Benton Township Church Finishes Tiny Home for Harbor Habitat

It took a group of children to get the idea and a whole church and community to come together to make their dream a reality. Now, St. Augustine of Canterbury Episcopal Church has finished a new tiny home it built in Benton Township.

Children's Ministry Coordinator Cara Gillespie tells us the idea for the home came from the church's Children's Chapel.

"Every year the kids raise money for charitable giving, and they get to decide how they're going to spend that at the end of the year," Gillespie said. "Four years ago - so in January of 2018 - they decided that they wanted to save their money for a specific project, and their project that they had in mind was to build a tiny house for someone in need. We thought we'd give it a try."

The Children's Chapel kids couldn't just build a house on their own, of course. Gillespie and others from the church started asking around

"We made some phone calls. I talked with a friend of mine who works and teaches at Andrews University at its school of architecture and interior design," Gillespie said. "He got me in touch with some other colleagues and Erin Hudson, who is the director of our local Habitat affiliate, Harbor Habitat for Humanity."

From there, a plan of action started coming together.

"Habitat gifted us a small lot that they couldn't build on because of its size, and we built a home from the ground up," Gillespie said. It has a footprint of about 640 square feet with loft space in a neighborhood that has a lot of little Habitat homes in it already. It's pretty

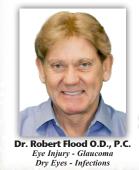

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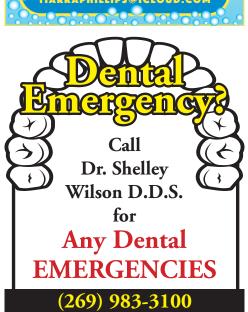

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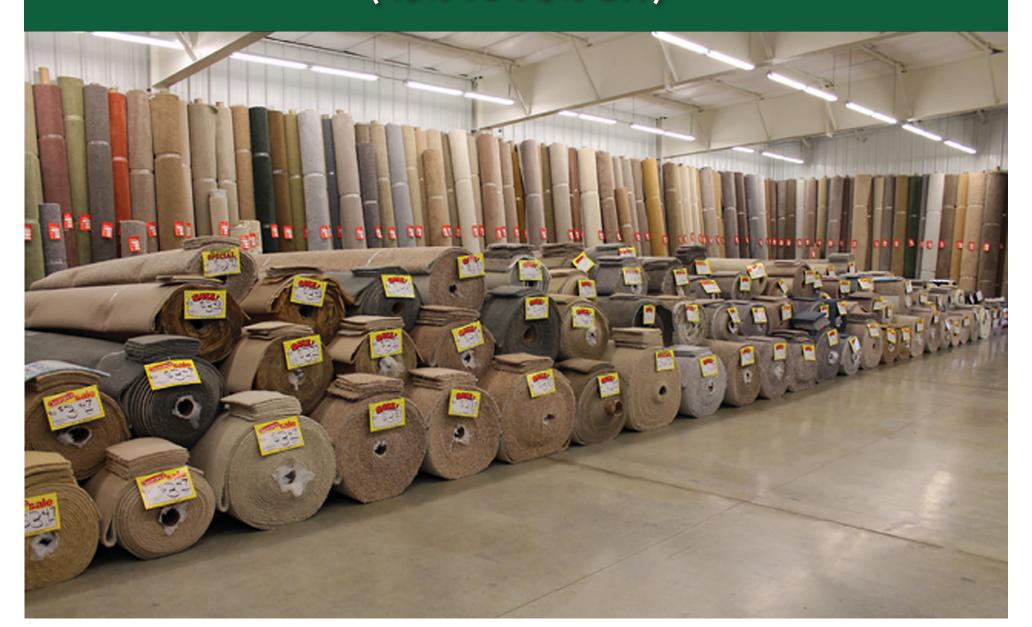
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Listen to MI Business Coalition

Last month, the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) released their latest emergency temporary standard (ETS) which mandates private companies with 100 or more employees to require their workers to be vaccinated against COVID-19 or wear masks and undergo regular testing. Employees who refuse to get vaccinated or tested would no longer covered by OSHA's anti-retaliation or discrimination protections, meaning they could be fired for noncompliance.

Thankfully, a federal appeals court halted the ETS two weeks later arguing the rule "grossly exceeds OS-HA's statutory authority." Their criticism was scathing. "The Mandate is a one-size fits-all sledgehammer that makes hardly any attempt to account for differences in workplaces (and workers) that have more than a little bearing on workers' varying degrees of susceptibility to the supposedly 'grave danger' the Mandate purports to address," the court wrote.

Even with the strong language above, the future of the directive remains uncertain. As such, employment attorneys are encouraging businesses with over 100 employees to move forward with compliance in order to avoid being caught unprepared should the ETS withstand its legal challenge.

Our chamber is also preparing for that possibility, and has joined a statewide advocacy coalition called **Listen to MI Business** in an effort to voice our concerns and affect change before it's too late.

Composed of 26 different statewide and regional business organizations, the Listen to MI Business Coalition supports increasing vaccinations as an important and sensible goal but not as a burdensome, 490-page federal mandate. We've been among the loudest voices to speak out against the rule as well as the administration's decision to bypass the traditional rulemaking process

To be constructive, we've also been hard at work advocating for changes - at the state and federal level - should the rule be upheld. On Monday, for example, we sent a joint letter to OSHA that both voiced our opposition and offered a number of suggestions.

New research by the Society for Human Resource Management found that 90% of employers "believe it will be somewhat or very challenging to implement the Biden administration's pending mandate that organizations with 100 or more employees require workers to be vaccinated against COVID-19 or undergo weekly testing." The poll also showed that "80% of organizations that meet the mandate criteria are concerned about the

amount of time they will have to spend enforcing or tracking employees' vaccination status or test status."

Meanwhile, nearly 40% of organizations surveyed said retaining workers will be the most difficult aspect of Biden's mandate, 90% believe some of their employees will quit as a result and a full 65% indicated their organization will be unable to afford to pay for employee testing.

Statewide, 61% of Michigan voters oppose employees being forced to get the vaccine as a condition of employment, according to a Marketing Resource Group (MRG) survey of 602 likely Michigan voters between Oct. 18-24.

Even Gov. Gretchen Whitmer is apparently worried about the impact of a federal COVID vaccine mandate on the state's 48,000-employee workforce. This week, the Daily News in Greenville reported her as telling business leaders in Montcalm County that she had the same concerns as some of them; that the mandate, if enforced, could lead to workers, including those in state government, walking off the job.

"We're an employer too, the state of Michigan is," Whitmer said. "I know if that mandate happens, we're going to lose state employees. That's why I haven't proposed a mandate at the state level. Some states have. We have not, we're waiting to see what happens in court."

Despite the legal battles and overwhelming concern surrounding the 100+ employee mandate, OSHA is already seeking input about whether they should issue a similar vaccine mandate for employers with *fewer than* 100 employees. We are opposed to this too.

Small companies in particular lack the manpower necessary to implement a federal mandate of this size, scope and burden. They also lack the resources should they be found out of compliance. Companies who don't adhere could face stiff fines — almost \$14,000 for each employee who fails to comply and up to \$136,000 for businesses found to be in "willful violation" of the requirements.

Most importantly, there is no data that suggests enterprises - regardless of size - need to even shoulder such a burden. Businesses have been on the frontlines of the COVID-19 pandemic, working to stay afloat while keeping their employees, customers and workplaces safe. As a result of their efforts, they are not a significant source of COVID-19 outbreaks and never have been.

For these reasons and more, we remain fundamentally opposed to the ETS and will continue calling on President Biden to withdraw this rule and immediately shift his administration's attention towards more pressing economic priorities like streamlining the supply chain, solving the staffing crisis, and stopping inflation.

cute. We're pretty proud of it. It's got one bedroom, and it's got everything you need. It's kind of a little square footprint and then it's got a steep pitch on the roof, but there's loft space upstairs. It's kind of long and skinny upstairs."

All of that was built from scratch.

"We have built a 1,000 square foot home in Benton Charter Township. It's currently owned by St. Augustine's. Once we have an occupancy permit, we will gift it to Harbor Habitat as a very low-cost rental for one of their clients."

The new home is a small triangle frame house at 378 Linden Avenue.

"You could put a small family in it, but it's kind of aimed toward a single person or maybe a couple," Gillespie said. "Our local Habitat owns some properties that they rent to their clients, and there's just not enough of the one-and two-bedroom homes, not enough inventory of that. Many of their clients are on assistance, and they just can't take something larger than that. So, there's just really no place for a single person or maybe one parent with a child or a couple to go. There's just very little inventory."

The church and the Children's Chapel planned an official blessing for the new tiny home to be held this month.

"The Episcopal Church has a liturgy for the blessing of a home, and we're going to use a version of that. The kids helped me rewrite it in children's language, a little plainer language, and we're going to bless the home and have a little celebration. It's been almost four years in the making, so it's been a long time coming and we're excited."

With the tiny home all finished, anyone can drive by and check it out. Gillespie says this is just a start as the church has already acquired a second lot from Harbor Habitat to build another home. Part of the rental generat-

South Haven Rotary Building a

Water System in Kenya

Work has officially begun on a longplanned South Haven Rotary water project in Kenya. The Rotary's Art Avers tells us they're constructing a 600,000-liter concrete water storage cistern for the Ngoswani Maternal and Child Hospital. The project was inspired by

Rotarian Dr. Marty Graber, who worked for decades to help people in Africa.

"This is the last project for our doctor-missionary and fellow Rotarian in Kenya who's been there 40 years," Ayers said. "He retired last year, and he had a desire to finish a project to kind of put his stamp on everything. Since water is a dire need and they only have very limited access to water, and here you have a hospital needing water for the obvious, and so the last project that he wanted taken care of was this rainwater harvesting project."

Kenya has two major wet seasons, and the hospital has 7,000 square feet of metal roofing. The roof of the hospital will be used to catch water, which will go into an underground tank.

"It's a 60,000 liter and 160,000-gallon cistern that will collect the rainwater so that they can have clean water for the hospital," Ayers said. "The system itself has two filters to clean the water."

The main purpose of the system is to provide clean water not only to the hospital, but to the entire area.

"This is a hospital that, for all intents and purposes, has the capability of serving a 300,000-thousand-person clientele simply because they have so few medical facilities in

years to bring the project together. Construction started this month.

"I had talked to my counterpart in Kenya and the contractor who I met when my wife and I were in Kenya, and I requested that they send pictures when the appropriate time was to be had, and we received those first pictures the other day. For those I sent them to, you can talk all you want about a 160,000-gallon cistern, but when you see the pictures and when you see how large of an area it will encompass, it really puts the project into perspective."

Getting to the point where construction would begin wasn't easy.

"This is something that's been going on Ayers says it took the Rotary about three for almost three years, if not more, and it's truly been a labor of love," Ayers said. "There's been a lot of labor involved, but for all the right reasons. When you think about the pandemic

Dear Dave,

I thought I was going to get control of my

Lots of people make big promises with the best intentions on December 31st. It seems everyone comes up with a laundry list of New Year's resolutions, but research shows very few people actually achieve their goals.

If you're ready — and I mean really ready to reset your life and succeed with your New Year's resolutions, here are a few simple, proven

First, write down your top goal. Pick the resolution that means the most to you and write it down. You're more likely to succeed if you can focus on a single goal, and you have a greater chance of achieving it if you write it down - on paper, on purpose. And make sure the resolution you choose is very important to you. Writing down a goal just because it's what someone else is doing, or because it sounds like a good idea, isn't good enough. If your goal isn't yours, it

Second, set benchmarks. Let's say you want to pay off your credit cards before July. You need to make that goal measurable throughout the year by setting benchmarks. If you owe \$5,000 on your credit cards and want to pay them off in six months, you need to pay about \$833 towards them every month. Write your benchmark down beneath your goal, and make a plan for how you're going to get it done.

Three, find an accountability partner. A great accountability partner isn't afraid to ask how your goals are coming along, and they'll call you on it when you're slacking. If you set a financial goal, a good accountability partner isn't going to be the friend who always asks you to go shopping. Studies have shown that having a strong accountability partner increases the likelihood of achieving a goal dramatically.

And finally, make sure you reward yourself along the way. It's tough to stay motivated when hitting your goal takes a while. Lots of folks start out at full speed, only to see the momentum disappear over time. You might treat yourself to a night at the movies when you've paid off the first \$1,000 on your credit cards, or maybe a nice, new shirt when you've paid off half the card.

Sometimes life doesn't work out the way we think it will, Isaac. Our priorities can change, and our goals may change, too. If that's why you didn't make your resolutions happen this year, that's fine. Just don't make the mistake of thinking it's too late to change and improve your life!

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The SWMI housing market sales dropped 23 percent in September. This makes three consecutive months that sales have fallen more than 19 percent below sales from last year. Selling prices made

moderate increases in September and year-todate. Selling prices in September set records when compared to previous years. The overall market continued to do well even with the inventory of houses for sale dropping over 20 percent per month since June.

In September, 398 houses were sold, compared to 518 houses sold in September 2020, for a 23 percent decrease. Sales in September were slightly higher than in August (398 vs. 388).

The Housing Market in Southwestern Michigan

the end of September was 2895, up 6 percent over September 2020 (2895 vs.2721). At 2895house, September set a new sales record in the yearover-year sales records since 2006. For the last nine months, the year-to-date sales have set records over previous years.

After selling prices in August declined slightly for the first time in 2021, selling prices in September were up slightly. Selling prices for the month and year-to-date surpass prices in 2021. The average selling price in September 2021 was \$324,171 compared to \$316,525 in September 2020, for a 2 percent increase. The year-to-date average selling price in September 2021 rose 11 percent over September 2020 (\$319,758 vs. \$287,218).

The median selling price in September 2021 rose 5 percent to \$230,000 from \$220,000 in September 2020. Year-to-date, the median sell-

Year-to-date, the number of houses sold at ing price climbed 7 percent (\$225,000 vs. \$210,000). The year-to-date median selling price also set a new record price in the month of September in the year-over-year comparison.

The median price is the price at which 50% of the homes sold were above that price, and 50% were below.

The inventory of houses for sale fell 20 percent from a year ago (922 vs. 1156), bringing the inventory of houses for sale to a 3.4-months supply of inventory available for buyers. The inventory level in August was also at 3.4-months supply. For comparison, in September 2009, there were 3757 houses for sale and a 17.3-months supply of inventory.

The total dollar volume plunged 21 percent September 2021 (\$129,020,263 vs. \$163,960,120). With the number of sales at higher prices, the year-to-date total dollar volume set a new record for the dollar volume at the end of September (\$924,741,988 vs. \$781,521,082). The year-to-date total dollar volume rose 18 percent.

There were three bank-owned or foreclosed homes as a percentage of all transactions in September. In January, the rate was 4 percent, the highest rate for the year. The previous lowest percentage in September was 1 percent in 2020. The highest percentage in September was 37 percent in 2009.

Nationally, the Freddie Mac mortgage rate in September was 3.01, up slightly from 2.87 in August for a 30-year conventional mortgage.
