,242 fewer vaccinated workers and 14,804 fewer unvaccinated workers at these facilities.

Growth in the state's vaccination rate for health care workers over the May to October reporting period is entirely a product of shrinking denominators. Thousands of workers have left the workforce at designated health care facilities impacted by the rule, with the largest losses coming in the two months leading up to the enforcement deadline of the vaccine mandate.

The explanations provided by the administration related to normal expansion and contraction, reporting rate fluctuations, and seasonal changes in workforce cannot explain this dramatic shift in the overall number of staff reporting vaccination status at these facilities. There is little doubt that the governor's vaccine mandate is the cause of these irregular losses in staff experienced by designated healthcare facilities. Maine DHHS and CDC need to answer to the discrepancy in the data reported on their public dashboard and the numbers released to the public in today's press release.



LYAC member Nafisa Tasnia added, "Actually, the park naming contest provides an opportunity to make a bit of history here in Lewiston."

The online and hard copy contest form requires a proposed name along with a brief narrative explaining why that name proposal should be selected

Submissions will be reviewed by Lewiston staff and LYAC. Should there be multiple exemplary submissions, the "top 3" will result in interviews being scheduled to acquire further information about each proposed suggestion. The final name selected is subject to Lewiston City Council approval. Following the park contest, LYAC will seek a monetary sponsor for the naming of the park's field/sledding hill.



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



Navigating the Porcupines

Chowderheads with the Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society had a multitude of outdoor adventure opportunities scheduled for the second day of our annual fall festival weekend on Mount Desert Island. Mountain hikes, bike rides on the Acadia National Park Carriage Roads, war canoe competitions were included and some members planned to participate in the unique Belt Sander Races at the Atlantic Brewing Company. I proposed a sea kayak trip. My preference was a traverse along the rugged east shore of the island from Seal Harbor to Bar Harbor. The usual elderly suspects

signed on.

The day began with a solemn event, a memorial service for recently departed and much loved member Tee Brower. Held on the beach at Seal Harbor, her husband, John Brower, conducted the ceremony sharing memories and photos of Tee's long remarkable life.

As the service concluded, I realized that contrary to the weather forecast, winds were blowing from the north instead of the southeast complicating my kayaking plan. A weather check indicated the forecast had changed and variable winds were predicted throughout the day. Recalling the same trip had to be aborted a few

years prior due to strong unexpected winds, I decided to explore alternatives. After consulting with the other intended participants, we elected to complete a circumnavigation of the Porcupine Islands. Our choice was in no way a sacrifice as the area is one of the most scenic in Maine.

The closest location to begin a trip around the Porcupines is a rudimentary landing at the end of Bridge Street in downtown Bar Harbor. The tide was rising when we arrived at the busy launching area. A multitude of hikers were negotiating a sand bar between the shore and Bar Island, and a large group of kayakers were preparing to depart on a guided trip. By the time we unloaded our kayaks and gear and found parking on nearby West Street, some of the hikers who had misjudged the tide were wading back from Bar Island.

We began our voyage by rounding the west end of Bar Island in Frenchman Bay and continuing on the north side of the archipelago. Proceeding with modest winds from the north, the views were phenomenal in all directions. During previous trips in this area, we encountered cruise ships moored amongst the islands. Banned due to Covid concerns, none were present this time.

After passing Sheep Porcupine Island, we navigated to a secluded gravel beach on the northwest side of Burnt Porcupine Island for lunch and a respite. A wonderful view of Schoodic and Black Mountains on the mainland made my bland outdoor fare much more appetizing.

Continuing east past tiny Rum Key, we persisted along the largest island, Long Porcupine. At the eastern terminus, we approached a narrow channel between Long Porcupine and a miniature atoll called The Hop. From a distance, it was unclear if there was sufficient depth for safe navigation. One Chowderhead successfully probed the passageway and everyone followed.

Turning west, we began our return to Bar Harbor on the ocean side of the island chain. For the remainder of the excursion, we were blessed with continuous views of the mountains of Acadia National Park. Alas, the summit of the tallest, Cadillac Mountain, was enveloped in clouds.

The character of the south-facing periphery of the Porcupines is significantly different as tall, imposing cliffs dominate the shorelines. A different wind direction from the southeast caused some turbulence between Long and Sheep Porcupines. The rolling waves crashed against the precipitous bluffs adding a little drama to our excursion.

The waters calmed as we passed in lee of Bald Porcupine Island and entered bustling Bar Harbor. Large yachts, tour boats, and a multitude of smaller crafts cluttered the congested waterfront.

When we arrived at Bridge Street Landing, the half mile sand bar between Bar Island and the shore was completely submerged by a high tide. The landing was empty of people except for another group of kayakers who were preparing for the next guided tour. Ours had been a most excellent paddling endeavor. I had no regrets about our decision to forgo the traverse which would have exposed us to varying winds and possible hazards particularly turning Great Head and Otter Point. Maybe next year we'll have cooperative conditions.

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




